



# **T-Birds perform Sunday**

More exciting than ever, the U.S. Air Force Thunderbirds will return to the South Plains at 3 p.m., Sunday, August 5, 1979 to take part in the annual Reese Air Force Base Open House.

Headlining this weekend's Open House, the famed aerial demonstration team comes back to the Lubbock area with a new show featuring two solo performers in addition to the traditional four-ship precision flying team.

Guiding the six-man team to Reese will be the commander and lead pilot for the Thunderbirds, Maj. D.L. Smith. The major is flanked by Capt. Ron Maness, left wing, and Capt. Jim Latham, right wing. Completing the formation team is Capt. Jim Coziahr, slot.

The Thunderbirds will open their show with the classic fourship launch. For the next 40 minutes, Open House spectators will witness precision flying at its best.

Streaking overhead at speeds nearly 600 m.p.h., the Thunderbirds will perform intricate maneuvers, often with no more than three feet between the shimmering red, white and blue T-38 Talon jets.

In between the formation runs by the main group, the two solo pilots will make exciting passes before the anticipated overflow crowd.

Following the show, the Thunderbirds will sign autographs and talk with Open House visitors at planeside.

This is the 27th season of Thunderbird performances. Up to the start of this year's season they have flown more than 2.245 air shows throughout the United States and 45 foreign countries. At home or abroad, they present to their audiences the professionalism, dedication and hard work of all Air Force men and women. To date, their shows have been viewed by more than 136 million people.

The Thunderbird team is composed of highly-skilled men and women working in more than 25 different career fields. The noncommissioned officers are technicians in the fields of aircraft maintenance, information, operations, supply, communications and admini-

the Thunderbirds and is the same aircraft that has been flown by Reese's student pilots since 1963. At one time, the T-38 held 12 world flying records. Many countries of the world use the T-38 as their front line fighter in its combat model known as the F-5.

The change to the T-38 from the F-4 Phantom jet came about in 1974 as a fuel conservation measure. The T-38's low fuel consumption contributes to the overall Air Force policy of energy and resource conservation. In today's environment, it is reassuring to know that the Thunderbirds are flying a high performance airplane that is economical and cost effective.



# Latham marks first year

1979 marks Jim Latham's first year as right wing on the famous Thunderbird diamond formation. Jim joins the team after flying F-4s at Elmendorf Air Force Base, Alaska.

Jim believes the bottom line mission of the Air Force is to fly airplanes. "The sophistication of aircraft and the complexity of the operational environment require highly-trained and dedicated people to do the job. I feel the Thunderbird team demonstrates the kind of teamwork needed to accomplish the Air Force mission."

Raised in Shawnee Mission, Kansas, Jim graduated from

1969 with a bachelor of science degree in Psychology. He was commissioned the same year through the U.S. Air Force Reserve Officers' Training Corps Program and entered pilot training at Vance Air Force Base, Oklahoma.

Captain Latham flew 328 combat missions during two tours of duty in Southeast Asia, flying the OV-10 forward air control aircraft and the F-4. During his second tour, while flying an F-4 on October 5, 1972, Jim was shot down by enemy ground fire, captured and interned as a POW. He was





#### **T-Bird stunts actually** aerial combat maneuvers

While a Thunderbird demonstration is, indeed, a spectacular sight, some people refer to the maneuvers as "daring, death-defying stunts, and acrobatics." But the Thunderbirds are quick to emphasize that not one portion of the aerial display is created specifically as a crowd thriller.

When the planes sweep past the spectators in the diamond formation, the Thunderbirds are demonstrating maneuvers which have proved successful in actual combat situations. The same is true for each maneuver in the show - and every Air Force pilot has been taught variations of these same aerial combat tactics.

It's the ingrained discipline, concentrated practice, and precise timing required of the pilots that provide the basis for the unique Thunderbird show. These attributes, combined with a precisely choreographed launch ceremony, sharp appearance, descriptive narration and vividly-painted airplanes, transform an otherwise ordinary flight exhibition into an exhilarating Thunderbird aerial ballet.

Such precision cannot be accomplished by the daredevil or stunt flier. It must come from hours of practice, discipline and sacrifice. It must come from an intense desire to achieve perfection. It must come from professionals.







airplanes, making final checks and loading the support aircraft. It's now 3 p.m. and they've spent the last seven hours tucked compactly inside a constantly vibrating transport aircraft.

Although they were at work more than 10 hours ago, the Thunderbird NCOs' work day is just beginning.

It's a hectic schedule, one that requires the utmost in ability and performance. The job demands long hours of bonetiring travel. Yet, as the Thunderbird NCOs step from their aerial home, their pride, professionalism and dedication are evident.

It's not merely an image they present to the public. It's a complete lifestyle - the Thunderbird trademark. Each team member earns the right to wear the coveted Thunderbird patch only after successfully completing a competitive selection and observation process.

