# Fuel shortage delays moves

America's fuel shortage, already disrupting traffic on the nation's trucking lanes, may cause lengthy delays for Reese people moving household goods this summer.

According to SMSgt. Guy Chauvin, Traffic Management Office superintendent the shipment of household goods, especially to the northeastern United States, will take several days longer than it has in the past. He noted that the delays will undoubtedly get worse as the fuel shortage continues.

In order to prevent major problems for the estimated 400 Reese families who will be making permanent change of station or temporary duty moves during the next four months, the TMO staff has changed its appointment policy.

Instead of waiting for scheduled appointments, Reese personnel should stop by TMO (building 26) as soon as they receive their orders.

"Even if they're not leaving

until December," said Sergeant making a move to stop by and Chauvin, "people should come in as soon as they receive their official orders."

That should help prevent some problems, but; TMO officials say that if people need to make long distances moves quickly the best option may be 'do-it-yourself' moves.


"We have some excellent briefings on do-it-yourself moves available," points out Sergeant Chauvin. "We would like everyone planning on look at them."

In addition to the time saved, do-it-yourself moves save money for the Air Force and the people moving. For example, a move by a family of five to Wurtsmith AFB, Mich. this summer could take up to 40 days by commercial carrier. By do-ityourself it would take only a few days and the family could make about \$600.

TMO officials are also working on alternative modes of transportation to ease the problem. Some household goods are being crated and shipped by flatbed trailer. Unfortunately, that increases costs by about 40

If the fuel situation doesn't improve by late summer, some household goods may have to be shipped by rail, an even more expensive alternative.

"The key right now," repeated Chauvin, "is to contact us at Ext. 3836 as soon as official orders arrive."

# Defense officials order dining halls to cut beef

Despite a Department of Defense mandate that all military dining halls slash beef usage by 25 percent, Reese officials are determined to maintain a well rounded menu.

The cuts, which won't go into effect here until Aug. 1, were ordered when rising beef prices pushed the nation's favorite meat above DoD's pocketbook. Defense officials tabbed the move as part of President Carter's program to fight inflation and counter shortages of high cost foods.

"Beef is our number one meat," acknowledged Reese will try to make the changes as subtle as possible."

One thing that won't change, stressed Palmentera, is the dining hall's policy of serving steak twice a month.

"We'll make most of the changes by substituting poultry, such as roast duck, or maybe Ocean Perch for one of the many varieties of roast beef now served," said Palmentera.

He noted that the dining hall prepares about 25 to 30 different dishes based on pot or oven roast beef.

Probably the biggest change in the menu will be the deletion we serve are based on beef, we dining hall patrons will get available at the dining hall.

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# Army Air Corps - our heritage

Although the United States Air Force is the nation's youngest branch of our armed forces, its tradition and heritage date far back to the beginning of military aviation. Next week, we will observe the 38th anniversary of the founding of the Army Air Forces.

It is fitting that we take a few minutes and reflect upon the development of our Air Force. Our air power was born in August 1907. Its official title was the Aeronautical Division of the Signal Corps, U.S. Army. The division consisted of one officer, two enlisted men, and one plane.

By World War I, renamed the Aviation Service, our air power had increased to 55 planes. In June 1926, the Air Corps Act was passed, establishing the Army Air Corps. The Corps consisted of 919 officers, 8,583 enlisted personnel, 142 flying cadets, and authorization for 1,800 aircraft.

In 1928, the first seeds of the Air Training Command were sown with the establishment of a primary training center at San Antonio. The center was later named Randolph Field.

In June 1941, Major General H.H. Arnold became Commander of the newly established Army Air Forces, the forerunner of our modern Air Force. In December of that year, our air power consisted of over 10,000 aircraft, 30 percent of which were suitable for combat.

By the war's end, the Army Air Forces had grown to two million men, almost 80,000 aircraft, one half of which were suitable for combat, and a newly developed weapons system that suddenly brought peace to a war-torn world.

The National Security Act of 1947 established the United States Air Force, equal in status with the Army and Navy. Although new in name, our heritage had long been established; one born with the birth of flight, raised through controversy and war, and tempered with the professionalism and self-sacrifice of countless individuals.

In our reflection of the past, it is indeed fitting to remember and revel in our heritage; however, more importantly, we must not lose sight of the fact that you and I are today's individuals that will become tomorrow's heritage. Are we meeting the challenge?

### Air conditioning woes

I just need to know why we are having so much trouble getting the central air units serviced in the base housing.

It has been over 90 degrees for over a week and I can't sleep at night because it is so hot and a fan doesn't seem to help much. I put in a request to service the air conditioner but they have to go through the civilian contractors and they said it would take about a month or month and one-half to get it serviced. In a month or month and one-half it is liable to be cold and getting winter time again.

What can we do about getting these air conditioning units serviced a lot faster?

### Dear 90 Degrees:

I am well are that you and many other families in Reese Village are without air conditioning and I wish I had an instant fix for you, but I don't.

I will however, try to explain the situation.

Between October 1978 and April 1979, the housing renovation contractor installed approximately 100 air conditioning units which could not be tested because the outside temperature was not high enough to thoroughly check-out the system.

So rather than let these houses sit vacant waiting for the air conditioning units to be charged, we accepted the houses and permitted those people on the waiting list to move in. This was done with the understanding that the contractor would have them all operational within a few days.

The Civil Engineers and the people in the Contracts Division are working with the contractor to get these units functioning just as soon as possible.

### Parking problems

Recently they roped off the parking lot in front of the Control Tower and Traffic Safety

building. Now this leaves very little space for traffic controllers and maintenance people to park and we end up parking three to five blocks away.

Now I really don't know what the problem is —I have heard that somebody went through the building in the Traffic Safety office and therefore it is being closed to everybody. I don't think that this is really fair to punish everyone for what somebody else has done.

