AF names Chauvin 'best' TMO officer

"Initiative, ingenuity and management; that's what separates us from the rest of them."

That's how SMSgt. Guy Chauvin, recently selected Traffic Management Officer of the Year for Air Force, sums up his shop. Chauvin, along with the Traffic Management Office he runs, were selected as best in Air Training Commandin May. The office is still under consideration for the Air Force level award.

The 23-year Air Force veteran has spent the last 14 years in Traffic Management, and has been filling the position of both Traffic Management Officer and NCOIC of the shop since the retirement of his predecessor in April.

Chauvin says that this double workload is not his alone. "In the last year we have experienced a 47 percent increase in our workload without receiving any extra personnel. This is a people oriented shop and the people who work here are real tigers."

When Chauvin mentions initiative, it is well substantiated. When Webb AFB was closed he organized a truck shuttle to salvage material from the closed TMO, including the lumber from the razed building, and realized a total savings of over \$5,000. This booty allowed Chauvin and his fellow workers to completely refurnish the TMO here, including purchasing all new furniture.

Reese's TMO has also saved

the Air Force several thousand dollars with a hard-driving program to cut back on Permanent Change of Station transportation costs. A recent case in point is that of an NCO who received orders to Hickam AFB, Hawaii. Standard Military Airlift Command procedure was to fly the wife and infant child commercial air to San Francisco, bus to Travis AFB, Calif. and a MAC flight from Travis to Hickam. The total cost was \$351.

After exploring several possibilities, the crew at TMO found one airline that would fly to Honolulu for only \$197!

Another innovative savings plan involved inbound PCS families. When families do their

Reese joins Brave Shield

Four Reese people have been dispatched to Fort Lewis Washington along with 58 other Air Training Command personnel to take part in the U.S. Readiness Command joint readiness exercise Brave Shield 20 which began Aug. 10 and will continue through the 29.

Other command members selected to take part in the exercise are from 9 bases: Chanute AFB, Ill., two; Mather AFB, Calif., 15; Keesler AFB, Miss., nine; Randolph AFB, Tex., seven; Lowry AFB, Colo., four; Sheppard AFB, Tex., four; Williams AFB, Ariz., four; Columbus AFB, Miss., one; Lackland AFB, Tex., five; and Maxwell AFB, Ala., seven.

BRAVE SHIELD 20 has been specifically planned and designed to evaluate the effectiveness of tactics, techniques and procedures of multi-service units.

During the exercise, approximately 23,000 soldiers and airmen will be involved. These Readiness Command forces come from

elements of the United States Army Forces Command, Fort McPherson, GA., and the Tactical Air Command, Langley AFB, Va. Reserve component forces will comprise approximately 25 percent of the personnel and will provide combat, combat support service and support units in all phases of the exercise.

The concept of the exercise envisions the commander in chief, United States Readiness Command supporting a mythical theater commander by deploying a joint task force to assist a country friendly to the United States in expelling an invading force. The field maneuver part of the exercise commences with the joint task force employing air forces, tanks, infantry and mechanized infantry forces to counter the opposition's air forces, tanks and infantry forces.

The operation will provide a simulated combat environment in which to exercise and evaluate active and Reserve component commanders, staffs and forces in joint tactics, techniques and procedures.

Commissary shopping — a bargain!

Commissary shopping can often be time consuming and a chore. Many patrons ask why are the stores so crowded?... Are the long lines worth it?

Let's stop and consider why our stores — yours and mine — tend to be crowded. Commercial supermarkets have relatively few customers in comparison. Their average patron count may reach 64 per hour. Our stores often handle well over 230 an hour!

Could it be that the reason our stores tend to be so crowded is that our customers — active and retired alike — recognize that commissaries offer a substantial savings? Market basket or price comparison surveys show that, on the average, commissary customers save more than 20 percent after the 4 percent surcharge is added at the register.

Customers share the cost of commissary operations through the surcharge. The surcharge that we pay covers: new construction, improving old existing facilities, utilities in the States, shopping bags, cash register tapes, the replacement of old equipment, and much more!

Commercial supermarkets, especially in large cities, may

feature certain items at lower prices. These items are called "loss leaders." They are products which are priced below cost in order to attract customers to the store. If the customer only purchases the "loss leaders" the store will lose money; however, shoppers tend to buy other products on impulse. The normal mark-up on those products will pay for the "loss leaders" and overhead.