More than 50 of the team's NCOs are responsible for assuring all the Thunderbird

fight ready status. The remaining NCOs provide the essential skills needed to support the flying mission.

Specialists and technicians in administration, graphics, information, life support, operations and photography work with their maintenance counterparts to produce a smooth precisely-timed and professionally-executed air show.

The "average" Thunderbird NCO - if indeed, there is an average - is 29.9 years old, has been in the Air Force 11 years and has logged one overseas tour. Collectively, enlisted members have received 62 individual medals and have worked at their various crafts a combined 652 years.

All Thunderbird NCOs are aware of the demands and responsibilities placed upon them prior to applying for a tour with the team. Without exception, these "Ambassadors in Blue" are fully committed to represent the best Air Force ever. They expect nothing more and the American public deserves nothing less.

## T-birds proven professional

Selection as a Thunderbird officer is an honor accorded very few. Those who have worn the distinctive Thunderbird patch have proven themselves to be dedicated professionals who have continually employed their training and talents beyond normal requirements.

Of the 96,000 Air Force officers currently on duty, only eleven can be members of the elite Thunderbird team at any one time.

Six of the openings are for demonstration pilots, three are for support officers, one is for the logistics officer, and one is for the narrator. The logistics officer and narrator must also be qualified pilots since their presence is required at all performances. The support officers conduct the squadron's executive, maintenance and public affairs functions.

Thunderbird officers have the responsibility of supervising and operating one of the most visible squadrons in the Air Force. In addition to their primary duties, the officers must also handle the obligations assigned to all flying units, most of which are larger organizations. In all, they share 66 additional duties required to function as a cohesive unit.

For example, the left wingman is also the squadron operations officer and the flying training officer. The right wingman is also the squadron standardization officer and instrument training officer. The squadron solo pilots have 13 extra tasks like flight safety and Federal Aviation Administration coordination between them. The maintenance officer is charged with vehicle control, supply and energy conservation.

Thunderbird pilots serve a two-year tour with the exception of the narrator who serves three years with the team. Normally, half the officers are chosen every year to provide an experience overlap and to help facilitate a smooth transition for new team members.

In 26 years, only 117 Air Force officers have joined the ranks of the Thunderbird alumni. They have experienced what few can — the pride of being a Thunder-





# Leader says T-birds represent Air Force

"It's a distinct honor being identified with the unit that represents the men and women of the Air Force to the American public," said Lieutenant Colonel selectee D.L. Smith. As leader, D.L. flies the number one aircraft in the world-famous Thunderbird formation.

"The job as Thunderbird leader provides a personal challenge for using past flying





# Talon cuts fuel costs


Since 1974 the Thunderbirds have flown the Northrop T-38A Talon, a twin-engine turbojet primarily used by the Air Force for pilot training. It is the first trainer-type aircraft employed for Thunderbird use.

At one time, the Talon held 12 world records, eight of which were set before completion of the plane's flight test program by noted aviatrix Jacqueline Cochran.

Though not specially constructed for use by the Thunderbirds, the plane has been slightly modified for demonstration aerobatics. This modification includes the addition of a non-polluting smoke oil system which injects oil into the plane's exhaust,

causing the oil to vaporize and form a white smoke trail. The plane's dramatic color scheme, its most visual modifications, enhances its sleek outline and provides an added visibility for the millions of spectators who will attend Thunderbird performances in 1979.

Operating costs for the T-38 are continually among the lowest of any supersonic jet in the Air Force inventory. Fuel consumption is also low, which directly contributes to the overall Air Force policy of conscientious energy and resource conservation. In today's environment, it is reassuring to know that the Thunderbirds are flying a high performance airplane that is economical and cost effective.

# Training requires grueling schedule

A strong Saturday afternoon breeze kicks sheets of dust across the Nevada flightline as six Thunderbird pilots descend from their cockpits. They have just completed the last show of the season, and for three of them it is their final performance and autograph session.

It's an awkward moment. A moment when those who are leaving the team find it difficult to suppress tears, and those who are taking over find it equally difficult to suppress excitement.

But come early Monday morning, emotions give way to other priorities. It's training season. The pros will teach the "novices" the fine art of tight, precision formation flying. There's barely enough time for a holiday break.

While maintenance crews provide operationally-ready aircraft to meet the more than 450 practice sorties which will be flown, the operations branch coordinates and reserves the airspace required for safe training sessions. The information staff rewrites, updates, photographs and illustrates publicity materials for nationwide distribution to the thousands of newspapers, magazines and radio and television outlets that will tell readers and viewers about

upcoming Thunderbird performances. The supply staff orders and issues parts, tools and equipment to ensure a smooth operation.

