

Academic ace is 'sure bet'

Some things are just a sure bet!

In fact, a wager that Capt. Robert L. Ehmen will be named Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 79-08's top academic student at today's graduation ceremony couldn't be considered much of a gamble.

Although the recipients of the UPT awards aren't officially announced until graduation, the 28 year-old Nebraskan has 363 right reasons to believe he has it in the bag. Captain Ehmen has completed acade-

mic training here without missing even one of the 363 exam questions given student pilots. That, believe training instructors here, is a Reese first.

"We've been talking it over in the Academic Branch," noted Capt. Richard E. Norin, Chief of the Academic Training, "and we (academic instructors) can't remember any students missing fewer than three questions."

And how does the former F-4 Phantom weapons system officer explain his success?

"I'm not really sure how I was able to do it," admitted Captain Ehmen. "I certainly don't

consider myself a whiz-kid. I think my prior experience in F-4s helped me a lot."

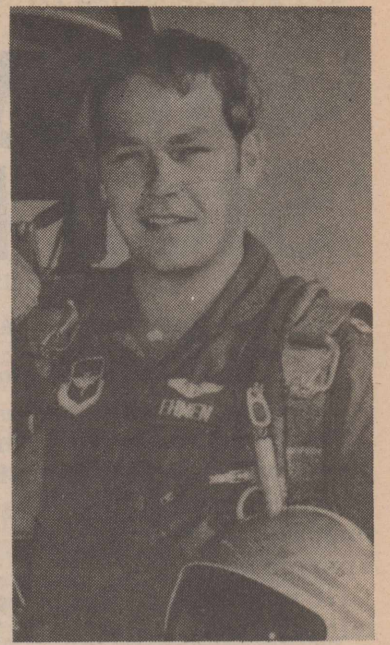
That may be an accurate explanation, but: Captain Ehmen had no "prior experience" when he nabbed the Academic Training Award at navigator school at Mather AFB, Calif., back in 1975.

Pressure is something all UPT students live with everyday. Just to pass the rigorous academic course puts a heavy demand on all students. But imagine the pressure of entering into the final exam with a perfect mark on the line."

"I confess," said Captain Ehmen, "I was more than a little nervous when I went in for my last exam — the second Flight Planning test. I felt good when I finished . . . but there were a couple of questions I wasn't sure about."

Relief is what Captain Ehmen says he felt when his perfect score was announced. "I'm real happy now," he mused, "but at the time I was just glad to have it over with."

