Ingram commands 64th FTW

Col. Richard A. Ingram came home last weekend, returning to the South Plains to take command of the 64th Flying Training Wing.

The McClean, Texas native assumed command of the wing during change of command ceremonies here Saturday morning. Gen. John W. Roberts, Air Training Command commander, presided over the ceremony.

Colonel Ingram replaces Col. Charles E. Bishop who has been nominated for promotion to brigadier general and assigned to Holloman AFB, N.M., as commander of Tactical Training Holloman.

An estimated 500 people braved the chilling 32 degree temperature to witness the

change of command. In addition, four squadrons of bluesuiters representing Maintenance, Operations, Resource Management and Air Base Group took part in the ceremony.

Most of those on hand for the ceremony stayed for the Ingram's reception in the Officers' Club.

Prior to his assignment at Reese, Colonel Ingram served as the Director of Information at ATC. The colonel was assigned at Reese in the early 1970's. He served as the commander of the 54th Flying Training Squadron, 64th Air Base Group and as Deputy Commander for Operations during his 1972-1976 stint here.

'RIF' cuts 21 positions; few problems foreseen

A 3.5 percent Air Training Command Reduction In Force will delete 21 civilian positions here by June 30, but; local officials are confident that the cuts will not cause major problems for any Reese employees.

According to Tom Ireland, Civilian Personnel officer, the RIF is necessary to bring the command civilian manning level in line with budgetary constraints and the Leach Amendment, which was enacted as part of the Civil Service Reform Act of 1978.

"Actually," noted Ireland, "the cuts aren't nearly as harsh as anticipated. At one time we thought that about 1,700 positions would have to be

deleted command wide. However, through positive management actions that figure was chopped to fewer than 600."

Although 21 positions will be eliminated locally at this time, only 10 civilian employees will actually be involved in the RIF process. The other 11 positions are currently vacant. All of the deleted positions were identified by the deputy commanders. Thirteen of the slots were wage grade positions and eight were general schedule spots.

"We have a history of taking care of our people here," added Ireland. "We expect to be able to keep all 10 of the people at Reese in their same grades and pay scales."

Ireland explained that most of the people will be able to move into the more than 30 job vacancies that still exist here. Those that don't qualify for those openings will probably be able to fill other vacancies caused by attrition.

To protect the people involved in the RIF, local officials have placed a temporary hiring freeze on the vacant positions here.

"If those avenues fail the people have 'retreat' and 'bump' rights, says the head of civilian personnel. "But we don't expect anyone to have to do that."

Command officials stressed the fact that the cuts were "nonworkload related"

During visit

Roberts cites wing effort

Gen. John W. Roberts, commander of Air Training Command visited Reese Saturday for the change of command ceremony in which Col. Richard A. Ingram succeeded Col. Charles E. Bishop as commander of the 64th Flying Training Wing.

In the course of his visit, probably the last he will make here before retiring April 1, General Roberts complimented the men and women assigned there for sustained excellence in

administering the undergraduate pilot training program.

"All the people at Reese," he said, "commander, staff, flying and support personnel, have distinguished themselves by maintaining the highest standards in producing pilots who will be flying Air Force planes for years to come. They have contributed mightily to Air Force readiness.

"And that isn't just rhetoric," he continued. "It is substantiated by the number of important awards that units

and individuals have received over the years.

"For example," he said, "flying and maintenance squadrons and the hospital have won Air Force Outstanding Unit Awards; an officer assigned to the Comptroller Division was selected Outstanding Budget Officer in ATC; the civil engineering squadron was named best in the command for 1978; also in 1978, the base newspaper won a command-wide Information

Racquetball court lights

I would like to complain about the maintenance of lights on the racquetball courts. I don't understand why the Civil Engineers don't do maintenance or repair between 8 and 10 a.m. CE should schedule their time to do this because the last three or four times that we have had a court they came in to change the lights. It takes anywhere from 30 to 45 minutes and you lose your hour of racquetball. We only have two racquetball courts anyway and it is hard enough to get a court now.

