Bus routes uncertain because of low sales

Floundering in a sea of uncertainty, the proposed express bus service between Reese and Lubbock needs a powerful gust in ticket sales to get the program out of irons.

As of noon Wednesday, only a handful of people had purchased the \$20 monthly passes for the express CITIBUS route. To stay afloat, the program must net 100 paid-inadvance riders before Thurs-

"This is a great opportunity for base people to save money and energy," said Capt. Gary Taylor, chairman of the express route working group. "It's up to the people here. Without basewide support the busses will never roll."

Captain Taylor also pointed out that the express passes will be honored on all normal CITIBUS routes, making the tickets one of the better transportation bargains around.

If enough tickets are sold in time, two 40-plus passenger busses will circle Lubbock each morning and afternoon, each making five stops. Busses will leave in time to reach Reese by 7:50 a.m. and will return to Lubbock at 5 p.m. daily.


Stops remain the same for

both morning and evening runs with the order of stops reversed at night.

Route-A will cut across the north side of Lubbock, running on Fourth Street. The bus will stop at the Civic Center, 7:15 a.m.; Town and Country Shopping Center, 7:25 a.m.; Christian Renewel Center, 7:30 a.m.; Redbud Shopping Center, 7:35 a.m.; and the Mini-Mart at Fourth and Elkhart, 7:40 a.m.

Route-B swings through the south part of Lubbock, cutting across 50th Street to the South Plains Mall and winding then back up to 19th Street. Stops on

Tornadoes strike

Reese aids storm victims

"People have been wonderful," said A1C Carol Charters as she prepared to take her last load from Reese to the KLLL tornado relief pick-up station. "It makes me feel good that people here really care."

Reese personnel responded generously when donations of food, clothing and money were requested to aid the survivors of tornado devastated Wichita Falls.

Airman Charters volunteered her office in the T-38 Check Section to serve as central gathering point of relief supplies for the base. She also volunteered her time and a strong arm to pick up donations from several points on base and carry them to Lubbock.

"It began when I was planning a garage sale," she said. "Then I heard about the disaster relief drive for Wichita

Falls so I donated my garage sale." She then made herself responsible for coordinating the relief efforts at Reese.

Personnel in the 3500th Resources Management Squadron held a "disaster relief party" at the NCO Club. The admission was donations of clothing and canned goods. Donations of money totaling \$102 were also collected. Fifty

I told her that there was no sticker on this car - she said to go on in.

As I said before I have been to other bases. We need that security system not only for us but to keep things going right.

It sounds like you had one of those days where nothing seems to go right. At any rate I will try to shed some light on the things that are bothering you.

First the incident at the gate. From what I understand there is another side to the story

having to do with your attitude about being asked to show your ID card when you entered the base earlier in the day, but I will let that be our secret

For your information, the policy at the front gate goes like this: From 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. we operate on an open base concept and randomly check ID cards. From 6 p.m. to 10 p.m. we gradually increase the number of ID checks and from 10 p.m. to 6 a.m. we perform a 100 percent ID check. The policy has been in effect for several years and is typical of most ATC bases.

As for ID checks at the Commissary and Theater, a 100 percent check is supposed to be made on everyone not in uniform. If you do not have your ID checked or observe someone else not getting their ID checked at any of the service facilities, please help me out and bring it to the attention of the service manager.

AFA—its for everyone

The Air Force Association's annulal membership drive is in full gear and will continue through the month of April.

Lubbock's AFA chapter needs more members of all ranks, but we are particularly short of enlisted members. It speaks for all blue suiters, not just for officers.

If you doubt whether the AFA works for you, consider the following achievements for 1978:

- A Survivors' Benefits Plan was enacted for Guardsmen and Reservists of all ranks.
- AFA was successful in pushing for full travel entitlements for junior enlisted personnel and dependents when stationed overseas.
- AFA helped defeat proposals that would have forced commissary baggers to become salaried

employees. This would have eliminated the commissary subsidies, and would have raised the surcharge to commissary customers

- It called for a return to a 90 percent reimbursement for CHAMPUS benefits instead of 70 percent. Congress compromised at 80 percent reimbursement.
- AFA's affiliate, the Aerospace Education Foundation, pioneered the development of the Community College of the Air Force which grants associate degrees to qualified Air Force people.
- AFA originated a proposal to create the position of Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force.

In short, AFA is involved in all our benefits from retirement to annual pay raises. These accomplishments benefit everyone! For AFA to better represent us, it needs everyone's support. Until the majority of Air Force personnel are members of AFA, it will be difficult for the AFA to truly say its opinion reflects the desires of the rank and file.

AFA continues to urge other changes that would benefit enlisted people such as: direct commissioning of qualified enlisted people, a fully funded Airman Education and Commissioning Program, enlisted per diem comparable to that paid officers, a variable housing allowance within the United States that would pay more for high cost living areas and dental care for dependents,

Texas revises sales tax

Due to a recent revision of the Texas Motor Vehicle Sales and Use Tax Rule, service members who register their motor vehicles in Texas may be liable for a tax of up to 4 percent of the purchase prise of the vehicle.

Basically, anyone who purchases a vehicle outside of Texas and subsequently registers it in Texas will have to pay a 4 percent tax, less any

amount which was paid as a sales or use tax when the vehicle was bought. For example, if you bought a car for \$6,000 in 1975 in State X and paid a 3 percent sales tax to State X and then register the car in Texas in 1979, you would be required to pay an additional \$60 in taxes to Texas (4 percent of \$6,000 less a credit of 3 percent of \$6,000 previously paid to State X).

Therefore, if you are thinking of purchasing or have purchased a vehicle outside of assistance.

Texas, you should consider your possible tax liability before registering the car in Texas.

Remember, as a member of the armed forces, when you. register your motor vehicle, you must do so either in the state where you are presently stationed or in the state where you are a legal resident (your domicile).


Reenlistees receive lump-sum payments



Donough Student gets rare second

There are many things in life that, once missed, offer no second chance. Until a few months ago, 1st Lt. Kenneth Donough thought that described his chances for pilot training.

chance

He had passed his 28th birthday and had not been accepted into the program. The official cut-off age for Air Force pilot trainees is 27 and one-half years old.

But Lieutenant Donough pursued his dream and now, at age 30, he is a member of class 80-02 at Reese. He is the oldest in his class and probably the oldest trainee in the program

Lieutenant Donough first joined the Air Force as an enlisted man in 1968. He served as a T-37 crew chief at Laredo Air Force Base. In 1969, his father contracted leukemia and the young Donough was compelled to secure a hardship discharge.

A few years later he entered Air Force ROTC. He received his commission in 1974 and applied for pilot training. But with many pilots returning from the war in Vietnam, the Air Force had more than it needed. Many new applicants like Lieutenant Donough were put in a standby status for 18 months

A little later, Congress cut the budget and the Air Force had to cut back on its training program. Lieutenant Donough, along with many others, was denied admittance. In July, 1976, he elected to enter maintenance school. For some time, he served as a maintenance officer at Zweibreuken Air Base in West Germany.

But he still wanted to fly. At age 29, he made another formal application for pilot school and was turned down because of his

Then the Air Force had a change of heart. Many Air Force pilots began finding lucrative positions with the commercial airlines. Suddenly, there was a shortage. As part of its program to remedy the problem, the Air Force decided that those ROTC cutbacks of the mid '70s were eligible again.

Lieutenant Donough made his third application and was accepted.