Although obviously proud of his academic performance, Captain Ehmen is thrilled

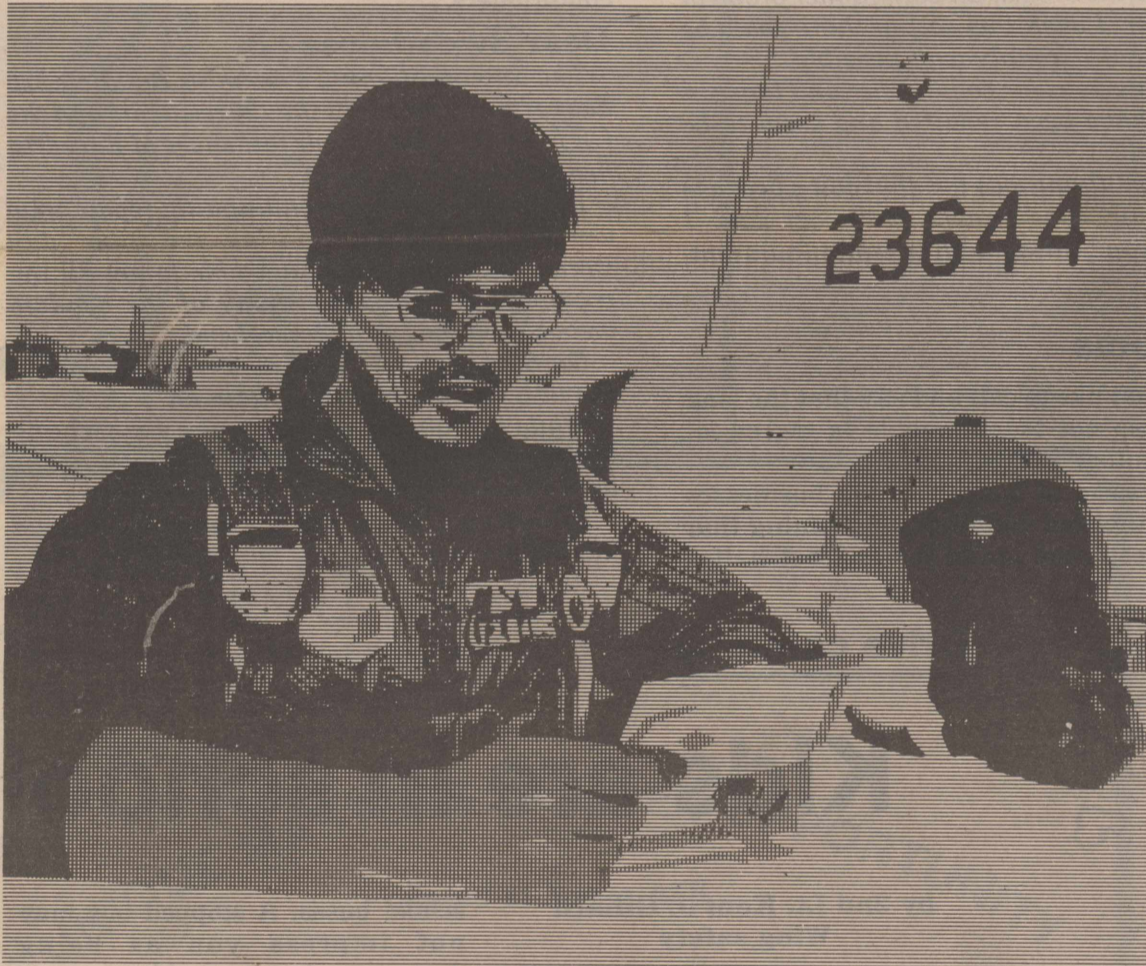

Class 79-08 gets wings today



Three women among new UPT graduates

Graduation ceremonies for Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 79-08 here today will mark a historic first for Reese's pilot training program.

Three women will be among those receiving Air Force pilot wings. First Lt. Cathy A. Caseman, 1st Lt. Jane K. Robinette Klingenberger and 2nd Lt. Linda L. Martin will become the first women to graduate from UPT here.

In all, 36 students will receive their wings at the 10 a.m. ceremony in the base theater.

Guest speaker for this morning's graduation will be Brig. Gen. Thomas E. Wolters, director of Inspection, Headquarters Air Force Inspection and Safety Center, at Norton AFB, Calif.

A command pilot with more than 5,000 flying hours to his credit, General Wolters has logged more than 265 F-4 Phantom combat missions in Southeast Asia.

General Wolter will have an additional duty at Class 79-08's graduation ceremony. He will be one of six active and former military fliers that will pin pilot wings on their offspring.

In addition to General Wolters' presentation to 2nd Lt.

Timothy L. Wolters, Col. Norman L. Nuckolls, Col. (retired) Gilbert G. Gallagher, Lt. Col. (retired) Franklin D. Cantwell, Lt. Col. (retired) Jerry R. Martin and Donald W. Meinhold will pin wings on 2nd Lt. Norman L. Nuckolls II, 2nd Lt. David M. Gallagher, 2nd Lt. Franklin E. Cantwell, Lieutenant Martin and 2nd Lt. Paul H. Meinhold respectively.

The ceremonies hold additional significance for Colonel Nuckolls and Colonel Martin. Colonel Martin graduated from TB-25 pilot training here in class 56-Nector and Colonel Nuckolls was a TB-25 instructor pilot from 1956 through 1959.

Following graduation there will be a special luncheon at the Officers Club. This evening, the graduates will be honored at a dinner-dance, also at the Officers Club.

Class 79-08 began training in October of last year. Twenty-four of the students are graduates of the Air Force Academy, six earned their commissions through ROTC, four are members of the Air National Guard, one is an Officer Training School grad and another was commissioned in the Air Force Nurse Corps.

Remember — when someone steals from the government, they are stealing from you. Get involved! "Stop Loss" is everybody's job.

We need to pay specific attention to school zones, school buses, and playing children. In addition to watching out for the "other guy," we need to watch out for the "little guy."

