

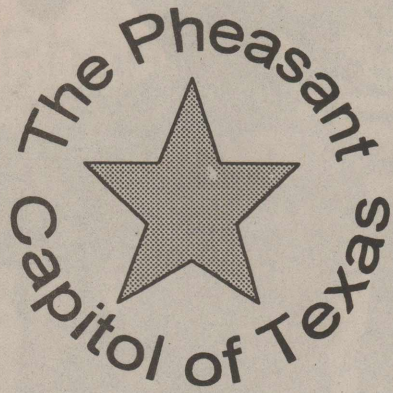

Starnes Signs Letter Of Intent

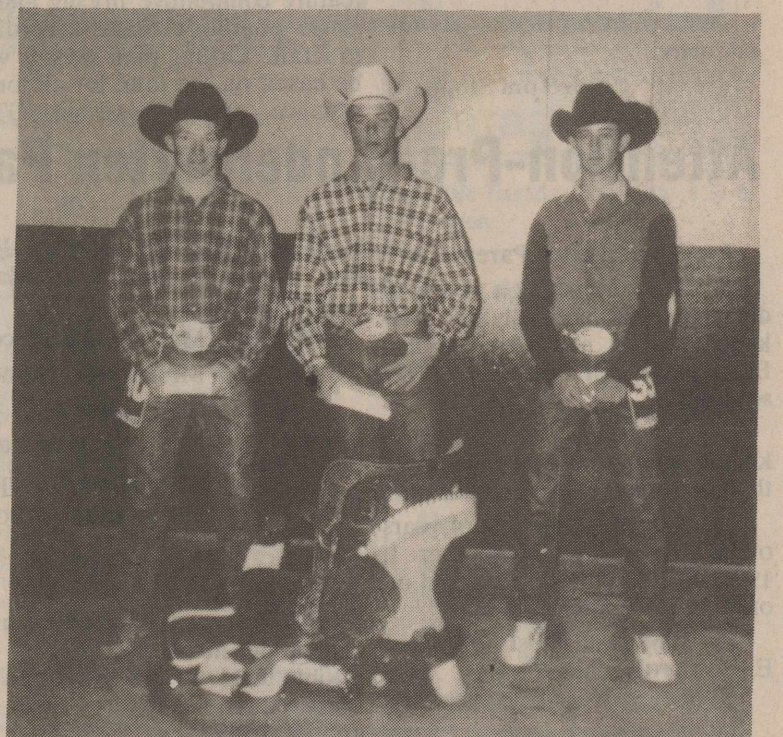

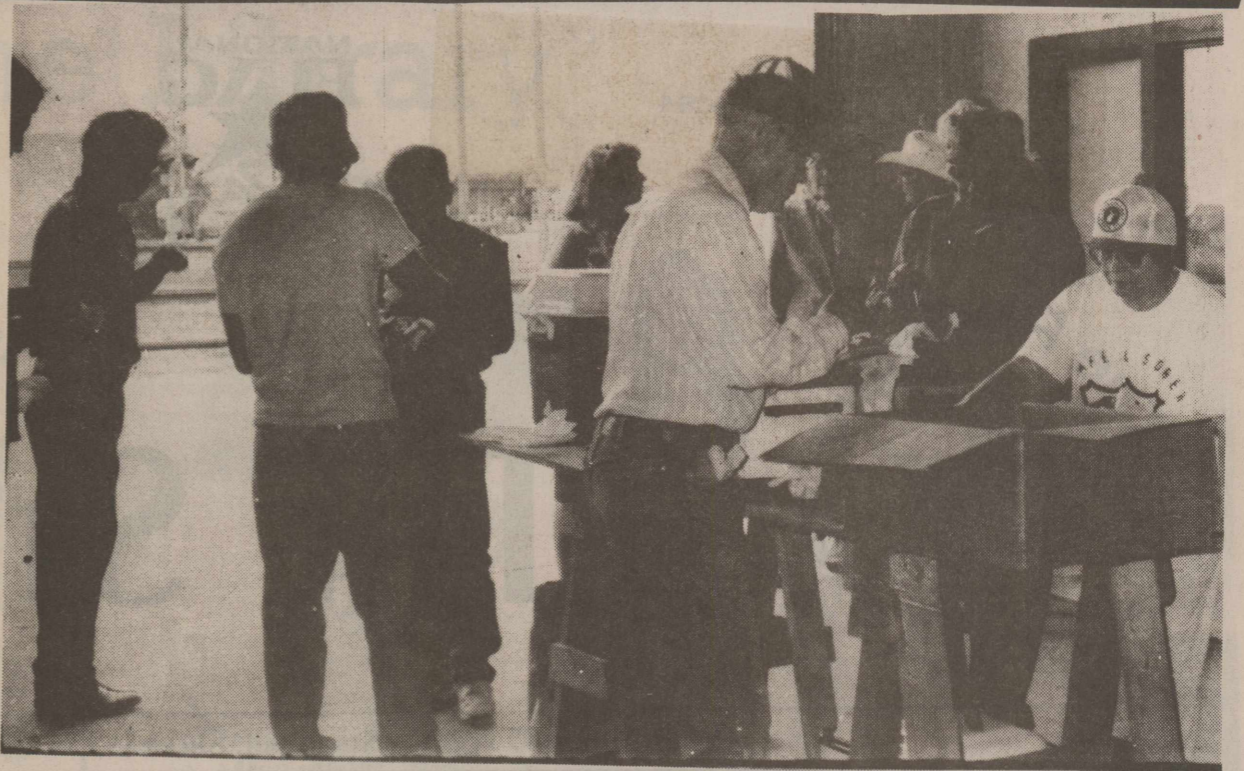

Jimmy Gillenwaters called from Greece last week, then was going to Crete. He does get around!