For the pilots, training season consists of an orderly but rigorous series of missions flown over a dry lake bed 50 nautical miles north of their home base. Beginning with basic two-ship formations, pilots progress through the complete series of show maneuvers. As proficiency builds, other aircraft are added until the four planes which comprise the famous Thunderbird diamond formation are flying with only a three-foot clearance. Formation takeoffs, lazy eights, clover-leafs, rolls and loops are thoroughly rehearsed.


While the diamond pilots are working on their timing and formation skills, the solo pilots are practicing their demonstration sequence at another site. In case of a new solo pilot, he practices all his maneuvers at a moderate altitude then gradually lowers them to where he will be performing during the actual demonstration sequence.

At a point when the two solo pilots and the diamond pilots reach a certain level of proficiency, all six pilots begin working together as they would in a show. This phase of the training season develops a high degree of confidence in the leader's abilities. It is during this time that all practices are video taped from the ground. This step is taken not only to assist the pilots with their maneuvers, symmetry, and precision, but also to ensure the training is flown with the most stringent safety standards possible.

The narrator then joins practice sessions to rehearse his description of the maneuvers being performed. His timing must also be precise, since he never actually sees the planes during a demonstration. Appropriately, he addresses his comments and narration directly to the spectators.

Timing, speed, aircraft position, entry, exit and crossover points for each maneuver must be second nature by takeoff time for the first show of the season. In three short months, the Thunderbirds must appear as though they've been performing together for years. No one should realize that three new Thunderbird pilots, along with a score of newly-assigned Thunderbird NCOs, are participating in their first air show ever. That's the way it should be, and that's the way it will be.







The Thunderbirds have met prime minister, presidents, foreign dignitaries, celebrities and countless fans throughout the years, spreading the goodwill and friendship which identify them as "America's Ambassadors in Blue."

Unfortunately, graphs, charts and statistics cannot relate the true value of the Thunderbird team. Their accomplishments and success in the areas of international and community relations alone have placed them on the top rung of the public relations ladder. Add to that the professionalism, pride, dedication and just plain hard work of the Thunderbirds in representing the capabilities of Air Force men and women stationed worldwide, and only then can you appreciate their value as a vital ingredient of the Air Force mission. The ideals they seek become a reality and an inspiration to all who see them.

Naturally, the most visible portion of a Thunderbird aerial performance is the aircraft itself. The team is currently flying the Northrop T-38A Talon. It is the seventh different airplane to be flown by the team and has been in use by the Thunderbirds since 1974. After starting out in the F-84G Thunderget in 1953, the team switched to the F-84F. Thunderstreak in 1955. The F-84s could attain only subsonic speeds, however, and in 1956 the Thunderbirds moved to their first supersonic aircraft, the F-100C Super Sabre. It flew more Thunderbird demonstrations than any other aircraft and was used from 1956 to 1964, when the F-105 Thunderchief was used for part of the season. Later that year, the team returned to the Super Sabre, this time flying the F-100D. Five years later, the team transitioned to the F-4E Phantom II which was flown until the T-38 was chosen for its fuel economy.

Highlights and accomplishments throughout the years include a myriad of awards which adorn the walls of the squadron's hangar at Nellis Air Force Base, Nevada, the team's home base since 1956. Plaques presented by various civic organizations and military squadrons are on display for the thousands of visitors who tour the squadron each year.

Among the awards is the Mackay Trophy, presented to the team in 1959 for their Far East tour as the Air Force's most meritorious flight of the year. There are also six Air Force Outstanding Unit Awards and various mementos presented by foreign leaders.

During the 1978 show season, the Thunderbirds again demonstrated Air Force excellence, this time in 80 air shows before five and a half million people. In their 26th show season, the Thunderbirds flew over 73,000 miles, visited 34 states and Canada, and spent over 200 days traveling. Fifteen of the air shows flown were before 100,000 persons, with the Chicago Lake Front air show drawing some 800,000 specta-

In addition to their live performances, the "Ambassadors in Blue," received nationwide television coverage on NBC's "America Alive" program. While in the New York City area, a local television commentator, Chuck Scarborough, rode with the Thunderbirds and later did a three-part series on the team.

Nine months of each year the Thunderbirds travel the length and breadth of North America. For team members the daily activities of toting suitcases, pressing uniforms, inspecting aircraft, polishing boots and the hundreds of other behind-thescenes tasks which must be done, admittedly become a matter of routine. But they guarantee there will never be a routine Thunderbird perfor-





Assigned to the Tactical Air Command, the Thunderbirds are the official Air Demonstration Squadron of the United States Air Force. Commanded by Major (Lieutenant Colonel selectee) D.L. Smith of Rossville, Georgia, the Thunderbirds fly the supersonic Northrop T-38A Talon.

Evans, second solo, Osceola, Arkansas.

Thunderbird officers with supervisory responsibilities in squadron activities such as maintenance, supply, executive support, publicity, air show coordination, personnel and administration are Major Fred Erickson, logistics officer, Albany, Georgia; Captain Jim Jiggens, narrator, Northville, Michigan; Major Steve Hyle, executive officer, Lancaster, Ohio; Captain Bob Biehl, chief of maintenance, Marion, Indiana and Captain Jim Jannette, public affairs officer, Mentor, Ohio.