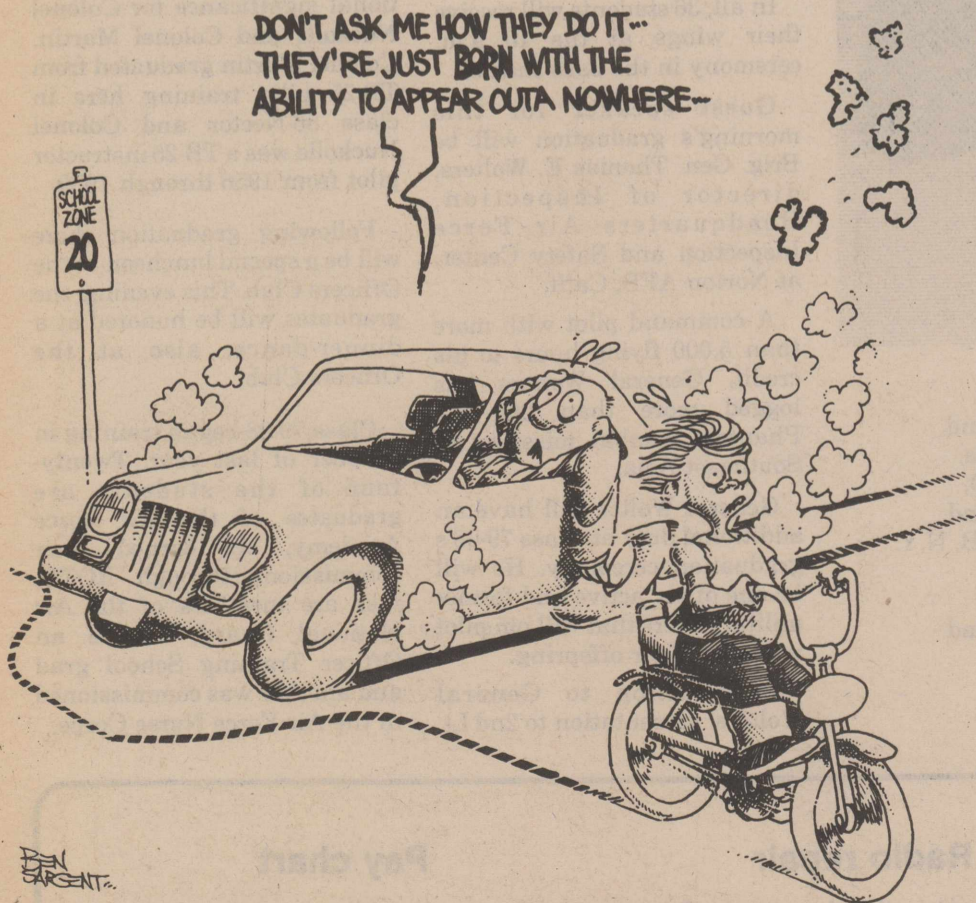
During the summer months, we may have neglected the numerous school zones and crossings. School zone signs are accompanied by flashing yellow lights and reduced speed limit signs.

Air Force alters SRBs

Several changes in the Selective Reenlistment Bonus program will go into effect Oct. 1, according to Reese personnel officials.

Eight Zone-A specialty codes will be terminated as will five in Zone-B. A total of 10 specialties will be reduced in both zones. There will also be 19 specialties getting a higher bonus while 19 more will be added to the SRB program.

Terminations are: Zone-A — AFSCs 251X0, 324X0, 341X2, 404X1, 306X1, 341X1, 391X0 and 426X0; Zone-B — 251X0, 341X1, 672X1, 306X1 and 341X7.

Reductions are: Zone-A —

463X0 (from SRB-3 to SRB-2) and 316X0, 326X7, 341X5, 541X0, 326X6, 326X8 and 341X7 (from SRB-2 to SRB-1); Zone-B — 272X0 (SRB-3 to SRB-2), 341X2 (SRB-2 to SRB-1).

