# Reese plans 30th Open House

# **Expanded schedule** brings super show

Boasting an expanded schedule, Reese officials are confident that Reese's 30th Open House will be its best ever.

For the first time, Reese will hold its major community relations event over an entire weekend. The extended affair is scheduled for Aug. 4 and 5.

Headlining the two-day Open House will be the Aug. 5 performance of the U.S. Air Force Thunderbirds. The aerial demonstration team will start its show at 3 p.m.


Adding an interservice flair to this year's Open House activities will be demonstrations both days by the U.S. Navy's Parachute West Demonstration Team.

Lackland AFB's famed Dimensions in Blue will also perform both days and the Air Force precision drill team from Washington D.C. will flash its close-order wizardry on Sunday afternoon.

In addition to the military units displaying skills, several local clubs will be getting in on the act. Area rocket and radio controlled model aircraft clubs will show off their stuff on Saturday and Sunday.

# Carpooling bolsters national spirit

During President Jimmy Carter's recent energy speech, he appealed to the people of the United States to make every effort to conserve fuel.

In keeping with that spirit of national conservation, Reese is beginning its computer carpooling program. Because of faulty information received last week in the Roundup office, there is some confusion as to how the program will work. Although familiar in some respects to the reported plan, the actual program Reese will attempt to put into operation has some vital differences.

Under this program, each person interested in forming a carpool will need to submit a form to his or her orderly room or to Maj. Roy Markle, base comptroller. The necessary forms have been distributed in each duty section.

Data Automation will compile the forms into a list

broken down by zones and distribute a copy of the pertinent section to each prospective participant. If people cannot find a ride within their zone, they may look at the master list in Major Markel's office to see if any people in neighboring zones live closer than those on their list.

As of noon Tuesday, 175 people had submitted forms and a partial listing compiled. The completed list will be released Tuesday.

According to Major Markle, an updated list could be run as often as once a month, if demand justifies.

# Project 'Non Com' helps train cadets


importance of the people they will someday lead.

#### Repair work

The magic number is four. Our Maytag Vehicle Maintenance personnel here are not doing their jobs to my satisfaction, to say the least.

Two months ago the Student Squadron airmen were instructed to start lawn detail.

On April 3 the exhaust pipe on our lawn mower broke, the throttle vibrated, the starter was not working properly, oil was leaking, and last of all the battery died.

On April 23 the choke had been adjusted but would not stay there, the same battery wouldn't start the mower after only one start. On May 7 the throttle was still vibrating causing the mower to die, and the same battery would no longer start the engine. Most recently on June 4 and three repairs later, someone exhibited another poor show of workmanship, a soldered muffler hissed at me and fell off.

These instances may not sound like much to you, but two extra hours in the midday sun just doesn't cut it, especially when repairs were supposed to have been made.

It's too bad anyone should have to voice a complaint with total record of all maintenance that, in my opinion, (as a part-time mechanic) was strictly pencil-pushed.

#### Dear Dissatisfied:

If I were in your shoes I'm not so sure I wouldn't feel the same way.

Two extra unnecessary hours in the midday sun doesn't do anyone's disposition much good. Anyway, your listing of the various maintenance problems is accurate but there is some additional background you may be interested in.

The battery problems were caused by a faulty generator on the first occasion and the operator running the battery down when the engine quit on the other. The original repair of the throttle was a temporary fix until the new locking throttle was received. This has now been installed. The exhaust system is a problem and the muffler may hiss at you again if the current fix should fail. The problem is that the threads on the engine block, which holds the exhaust pipe, are stripped beyond repair. Replacing the

engine block would be the ideal fix for the problem but the cost of doing that simply isn't justified.

#### Wet sight

Yesterday when I came out behind the NCO Club, water was bubbling out of the ground.

It looked like Pagosa Springs; beautiful, clear water running into an underground outlet and I thought, "Gee, I'll bet they're anxious to fix that."

Today I ate lunch over there and took the same route and water was still bubbling up. It looks like it is terribly expensive.

I thank you for being concerned about water conservation. However, the water you are talking about behind the NCO Club is overflow water from the gutters at the NCO swimming pool.

Even then this water is not wasted, it collects in the lake by the picnic area, then it is pumped to the sewage lake and used to water the golf course.

# AF works to aid travelers

studying ways to lessen the impact of the fuel shortage on people traveling on permanent change of station or temporary duty orders in their own automobiles.