Would it be possible to place some type of a cement barrier type thing there so people would know where the limit to stop was? There is a log there now but it can be rolled over easily.

### **Dear Roped Off:**

Since we have experienced several accidents/ incidents in this lot (including someone driving into Building 100 several times) and since there are only 5 spaces involved, we felt it best to quit while ahead. If you will assume full responsibility for all personal and property damages, I'll re-open the lot.

# Carrying extra gas can cause trouble

Carrying a few extra gallons of gasoline in your car trunk is a good idea! Right? Wrong!

A gallon of gasoline stored in the trunk or storage compartment of a vehicle is a liquid bomb equal to 14 sticks of dynamite.

A minor leak in the container allows dangerous concentrations of easily ignited vapors. During accidents, containers are easily ruptured and exploded.

Gasoline, no matter where stored, must be considered a potential liquid bomb and handled accordingly. Vapors are emitted from cans even in cold weather and vapors explode — not the gasoline.

Gasoline must not be stored in rooms or garages equipped with hot water heaters or other devices with open flames or pilot lights. A mere spark such as that from a thermostat or from the scratch of shoe soles could ignite the vapors.

Long lines at gas pumps and closed service stations can certainly be a problem, but unsafe transporting and storing of gasoline can be a catastrophe.

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# Europe's infamous killer still threatens life today

Plague, once referred to as the "Black Death," devastated many rat-infested European communities during the Middle Ages. It still occurs today in parts of the United States.

With the advent of effective antibiotics, mortality has been greatly decreased provided the disease is diagnosed in its early stages. As Reese is located on the eastern edge of the region where plague most often occurs, the Deputy Surgeon General has designated Reese as a medium to low risk area for plague infection. Surveys in the Lubbock area have shown that this disease is present in certain colonies of rodents.

It is important that Reese personnel are aware of this potential threat to human health. Parents should insure that their children are fully informed of the steps for

The causative bacteria (Versinia pestis) is widely distributed in the western United States. It is transmitted

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to people through direct contact with infected animals, principally rodents, and by bites from their infective fleas.

These fleas generally do not infest and bite other animals and man unless their natural host is not available.

The natural host in this area of the country are the prairie dog and wood rat. Occasional hosts include field mice, ground squirrels, gophers and rabbits.

There is an on-going Plague Surveillance Program at Reese in which the rodent population on base is closely monitored for die-offs. However, if you should observe several or more sick, sluggish or dead small rodents and rabbits, you are asked to contact Veterinary Services so that these animals may be checked for plague.

### Recommendations for prevention

When on an outing, do not camp or stay for extended periods in rodent-infested areas.

Do not catch, play with, or attempt to handfeed any species of wild rodent.

Avoid contact with all sick

Notify CE for prompt removal of any dead animals observed on Reese.

If you must hike in a known high-risk plague area (i.e., New Mexico mountains), treat pants. socks, shoe tops, arms and legs with insect repellents to keep fleas away.

While hiking or camping, keep all dogs on a leash; or, better yet, leave them at home. Dogs are considered to be resistant to plague but may retrieve infected rodents or be a temporary host to plaguebearing fleas and thus increase the hazard to owners.

Keep domestic cats confined as much as possible. Cats are very susceptible to plague and may die suddenly if they catch and eat infected rodents.

Provide adequate flea control for your dogs and cats. Remember: If reasonable precautions are taken, the probability of your being exposed to and contracting plague, even in a plague area, is low. For further information contact Veterinary Services.

# Keep track of IDs

This is the season, traditionally, that thousands of ID cards will be lost or stolen. Please remember that military ID cards are government property, not personal, and must be safeguarded.

The military member is responsible for insuring that his or her dependents are aware of their responsibilities. Children, especially, should be instructed not to leave their cards in the back pocket of jeans at swimming pools, gymnasiums, ball fields, or other recreation areas where the card is not properly safeguarded at all times.

ID cards should be carried in

a wallet or purse or in a pocket that can be buttoned or fastened. It should be emphasized that an ID card is as good as a blank check signed by an Air Force Accounting & Finance Officer.

The majority of all ID cards lost or stolen are a result of carelessness or negligence by the card holder. If the sponsor and dependents exercise a little extra caution, they will not be inconvenienced by a visit to the **CBPO Customer Service Center** for a replacement.

Further, without an ID card to verify eligibility Customer Service requires a Birth Certificate (for children) or a Marriage License (for spouse) prior to verifying an applica

Reese officials, in an effort to stimulate an interest in energy conservation and encourage its practice, have designated June 26 as Energy Awareness Day here.


Reese Village residents will be asked to walk or ride a bicycle to work, while those living further from the base are requested to carpool.

'This is the academy's silver anniversary. Those who have preceded the class of '79 are now becoming the leaders of the Air Force," Gen. Lew Allen Jr., Air Force chief of staff, told the graduates.

The class of 1979, the 21st graduating class, produced 141

honor graduates and 63 distinguished graduates. It was the last all-male class to graduate. Women cadets will receive diplomas for the first time next year.

Class valedictorian was Cadet David H. Rhodes of Glendale, Calif. He achieved the academy's first-ever, perfect, four-year 4.0 grade point average.

The number-two graduate, Cadet William P. Doyle of Simi

Valley, Calif. averaged a 3.97 score for his four years.

This year's class will send 581 lieutenants to pilot training, 27 to helicopter training and 47 to navigator school.

Sixteen more lieutenants will go on to pilot training after obtaining master's degrees.

The academy also graduated another Rhodes Scholar, Cadet Jeffry A. Jackson, bringing the total to 20 since 1959.

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
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# Rattlers extend streak; head for 'big' tourney