Receiving hikes are: Zone-A — 241X0, 361X1, 403X0 and 554X0 (SRB-1 to SRB-2), 114X0, 274X0, 328X2, 115X0, 308X0 and 511X1 (SRB-2 to SRB-3), and 99105 (SRB-3 to SRB-4); Zone-B — 222X0, 326X7, 361X1, 791X1, 326X6, 326X8 and 511X0 (SRB-1 to SRB-2).

Additions to the program are: Zone-A — 202X0, 316X2, 443X0, 913X0, 206X1, 341X4, 472X1, 472X1, 921X0, 275X0, 427X4,

901X0, 303X1, 431X0 and 911X0 (SRB-1) 304X1 and 304X6 (SRB-2); Zone-B — 304X0, 304X6 and 321X1 (SRB-1).

Also slated to begin Oct. 1 will be SRB payments to eligible personnel in the 208X0 field. Multiple levels will depend on the individual language grouping.

Lump sum SRB payments will continue for all airmen reenlisting during fiscal year 1980.

ADC office adds answering device

Because of the installation of a telephone answering device, it will be easier for people to contact the Area Defense Counsel after duty hours.

In the past, people needing to talk with a member of the ADC staff after duty had to go through the Security Police Squadron or wait until the next duty day. The telephone answering device enables the two-man shop to have 24-hour, seven-day contact with Reese people.

ADC personnel can replay messages left on the answering

service from a remote source. By periodically checking in, ADC personnel will be able to return calls in a short time.

All calls remain strictly confidential and only ADC personnel can activate the replay on the answering device. People needing help do not have to give any details.

When leaving a message. The callers name and a telephone number where they can be reached is all that is needed.

Normal duty hours for the ADC are from 8 a.m. until 4:45 p.m. weekdays. The office telephone number is Ext. 3645.

Drug abuse heads legal actions here

Nearly half of the legal actions taken here last month, including the only special court-martial held, involved drug abuse.


Five of the 12 Article 15s handed down during August were for use or possession of marijuana. Charges in the lone special court-martial included wrongful possession and use of LSD, use of cocaine and marijuana.

The airman involved in the court-martial was found guilty on four counts and was

sentenced to: a Bad Conduct discharge, 90 days confinement at hard labor and reduction to the grade of airman basic. Enactment of the sentence is pending final approval by reviewing authorities.


Two of the remaining Article 15s were for failure to repair and two others were for being absent without leave.

The final three Article 15s were given for showing disrespect to an NCO, violation of haircut standards and for driving while under suspension.



Reese opens CFC drive; eyes \$80,000 target

Combined Federal Campaign kicked off at Reese Tuesday with base people looking for a total of \$80,000 dollars in donations before the close of the drive. Last year's CFC netted over \$81,000.

Capt. Ron Bailey, CFC coordinator, hopes to have all pledges in by Sept. 29 and recommends the payroll deduction plan.

Noting that many people are unsure about their 'fair share,' Captain Bailey commented that each key worker would have a chart showing suggested contributions from each pay

grade. According to Bailey, the 'fair share' is computed at one hour's wage per month.

CFC donations are divided among the various agencies with the United Way getting 75 percent, National Health Agencies receiving nearly 20 percent and International Service Agencies sharing five percent. However, money may be designated to go to specific agencies in different amounts.

The Reese Youth Center, one beneficiary of CFC, will receive more than \$10,000 again this year from the United Way.

To help key workers in keeping track of their progress, unit goals have been established as follows:

Air Base Group/Civil Engineers, \$16,000; Field Maintenance/Organizational Maintenance, \$21,500; 35th Flying Training Squadron/54th FTS/64th Student Squadron, \$25,500; Supply/ Resources Management, \$10,300; Hospital, \$4,600; Communications, \$2,500; Wing Staff, \$500; Weather, \$400; Commissary, \$1,500; and all other agencies total \$400.