The Thunderbird team is

composed of highly-skilled men and women working in more than 25 different career fields. The noncommissioned officers are technicians in the fields of aircraft maintenance, information, operations, supply, communications and administration. It is their job to make sure the planes are show ready and that the myriad of minute details which accompany each performance have been completed. In 26 years and more than 2,245 air shows, the team has performed throughout the United States and in 45 foreign countries.







# Auto Care Members all hand-picked

All Thunderbird team members are hand-picked volunteers who have demonstrated the ability to perform their jobs to exacting Thunderbird standards.

When a vacancy occurs, a thorough screening of each applicant is accomplished. Particular attention is given to the candidate's performance records, appearance and written recommendations. In selecting pilots, flying background and experience are also scrutinized.

Thunderbird officers are responsible for reviewing the records of each officer applicant. Their primary concern is the potential ability of a candidate to perform as a Thunderbird team member.

Depending upon the number of vacancies and the quality of the applicants, as many as 15 semi-finalists may be invited to accompany the team on deployment. This travel provides future Thunderbird officers an opportunity to become familiar with the squadron and provides current team members a chance to personally evaluate each applicant's overall abilities and

The field is narrowed to five or six finalists who travel to Nellis for extensive personal interviews. For demonstration pilot vacancies, applicants actually fly the Thunderbird aircraft in formation. Flying skills - particularly each

individual's general airmanship or "air sense" - are closely evaluated.

Following these flights, the Thunderbird officers make their recommendations which are sent to a board of senior officers and then to the commander of Tactical Air Command for final approval.

Competition for Thunderbird noncomissioned officer positions is just as intense. Enlisted members are initially selected on the basis of performance and personal records, plus recommendations from supervisors and commanders which may be included in the applica-

With the approval of the commander/leader, potential team members join the Thunderbirds for a 30-day observation period in which the candidate must earn the coveted Thunderbird patch worn by all members of the squadron. Personal appearance, working relations and attitudes of each applicant are considered, as well as their technical abilities and qualifications.

Such strict selection measures ensure that each Thunderbird is the best of those who have applied. As with the officers, enlisted team members are expected to maintain Thunderbird standards of job performance and personal conduct throughout their tours.


Many of the aircraft will zoom past the viewing stands in

## Stockholders report gives view of 1979

(Editor's note: Starting with this Open House issue the "Roundup" will run a series of articles outlining the 1979 ATC Report to Stockholders. Kicking off the first of the Series is a look at Flying Training.)

Air Training Command, with headquarters at Randolph AFB, San Antonio, Texas, is comprised of 15 U.S. installations, 87 worldwide training units, and 150 Reserve Officer Training Corps detachments.

The command is responsible for recruiting new personnel and providing them with military, technical, flying, and professional training and education.

More than 115,000 military and civilian personnel are involved in carrying out ATC's mission. The command's annual operating budget is more than \$1.6 billion. ATC manages \$3.3 billion in assets, including over 1,500 aircraft.

The command's technical training centers, Air University, and the USAF School of Health Care Sciences conduct more than 2,600 resident and non-resident courses, while field training detachments offer an additional 800 programs. Seven flying training bases provide pilot and navigator training to Air Force personnel, as well as students from foreign countries.

#### Flight training

ATC trained 1,125 new pilots, 502 new navigators and 397 foreign pilots and 24 foreign navigators in fiscal year 1978.

Six more women graduated from pilot training and are currently assigned to instructor, air evacuation, tanker and transport duties. Future plans call for training 24 women pilots each year. Six women are now on active duty as navigators. Eight more are currently in training.

Additional training programs include Advanced Navigation, Tactical Navigation, Navigator-Bombardier Training and Electronic Warfare Officer Training courses. Interservice Navigation Training will produce 205 U.S. Navy and Coast Guard and 32 U.S. Marine Corps

graduates. ATC also gives basic land and water survival training to all newly-assigned aircrew members. In 1978, over 9,600 crew members received such training in preparation for assignments throughout the Air Force.

Under USAF's Accelerated Copilot Enrichment (ACE) Program, ATC instructor pilots serve at 20 Strategic Air Command bases to help over 900 young bomber and tanker copilots gain additional flying experience in T-37's and T-38's. This extra flying develops the proficiency of copilots much more rapidly and economically than just flying their primary mission aircraft.

The Air Force uses the most advanced trainer aircraft and instrument flight simulators. The latest simulators give the pilot an outside scene created by computer imagery. They provide high quality instrument training while saving fuel and energy costs.

