# Reserve captains improve career chances

Air Force officials have announced a change in policy that will improve the career opportunities of reserve captains who fail to be selected for promotion to temporary major, say local personnel officials.

Reserve captains who are not selected the first time they are considered for temporary major will no longer be separated.

In addition, a selective continuation program will be implemented for reserve captains who have twice failed to be selected.

"Policy changes will be effective with the June temporary major selection board and will apply to all promotion categories," points out MSgt. Ray Guerrero, NCOIC of Quality Force Section.

Officers will be considered for selective continuation after the second deferment to temporary major. Those selected will be able to remain on active duty for at least three additional years and probably will be able to serve until retirement.

Continued officers will help meet Air Force requirements in shortage skills such as rated duties, engineering specialties and other career fields.

The exact number of officers to be continued depends on many factors, including Air Force requirements. Officials expect about 100 will be continued this year. More will be affected in following years.

Previous policies releasing captains after nonselection to major were implemented in 1975 when the Air Force was rapidly reducing its officer strength to meet congressionally imposed limits.

Under that problem, firsttime non-selected officers could apply to remain on active duty to be considered a second time.

"With the current policy changes, only reserve officers

who are not selected the second time or chosen for continuation will be separated," adds Sergeant Guerrero.

Officers selected for and accepting continuation under these changes will remain eligible for temporary and permanent reserve promotion, regular appointment, training and assignments if they are otherwise eligible.

# Express route proposal fails

Reese's fight to establish express CITIBUS routes ended last week when the deadline for securing the service passed with the base still far short of the required 100 paid-in-advance riders.

Base officials tossed in the towel at 5 p.m. Friday, shortly after ticket sales closed at the Mathis Recreation Center. Only 15 people had purchased the \$20 monthly CITIBUS passes.

"At least for now," explained Capt. Gary Taylor, chairman of the bus service committee here, "the express route idea has been killed. For whatever reasons, Reese people just didn't respond to the proposed program."

Failure to reach the needed number of paid riders ended months of campaigning by base officials for the express route. The idea for the service was raised late last year in a Base Advisory Council meeting. Since that time Reese and Lubbock transit officials have labored to find a "workable" bus program. Their efforts included two major proposals.

Under the direction of Captain Taylor, a volunteer working group had reached an agreement with CITIBUS to provide two buses to Reese for \$2,000 per month.

As a bonus, express ticket holders would have been entitled to use all of the "regular" CITIBUS routes for free


Base officials had blessed the proposal because it not only offered Reese people a money-saving form of transportation, but; held great potential as a major energy saving program. They had even extended the original deadline to try and save the program."

"Everyone who purchased passes will receive a full refund," said Captain Taylor. "All ticket holders need to do is turn in their passes at the Mathis Recreation Center."

# National Hospital Week begins

May 6-12 is National Hospital Week and the focus around the country for the observance will be on our nation's hospitals' voluntary effort to contain health care costs.

Many of us in the military service might reply, "So what! Our health care is free, isn't it?"

Well, yes and no. Medical care provided in DoD medical treatment facilities is, with the exception of a small hospitalization charge, provided at no cost to the military beneficiary.

But free it's not. It costs money to run a hospital and the military is not exempt from the inflationary spiral that is affecting our economy and our nation's health care facilities.

We all must realize that there is no such thing as "free" health care. Even if you don't have to reach into your pockets right away to pay for the health care you're going to pay for it somewhere along the line; perhaps through bigger tax bills or by a gradual erosion of medical services because of increased demand and an inadequate supply of resources. That's why the conservative and wise use of health care resources is always in your best interest.

As a Hospital Commander and resource manager I must be constantly aware of costs and insure that adequate medical services are available to our patients within budgetary constraints. Both military and civilian hospitals are continually looking for ways to cut costs without cutting quality of care.

Even so, because a hospital is geared to providing the highest level of care around the clock, 365 days a year, its overhead and personnel costs are high. If you need that level of care, there is no substitute. But, it is a waste of resources to use it when you don't.

There is another way, however, to lower costs. A method that is so simple that many completely ignore it. I'm talking about prevention of disease.