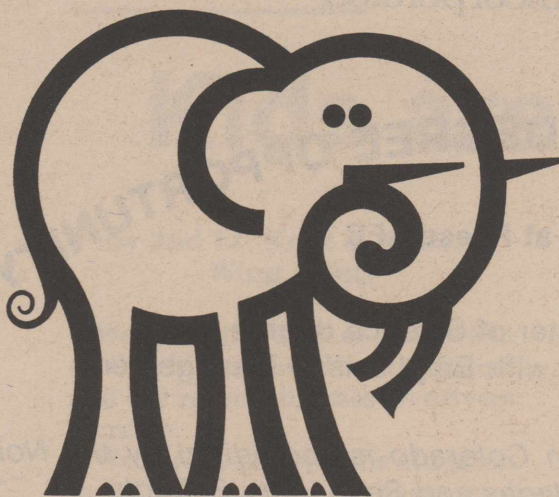

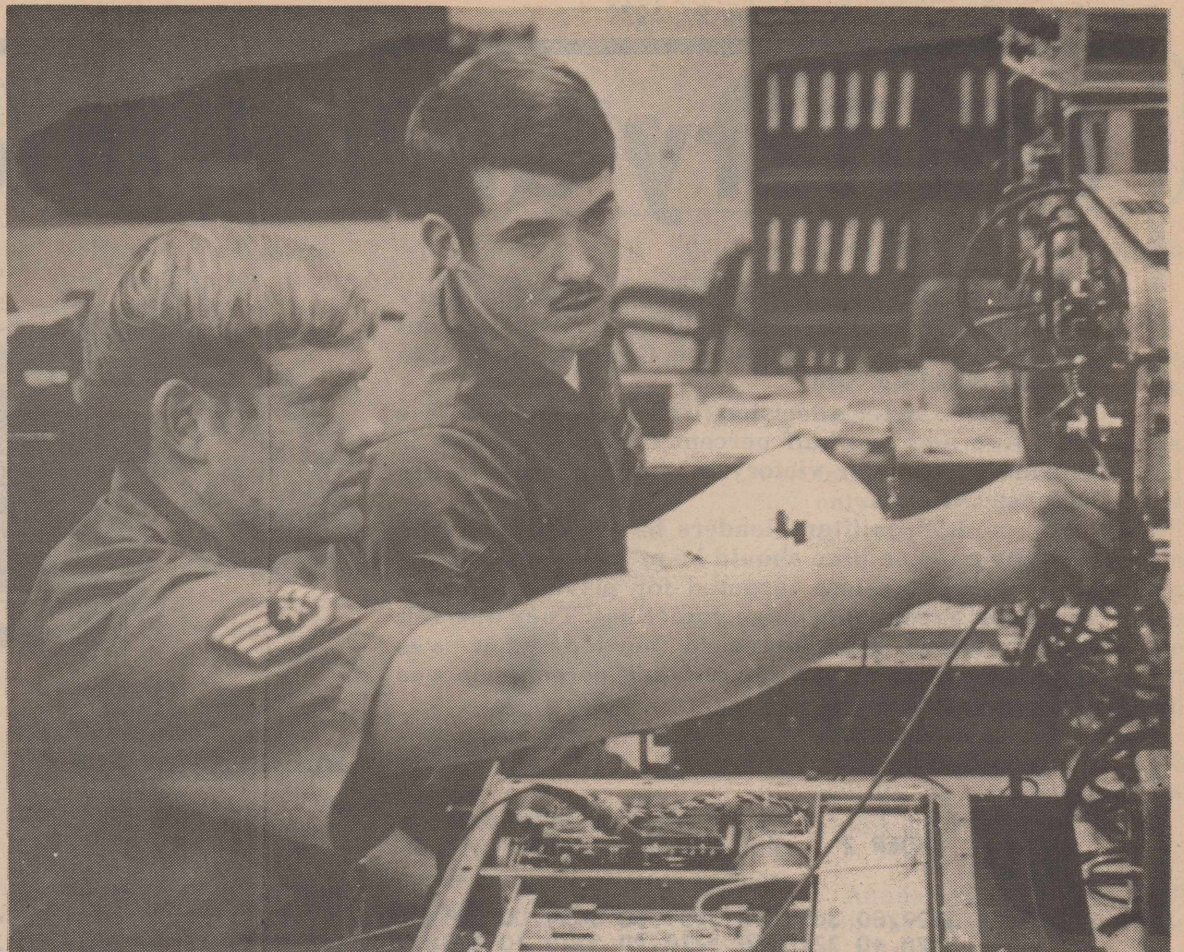

Communications duo keeps radio working

If there is any truth to the old adage "time is money," then two technicians from the 1958 Communications Squadron Radio Maintenance Shop recently saved taxpayers a bundle.