It should be feasible if they would just take the time to coordinate with the gym to do the maintenance and replace the light bulbs and things on the racquetball courts between 8 and 10 a.m. because you can't get a court before 10 a.m.

There are several of us that feel this way, not just myself. I think gym personnel are there from 8 a.m. as they do their cleaning then and I think it would be very possible for CE to schedule changing the lights in the racquetball courts between 8 and 10 a.m. instead of using up an individual's time.

Taxes: Some helpful tips on how to prepare

It's tax time again and although it comes at the same time each year and federal law requires taxpayers to maintain records that will enable them to prepare accurate tax returns, there are always millions who aren't ready.

They are the ones who wait until the last possible minute; grab facts and figures out of the air; then pray that the Internal Revenue Service overlooks them again this year.

Even if federal law did not require it, maintaining records is still a good idea. Files are beneficial to insure that only the proper amount of tax is paid and for support in event the IRS decides (heaven forbid) to audit "my" income tax return rather than the other persons.

Records help the taxpayer:
 • Identify sources of income. Cash or property may be received from a number of

sources, and unless records clearly identify the source, individuals may be unable to substantiate that some part of the income is nontaxable.

• Prevent omission of deductible expenses. An overlooked item of \$25 could cost several dollars in tax.

• Explain itemized reports on income tax returns. Sales slips, invoices, receipts, cancelled checks and other documents always support adequate records and are essential for explanations.

Once the records are accurately compiled, they should be retained as long as their contents may be material in the administration of any IRS law. As a rule:

• Records that support an item of income or a deduction should be kept until the statute of limitations expires for that return. Usually this is three

years from the date the return was filed or due, or two years from the date the tax was paid, whichever occurs later.

• Some records, such as the purchase of a house, must be kept indefinitely. Records of transactions relating to the basis of property should be retained for as long as they are material in determining the basis of original or replacement property.

• Copies of all previous income tax returns should be kept in permanent files. They will aid in preparing future tax returns and in making computations if the taxpayer later files a claim for a refund or amends a tax return.

With the proper records, publications and forms, you're now on the way to alleviating if not completely eliminating the problems most people encounter around mid April.



Assistance fund aids AF village

Air Force Village in San Antonio, Texas, is a non-profit, tax exempt, charitable foundation, supported in part by your donations to the Air Force Assistance Fund.

The village is a home for the aging, with a licensed nursing home for widows of Air Force officers and spouses, and dependents of Air Force officers. It also provides apartments for the young widows and families of active duty Air Force officers during their time of adjustment.

Widows who need financial help have first priority for admittance to the village. No one is denied admittance due to being unable to pay.

The village receives no taxpayer monies nor any type of

government subsidy. Through support received as a resident of the village, those in need do not have to rely on government welfare programs.

Contributions are needed by the village not only to help those in need but also to expand the nursing care and living areas for those who are awaiting the opportunity of becoming residents. It is the goal of the village to more than double the number of apartments and to add a nursing home. It is estimated that by June 1980 the number of eligibles for the village will increase by 125 percent.

In addition to providing a residence, the village also provides funds for food, clothing and other needs on a case-by-case basis.

Arriving here Jan. 31 from Lackland AFB, Tex., Sergeant Zielinski has set his priorities and established some of his


goals. His main goal is to upgrade the retention program in all ranks and especially in the area of first and second termers.

Lubbock CCPS, Reese fight against child abuse

Lubbock County Child Protective Services and Reese have signed an agreement to provide each other assistance in handling reports of child abuse and neglect among families of military personnel living off base.

First Lt. Robert D. Griggs, Child Advocacy Officer here, said that Reese and Lubbock County have worked together for several years, but that no formal agreement had been drafted. The formalization of the relationship was part of a push started by the Texas

Department of Human Resources to foster greater cooperation between civilian and military agencies concerned with child abuse.

