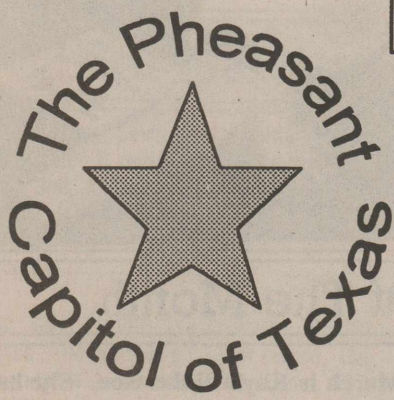

First State Bank Ranks In Top Ten Lenders Among Community Banks

American Banker Research; Sheshunoff Information Services, Inc. has rated the First State Bank of Stratford among the top ten lenders in community banks. The First State Bank has been a part of Stratford since 1948. In 1995 the bank expanded into the Dumas and Dalhart markets with the purchase of North Plains Savings and Loan.

The top ten banks were culled from banks with \$3 billion in assets or less, holding at least 25% agriculture loans, loans to deposits of at least 65%, and an average return on assets of at least 1% from 1992 through September 1995.

The three branch First State Bank had assets in excess of \$105 million as of September 1995 and a loan portfolio of \$62 million. The First State Bank loan portfolio consists of mortgage, real estate, agriculture, commercial and consumer loans.

The First State Bank made the top ten list based on its performance in profitability, agricultural loan concentrating and growth, and overall loan portfolio performance during the period.

In terms of agriculture, the bank said it stresses personal relationships, just as many other small, rural banks do. "We've had good customers that stayed with us...most of them for many years," said B.A. Donelson, bank president.

"The relationships a farm bank cultivates with its customers is perhaps the most important factor in its success. If the farmers are profitable, the bank will be. Anything that the bank can do to increase the management skills of the producers would ultimately pay off for the bank," said Donelson.

Low cattle prices coupled with rising expenses and very little moisture could bring woe to farm customers in the next few years. "Of course, it's like everything else," Mr. Donelson said. "The good managers will come through."

Tax Deferral Available For Elderly Homeowners

Texas aged 65 or older can postpone paying delinquent and current taxes on their homes. They can take advantage of a tax option called "over-65 deferral" by signing an affidavit at the Sherman County Appraisal District office. The form and more information is available at the Appraisal District office, 402 N. 3rd Street in Stratford or call 396-5566.

If the affidavit is on file, an older homeowner cannot lose a homestead because of delinquent taxes. Once a homeowner files an over-65 tax deferral affidavit with the appraisal district, no taxing unit can start or continue a lawsuit for delinquent taxes as long as that person owns and lives in that home. The tax deferral only postpones paying delinquent taxes on the home; it does not cancel them.

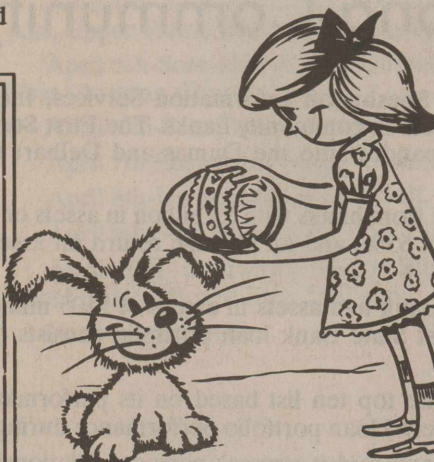

Across The Fence

Start your garden and flower beds off right this year. Follow these easy reminders for a healthy productive garden....

*Clear the garden of winter debris to eliminate hiding places for pests. *For new flower beds, remove any weeds or grass from the bedding area.

*Use a shovel to loosen the soil at least 6-12 inches deep in the bed you want to use for a flowering display. *Next, add peat moss or compost to increase the organic content of your soil. Whether your soil is clay or sandy, organic matter will increase aeration, the water-holding capacity and the ability of your soil to hold fertilizer.

*Add a well-composed manure or flower fertilizer according to the package directions. To cut back on weed seeds, use manure that has been composted at a high temperature, such as the type sold in plastic bags.

DESIGN TIPS TO SAVE YOU WORK...

*Don't make your flower beds any wider than what you can comfortably reach across--under 3 feet wide is best, unless you plan on adding a path of stepping stones for easy access to the flower bed for maintenance.

EDGING A GARDEN...

*Few things are more frustrating than discovering that your lawn has snaked its way into your flower bed. One sure way to prevent this is to surround the bed with an edging made from impenetrable plastic or wood. An edging of brick or wood will separate the garden from the grass and provide a route for the wheels of the lawn mower to follow. Anything impenetrable can be used for edging a garden, as long as it is deep enough to sink into the ground and prevent grass roots from spreading under it. Polyethylene, plastic, redwood, treated wood, brick, cement and paving stones are all excellent choices.