Among the proposals are increasing the mileage rates paid to military travelers, paying a smaller mileage rate but adding a per diem allowance to it, and increasing travel time.

One suggestion resulted in the Defense Department

seeking a higher mileage allowance for PCS travelers. The DoD legislative proposal seeks an increase from 10 to 12 cents per mile.

Budgetary priorities prevented the department from seeking an increase to 15.5 cents, the figure recommended by a 1976 joint-service study

The Air Force says the current mileage figure isn't adequate to cover the expenses for lodging, meals, transportation and incidental expenses

the allowance was designed to time limits. The idea is not offset.

Another idea would lower the mileage fee to 7 cents per mile, but would add a \$35 per diem allowance. Built into this proposal would be the authority to allow more travel time when travelers are detained because of fuel non-availability.

The service is also pressing the Defense Department to allow extra travel time when members are delayed in reaching their new duty stations within the prescribed

connected with a monetary proposal.

While this won't provide additional travel funds, the Air Force says it will preclude charging members for unwarranted leave when they're unable to buy gasoline.

The Air Force also wants travelers on official orders exempted from state-imposed fuel rationing plans. Another initiative being investigated would allow members to ship privately owned automobiles with more fuel in the tanks.



A new carry-out service will be available 10:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 3 to 7 p.m. on weekdays and 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 3:30 to 6:30 p.m. on Saturdays and Sundays. The service is not available on federal holidays.



# Sky Lab meets end

Almost two years of intensive Air Force tracking of Skylab came to a close July 11 when fiery debris of the 77 ton space vehicle took only minutes to plunge to Earth.

In August 1977, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration asked the "spacewatchers" of the North American Air Defense Command to provide the best possible prediction of when and where the space lab would break up. NORAD predicted Skylab would fall in mid-1979.

As the estimated time for reentry approached, six NORAD sensors made 90 observations a day as Skylab orbited 150 miles from Earth.

Although Skylab is gone, the NORAD spacetrack mission continues. While it was the biggest, Skylab was only one of more than 4,500 manufactured space objects being tracked by the command.

# 'A small step for man . . .'

HOUSTON: Sixty seconds.

EAGLE: Lights on; down 2½. Forward, forward 40 feet, down 2½, picking up some dust; 30 feet, 2½ down shadow, four forward, four forward, drifting to the right a little.

HOUSTON: Thirty seconds.

EAGLE: Contact light. Okay, engines stop. Engine arm off.

HOUSTON: We copy. You're down, Eagle.

EAGLE: Houston, Tranquility Base here. The Eagle has landed.

It was 4:17:42 p.m. EDT on July 20, 1969. The Apollo 11 lunar module, Eagle, had landed on the moon. Orbiting overhead was the command module, Columbia, with Air Force Col. Michael Collins at the controls.

Neil A. Armstrong and Air Force Col. Edwin E. Aldrin, Jr. were inside the Eagle. At 10:56 p.m., the hatch was pushed open and a cumbersome figure stepped down the ladder to the dusty surface below.

"That's one small step for a man . . . one giant leap for mankind," Armstrong said. Colonel Aldrin joined him on the moon, and the two raised the American flag.

For more than two hours they set up scientific experiments, collected dust and rocks and explored the moon's surface.

A plaque attached to the Eagle's landing structure was unveiled, revealing the east and west hemispheres of Earth, and the words "Here men from the planet Earth first set foot on the moon. We came in peace for all mankind. July 1969 A.D."


It was signed by the three Apollo 11 astronauts and President Richard M. Nixon.

A memento package was left on the moon. It contained two medallions for the Russian cosmonauts who had been killed, and a patch from the Apollo 1 crew whose members had died in a fire. There was also a small, gold, olive branch. Three other gold branches carried on the flight were given to the wives of the Apollo 11 crewmen.

The return to the command module and return to Earth were accomplished without a hitch. Col. Aldrin even submitted a travel voucher after his unusual temporary duty, but was paid only \$33.31, because government air transportation, government housing and government meals were used throughout the trip.

Though travel vouchers and mementos lent a light touch to the venture, they should not take away from the importance of the achievement. Humanity had taken its first step in its space quest toward the stars. Footprints now mark the moon. Only two people were there physically. Millions of others joined them mentally.

An American flag now flies where no other has been before. But this was not a nationalistic act. It was the culmination of years of effort by people from



many countries: Germany's work with rockets, Russia's space efforts, and the worldwide exchange of ideas by scientists and engineers of every clime.




