Academic ace is 'sure bet'

Some things are just a sure bet!

In fact, a wager that Capt. Robert L. Ehmen will be named Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 79-08's top academic student at today's graduation ceremony couldn't be considered much of a gamble.

Although the recipients of the UPT awards aren't officially announced until graduation, the 28 year-old Nebraskan has 363 right reasons to believe he has it in the bag. Captain Ehmen has completed academic training here without missing even one of the 363 exam questions given student pilots. That, believe training instructors here, is a Reese first.

"We've been talking it over in the Academic Branch," noted Capt. Richard E. Norin, Chief of the Academic Training, "and we (academic instructors) can't remember any students missing fewer than three questions."

And how does the former F-4 Phantom weapons system officer explain his success?

"I'm not really sure how I was able to do it," admitted Captain Ehmen. "I certainly don't consider myself a whiz-kid. I think my prior experience in F-4s helped me a lot."

That may be an accurate explanation, but: Captain Ehmen had no "prior experience" when he nabbed the Academic Training Award at navigator school at Mather AFB, Calif., back in 1975.

Pressure is something all UPT students live with everyday. Just to pass the rigorous academic course puts a heavy demand on all students. But imagine the pressure of entering into the final exam with a perfect mark on the line." "I confess," said Captain Ehmen, "I was more than a little nervous when I went in for my last exam — the second Flight Planning test. I felt good when I finished . . . but there were a couple of questions I wasn't sure about."

Relief is what Captain Ehmen says he felt when his perfect score was announced. "I'm real happy now," he mused, "but at the time I was just glad to have it over with." Although obviously proud of

his academic performance, Captain Ehmen is thrilled



In addition, if we had the money we would have a backup system — but we don't.



Several changes in the Selective Reenlistment Bonus program will go into effect Oct. 1, according to Reese personnel

Eight Zone-A specialty codes will be terminated as will five in Zone-B. A total of 10 specialties will be reduced in both zones. There will also be 19 specialties getting a higher bonus while 19 more will be added to the SRB

Terminations are: Zone-A -AFSCs 251X0, 324X0, 341X2, 404X1, 306X1, 341X1, 391X0 and 426X0; Zone-B - 251X0, 341X1, 672X1, 306X1 and

Reductions are: Zone-A -

463X0 (from SRB-3 to SRB-2) and 316X0, 326X7, 341X5, 541X0, 326X6, 326X8 and 341X7 (from SRB-2 to SRB-1); Zone-B - 272X0 (SRB-3 to SRB-2), 341X2 (SRB-2 to SRB-1).

Also slated to begin Oct. 1 will be SRB payments to eligible personnel in the 208X0 field. Multiple levels will depend on the individual language grouping.

Lump sum SRB payments will continue for all airmen reenlisting during fiscal year 1980.

Drug abuse heads legal actions here

Nearly half of the legal actions taken here last month, including the only special courtmartial held, involved drug abuse.

Five of the 12 Article 15s handed down during August were for use or possession of marijuana. Charges in the lone special court-martial included wrongful possession and use of LSD, use of cocaine and marijuana.

The airman involved in the court-martial was found guilty on four counts and was

sentenced to: a Bad Conduct discharge, 90 days confinement at hard labor and reduction to the grade of airman basic. Enactment of the sentence is pending final approval by reviewing authorities.

Two of the remaining Article 15s were for failure to repair and two others were for being absent without leave.

The final three Article 15s were given for showing disrespect to an NCO, violation of haircut standards and for driving while under suspension.

Reese opens CFC drive; eyes \$80,000 target

Combined Federal Campaign kicked off at Reese Tuesday with base people looking for a total of \$80,000 dollars in donations before the close of the drive. Last year's CFC netted over \$81,000.

Capt. Ron Bailey, CFC coordinator, hopes to have all pledges in by Sept. 29 and recommends the payroll deduction plan.

Noting that many people are unsure about their 'fair share,' Captain Bailey commented that each key worker would have a chart showing suggested contributions from each pay

grade. According to Bailey, the 'fair share' is computed at one hour's wage per month.

CFC donations are divided among the various agencies with the United Way getting 75 percent, National Health Agencies receiving nearly 20 percent and International Service Agencies sharing five percent. However, money may be designated to go to specific agencies in different amounts.

The Reese Youth Center, one benificiary of CFC, will receive more than \$10,000 again this year from the United Way.

To help key workers in keeping track of their progress, unit goals have been established as follows:

Air Base Group/Civil Engineers, \$16,000; Field Maintenance/Organizational Maintenance, \$21,500; 35th Flying Training Squadron/ 54th FTS/64th Student Squadron, \$25,500; Supply/ Resources Management, \$10,300; Hospital, \$4,600; Communications, \$2,500; Wing Staff, \$500; Weather, \$400; Commissary, \$1,500; and all other agencies total \$400.


Red Cross aids airman

A1C Mike Cronin strongly supports one beneficiary of the Combined Federal Campaign, the Red Cross.


Last February, after returning from emergency leave resulting from his mother-inlaw's cancer surgery, he was notified that his mother was to undergo the same surgery.



Military anticipates pay hike

Although still not official, it appears that military people and federal civilians will get a seven percent pay hike on Oct. 1. At press time, Congress had yet to cast the deciding vote.

President Carter's decision to raise the pay increase from five and one-half percent to seven percent is considered a major victory by Air Force and other Defense Officials.

For months, military leaders have been charging that the defense hike should be at least equal to the seven percent raises targeted for private industry under the President's wage guidelines. They also felt that inflation has increased beyond what was expected when the five and one-half percent cap was set.






