# Chief McCoy outlines his goals

Quality of Air Force life and efforts to "inject the influence of enlisted men and women into programs that will improve retention and keep our people on board" will be major concerns of the new chief master sergeant of the Air Force.

CMSgt. James M. McCov. who took the top enlisted Air Force job on Monday said, "We use the term benefits. I prefer to use the term compensation because I feel that we're being compensated with good medical care and the commissary and BX privileges for the long hours we put in, the lengthy TDYs and extensive PCSs that make the military life the way it is.

"I feel that these compensation areas are very important and we should strive to continue to keep them so we can continue to keep our people."

Speaking from the vantage point of 28 years of service and as the father of eight children, Chief McCoy believes his military career has been a tremendous advantage to his family.

"Right now I have to pull my two youngest, a junior and sophomore. in high school, out of the school system they have gotten used to. The older they get, the harder I find this is to do. But by the same token, they've been able to look at this as a tremendous learning experience. .. meeting different people living in different societies in different countries.

"People say that it's hard to maintain a career and maintain a

family life—I don't agree with that. I think there are a great many ways that you can maintain a strong family life even with your military career."

Today's airmen look at life in a different manner than when he came in the service in 1951. Chief McCoy believes.

"It's not just in the military, but society itself has changed. We're in a different, a more permissive society. But I don't want to go back to those times often referred to as good old days.

"I think our young recruits of today, and I've been privileged to spend a lot of time with them recently, are most impressive.

"They feel a need to serve. They're better educated. They ask questions. They listen but they also ask. I think that's good, healthy."

Getting ahead in the Air Force is a one-step-at-a-time process, Chief McCoy feels.

"You have to set goals and initiatives. You've got to be able to try your best and get into the areas where you feel you can contribute to the life style of the total military force.

"Get as much education as you possibly can, not only in professional military education but academics as well. Take advantage of every opportunity."

Chief McCoy added another goal. "I just want to make the Air Force a whole lot better and greater place to live and work in so that this great country of ours can enjoy the freedom that we've been able to enjoy for so many, many years."

## President urges **CFC** donations

President Jimmy Carter has asked for support in the upcoming Combined Federal Campaign, scheduled Sept. 10 through Oct. 19.

In announcing the new pay study, Secretary of Defense Harold Brown said, "Military pay systems are not and should not be static."


Dr. Brown named Assistant Secretary of Defense for Manpower, Reserve Affairs and Logistics Robert B. Pirie Jr. to head the joint DOD/military

services study group on military compensation.

Pirie said his group would look into incentive pays and the general level of military compensation.

He pointed out that the pay of recruits has slumped from 115 percent of the minimum wage in fiscal year 1975 to 83 percent this fiscal year.

## Hospital advises checking boosters

Texas State Law requires that all children entering the first grade must have received an entire complement of vaccinations prior to the beginning of the school year.

The Reese Hospital is urging all military parents to check their children's shot records to insure they are up to date. If unable to read the records, they may be brought to SSgt. John Compton or SSgt. Ginger Minnis at the hospital.

Required vaccinations are a diptheria, pertussis, tetanus booster and a polio booster since the age of four. A combined measles, mumps and rubella shot is also required and should be given at around age 15

Parents are urged to bring their children into the immunization clinic early to avoid the pre-school rush. Clinic hours are 7:30-noon Monday-Friday and 1-4:15 p.m. Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday.

These diseases still account for a lot of illness and a number of deaths each year. They needn't. When diseases can be prevented through such a simple procedure as vaccination, no child should face the needless risk of remaining unvaccinated.

## Camp Blue Yonder gets underway Monday


Camp Blue Yonder, Reese summer camp program for disadvantaged youth, opens Monday with approximately 40 boys expected to attend the week-long event.



This year officers in all specialties were eligible. Those in specialties such as pilot, navigator and engineering had a better chance for selection because of greater needs in those career areas.

The board's decision enables these officers to continue serving for at least three more years in a commissioned status. If not subsequently promoted, the continued officers will be evaluated by another board in their third year of continuation.

While the Air Force cannot guarantee continuation to retirement, current projections show a continuing need for officers selected under this program. Officials emphasize that if duty performance is good, it is their intention to keep officers on active duty until eligible for retirement. They expect the program to continue for the forseeable future.

The selective continuation program is voluntary. Those selected who ask to be continued will be; those who do not will be separated and receive readjustment pay, if eligible. Those who accept continuation will remain eligible for promotions, assignments and schooling under the same terms as other officers.

# Reese installs energy savers

Refrigerated air conditioners in Reese Village may be shut off for 10 to 15 minutes the next couple of weeks because of an energy saving device that is being installed.

Work is expected to start today.

The device is a radio controlled unit that will help Reese reduce peak load charges for electricity. What it will do is prevent more than 75 percent of the Reese Village units from running at the same time.

According to a Civil Engineer spokesman, the device will shut off individual air conditioning units for only a few minutes at a time. By alternating down time from one home to another, officials say that occupants should notice little difference from normal operation.

The radio control project will take two to three weeks to complete. Additional work will have to be done later when the rest of the Reese Village units have been converted from evaporative cooling to refrigerated air.

# Filters cause problems

Air conditioning units in Reese Village have been the subject of several service calls this summer, but, according to Civil Engineering spokesmen, the majority of the problems can be corrected by some minor maintenance.

The number-one problem seems to be dirty filters in the air conditioners. These filters need to be cleaned about every two weeks and can be cleaned with warm soapy water.

If the metal filters are worn beyond use, Village residents should take the old filters to the Base-U-Fix-It-Store (building 552) and exchange them for new ones at no charge.

CE officials remind housing occupants that maintenance of the filters is their, the resident's, responsibility.

## C-5As fly oil pump to Alaska

Air Force C-5A aircraft are flying components of an entire 100-ton oil pumping station from Columbus, Ohio, to Dead Horse, Alaska, to speed Alaskan pipeline production and increase the nation's domestic oil flow before the onset of winter.

Once the 11 sections of the pump reach Dead Horse, they will be trucked to a site 65 miles from the pipeline's northern end at Prudhoe Bay. When the pump goes into operation, expected in late November, an additional 160,000 barrels a day will be piped into the Alaskan pipeline for American consumption.

The Department of Transportation requested airlift from the Department of Defense because of the critical energy situation and the short Alaskan construction season.