SSgt. Milo Moffitt and SSgt. Charles Sutherland were sent to the Terry County Auxiliary Field last week to pick up some damaged radios that were a part of the FM fire crash net, the only communications between the Runway Supervisory Unit and the Fire Station.

Since July, heavy electrical storm activity has damaged the system four times, according to Sutherland. The maintenance contractor for the radios had so depleted his stock of replacement parts that repairs had to be delayed.

Safety requirements would force closing the Terry County facility unless an alternate system could be set up. After meeting with CMSgt. Coy Martin, head of their section, Moffitt and Sutherland proceeded to save the day.

Removing the FM Civil Engineering network radios from their maintenance trucks, they installed external

antennas and attached a power supply that allowed the RSU to keep in contact with the fire department and keep the field open.

Although it is not possible to compute the dollars saved by their actions, it is possible to see the impact the closing would have had on Reese's training commitment.

The Terry County Field is used by students in T-37 training primarily to get a variety of approach patterns in their training schedule. According to 2nd Lt. Stephen H. Gladstone, Chief Air Traffic Control Officer, without the approaches available only at Terry County, 15 percent of T-37 students would have to wait for the reopening of the facility in order to complete this necessary phase of their schooling.

According to the contractor, the parts needed to complete repairs are not yet available and may be several weeks in coming, which would delay training until those parts are available.

Avoiding these delays, plus avoiding the added congestion in Reese's flying pattern, adds up to a big debt owed to the two technicians from Communications.

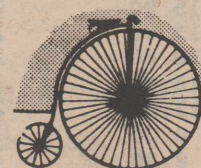

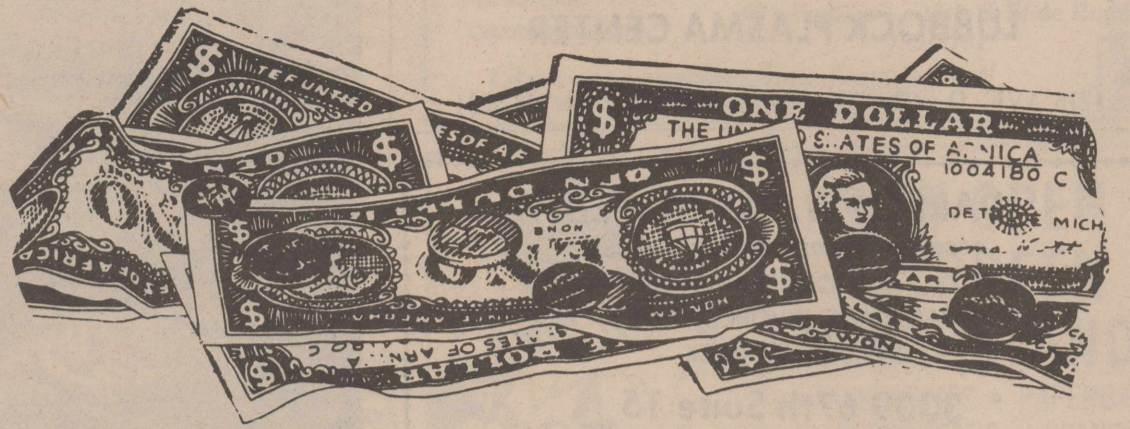

Although still not official, it appears that military people and federal civilians will get a seven percent pay hike on Oct. 1. At press time, Congress had yet to cast the deciding vote.

President Carter's decision to raise the pay increase from five and one-half percent to seven percent is considered a major victory by Air Force and other Defense Officials.

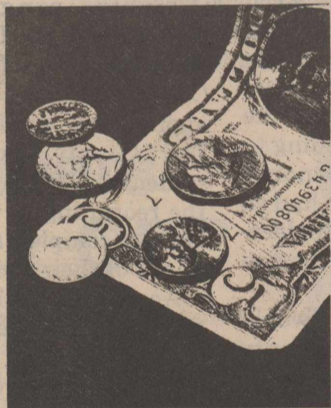
For months, military leaders have been charging that the defense hike should be at least equal to the seven percent raises targeted for private industry under the President's wage guidelines. They also felt that inflation has increased beyond what was expected when the five and one-half percent cap was set.