Commissaries have expanded hours of operation considerably during the past two and a half years despite Department of Defense directed manpower reductions. Now, as a result of payroll budgetary constraints, the stores have had to reduce manhours which has — in some cases — resulted in longer lines. This is an inconvenience to customers, but it is only a temporary measure. By the end of this fiscal year your — our — commissaries should be back in normal operation.

Our stores are a valuable entitlement. They are a non-pay compensation which we can use from first enlistment through our retirement years. This invaluable entitlement does make the waiting worth it — especially during a period of tight money, pay caps and high inflation!

Telephone service

I am concerned with the telephone service here on base, trying to get an outside line. It takes six or seven times to get a phone line to hang on so we can get a number.

I feel like we are paying too much money for the normal phone service if we are getting disconnected.

Dear Disconnected:

A problem does exist when dialing off-base to Lubbock, but we must live with what we have for the time being.

There are some points to consider however concerning the actual way the phone system works. When you dial "9", you are gaining access to a central office trunk line at Reese of which there are only 26.

Reese has 277 Class A and AUTOVON restricted phones competing for the 26 off base trunks. Once you have gained access to Hurlwood switch, you are competing with the entire Hurlwood area (a population of about 500

lines) for 31 Extended Area Service lines into Lubbock.

As you can see, you will not always get connections instantly. To correct this problem, GTE is presently installing a new cable between Lubbock and Hurlwood Switch which will make some additional pairs available and increase your chances of gaining access to Lubbock.

GTE is also working with Bell to make the Bell computer system more compatible with their older manual system at Hurlwood.

Fueling Around


I work in Petroleum Fuels and this Friday night Maintenance Control left at about 10 after 11 and didn't notify us they were leaving. Initially they had requested that we stay around to refuel post dock airplanes that were coming from Maintenance. We stayed like they said and the last run we caught was about 10 minutes before 8. What it was - they left without even telling us they were going home so we are just sitting here waiting for them to call us to

refuel aircraft. Normally they do call but this is the second time it has happened.

Dear Leaving Without Calling:

Being held overtime with nothing to do is a wasteful use of resources and poor management. However, the records in Job Control indicate that the function was not closed down for the weekend until 12:15 a.m. on Saturday. Also I understand you had called Job Control several times, starting at 7 p.m. that night asking to be released. Since the airfield stays open until 9 p.m., I cannot imagine not having POL support available until at least that time for unprogrammed transient alert aircraft in addition to our own aircraft undergoing maintenance. At least two hours remain on your shift after the field closes. I have been assured by the DCM that their weekend closedown actions include notification of POL. Be assured that I am concerned about any wasteful use of manpower, but I also expect people to work a full shift when the work is there. I hope this answers your question.

Is square filling really all that bad?

Square filling has the reputation of being a shoddy motive. But if you take a hard look, you may find some real value in filling certain squares.

One program, NCQ Professional Military Education, is designed to provide the educational experience to help develop the needed skills to get the optimum from each individual.

So, if completing a PME course fills the square that allows you to reenlist and become a sergeant —

If by reenlisting and becoming a supervisor you are allowed to receive the needed education to deal with initial added responsibility — fill that square too.

If by attending Phase III you fill the square of the working leader in the Air Force — fill it.

If by attending Phave IV you get a better perspective of your position as supervisor/manager and get additional points for promotion past master sergeant fill the square.

If by attending Phave V you are exposed to the responsibilities of a manager of resources and get points for promotion — then fill that one too.

Is PME nothing more than

filling a square? As you can see if you attend the courses you do fill squares needed for career progression. However, there are little squares and big squares.

The little squares are filled when you attend because it's mandatory, because your commander said you had to go, or to accumulate points for promotion. The big squares include learning your responsibilities as an NCO, learning the techniques of being a supervisor, fine tuning your concepts and techniques of being an effective leader and manager, and finally accepting the Air Force mission as yours.

Maybe NCO PME is a matter of filling squares, but in the final analysis, that may not be all bad.

According to Sergeant Zielinski, supervisors should counsel first-term airmen on the procedures and guidelines of the

Reservation System. First-term airmen should apply for a Career Job Reservation. CJRs are issued on a first-come, firstserve basis and selectees should be encouraged to apply as soon as they become eligible, especially if a waiting list

If a CJR is unavailable, airmen may apply for retraining into another career field. Retraining provides the CBPO, Ext. 3168.



own unpacking they are expected to dispose of the boxes themselves, a problem that often involves borrowing or renting a truck to haul the large boxes to a dump.



