CFC contributions top \$71,000 mark

With only one week left in Combined Federal Campaign, it looks as if Reese may fail to meet its \$80,000 goal.

According to Capt. Ron Bailey, CFC project officer, 90 percent, or \$71,423, of the goal has been collected. Although six of all the 11 agencies reporting are over 100 percent of goal, the remaining contributions are insufficient to cover the all-time high mark.

Highest among those reporting is wing staff, with 239 percent of its goal accounted for. Field Training Detachment runs second 167 percent, followed by Area Defense Council with 126, Hospital with

125, Management Engineering Team with 124 and Weather with 122.

Those that have failed to reach their unit goals are Resources Management with 66 percent, Communications with 66, Maintenance with 68, Air Base Group with 80, and the DO complex, falling just short with 96 percent.

Captain Bailey commented on the possibility of reaching the overall goal by saying, "Being very optimistic, there is a possibility that we can make it. If the organizations that are low will come through there is still a chance. Operations for gone back through and canvassed for late pledges. It looks like they will hit 100

During Monday visit

Chayes talks with local media

Representatives from local news media, including a Reese Roundup reporter, were on hand at base operations Monday for an interview with Undersecretary of the Air Force, Antonia Handler Chayes.

Chayes had just finished a tour of Reese which included a mission briefing, a drivearound tour of facilities, a look at the flight simulators and the 35th Flying Training Squadron and meetings with groups of instructor and student pilots.

After discussing such international questions as the impact of Sinai withdrawal on the construction of U.S. financed bases, Chayes addressed the problem of retention in the face of eroding

military entitlements and shrinking buying power.

"We're looking at a variety of possible changes (to improve retention). I was discussing these with some of the IPs. A general improvement in the compensation system has been a DoD study, including, for example, a variable housing allowance; including improvements in PCS; including some increases in overall pay. We have managed to get a seven percent rather than a five percent pay cap, and while that's not great, it is something.

"I think we're looking at special incentive pays, reenlistment bonuses, and special incentives for certain skill categories. Conceptually, what we're trying to do is, one, be equitable and, two, target special funds to special skill categories."

When asked if this meant a return to proficiency pay, the undersecretary replied, "No, we're talking about such special skill areas as pilots, engineers and those that require bonuses. We're also looking to keep the

Reese installs energy control system

During Fiscal Year-1979 Reese energy conservation measures saved the Air Force nearly \$143,000. With the installation of a new computerized energy monitoring and control system, base officials expect even greater savings next year.

The first phase of the new system, which uses computers to control the temperature and numically in various base buildings, will be completed by the beginning of the year. By then, nine facilities at Reese will be hooked up to the central computer in Civil Engineering headquarters, building 553. Installation of the system in more base facilities is expected to start later next year.

Buildings having the control system installed in them now include the 35th Flying Training Squadron and the 64th Student Squadron buildings, the Corrosion Control facility, the base theater and the Security Police headquarters. Other facilities include the base Arts and Crafts Center, a transfer station and the 1958th Communications

Squadron maintenance build-

The \$375,000 system is similar to that already in use in the Instrument Flight Simulator, although Civil Engineer spokesmen report that the new

"We hope to have an energy savings of 15 to 25 percent over present usage in the buildings using the control system," projected Lomas Freeman, chief of the Energy Management Section. "Eventually we hope to have every permanent building on base hooked up to the central computer."

Controlling the temperature and humidity aren't the only things the new system can do. It can automatically shut on or off energy using devices. "This system can do about anything we want to program it for,' explained Freeman.

In addition to this system, Reese will have another computerized energy saver at work by next summer in Reese Village. This system will regulate the number of air conditioners running in the village at any one time to keep

Halloween brings out 'trick or treaters'



With Halloween approaching, it's time to consider the safety and potential hazards children should be made aware of.

By following the tips included here, children can enjoy a safe and happy Halloween, Reese safety officials note.

Be careful of the material in costumes. Many are extremely flammable. With jack-o-l'-lanterns and candles present, the possibility of a billowing costume or long wig catching fire is very real.

Though people don't like to think

others would give unsafe treats, there are always a few who do. Tell children not to eat anything until it's been checked out. Throw away any item that causes the slightest suspicion, including any upwrapped treats.

Children can become excited and forget even normal road precautions. Remember that dusk is the time of poorest visibility for drivers. Instruct children to avoid dark streets and make sure they wear a bright, reflective costume.

Know the plans of children. Where will they be going? Who will they be going with? Ideally they should be accompanied by an adult or older child.

What will they be doing? Do they have any pranks planned? What time will they be home? Agree on what time they must be home before they leave.

If possible, attach reflective tape to the children's costumes. Give them a flashlight.

Don't obstruct the porch with potted plants or jack-o'-lanterns.

Make sure the porch light is on. Don't ask or encourage children to come into your home.



Check heating devices

Have your furnace and kitchen stove installed and checked periodically by a competent tradesman. Avoid portable gas, kerosene, gasoline or oil burning heaters which consume the room's oxygen and given off deadly fumes. Never resort to makeshift heating or cooking units in your home.

A screen should always be placed in front of the fireplace to keep sparks from flying onto the rugs and furniture. Keep your supply of fuel well away from the fire. Fires should be tended by an adult, and small children should never be allowed to throw paper or wood into the flames.







must be able to complete bachelor's degree requirements within two academic years. Any academic major is eligible and academic study plans must be approved by Air Force ROTC.

Other requirements for applicants include: obtaining an enrollment authorization from the school they plan to attend in the category they wish to enter AFROTC; taking an Air Force Officer Qualifying Test and scheduling an Air Force medical examination.

Airmen accepted in this

program will not be discharged more than 30 days prior to entry into college and concurrent enrollment into AFROTC's Professional Officer Course.

To verify eligibility and rule out other regulation restrictions, AFROTC officials recommend that interested persons write the Office of Public Affairs, Air Force ROTC, Maxwell AFB, AL, 36112, or call (205) 293-2825 or contact the Professor of Aerospace Studies at the university or college they plan to attend.

energy is not a new idea in the Air Training Command. Other bases with energy monitoring and control devices such as that being installed here are: Williams AFB, Ariz.; Vance AFB, Okla; Lackland AFB, Texas; and Keesler AFB, Miss. Randolph AFB, Texas is also having a similar system put in.

And the command's search

for ways to save energy doesn't end there. Several programs designed to reduce dependency on non-renewable energy resources are underway. For example, solar energy systems are being tested on several military family housing units at Sheppard AFB, Texas and the Randolph Base Exchange.

A feasibility study recently completed by the Department of Energy indicates that a practical geothermal source may be available to provide heating and cooling at Williams. Planning is underway to tap this geothermal source.

Saving America's fossil fuels is a major priority of the Air Force. At Reese and at bases around the world the Air Force is looking for better ways to



Colder weather arrives


by Tsgt. Charles P. Milliken Cooler temperatures mark the arrival of November as the average daily reading drops ten degrees below that of October.
