Cavalry rides to rescue again

In the traditional western movie the cavalry always arrives just in time to save the fort. Well, in relation to the availability of medical services here at Reese, we can hear the bugle and the cavalry just over the hill.

Over the past several months "gloom and doom" articles have appeared in the Roundup and elsewhere relative to physician shortages.

Locally, the situation is being aggravated with the departure of our Surgeon at the end of this month. However, we also have held out hope for the future, and that the help would be coming by this fall. Well the picture is brighter than ever. Beginning in September, not only will our current staff be augmented, but some additional services will be available.

Besides the arrival of several specialists, such as in Internal

Medicine and Pediatrics, it is beginning to appear a very real possibility that we'll be able to reopen our Obstetrical/Gynecological Services. This will be accomplished through a cooperative arrangement with CHAMPUS and civilian physicians to provide these services at the base hospital. This is a rather novel idea and there are a number of details to work out, but; we expect that the final, major hurdle, i.e. DoD approval, will be overcome shortly.

In preparation for the arrival of these new providers and the initiation of the additional services, the Reese Hospital will be undergoing some changes over the next few months—both physically and in procedures. The most immediate change will be the relocation of clinics and offices.

Also we're planning some changes in our Health Delivery System this fall, such as having our base population enrolled with provider teams following a Family Practice Model. Not only will this enable us to make better use of our resources, but should result in more personalized medical care that is tailored to the needs of the patient and family.

Inevitably, anything new requires orientation of both our staff and patients and will take the cooperation of both. I'll try to continue to keep you informed of these changes as we progress.

About a month ago, I asked in a Roundup article for the base population's cooperation in using our available medical resources wisely. I'm pleased to report that, for the most part, we've received this cooperation. Emergency misuse is down and there has been better use of our appointment system. To meet your future health needs we'll continue to require this support and your cooperation.

With your help I believe we can meet any challenge and receive maximum benefit from the cavalry when it arrives.

Package store sales

The base package store buys beer from a distributor downtown and pays less for it than do the operators on the strip because the base pays no tax on it. Yet, the package store charges anywhere from 5 cents to a dime within what it would cost to buy it at the strip.

I have heard that the Officers' Club is running in the red and all the funds they make in excess are pumped into the Officers' Club to

keep it out of the red.

I know for a fact, because I talked to the people who sell beer to the base, that they are selling it for a dollar or maybe a little less a case cheaper than they selling it to the people on the strip. It seems like it is a big rip-off to the military to pay those kind of prices for beer just to keep up the Officers' Club.

Dear Package Store:

The Package Store does pay less for spirits,

but the difference for beer is only 36¢ tax on a case (wholesale), not one dollar.

Premium beer prices at the Strip average \$2.25 per 6-pack and \$8.25 per case compared to \$2.10 and \$8.00 respectively at the Package Store. You must realize however, that we cannot offer the "fantastic bargains" commonly found at the strip because of our volume.

I am sure you will be glad to know that the Package Store profits are not pumped into the Officers' Club as you indicated, except as authorized. You see, enlisted sales profits go the the NCO Club and Officer sales profits go to the Officers' Club. It should also be noted that the Officers' Club has experienced two consecutive profitable months without counting profits generated by the Package Store.

Finally, the Package Store is strictly regulated to a small profit which can be returned to the respective clubs, while maintaining competitive pricing. This coupled

with its location, gives the military member a definite benefit.

"Anyone who can give just three hours per week could help us a lot," she said.



Some civilians due back pay

Reese civilian employees who have been reduced in grade as a result of a reduction in force or reclassification action between Jan. 1977 and Jan. 14, 1979 may be entitled to back pay.

According to Reese civilian personnel officials, civilians reduced in grade through these actions may be due retroactive pay, because of provisions outlined in Title VIII of the Civil Service Reform Act of 1978.

"Anyone reduced in grade during this two-year period should stop by the Civilian Personnel Office (building 37) and fill out Form 1367," explained Tom Ireland, chief of civilian personnel.

Any entitlement due, will be computed by the appropriate payroll offices and mailed to the applicants. Those found ineligible for any retroactive pay will be notified by the Reese Civilian Personnel Office.





Carter approves MX development

A new M-X mobile intercontinental ballistic missile system will be developed by the United States that will ensure the survival of our land-based missiles against an enemy attack, according to Department of Defense officials.

Defense spokesmen said the decision to pursue a full-scale development program for the M-X was made by the President after prolonged study and analysis.

The M-X program will encompass the following:

- Building and flight testing 20 prototype M-X missiles at Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif.
- Designing and developing a prototype basing system with support facilities, also at Vandenberg.
- Screening potential deployment areas in the United States.
- Fathering additional cost and technical data for evaluation of future production and deployment decisions.
- The M-X missile will be 71 feet in length and 92 inches in diameter. It will weight 190,000 pounds and accommodate 10 warheads.


Defense spokesmen said M-X development will continue the long-standing U.S. policy of maintaining a triad of three strategic forces — intercontinental ballistic missiles, submarine-launched ballistic missiles and heavy bombers.


It was stated, the M-X will be as capable as any missile the Soviets can deploy.

Defense officials expect the M-X program to start full-scale engineering development next month. The first flight will be in 1983. Initial deployment will be in 1986 will full operational capability expected in 1989.

M-X will be deployed in a ground mobile basing system. Defense spokesmen said they are considering the possibility of using areas of Defense Department land in Arizona, New Mexico, Nevada and Utah. Bureau of Land Management acreage is also under consideration in the latter two states.

Basing systems under consideration include a trench below ground level with a rail or roadbed and up to 8,800 hardened shelters. A comparable system might be placed on the surface of the ground.