CETA saves money

Many jobs at Reese which would not be fulfilled because of lack of funds for employing Air Force personnel, are being accomplished with the assistance of the Comprehensive Education and Training Act.

Administered by the South Plains Association of Governments CETA employs workers in virtually every occupation on base from draftsmen to greens and garden workers.

Civilian Personnel Officer Fred Flewellen says, "With the assistance of this program workloads have become more evenly distributed to our regular employees."

Currently at Reese, CETA employs 35 special project people, who work full-time, and 27 young people, who work under a summer youth employment program. The summer youth will earn a combined salary of \$25,984 while the yearround employees will earn \$261,556. This combined is \$287,540 of assistance received at no cost to Reese or the Air

AF ends mandatory urinalysis program

The mandatory quota of urinalysis for drug abuse has been terminated by the Department of Defense.

The revised policy is intended to connect urine testing to incidents most often shown to be associated with drug or alcohol abuse.

Command-directed urinalysis is still permitted. This includes unit sweeps in areas with a high availability of hard drugs or where a serious problem with drug and alcohol abuse exists. Sweep testing of units is normally limited to units where drug abuse levels appear to be significant.

Under the new policy, urine tests will be conducted promptly when incidents indicating probable involvement of drugs or alcohol occur.

Tests normally will be conducted when a member's behavior seems odd or eccentric. They will also be given to those arrested or under the investigation for drug abuse, violent crimes, serious accidents or drunkenness.

Repeated or serious breaches of discipline will be considered along with other circumstances to determine possible involvement of drug or alcohol abuse.

"Do you know where your children are and what they are doing?" asks Don Hutchins, director of the Reese Youth Center.

"If they are members of the Youth Center, you do," he continued. "The Youth Center provides activities that develop total fitness through leadership, team work and a sense of belonging.

"My job as youth director is to provide sound, logical and appealing programs. I work with a limited budget and limited personnel, so it is important in the light of the increasing costs of all programs and services that I provide only the very best."

year per individual. Family membership fees for two or more cost \$10 per year.

The Youth Center offers a wide range of programs. Sports include youth league play in baseball, basketball, soccer, football, softball, and tee-ball. There is a junior bowling league and a youth swimming team. In addition, judo and karate are offered.

Professionally taught classes are offered in gymnastics, tap

dancing, ballet, Disco dance, piano and guitar. There are also classes in ceramics, leathercraft and other skills.

Girl Scout, Brownies and Cub Scout activities also take place at the Youth Center.

The Youth Center building contains facilities for all kinds of recreation. These are pool, foosball, table tennis, carome and pocket golf. There is even a room specially designed for preteens.

There are facilities for parties, disco dancing, color television, stereo and amusement machines. Also, there is a library and reading area, a gymnastics and ballet room, and arts and crafts room, and a complete kitchen and snackbar.

Free movies and free refreshments are a common feature. There are supervised outings to local areas of interest.

Modern and professionally supervised, the Youth Center is operated by the Morale, Welfare and Recreation Division of Reese.

"Membership in the Youth Center is expanding," Hutchins said, "and must expand continuously in order to justify expenses. With summer almost over and new people moving on base, I wish to offer every eligible child here the opportunity to join the Youth Center."

To support this space effort, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration has announced a limited number of astronaut candidate positions. Candidates will be selected from individuals nominated by the Air Force, other military departments and civilian sources.

The positions are for pilots and mission specialists.

Air Force applicants for shuttle pilot must have at least a bachelor's and preferably a master's degree in engineering, physical science or mathematics or have completed all requirements for such a degree by Oct. 31 from an accredited college or university.

Air Force pilot candidates must have a minimum of 1,000 hours of first-pilot flying time, with 2,000 or more hours being desirable. High-performance jet aircraft, flight test and combat experience are also desirable.

Pilot applicants must be between 64 and 76 inches in height and be able to pass the NASA class I space flight physical.

Applicants for shuttle mission specialist must have a master's degree in engineering, biological or physical science. or mathematics from an accredited college or university or have completed the requirements by Oct. 31. The requirement cannot be waived unless the candidate has extensive practical experience working in his or her academicspecialty field.

Mission specialists must be between 60 and 76 inches in height and be able to pass the NASA class II flight physical.

Air Force applicants for both positions must have between five and 13 years of active duty.

Applications must be submitted by Oct. 31. Interested individuals can contact the officer assignments section, Ext. 3436, for application instructions.