This is where you come in and we can all start by taking better care of ourselves. For example, it has been estimated that 24,000,000 people in the United States suffer from high blood pressure, which is a contributing factor in one-third of premature heart attacks and strokes. Estimated medical care costs for 1975 were 15.9 billion. That's quite a price tag for a problem that can be controlled with proper diet, exercise and no smoking.

Another illustration of the cost of illness is alcoholism. Statistics suggest that alcohol abuse is the single most expensive health problem in the country today, with an estimated price tag of \$33.6 billion in medical care costs in 1975.

As such, I would suggest that National Hospital Week is an excellent time to look at your life style and choose healthier habits. As part of the observance of this week your base hospital will be

offering you several consumer educational programs.

I urge you to take advantage of these programs and take positive steps to improve your health.

Preventive care is still the best bargain for you in health care.

# Five good rules for buying a car

In the United States we own enough automobiles so that if everyone wanted to leave the country by automobile, we could all ride in the front seat.

With this many cars, very few Americans exist that do not own or will someday buy a car.

Buying or motor vehicle can be like opening a legal "can of worms."

The first rule that you should abide by is never sign anything until you have made a firm decision to purchase the car that you have been shown. If the salesman works up a deal for you with all of the charges, allowances, taxes and finance charges, there is no reason for you to sign it. You don't have to acknowledge receipt

The second rule is for you to read everything that is presented to you. Read it carefully and fully. In most cases when you finally sign a contract you are agreeing that it is the whole contract and that no oral representations by a salesman have any bearing on it.

If, while reading the contract, you have questions which are not answered to your satisfaction, take the time to come to the Legal Office and have it reviewed by a Legal Assistance Officer.

The third rule is to take the car, especially a used car, off the lot, to a mechanic that you trust. Pay him \$10 or \$15 if necessary, but have him go over the car with a fine-tooth comb. A good mechanic should be able to tell you whether or not the car is mechanically

Rule "four" is to have all repairs and adjustments which are necessary taken care of before you accept delivery of the car and before you obligate yourself to pay for it. You have much more power to get satisfactory repairs accomplished at that time than you do later under any kind of warranty.

Finally, as a general fifth rule, it is far better to finance your automobile through the credit union or another lending institution rather than through the dealer himself. There are some knotty legal problems that can result from financing the car through the manufacture's corporation, especially if you insure the car through the dealership.

# **President Carter salutes Asia-Pacific Americans**

In the continuing effort to recognize the significant and on-going contributions specific cultural and ethnic groups have made to the personality of American society, the first observance of "Asianand Pacific-American Heritage Week" will be celebrated from today through May 4.

The dates specified in the Presidential Proclamation are of particular importance to the heritage of Asian and Pacific-American people.

On May 7, 1843, the first Japanese immigrants came to the United States and on May 10, 1869 the transcontinental railroad, to a large extent the work of Chinese laborers, was completed.

Although these two groups were the earliest arrivals in large numbers, there are now five major sub-groups based on have provided ways and means

Japanese, Chinese, Filipino, Korean, and Samoan. These five groups total approximately 1.3 million people nationally. More recently, the greatest influx has come from the Southeast Asian countries.

The main obstacles to acculturation centered around areas of language, lifestyle and prejudice. The large numbers of Asian and Pacific-Americans who were born outside of the United States have unique cultural patterns and languages that serve as their means for social interaction and communication. Even many of those born in this country will retain their particular cultural patterns and language. English, to them, is a foreign language, and the "main-stream" of American life is a foreign culture to them.

While their native cultures 1970 census enumeration: to maintain the common good, American society and simple prejudice have often not allowed the channels and resources for Asian and Pacific-Americans to care for one another in the traditional ways. A vacuum often exists where the effective delivery of health, education, and social services in a culturally relevant manner should be taking place. As with other minorities, efforts are continuing relative to bilingual or bicultural services, assistance, and information dissemination. If all Asian and Pacific-Americans are to be contributing members of our American society, they must be encouraged and prepared to participate in the American lifestyle without having to deny their own heritage.

We, at Reese, salute those Americans of Asian and Pacific heritage and recognize their invaluable contributions to our American way of life.

The material will include games, puzzles, songs, projects and Bible stories for ages three through Junior High. Children need to be three-years-old by June 1 to enroll.





"Orderly, spacious, clean and pleasant" are other words that could be used to describe the warehouse.