ATC's flying safety record in 1978 was 4.2 per 100,000 flying hours. The command flew approximately 18 percent of total Air Force flying hours but experienced less than 8 percent of reported accidents. In view of the command's training mission, that's an enviable

#### Technical training

ATC designs and conducts technical training for the Air Force, its three sister services, other government agencies and allied nations. This year 69,000 students completed basic military training at Lackland AFB, 145,000 completed





# History spans 38 years

Reese, located near Lubbock. Texas, is one of five Undergraduate Pilot Training bases in the Air Training Command. The other Undergraduate Pilot Training bases are: Vance Air Force Base, Okla; Williams Air Force Base, Ariz; Columbus Air Force Base, Miss; and Laughlin and Sheppard Air Force Bases in Texas.

The mission of Reese and the other Undergraduate Pilot Training bases is "To train top quality military pilots with the greatest efficiency and minimum possible cost," for today's Air Force.

The training that officers receive at Reese Air Force Base enables them to fly any aircraft in the Air Force inventory with a short transition training period needed to familiarize them with the new aircraft.

Reese is a typical Under-

has a force of approximately 1,650 enlisted men and women, 658 permanent party officers, and 627 civilians. There are presently about 370 students undergoing training. This number will rise to about 480 by

The aircraft inventory includes approximately 89 T-37 and 109 T-38 jet engine planes. On an average flying day as many as 76 aircraft may fly 354 sorties from Reese.

Lubbock Army Air Field (later to become Reese Air Force Base) came into existence June 23, 1941, shortly after the citizens of Lubbock area had donated more than 2,000 acres of land west of the city to the government for construction of the training facility. The field was officially opened in late 1941, and the training of Aviation Cadets began in early

By the end of World War II a total of 7,000 bomber, fighter and transport pilots had been trained at the facility. With the end of the war, the base was closed down December 31, 1945.

During the period it was closed, the base was used as a housing area for veterans and their families. National Guard units also used the base for training.

The base was reactivated August 1, 1949, with the 3500th Pilot Training Wing moving to Reese from Barksdale Air Force Base, La. The wing was redesignated as the 64th Flying Training Wing October 1, 1972.

Reese is named to honor Lieutenant Augustus F. Reese Jr., a native of Shallowater, Texas, which is located about six miles north of the base. Lieutenant Reese was killed in action at Cagliari, Sardinia, May 14, 1943, while on a mission in a P-38 to destroy a railroad supply train. The ceremony naming the field Reese Air Force Base was held November 5, 1949.

Many training airplanes have been used at Reese - the T-6, T-28, AT-7, but perhaps the best known was the TB-25. It was used as the only trainer

graduate Pilot Training base. It from January 1955 to September 1957. The last TB-25 to fly at Reese is now on display at the main entrance to the base. Reese was the last basic training school to use the old war bird.

> The first jet trainer, the T-33, was introduced September 4, 1958. In April 1961. Reese was named as one of seven original Air Training Command bases to conduct undergraduate pilot training. This brought an end to the three-phase program where preflight, primary, and basic pilot training were given at three different bases.

> The second jet trainer, the T-37, entered the program March 13, 1961. Training went supersonic in 1963 when the T-38 replaced the T-33. In 1965, the T-41, a military version of the Cessna 172, was introduced as a preflight trainer. Students now receive that training before they arrive at Reese.

> August 11, 1977, the Air Force's first Undergraduate Pilot Training/Instrument Flight Simulator began training members of Class 78-06 in the T-37 simulators. Class 78-07 began training in the T-38 simulators February 27, 1978. The UPT/IFS facility houses eight each T-37 and T-38 simulator cockpits for a total of 16 simulators plus their associated visual and computer equipment. The simulator reduces actual student aircraft flying hours from 210 to 170 for each student. The majority of instrument training is conducted in the simulator. This results in a substantial savings in the consumption of aviation fuel, and aids student proficiency while training in a safer environment.

> The years have brought many changes to Reese. Silver wings have now been pinned on more than 20,000 new pilots since 1941. Many new buildings have been constructed, but the mission of Reese has remained the same - to train top quality military pilots.

There are two major tenant. units assigned to Reese which support the mission, the 1958th Communications Squadron and the 24th Weather Squadron Detachment II.

## AF dollars aid community

Reese has been an integral part of the Lubbock community and its economic life since 1941 when the City of Lubbock and local private citizens donated some of the land where the base is now located to the U.S. Government.

Located 12 miles west of Lubbock, its mission is the training of top quality military pilots with the greatest efficiency and at the minimum possible cost. It covers 3,240 acres including the Terry County Auxiliary Field.

Reese employs approximately 768 civilians (including both civil service and nonappropriated fund employees). Permanent party military personnel amount to a total of, 2,060 including 416 officers and 1644 enlisted men. There were also 359 student pilots, all officers, assigned making a grand total of 775 officers and 2,419 military. The base also serves approximately 4,640 military dependents plus 12,500 former service men living in the Lubbock area.

the total payroll of all persons employed at Reese exceeded \$37.6 million. The base's total expenditures were more than \$46.6 million during the same period of time. Construction programs of various types valued at more than \$9.7 million are either planned or ongoing at present.


