



model for the reality we are trying to portray.



We are not the "playthings" of a capricious creator; we are made "in his image and likeness." Yes, God is truly with us; we are important in his sight!





## Forget gambling

Air Force Regulations prohibit all forms of gambling on any Government-owned or leased property.

Furthermore, regardless of what state law allows, you cannot engage in any type of gambling activity while on duty for the Government. This prohibition includes, among other things, card games, lotteries, baseball and football pools, and any other kind of betting.

The only exception to the above rules is that membership associations, such as Officer and NCO clubs, may allow

limited card games and nominal games of chance among small groups of their members as long as the games conform with local law.

Potential penalties for violations of AFR 30-30's prohibition against gambling are very serious. A member of the Air Force could receive a dishonorable discharge, forfeiture of all pay and allowances, and confinement at hard labor for up to 2 years. A civilian employee of the Air Force, who gambles while on duty might eventually be removed from his job.

So before you engage in any kind of gambling activity on base, think — it would cost you more than your money.

## Davis recalls past, looks ahead

(Editor's note: Bob Reede recently talked with Gen. Bennie L. Davis, ATC commander, about his background and future plans. The interview will be published in three parts.)

Part I

• Before we begin, General, for future reference which do you prefer, Gen. Bennie L. Davis, or Gen. B.L. Davis?

Either one's okay. I probably use B.L. more often because it takes less time to sign letters.

• General, you were born and brought up in McAlester,, Okla. How large a town was it then?

Oh around 12,000, I guess. Today it's closer to 20,000.

Was that "dust bowl" country?
 No, no. That was down in the southwestern part of the state. Our part resembled the Texas hill country that begins just north of Randolph.

• What did your dad do?

He bought hides, fur and wool for a company there in McAlester.

You have two sons, General. What's their work?

I just had the pleasure of commissioning our youngest, Tom, who's in medical school, as a second lieutenant in the Air Force. Our other son, Jim, is a junior at the University of Texas. After putting in four years in the Air Force as an enlisted man—an operating room attendant—he decided to get out and return to school. He's majoring in nursing and may later decide to go to medical school, too.

• You're a West Point grad, General. You entered quite young, didn't you?

Yes. Right after graduating from high school in 1946. I was 18. (General Davis is now the youngest four-star general in the Air Force. Ed.) • Someone told me you were an outstanding football player in high school. Undue modesty aside, is that so?

I did play there, and made all-state my last two years. Following graduation, I got several football scholarship offers, including one from the University of Oklahoma. But in those years, if you went to a university on a football scholarship, the sport had to take precedence over scholastic pursuits. I had graduated second in my class in high school, and was more interested in education. I knew I'd get a fine one at the Point, and besides, they had a terrific football team, too.

• Those were the days of the fabled Glenn Davis and Doc Blanchard, weren't they?

Yes. I played with them. I was on the varsity for four years. The coaches were "Red" Blaik and Vince Lombardi. We didn't lose a game for a couple of years, and won a national championship.

• What position did you play?

Tackle.

• Both ways? Offense and defense? Both ways.

• I can't help asking, General. At Army vs. Air Force games, which team do you root for?

The Air Force, of course.

• Even deep down inside?
Yes. With no reservations. I'm Air
Force all the way.

• General, you spent three years, 1972-1975, at Randolph, first as vice commander of the Military Personnel Center, then as a commander of Recruiting Service. How do you feel about coming back?

Absolutely great. We have a wonderful military-civilian relationship here in San Antonio. To top that

off, I'm delighted, honored and proud to be commander of Air Training Command, the "first" command, where it all starts. It's a tremendous challenge — and in the most sincere sense of the word, a humbling responsibility — to be able to direct training and other activities that will

## Below zone hikes expand

Air Force plans to increase its allotment of below-the-zone promotions to E-4, starting with the July through September quarter.

Since the below-the-zone program began in 1976, selectees have consistently outscored their contemporaries in E-5 promotion testing and have had a lower disciplinary incident rate.

Air Force officials plan to expand the eligibility "window" from six to 12 months and will increase the selection quota from 10 to 15 percent.

The opportunity for earlier promotion and the increased selection quota make the program more meaningful for all airmen.

Although the impact of these changes will be modest, Air Force officials expect the new policies to give commanders more flexibility to nominate top contenders for early promotion.

## More conservation needed warns utility spokesman

"Air-conditioning — now or ' in August?"

