

## **Reese must cut consumption**

With rising utility costs threatening to burn up budgeted funds, base officials warn that Reese must "get serious" about energy conservation before some "special" programs go up in smoke.

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"We have to face the fact that Big Brother isn't going to bail us out if we go over our utility budget targets," contends Lt. Col. Hirum West, 64th Civil Engineering commander. "If we continue to waste energy some of our other programs will suffer-and it could happen this year."


Reese's total utility bill this year is expected to top \$1 million. And if that isn't incentive enough to search for ways to conserve, the Department of Defense has taken some big steps to make sure everyone does.

Defense officials are hoping to pull the plug on waste by calling for a 20 percent reduction in energy consumption by 1985. But that's not the

whole story. That 20 percent cut is based on 1975 utility figures. That means Reese will have to slash last year's total by nearly 30 percent to reach the 1985 target.

"Reese will be able to save some energy by consolidating units into more efficient buildings, adding insulation and abandoning some of the older, energy wasting facilities," explains Colonel West. "But, at least half of the cut will have to come from conservation efforts by the people. There just isn't any other way!"

Although it may sound like an impossible task, CE officials (Continued on page 8)

Fund campaign only two weeks old, the base has exceeded its goal for \$7,663 with donations totaling \$9,492.

Donations from this annual fund drive benefit the Air Force Aid Society, the Air Force Enlisted Men's Widows Home and the Air Force Village. The only change from past campaigns is that your donation has to be designated to one or a combination of the three agencies.

and loans for emergency car repairs. Particular emphasis is being placed on the needs of junior enlisted personnel, especially those stationed overseas.

During its history the Aid Society has helped

Any Air Force active duty member, retiree, dependent or surviving spouse who show a need for temporary financial aid may receive assistance from the Aid Society. In addition, dependent children of active duty and retired members are eligible for educational loans.

Most financial assistance is given for educational loans. In terms of numbers of people helped, the vast majority of help is for emergencies. Most common situations involve loans and grants for food, clothing, emergency leave travel, and "settling in" expenses at a new base. Considerable aid is also given for funeral expenses, emergency medical and dental care more than 512,000 Air Force people with a total of more than \$52 million. Educational loans to more than 15,000 students have totaled above \$26 million. Last year more than \$2 million was given in emergency assistance to nearly 9,000 Air Force people. This individual aid ranged from a few dollars to several thousand.

Aid Society assistance is available almost everywhere, some 130 Air Force installations have Aid Society offices. The Aid Society also has assistance agreements with the Red Cross, Army Emergency Relief and Navy Relief Society.

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## Strong winds herald stormy season here

(Editor's note: Spring brings harsh weather to the South Plains and the Base Disaster Prepardness Office offers some guidelines on what to do when things get nasty. This week the **Roundup** will look at severe storms, next week—tornadoes.)

March through June is the storm season with heavy rains, lightening, hail, high winds and tornadoes making it a dangerous time on the South Plains.

The harsh elements encountered in a severe thunderstorm can cause tragedy for family and community. Plan ahead. By acting now, you can avert many of the dangers.

Locate a sheltered place in your home. A central hallway or closet away from doors and windows will serve. If you live in an upstairs Apartment find some place on the ground floor. Discuss this with your neighbors. If you live in a mobile home, plan to leave it and seek other shelter. Many mobile home parks have storm shelters.

At work or away from home, find the nearest brick building or other substantial structure. The metal hangers on the Reese flight line are not suitable storm shelters.

#### Storm kits

Instructing your family in severe storm procedures is very important. Put together a "storm kit." This should include flashlight, battery-powered radio, spare batteries, first-aid kit, and other useful items. Store the kit near the place where you will seek shelter.

Listen to radio and television. They will keep you informed. The National Weather Service broadcasts severe weather reports over FM (162.4 MHz). be wary of a sudden increase in wind.

Once the weather service determines there is a severe thunderstorm in the area, a severe thunderstorm warning is issued. Take the following actions:

• Get inside. Do not stand

Remember to monitor your radio. A severe thunderstorm watch or warning can quickly be upgraded to a tornado watch 'or warning.

## Surgery, Orthopedic clinics change appointment rules

Appointments to Surgery and Orthopedic Clinics are now by referral only, says Reese Hospital officials.