The aircraft assigned to Reese are valued at more than \$103,124,006. The base's other equipment and facilities are valued at more than \$56,688,234 and real property at \$55,912,000.

The flying training program is divided into two phases. The first is conducted in the T-37 Cessna jet trainer. This 400 mile-per-hour aircraft provides all the student pilots with basics needed to fly the U.S. Air Force's larger and faster planes. The T-37 has a range of about 400 miles and normally flies at altitudes of under 25,000 feet. The second phase of training is conducted in the T-38 Talon, a supersonic twin-engine jet aircraft that is capable of flight During the 1978 fiscal year at a top speed of 850 miles per

hour, at altitudes up to 43,000 feet. Its range is more than 1,050

Beginning in 1977 a new dimension was added to the pilot training program as the base's Undergraduate Pilot Training/Instrument Flight Simulater (UPT/IFS) became operational and revolutionized the way pilots are trained.

Housed in a building constructed by local contractors and costing \$4 million, the \$32 million worth of simulator equipment will enable a pilot to learn the skills of aircraft navigation safely at reduced training costs while at the same time extending the life of our current training aircraft.

# Squad flashes fancy footwork

The 25 member U.S. Air Force Honor Guard Drill Team will make a featured appearance during the Reese open house.

Scheduled to begin at 2:15 and to last until 3 p.m. Aug. 5, it will take place on the center of the aircraft flightline ramp in front of the grandstand.

This is the first appearance of the Air Force Drill Team in the Lubbock-West Texas-Eastern New Mexico area. The Drill Team seldom performs outside of the Washington, D.C. area.

During its show at Reese, the Drill Team members will perform precision marching and drill maneuvers with the M-1 rifle with fixed bayonet, the same as they do for State and ceremonial functions in the Washington, D.C. area.

The Drill Team marches at precisely 110 steps per minute. The precision movements are a way of life with the disciplined team members. They practice these military drill movements until the coordinated motion of all members looks like a single

A component of the U.S. Air Force Presidential Honor Guard, all members of the team are volunteers. The Honor Guard has a total strength of 147 airmen and three officers. All members are carefully screened for their exceptional moral character, a high standard of personal appearance and for their mental agility and physical dexterity, prior to being selected to serve with the Guard.

Since its organization in May 1948, the Air Force Honor Guard has represented the Air Force in ceremonial functions such as official White House receptions and other State and military occasions in the Washington, D.C. area. The Honor Guard also participates in Pentagon ceremonies honoring visiting military officials of all services; in funeral ceremonies in Arlington National Cemetery; and at arrival and departure ceremonies for visiting dignitaries, both foreign and national, at both the White House and Andrews AFB, Maryland.

# Hanger houses several displays

Over 30 organizations are scheduled to set up displays and booths in Hanger 82 for the Reese Open House, Saturday and Sunday.

Booths will include those from 54th Flying Training Squadron, 64th Flying Training Squadron, 35th Flying Training Squadron, and the 64th Air Base Group. In additions there will be booths for the 64th Field Maintenance Squadron, 64th Organizational Maintenance Squadron, and 64th Resource Management Squadron.

Hospital will have three booths, including one each for the veterinarians and nurses. The fire department and the rest of the 64th Civil Engineering Squadron will be there also.



and reopen at 10 a.m. On Sunday the show will last from 10 a.m. until the trophy presentation at 2 p.m.


A \$1 entry fee is required for each vehicle with all the money being returned in trophies or cash prizes to the top entries. Judging will be under the rules Association.



# 'Leapfrogs' perform acrobatics

The skies above Reese will be filled with Leapfrogs during this weekend's Open House as the U.S. Navy's Parachute West Demonstration Team performs a display of freefall parachuting.

One performance is scheduled each day. Saturday's show is slated for 3 p.m., the Sunday performance at 1 p.m.

The Leapfrogs are assigned to the U.S. Navy's Special Warfare Group One, based at the Naval Amphibious Base Coronado, in San Diego, Calif.

All team members are selected from the Navy's world famous underwater demolition teams or the Navy's elite SEAL team.

During their Reese show, the Leapfrogs will perform the aerial acrobatics and precision free-fall parachute techniques used by members of the UDT and SEAL teams during combat airborne infiltration operations.

For the convenience of their viewing audience, the Leap-frogs attach colored smoke

canisters to their boots and climb to an altitude of 12,500 feet (two miles) above the demonstration landing area. Their show emphasizes split-second aerial maneuvers and landing accuracy.