This is the question that Lt. Col. Hirum West, 64th Civil Engineering commander, would put to Reese personnel.

Although the air-conditioning in most work areas at Reese will not be turned on until late May or early June, a couple of weeks later than last year, base officials still fear that this will not solve the dollar shortage in the utility budget.

"There are two things the Air Force is going to do" he said, "fly airplanes and cut the grass. If the energy budget runs out it's not coming from anything

With 58.7 percent of the budget year already gone, Reese has spent 57.5 percent of the funds allocated for heating, cooling and light. The time for heaviest energy need is still ahead. There is a great possibility that the funds will

"In times past, Air Training Command was able to bail us out when that happened," said Colonel West. "This year, ATC will probably not have the dollars to do it. If we run out, there goes August airconditioning.'

Colonel West believes Reese can still be cool in the hottest part of the summer if people get serious now about saving

One way to conserve is to not use high electrical load equipment (welding gear, clothes dryers, dishwashers, etc.) during the middle part of the day, 1 to 5 p.m. This would help the base avoid Peak Demand Charges levied by the utility companies for using excessively large quantities of electricity for short periods. Such charges can easily run the base electric bill over \$20,000 for one month.

Cutting off window airconditioners when not at home. and keeping thermostats at 80 degrees are definite ways to save, as is cutting off unnecessary lights.

"We were allocated \$1,154,000 for utilities this year," said Colonel West. "If people really conserved as much as they possibly can, we could come to the end of the fiscal year with money left over. We could do virtually anything we wanted to do with that money."

"New sports facilities could be built, or the old ones renovated. It could mean new office furniture, drapes, paint, any number of things.'

This can only happen if people take responsibility for the energy they use. It is possible to save that money. It is still possible to remain cool in August. The responsibility rests on the shoulders of the individual.







# Reese sergeant plans camp for handicapped

Being handicapped doesn't stop children from participating in Boy Scouts of America—not since TSgt. Harvey Schirmer opened his troop for "special" children.

Boy Scout Troop 514, in existance since November,



works directly with the Muscular Dystrophy Association in Lubbock, providing a needed recreational and educational program for handicapped children.

Sergeant Schirmer plans a three-day campout at Camp Post May 25 through 27.

Any physically or mentally handicapped children in the area are welcome to join the troop and attend the camp. It is open to physically handicapped youngsters from 10 to 21-years-old and for mentally retarded youths from seven to 21-years-old.

Although he has all of the assistant troop leaders he needs, he encourages parents to become involved in the campout "Some of the children need special attention that the counselors may not be aware of," he explained. "We need parents to get involved and let us know what we need to watch for with each child."

Troop 514's leader also noted that ambulatory children are eligible for the campout. He pointed out that several youngsters in wheelchairs are already members of the troop.

## Reese Nursery limits patrons

Daytime child care at Reese is being taxed to the limits by the increasing numbers of families using the facilities. As a result, there have been necessary cutbacks in the daytime child care services offered to civilians and retirees.

Linda Perron, director of the Reese Child Care Center, said that there are already 27 children of active duty parents on the waiting list. The situation is not expected to improve in the near future because of the expected summer increase in military families here. Also, many older children will be out of school this summer putting further demands on the facilities.

"Unfortunately, because it is a military facility, children of active duty parents are given priority," Mrs. Perron said. "So far, the decision has directly affected 12 civilian and retiree families."

"It is really a shame that we can't handle more children," she continued. "We are probably the most economical facility in the Lubbock area that offers quality child care."

A recent article in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal cited three centers operated by the Day Care Association of Lubbock with state, federal, and United Way funds. At present, these centers take care of 265 children and have a waiting list of more than 1,000. A fourth center will be available in the near future but will accommodate only an additional 120 children.

The inadequacy of day care centers is a widespread problem. Although the programs and facilities are being expanded continually, they are not keeping pace with the demand.

Currently, the Reese Child Care Center is built to handle only 74 children at any one

Plans for the expansion of the center are being rushed, but will still take about two years to bring to completion. In the meantime, although base officials are trying to alleviate the problem, many working parents must find other ways to care for their children.

Reservations for the Child Care Center should be made well in advance (at least one week, two weeks would be preferred). Cancellations should be made promptly so that the spaces may be opened to other children as soon as possible. There is a charge for not canceling. For more information call Ext. 3541.