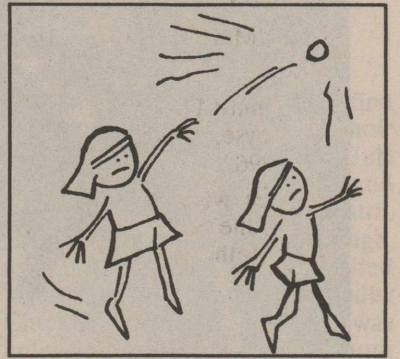
Bill and Donna were at Freedom Saturday with the Duane Gillenwaters family. (Mostly Jacy, betcha!)

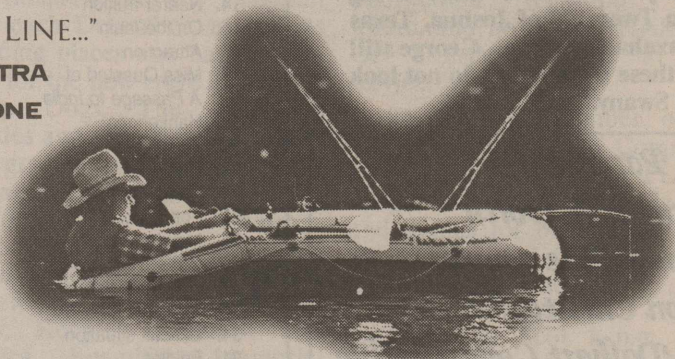

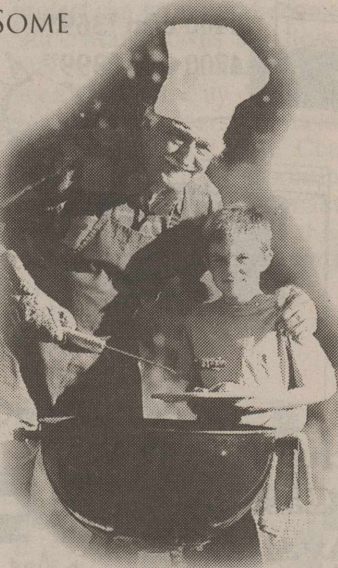

70 Years Celebrated

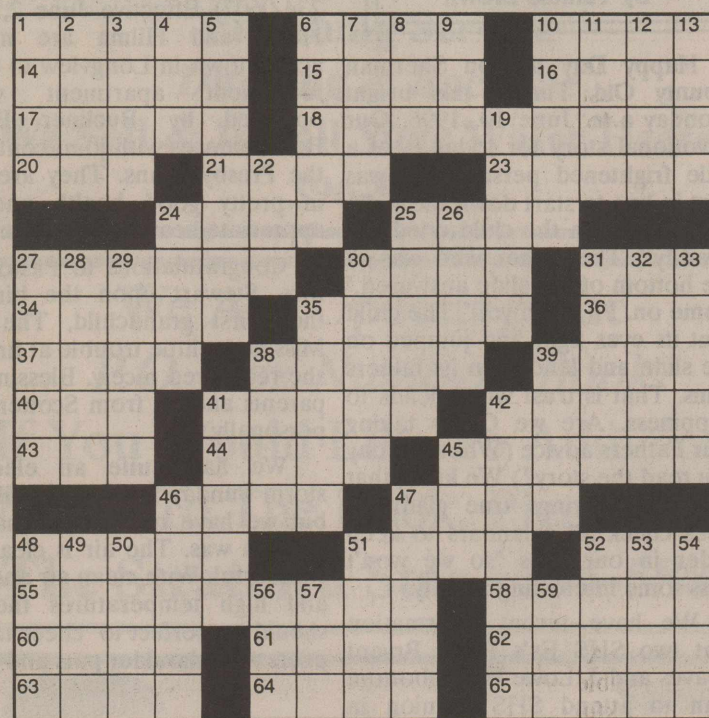

One of the biggest feats the Chamber has championed was the beginning of the AREA FOUNDATION, in 1980. Some courageous folks with indepth insight and a strong determination set sail to organize and invest in Stratford Sherman County. He was also honored as director of "Dead Air Frequency," the Best Special Show, and the Best On-Air Personality.

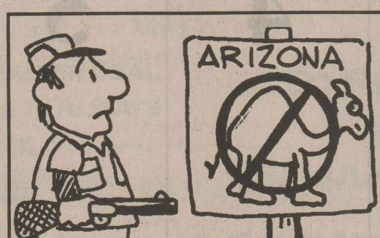

Asher Named To Dean's List

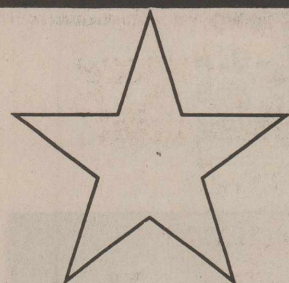
Texas A&M University has named its honor students for the 1996 spring semester, recognizing several thousand students for outstanding academic performance.

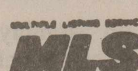

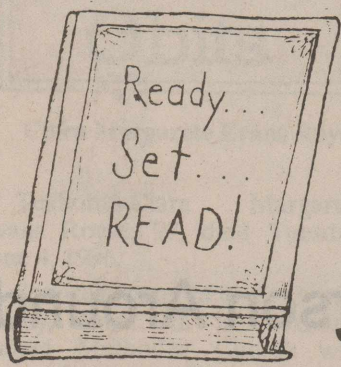