A jumper can control his freefall rate of descent from a relatively slow speed of 120 mph to a head down speed of 220 by changing his body configuration with his arms and legs. After free-falling for approximately 60 seconds, the Leapfrogs open their parachutes and three seconds later their descent slows to a speed of approximately five mph. By using their rectangular-shaped parachutes like a glider wing, a jumper can maneuver himself at speeds up to 35 mph to a stand-up landing at a speed of two mph in the center of the drop zone's target panel.

Following each show, the Leapfrogs will be available to sign autographs and describe first-hand to their audience the art of parachuting.









Geronimo!

Smoke trails not only provide a dramatic effect, but enable viewers on the ground to track the 'chutists more easily. As the Leapfrog nears the ground he controls his drift to hit the target. The landing requires split-second timing in order to avoid injury.



# Chili chefs cook at Open House

Reese chili cooks will have a chance to prove just how good they are and earn points toward a trip to the World Chili Championships during this weekend's Open House Chili

Chili chefs open the competition at 10 a.m. Saturday with the judging set for 4 to 6

Several area celebraties will be among the official contest judges. These include Dick Benedict, John Henson, Maria Lugo, Col. Richard A. Ingram. Col. Monte Montgomery and Ronnie Roach. Two special members of the judging team will be Texas Tech grid stars Ron Reeves and Greg Israel.

The cookoff will be conducted in accordance with official chili cookoff rules using the Frank X. Tolbert Super and Secret Judging System.

Entrants in the Reese cookoff will be awarded points toward qualification for the Arriba Terlingua Championship on the basis of three points for first place, two points for second, and one for third. It takes six points accumulated at Chili Appreciation Society International (CASI) sanctioned cookoffs to earn a spot at Terlingua.

All chili must be cooked from scratch on site the day of the cookoff. Regular commercial chili powder is permissible, but complete commercial chili mixes are not permitted. As the cookoff will be held on a paved area, there will be no open fires. Entrants are asked to bring their own burners, Coleman stoves, or barbecue pits.

Chili will be judged by taking all criteria, such as aroma, color, taste and consistency into consideration.

In addition to the chili judging for CASI points there will be awards for chili showmanship. Showmanship will be judged on theme, costume, booth setup, action, and audience participation. The judging will be continuous throughout the cookoff by anonymous persons. Winners will accumulate points towards the chili showmanship division of the World Championship Chili Cookoff. The top military winner will advance to the Air Force-wide Chili Cookoff at Goodfellow AFB in San Angelo, Texas. The winners of that contest will go on to Terlingua. Other events during the cookoff will include a hot chili pepper eating contest, moseying and lemon rolling contest.





the hospital has announced that appointments for OB/ GYN services may be made beginning Aug. 15 in preparation for the clinic's opening the first of September. The OB ward, nursery, and delivery suite are scheduled for opening later this Fall.

#### Numerous benefits

Capt. Michael Vojtasko, Hospital Administrator, pointed out that there are several distinct benefits to this program other than the obvious advantage of having OB/GYN services available on the base.

significant cost reduction will be realized both to the possible because the Air Force will be providing everything except the physician's services.

For inpatient services the cost to the active duty beneficiary will be \$4.65 a day-the same rate charged for hospitalization at any military hospital. This same rate applies to total OB care (covering pre- and postnatal care as well as hospitalization) under the special maternity benefits portion of CHAMPUS.

Cost to retirees and their dependents, as provided by a civilian doctor under this plan, will be \$4.65 per day plus 25 percent of the physician's professional fee. However, the retirees avoid paying 25 percent of the hospital cost for which they would be obligated in a civilian hospital.



#### Work schedule

When I arrived at Reese I was curious about the duty hours. I have been told that the ATC policy is 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

It doesn't apply directly to me because I work a 24 hour shift at the Fire Department. It seems that by the time I leave the base, about 7:45 a.m., the cars are stacked up at the main gate trying to get on base. It seems that quite a few people are coming in late and again in the afternoon about 4:15

I don't let any of my troops step out in the street because there seems to be a race again to the main gate. I don't feel that I am exaggerating the point at all.

I was just wondering what the commander's policy is on this. Maybe a few people ought to be told about it or print it in the paper to remind them what the duty hours are. Thank you.

#### **Dear Duty Hours:**

Yes, you're correct. Some people still have not adjusted to the summer duty hours.

I see both military and civilian employees who continue to be lax about the time they arrive at work.

For your clarification and those who take these liberties, Wing Reg 11-4 is the publication that specifies our duty hours. Duty hours are as follows: June 1 through August 31, 7:30 a.m. to 4:15 p.m., Monday through Friday, Sept. 1 through May 31, 8 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Thank you for bringing this to our attention and I hope that many of the people who read this will check their watches as they enter and exit the base to be certain that they are giving Uncle Sam a full day's work.

#### Gasoline woes

The base gas station is closing the pumps and telling us they have sold their daily allotment, then we see military vehicles go up and the manager unlocks the pumps and gives them gas. We don't like that.

