SPs issue Magistrate citations

Effective today, the Security Police at Reese will have the authority to ticket civilians speeding in Reese Village.

Most people have been accustomed to the Armed Forces Traffic Citation which reports traffic offenses to the Unit Commander. Those citations will continue to be used for citing military members subject to the Uniform Code of Military Justice. However, a new citation called the U.S. Magistrate Court Citation will be used to ticket violators who are not subject to the

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Justice.

The new Magistrate Court Citation will require speeding violators to either pay a fine to the Federal Violations Bureau in Dallas by mail or to appear in the U.S. Magistrate Court at 12th and Texas Avenue in the city of Lubbock. Failure to pay the fine or appear in court may result in the issuance of a federal warrant for the violator's arrest by the U.S. Marshal.

Fines for speeding offenses committed in Reese Village are

Uniform Code of Military fixed and dependent upon how much over the speed limit the violator was speeding. In most cases the fines will be less than \$50.

> Reese's decision to employ Magistrate Court Citations was prompted by safety considerations. "Because of the number of children residing in Reese Village and the traffic density, the importance to adhering to the posted 15 mph Reese Village speed limit is essential and will be strictly enforced," stressed Capt. Alan Rouse, chief of Security Police.

CFC officials set '79 target

Breaking from the usual tradition of setting goals that will undoubtedly be shattered, this year's Combined Federal Campaign officials have their eyes on a "realistic" target.

"In past years the CFC goal has been set very low so that our final tally would be more impressive," admitted CFC project officer Capt. Ron Bailey. "This year we are setting a realistic goal."

Captain Bailey was quick to point out that the 1979 Reese and Lubbock goal of 120,000 doesn't mean that Reese people are expected to dig deeper into their pockets in the past.

"Our on base goal is \$80,000, he explained, "Last year Reese people gave more than \$81,000. The difference this year is that we plan on reaching a legitimate goal and not trying for impressive statistics that don't really mean much.'

To illustrate that, Captain **Bailey flashed statistics** showing that if every federal worker on Reese and in the Lubbock area gave his or her fair share (computed at one hour of earnings per month) the total would exceed \$360,000. That's the same "fair share" standard used last year.

This year's campaign officially kicks off Sept. 18. More than 100 key workers will be contacting individuals on Reese from then to the end of the drive, Sept. 28.

Reese toughens eatbelt checks

Getting people to "buckle up" hasn't been the easiest thing for base officials to get done here. That's why Safety and Security Police personnel are banding together in a program designed to increase seatbelt use on base. "Reese certainly doesn't have the worst seatbelt usage record

in the Air Force," said John Morehead, wing safety division. "But, we're not exactly leading the way either."

Through July, Reese was dead on the Air Force average of 86 percent (that according to monthly surveys conducted by (Continued on page 5)

Out-processing

I was just wondering why there is no outprocessing checklist to the individuals before out-processing through CBPO. I have heard a lot of people talk about this.

Dear Checklist:

Personnel who have assignments to leave Reese are given a Relocation Preparation Instruction Letter on their initial Relocation Interview. This is to be used as your guide for clearing the base.

This procedure is standard policy throughout the Air Force. The one stop processing procedure prohibits requiring individuals to clear with organizations unless they have an obligation to that unit (NCO/Officer Clubs, Base Supply, MWR activities, etc.) The basic letter provides guidance for required clearance but does not set up a schedule for appointments. of the nurses. Dear Dissatisfied:

We are sorry this incident occurred. Since we cannot identify the nurse you referred to, the possibility that your wife was given the wrong information is valid. Because of the Privacy Act, the hospital is required to obtain a signed release from the patient before releasing medical information. Once the individual signs the release, the Registrar will copy the information requested and release it to the patient for use by the civilian physician. Civilians get voice in ratings standards

civilians will soon have a stronger voice in establishing the standards by which they are rated.

Research scientists of the Air Force Human Resources Laboratory at Brook AFB, Texas, are working to develop a new Air Force civilian personnel appraisal system that is "job-related, objective and valid."

The system will provide the basis for management actions such as training, rewarding, assigning, promoting, demoting, retaining or removing civilian members.

Reese and other Air Force performance. The second will assess promotion potential.

Personnel officials expect the system to be implemented Air Force-wide before the October 1981 deadline required by the Civil Service Reform Act.

Supervisors and employees together will determine job performance standards. They will identify the job's dominant elements, including performance standards for each element.

Through regular counseling sessions during the rating period, the supervisor and employee will assess progress made toward meeting stan-The new appraisal system dards. At the end of the rating period, the supervisor will The first will evaluate job assign a rating to each of the

dominant and critical elements based on the employee's demonstrated performance.

Promotion potential will be evaluated separately, using data such as test performance, ratings, training, education and work experience.

The present system of rating an employee "outstanding," "satisfactory," or "unsatisfactory" will be phased out.