All patients requiring initial Surgery Clinic appointments must be seen first in the Primary Care Clinic. If the Primary Care Provider deems it a Surgical problem, the patient will be referred to the Surgery Clinic using a consultation form (SF-513).

Persons phoning the appointment desk for follow-up appointments should specify that they are requesting a follow-up visit and how long it has been since they were seen for their particular problem.

Patients requiring Orthopedic evaluations must first be seen in the Primary Care Clinic. In some cases an additional evaluation in Surgery Clinic must be obtained before being consulted to the Orthopedic Clinic.

These changes have been put into effect to better utilize Hospital resources. Because of limited orthopedic appointment availability from our civilian consultants, active duty personnel will have priority on available appointments.



## Early out options axed by Congress

who don't have enough retainability for a stateside assignment at the end of their overseas tour will no longer be able to receive an early out, starting Oct. 1.

reducing early release programs has axed what for many years has been an automatic early out program for Air Force personnel.

In the past, bluesuiters stationed overseas would be discharged at the port if they didn't have at least six months retainability at the end of the tour. Now those with more than 30 days of retainability (time until scheduled discharge) must either extend their service commitment long enough to

Airmen stationed overseas accept a stateside assignment or extend the overseas tour until time for discharge.

Air Force officials indicate that affected personnel will be given the option. If neither is accepted then the member will Recent congressional action be involuntarily extended overseas.

> Officers with mandatory separation dates and officers and airmen with approved retirement dates will continue to be assigned under current policies.

> Certain airmen, such as physicians and dentists, will be required to take a stateside tour if they have more than two months of retainability.



### **ID** card applicants need information

Nearly one-third of the retirees, disabled veterans and eligible dependents applying for government identification cards at Reese are being told to "come back again" and Personnel officials are blaming incomplete documentation for the problem.

"We realize that many of these applicants are coming in from outlying districts and we hate to tell them they have to come back again," explains SSgt. Walt Sidler, NCOIC of Customer Service, "but, without the proper documentation we just can't issue an identification card to anyone.'

Without the ID card, retirees, disabled veterans and dependents of people who died while in the service, can't obtain many of their entitlements. Among these are use of military hospitals and commissaries and access to base exchanges. An acute problem for retirees is that without the ID cards they can't participate in the Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services.

"The problem," says Sergeant Sidler, "is that many people are not bringing all of the necessary paperwork with them the first time they apply for an ID card. During the last two months we have had to turn away 244 of the 744 non-active duty applicants."

To avoid the delay, applicants must bring their marriage (if applicable) and birth certificates. If the applicant is a dependent of a deceased service member, he or she must also present a death certificate. Disabled veterans must bring a current letter from the Veteran's Administration stating that they are 100 percent disabled.

In addition, dependents over 21 years old and a full-time

### Vet warns some pets need shots

Reese veterinary officials urge base personnel to make sure their pets have been immunized against rabies.

Veterinary office personnel warn that warmer weather generally brings with it an increase in the number of bites by animals, mostly to small children.

A recent review of records show that a "significant" number of animals are delinquent on their annual boosters. Residents in Reese Village are required by regulation to have their pets immunized.

Vaccinations for pets can be obtained from 9 to 11 a.m. on Tuesday and Thursday and from 1 to 2 p.m. on Friday at the Veterinary Services Office.

Village pet owners must also remember to see to that the immunization tag is ron by their pets at all times. Any stray pets sighted in the Village should be reported to the Security Police, Ext. 3614.

The veterinary spokesman also pointed out that parents of small children should caution them against approaching strange animals. He added that parents should warn children not to provoke animals as well.

## Training unit ends operation at Reese

Worth over three million dollars, the training simulators used to instruct student pilots at Reese are the offspring of an original piece of equipment put together in the basement of a Binghamton, N.Y., organ and piano factory over 50 years ago.

In 1929, Ed Link perfected what he called "an efficient aeronautical training aid," and what has become known throughout the Air Force as the Link trainer. The factory basement he worked in belonged to his father.

This "pilot maker" — a cockpit mounted on pneumatic bellows — was the forerunner of today's sophisticated simulators.

Link stimulated interest in his trainer in 1934 when he piloted his plane to a meeting with the Army Air Corps to discuss the problems of flying the mail in bad weather.

It was a foggy day, but he arrived on schedule, explaining he had learned instrument flying in his trainer. The Air Corps promptly ordered six.