This is in direct disagreement to what we have been told and it is eating into the allotment

that is supposed to be a benefit to us, not the military.

Even though they use it they shouldn't get special treatment.

#### Dear Daily Allotment:

Our government vehicles which require unleaded gas have no other source on base.

The operators of those vehicles have been instructed to fill their tanks during gas station pumping hours; however, in emergency situations, the service station will unlock the pumps and provide gasoline.

Please realize that part of the unleaded allotment the BX receives is based on the military purchases during the period on which the allotments are based. Action is being taken to establish an unleaded fuels dispenser for government vehicles and to procure the unleaded gasoline under a separate military contract.

Until this can be accomplished, please bear with us. We still must get the job done and accomplish the mission.



# How to beat gas crunch

Suggestions ranging from having cash to pay for gasoline to using gasoline hot lines are being offered to Air Force members who must travel by privately owned automobiles during the fuel crisis.

Because many gas stations are only open during certain hours of the day, careful consideration of departure and arrival times can ease the problem of finding gas.

Trips taking five or more days should be started on Mondays. Travel should be avoided during weekends and evening hours, when gas suppliers are usually closed. The best time of the day to start trips is between

5:30 and 9 a.m., when gas stations are usually open to serve rush-hour motorists.

Having enough cash to purchase gas at stations that don't accept credit cards can also help. The American Automobile Association reports independent stations usually have more fuel and are open longer hours, while major oil company stations have less fuel and shorter operating hours.

If traveling on permanent change of station orders, motorists should try to buy gasoline at base exchange gas stations, since these outlets have been advised not to subject PCS travelers to state rationing restrictions.

Travelers are also being advised to allow enough travel days to meet reporting dates, to travel along major routes and to avoid travel through states with odd-even rationing plans.

Military members are also being urged to contact new duty stations when they become stranded because of fuel nonavailability.

To assist motorists, several civilian groups have established fuel hot lines.

State and city AAA offices can help members find fuel. Offices are usually located in the phone book under AAA or as the state or city name before Automobile Association -Dayton Automobile Association, for example.

The Holiday Inn motel chain has established a toll-free number - (800) 238-8000 - that can point motorists to fuel if they are provided with the name of a city or town within five miles of a Holiday Inn.

The American Trucking Association's toll-free hotline -(800) 424-2426 - is a threeminute prerecorded tape about the trucking situation and diesel fuel availability. It is also



a good source to learn of areas affected by truckers' strikes.

Other information sources include local radio and television stations, police, citizens' band radios, newspapers, Kampgrounds of America (KOA) campgrounds and other motel chains. Military installations can also give information about on- and off-base service station hours and any state restrictions.

Military members should also keep in close contact with sponsors at their next duty

Finally, contact the nearest Air Force Aid Society office if financial difficulties are encountered.





## Gasoline allocations increase this month

Gasoline allocations for the base service station increase this month, but not by much.

According to Dan Arias, base exchange manager, Shell Oil has tenatively planned to ship 75 percent of last August's total sales this month 9,000 gallons more than in July. Last year Reese used 80,200 gallons of gas. That entitles Reese to just over 60,000 gallons this month, according to the allocation

Arias stressed that the local allocation system limiting total in April, the base service station has been able to sell gas throughout each month.

In July, daily rationing ran out around 12:30 p.m. each day. Arias expects the increased allotment to keep the pumps going until about 1:30 p.m.

"We are trying to get more gas allocated," adds Arias. Since March we have submitted three requests for larger allocations to the Department of Energy. Unfortunately, so far they haven't gotten us anymore gasoline.'

Arias was firm in saving that sales per day continues to work Exchange officials would here. Since the program began continue to try and get the allocation boosted.

### Some eligible for credit under Earned Income

Military and civilian workers with a family income less than \$10,000 who expect to have a child living with them this year may be eligible for a tax credit.


People in this category may apply for an earned income credit payable through the rest of the year, say base finance officials.

Those who think they are eligible and want credit in advance of their tax return filing should contact TSgt. Joe Foster in the finance office, Ext. 3401. He will give details and assistance in filing a W-5 Earned Income Credit Advance Payment certificate.

Finance people can tell those interested in filing whether or not they qualify for the credit. The credit may be claimed in regular pay or on federal tax forms.

Civilian credit payments may begin the first pay period of July. Because of the changes needed in the Joint Uniform Military Pay System, military payments will not begin until Aug. 1.

The W-5 forms are available at the military pay customer counters.

## Legal actions down over previous month





## Seven teams chase OMS


Seven intramural softball teams will be trying to knock off top ranked Organizational Maintenance Squadron when the slow-pitch playoffs get underway here Monday.







"Even the guys who will play won't be at 100 percent," says Ford. "Nearly everyone on the team has a bunch of bumps and bruises."


Rounding out the field for Saturday's tourney will be Lubbock United and Mellow Yellow Taxi, two other city league teams.