Because of a shortage in manpower Reese officials have been unable to investigate child abuse cases that occur off base. All such cases are referred to Child Protective Services in Lubbock.

Terms of the new agreement include that Child Protective Services provide Reese officials with written reports of their investigations.

Six Reese Talons receive new wings

Six aircraft at Reese are among the 68 T-38 Talon trainers that's wings will be replaced by the Air Force following tests that revealed the wing's resistance to cracking could soon present a safety hazard.

Maj. John E. Hogan, 64th Wing Maintenance Control Officer at Reese Air Force Base, stated that he does not expect the recall to cause great problems, but it will certainly challenge the capability of the training program. Currently, the program is running at near maximum capacity.

Major Hogan indicated that Air Training Command is going from a position of having excess aircraft to having just barely enough to meet present needs. It has been projected that there may be a deficit in the number of aircraft required by late 1981.

Recalling the T-38s was one of the results of a study conducted by the Air Force over the past four years. The study was called a Durability and Damage Tolerance Assessment. A test of the wings on T-38s for fracture toughness, a measurement of the rate of crack growth at critical stress points, indicated

that some of the aircraft fell below minimum accepted standards. Another result of the study is that the expected life of T-38 wings has been reduced from 15,000 to 10,000 hours of flight time.

Six aircraft at Reese were grounded on Feb. 1, and plans are being made to fly five of them to a central storage site,

probably at Randolph, AFB. One T-38 is being repaired at Reese by "cannibalizing" the wings from another aircraft.

Because of priority factors and the Northrop's capability to build only four sets of replacement wings per month, most of the aircraft in the recall are not expected to be back in service until summer, 1980.







Actor spurns Hollywood for tour with Air Force

AB William Walker hit Lackland just like he started in Hollywood, with a suitcase, a few dollars in his jeans and lots of confidence. But the trip from Hollywood to Lackland involved a big transition, from chauffeured limousines to marching in combat boots.

Why, after earning success in motion pictures, did he enlist? "Instead of asking why I joined," he explained, "I wish people would ask, 'Why don't you join?' Even if you're successful, why not check it out?"

The 22-year-old airman earned acting credits for roles in seven feature films ranging from "Towering Inferno" to the production of "Hard Core," scheduled for release this month.


He's also played in television, with appearances on "Starsky and Hutch," "Emergency," "Baretta," and the made-for-TV production of the movie "Katherine."

His big break into movies came when he was in a stage production of "Romeo and Juliet" at the American Conservatory Theater in San Francisco.

"I was seen by Richard Chamberlin who was acting at the time in 'Towering Inferno.' He brought me to the attention of the producer who gave me the role of the TV newsman who interviews people at the start of the film when they're entering the building for the grand opening."

Most of it ended on the cutting room floor but the 40 seconds that remained were enough to establish his reputation as a supporting actor for films like "White Buffalo," "The Driver," and "Once Upon a Summer."

Airman Walker's involvement with the Air Force came



when his agent arranged a personal appearance tour for the USO. Since he wanted to know more about the audiences he'd be entertaining, he visited a recruiting office in Van Nuys, Calif.

Recruiters there showed him "Air Force Now" a monthly film produced by the Aerospace Audiovisual Service for the commander's call program.

That whetted his interest and started him toward Lackland.

He arrived at the Texas base just like any other recruit. In fact, he kept a low profile about his background until a job classification interviewer in the 3507th Airman Classification Squadron started asking questions.

The interviewers had a tough time buying his story; not many actors enlist.

But they checked it out and decided that his unique background warranted a special assignment. He will be leaving Lackland to go to the home of the Aerospace Audiovisual Service at Norton AFB, Calif., the same people who made the "Air Force Now"

movie that got him interested in the Air Force.

Talking about the Air Force, airman Walker said, "They've held up their end of the deal; I expect to hold up mine. Really, all I want is to be of use."






