Base sets change of command

Ingram replaces Bishop as 64 FTW commander

Colonel Ingram will replace Col. Charles E. Bishop, who has been nominated for promotion to brigadier general and assigned to Holloman AFB, N.M. as the commander of tactical Training Holloman.

Presiding over the 10 a.m. change of command ceremony will be Gen. John W. Roberts, Air Training Command commander.

Colonel Ingram is very familiar with the West Texas area. He was born 140 miles north of Lubbock in McLean, Texas. He attended high school in Phillips, a few miles northeast of Amarillo, Texas.

Poor treatment

The situation is that my wife was sick last Thursday (Jan. 24) and we took her to the hospital to see a physician's assistant. He ran some tests on her and he told her that if she got any sicker to come in immediately for treatment.

Friday evening late or Saturday morning she became sicker, my son was also brought in Saturday morning along with my wife with a severe cold and bronchitis. Both were refused treatment.

I was wondering why since we are guaranteed medical coverage we don't receive any treatment whatsoever. The treatment that we do receive is inferior to anything we could receive downtown.

Also at this time we are in the process of being sued for a bill for \$102 that CHAMPUS was supposed to have paid over 2 years ago and never has.

Your base hospital continually strives to

deliver quality health care to all active duty, retired, and dependents, so I was genuinely concerned when I heard your problem.


The Hospital Commander, together with a board of physicians, carefully examined the records and concerns expressed in your inquiry. According to the records, and from interviewing the individuals on duty at the time, both your wife and son were seen by a physician and treated or referred as appropriate.

I regret if you feel that what was done was not adequate but neither your wife or son was refused medical treatment.

The Emergency Room is not staffed after duty hours to provide for routine medical care. It is, however, the Hospital Commander's policy that any patient who presents himself at the ER will be seen and, immediate treatment rendered, or, if the problem is not an emergency, the patient may be asked to make a regular appointment in the clinic the following duty day.

The hospital staff is quite concerned about insuring your satisfaction. If, in the future you encounter a problem or feel that you have not received adequate care, try to resolve it on the spot. Talk to the health care provider; explain your concerns. If you prefer, there is a Patient Affairs Representative, the Hospital Administrator, The Chief of Hospital Services or the Hospital Commander.




Small Claims Court settles lesser disputes

In days of King Author's Court, disputes were settled by fighting or by ordeal. In the 20th Century United States however, fighting between persons who disagree is generally discouraged. Our alternative - a highly developed court system.

Many of you may say to yourself, that problems can only be aggravated by involving lawyers, judges, and courts with what seems to you incomprehensible gobbledegook. I agree - sometimes. They





problems involved in a complicated court action. However, Texas has recognized this problem and provided a

In Texas, a Small Claims Court has been established to provide a forum for settling

simply do not justify the small disputes. The procedures are simple and informal. NO ATTORNEY IS REQUIRED. The filing fee is \$7.50. The fee and any other court costs are usually assessed against the losing party. The court may award up to \$150.00.

The Small Claims Court is a simple and effective solution to many of your day-to-day disputes. The State Junior Bar publishes an excellent pamphlet which details the process one must follow in pursuing a Case in Small Claims Court. This pamphlet and other information is available at your base legal office.



The 54th cruised into the championships with wins over Sturon-one, 31-24, and Resource Management, 44-30.



Interested individuals should contact a member of the gym staff for further details and pick up a "Request for Specialized Training" form which should be submitted as soon as possible.



is looking into the problem. One of the possible solutions would be to build several new courts. But that takes money . . . lots of it.