And it isn't just in the warehouse. The offices of the 64th Supply Squadron are taking on a new look as quickly as time and budget permit. Paneling has been added. Desks are being replaced. The drab greens and dull greys are giving way to more cheerful colors.

If improvement is a state of mind, then that state exists in the supply squadron. It seems everywhere one looks there are people doing something to make their work area a better place to do business.

Talk with Captain Wilford Foster, chief Management and Procedures Branch, or James Truelock, Material Storage and Distribution Officer, and you hear plans for present and future improvements coming in a steady stream.

"We'd like to get an outside facility for paint and lumber storage to make more room in the warehouse," says Truelock.
"We also need to increase the size of some of the bins in the aircraft parts section.'

Captain Forster adds, "With the expected increase in the flying load this summer we'll need room to increase tire and other aircraft stock. We are also in the process of getting civil engineering and aircraft stock into separate areas to increase the efficiency of our operation."

James Truelock is proud of his operation, so is Captain Foster. So are the many other people, civilian and military, who work in the supply squadron. It shows!





# AF boxers decision local 'golden gloves'

Displaying a blend of power and boxing skill, the Air Force boxing team rolled to a 6-1 team victory over the West Texas Golden Gloves Association here Saturday night.

The power came from lightmiddleweight Joe Curiel (Dyess AFB. Texas) and heavyweight Victor Berard (Dyess), TKO winners in the Reese hosted boxing tournament.

Welterweights John Ellis (Peterson AFB, Colo.) and Lonnie Rogers (Charleston AFB, S.C.), light-welterweight Richard Johnson (Mather AFB, Calif.) and Tony Huggins (Sheppard AFB, Texas) boxed their way to split-decision victories for the Air Force team.

Nationally ranked Robin Blake, a 17-year-old featherweight from Levelland, Texas, presented a clean sweep by the Air Force squad, registering a convincing second-round TKO over Georgia Golden Gloves champ, Alvin Dixon (Robins AFB, Ga.). Blake, who is scheduled to represent the United States against the East Germans in mid-May, was named the tournament's outstanding boxer.


Curiel, the only returner from the 1978 Air Force squad, demonstrated a lethal right hand in his TKO win. The 1979 Southern Texas AAU runner-up staggered New Mexico's Lee Mascarenas with a straight right in the first round and was in control throughout. It was the right hand that ended the fight as the Corpus Christi native dropped Mascarenas in the third round of the lightmiddleweight bout.

Heavyweight Berard effectively worked to the body of Lubbock Golden Gloves veteran Jasper Colbert, setting up his some of the fighters berths on third-round TKO. Trapping the weakened Colbert in the Air Force corner, the 1979 Odessa Golden Gloves runner-up caught Colbert with a series of left hooks and straight right hands, ending the fight with about 1:30 to go in the round.

Sporting an obvious reach advantage, Huggins was able to keep Reese's Charles Watson at bay enough to claim a splitdecision in the bantamweight bout. Watson, who was a finalist in the air Force team trials earlier this year, pressed the 1978 Indiana Golden Gloves Champ throughout the fight, continually absorbing punishment from Huggin's stinging left jabs.

In light-welterweight action, Johnson's cool and deliberate style was too much for Levelland's Roddy Blake, the older brother of Olympic hopeful Robin Blake. Remaining at a distance throughout the fight, the winner of the 1979 Reno Gold and Silver lightwelterweight crown used clean crisp jabs and an occasional right lead to outscore Blake on two of the three judges' ballots.

Ellis and Rogers both claimed split-decision victories over the same fight, Lubbock's Raymond Amalla. Rogers, the 1979 Inter-service welterweight runner-up, used a deceptively fast left hook to out-point Amalla in the first fight. Three bouts later, Ellis' lightning quick hands recorded the Air

Force team's sixth win on the night. Amalla was awarded the tournament's outstanding sportsmanship award for his double effort.

Air Force boxing coach, Al Alaniz, praised the West Texas squad for providing the AAU Championship bound squad with a quality tune-up match.

The Air Force team heads into the AAU Nationals in New Orleans May 11-13 hoping to earn recognition that may land the 1980 Olympic team that will go to Moscow. The Air Force had two fighters make the 1972 Olympics in Mexico City.