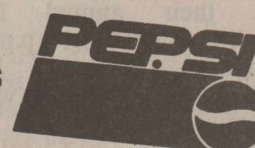

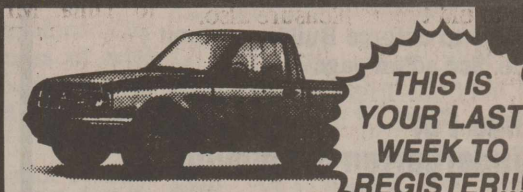

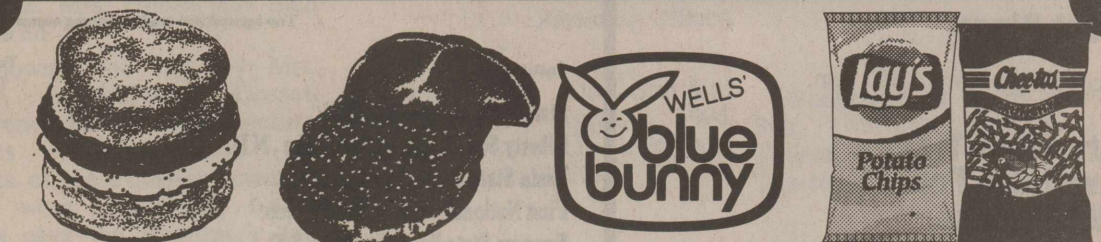

CITRUS GREEN SALAD
Prep: 25 min. Makes: 6 servings

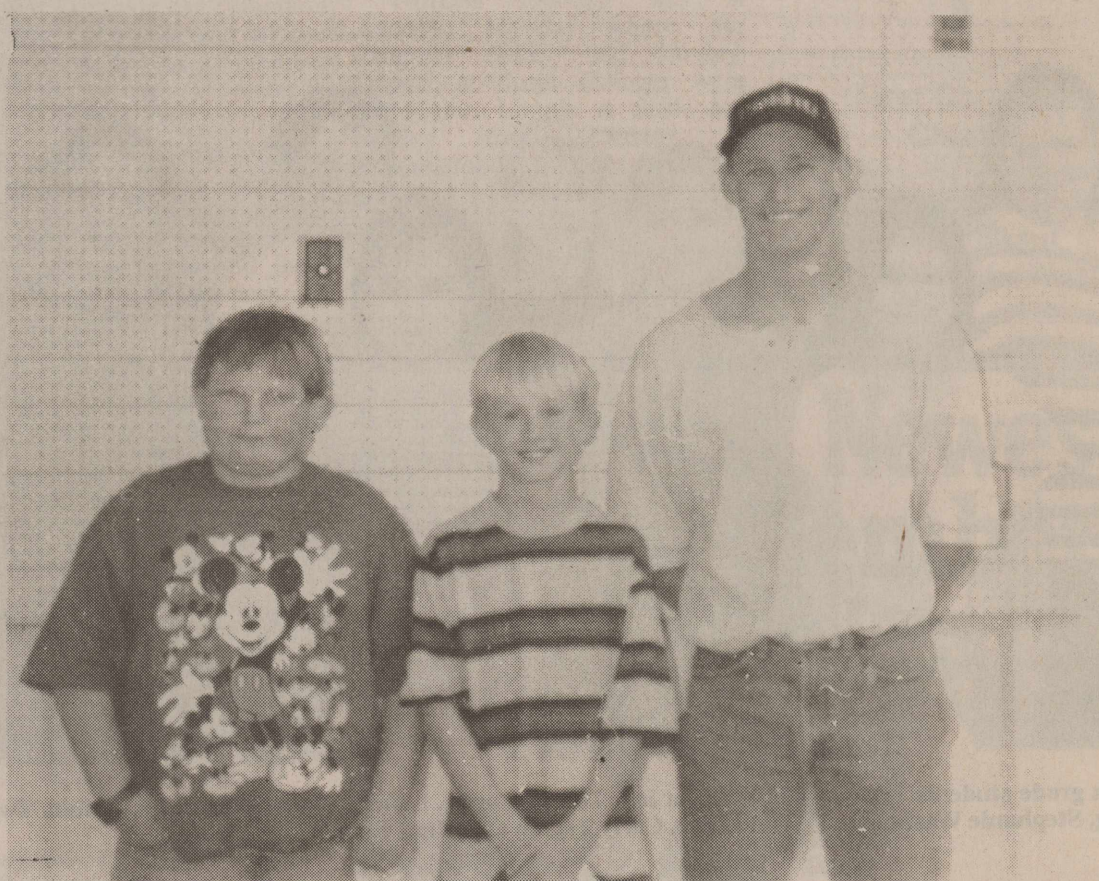