Termed "too vague," civilian personnel officials said the old system is practically useless, since 98 percent of all civilians receive "satisfactory" ratings. Present supervisory appraisals will also be phased out.

A full-scale test of the new system is scheduled for Norton AFB, Calif., this summer



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
Finance officials endorse use of traveler's checks

Reese finance officials recommend Air Force people consider buying traveler's checks instead of carrying large sums of money on permanentchange-of-station or temporaryduty trips.

Traveler's checks can be refunded almost immediately if they are lost or stolen. They can be used as cash for taxis, bus or plane tickets and for shopping. Personal checks are not always accepted for these services. It is


frequently difficult to cash personal checks in small towns.

Another plus in buying traveler's checks in conjunction with PCS or TDY moves is that the purchase cost is reimbursed when the travel voucher is filed. The amount payable depends on the total amount earned on the voucher. Unused traveler's checks can be deposited in savings or checking accounts, or they can be cashed at the local exchange or bank.


Morehead was quick to point out that the new program is not a "witch hunt." He noted that the main purpose for the inspection is to gather information about usage on base. By issuing traffic citations, the violations merely become part of the individuals driving record. The tickets do not access points against the driver's license.

"All we are doing is identifying violators to their commanders," stressed Morehead. "After that, it's up to the individual's command what disciplinary action will be taken, if any."

For the record, military personnel caught driving a privately owned auto while not wearing installed safety gear are subject to administrative action from a letter of reprimand to court-martial, although the latter is unlikely. They could also lose their on base driving priviledges. Suspension of those same driving priviledges is what could happen to civilian employees.

Those (military or civilian) caught driving a government vehicle without using seatbelts could lose their government license for 30 days.

Drivers should remember that they are responsible for everyone in the vehicle. Even though the driver may be buckled-up, if a passenger isn't the driver gets the ticket.



During September, we at Reese can expect an average of 2.6 inches of precipitation.







96th Congress considers dependent travel overseas

Editor's note: This is the second article in a series devoted to the status of legislation before the 96th Congress affecting the quality

ATC Office of Information Overseas travel entitlements for junior enlisted people coupled with the number of military dependents abroad are two related issues awaiting resolution by the 96th Congress when it reconvenes in

October Congress voted to extend overseas travel benefits (including shipment of auto and household goods) to dependents of junior enlisteds. That is, E-4s and below with less than two

years service. At the same time, a ceiling of 350,000 was set on the number of military dependents permitted abroad. (The services now have in the neighborhood of 377,000 dependents overseas, of which about 335,000 are commandsponsored.)

In May of this year, however, the Senate Armed Services Committee voted to end travel benefits for junior enlisted people and to cut the overseas dependent population by 30 percent over the next five years. The committee in its report to the Senate did not actually direct the Department of Defense to reduce dependents overseas; rather, it required DoD to report by the end of December. How the services intend to cut dependents abroad by 10 percent in FY 1980 and by 30 percent through FY 1984.

The full Senate in turn agreed with its Armed Services Committee and in late June voted in its version of the FY 1980 authorization bill to eliminate junior enlisted travel entitlements and reduce the overseas population of dependents.

The House Armed Services Committee, on the other hand, has approved a bill which supports travel benefits for junior enlisteds and does not restrict the number of military dependents abroad.

In full House has yet to vote on its version of the FY 1980 authorization bill. Once Congress reconvenes and the House votes, the differences between the two bills will be Committee in considering the FY 1980 Military Construction Appropriation Bill took the following actions:

1 712. 17 I

• Cut almost 20 million dollars in funding dependent schools overseas

• Cut 20 million dollars for leasing houses abroad

• Cut 50 million dollars for buying furniture for overseas.

The full house supported the committee's recommendations in voting out the FY 1980 Military Construction Appropriation Bill. The measure will be considered by the Senate upon its return from recess, and, again, a joint committee may be required to iron out differences.

In a related House action, the Defense Subcommittee of the House Appropriations Committee, in considering the FY 1980 Defense Appropriations Bill, voted to:

• Cut the number of dependents overseas by almost 30.000

• End privileges such as use of schools, exchanges, commissaries, and routine - but not emergency - medical care for non-command-sponsored dependents who report overseas after Oct. 1.

 Continue funding junior enlisted travel entitlements

The subcommittee's recommendations will be considered by the House Appropriations Committee and the full House later this summer.

While it may be difficult to keep up with who is doing what to whom, one thing is clear the number of dependents allowed overseas and the future of junior enlisted travel entitlements will be subjects of great interest to Congress and the military alike when the legislators reconvene in September.

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


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Several Reese people will be answering phones during this weekend's Muscular Dystrophy Telethon broadcast on KLBK-Channel 13.



The marathon works similar to the recent bike-a-thon held in Lubbock. Dance teams get sponsors to pledge a certain amount of money for each hour danced.