Link's trainers became known as "Blue Boxes" and were widely used during World War II. A total of 10,000 were built and they trained more than half a million flyers. Since then, the roster of new Link simulators has closely paralleled aerospace developments. Simulators were used in the United States space program to train astronauts for Gemini, Apollo, Skylab and Space Shuttle missions.

This week marks the last powered ride in a Link trainer at Reese. Two models of the trainer have been in use here. Eight T-4s which ended service last week, trained pilots to fly the T-37 aircraft, and eleven T-7/26s were used to train T-38 pilots.

Seventeen members make up the Synthetic Trainer Branch of the Operations Division. Their NCOIC is TSgt. Richard W. Despault. The trainers were kept running by the 11 people of Aircrew Training Device Maintenance, headed by MSgt. Anthony Benson.

When the Training program was in peak operation, student pilots were required to spend 70 hours in the synthetic simulators.

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## **Peak Demand Charge** hikes base electric bill

During the early part of 1975 the total electrical bill for one month was \$20,000. This year, just the Peak Demand Charge was more than \$22,000.

"Soaring electrical costs have made it clear that Reese can no longer afford a passive attitude about using electrical equipment during peak periods of the day," says Lt. Col. Hirum West, Civil Engineers commander.

The Peak Demand Charge is a penalty consumers pay for using large amounts of electricity for a short time. This charge is based on the highest kilowatt usage for a 15 minute span during the billing period.

Electric companies levy this charge on the consumer

because, the company has to have extra generators and transmission lines available to feed the extra juice to the user.

By avoiding use of high electrical load equipment (welding gear, clothes dryers, dishwashers etc.) during peak periods, the base can make major cuts in its electrical bill.

During the winter months, the peak period normally runs from 10 a.m. until 3 p.m. People should try to schedule use of electrical equipment before 10 a.m. and after 3 p.m.




The January electrical bill, including the Demand Charge, was more than \$70,000 this year. Nearly a 250 percent increase from the 1975 tally. Most of that increase is because of rate hikes.

Civil Engineering officials anticipate that the Demand Charge will rise to more than \$30,000 this summer if the peak load usage isn't cut.

"Remember," says one CE spokesman, "The entire bill is computed by the highest 15 period."



#### period is about 2 p.m. (when minute peak use period. The most air conditioners get only way to cut the charge is to reduce peak load use across the board for the entire billing



Assure thermostats are adjusted to maintain room temperatures of 65 degrees for heating. Encourage workers to dress warmly. If heating systems are not controlled by time clocks, manually turn off system or lower thermostat at night and on weekends to conserve energy without freeze damage.

Eliminate unnecessary lights. Make maximum use of available sunlight. Turn off hallway lighting adjacent to windows. When an office or area is not being used, turn lights off. Also turn off lights in restrooms when not in use.

Consolidate coffee pots, especially between adjacent administrative areas. Turn off office equipment when not in use

Disconnect water coolers from electrical outlets. During winter, this should not inconvenience anyone.

Individual electrical space heaters are not authorized unless specifically approved by the Base Commander and Wing Energy Conservation Officer. Discourage this type of heating.

Unplug soda vending machines before leaving for weekends. Considerable savings can be realized in this area if everyone does his or her part.

## **IFS slashes utility costs**

The Instrument Flight Simulator complex, Reese's largest single energy consumer, has cut its utility bill by \$5,000 per month - all by conservation.

Capt. Raymond Cardona, who headed the conservation effort, explained how the IFS was able to chop its bill.

"When we opened the IFS we expected it to burn about 50 percent of the total utility consumption on base. When we only used 35 percent the first year we thought the unit was on target. But later, we decided we could do even better," he said.

The savings were made by shutting down equipment not in use and turning off air conditioning at night and on weekends.

"We had to find out what equipment we could shut down and when," noted Captain Cardona. "At first we weren't sure whether or not it would

take more energy to restart units than to leave them on."

Working with officials from Civil Engineering, Captair. Cordona and his IFS co-workers identified areas where conservation cuts could be made without upsetting the training schedule.

"Because of the measures, the IFS consumption has been chopped by nearly 150 million kilowatt hours per month.

"People have to become involved in conservation efforts," stresses Colonel West.


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## **Reese helps recruit operators**




