Giraffe

The giraffe is the world's tallest animal and can stand up to 18 feet tall, or 12 feet at the shoulder! Most of this animal's height comes from its long neck. Giraffes can weigh almost a ton and a half (3,000 lbs.). The giraffe uses its great height to reach leaves on trees-its main source of food. The giraffe's favorite kind of leaf is the acacia. Giraffes also like mimosa leaves.

When giraffes are thirsty, getting a drink of water can be very difficult! They have to spread their long front legs apart and bend way down to reach water.

Giraffes are unusual for other reasons besides their long necks. A giraffe's tongue can be 18 inches long! Most other animals have exactly two horns. Most giraffes have three, but they can have as few as two or as many as five bony horns that stick out from the tops of their heads. Giraffes have short, smooth hair that is brown with dark spots. The spots help them hide from predators. Giraffes have manes like horses, but the hair is much shorter.

Giraffes are herd animals. They usually run away from danger rather than try to fight, and they can run at speeds up to 30 miles per hour for short distances. If a giraffe is cornered, it can protect itself with its strong legs and heavy hooves. Giraffes live to be about 15 years old.




The tiger is the largest and most powerful member of the cat family. A large male tiger can be nine feet long and can weigh 400 to 600 pounds. Females, or tigresses, are a little smaller. Tigers are usually reddish-brown with black stripes, which help them hide in forests and long grass. The hair around their faces is usually longer, and their underbellies are whitish. Some tigers are white all over with dark stripes. These unusual tigers may even have blue eyes!

Tigers live mostly in Asia. They prefer to live in forests, but tigers have adapted to live in areas as cold as Siberia and as hot and wet as Malaysia. 



Homeowners in many areas of Canada basement where the bulbs can be stored, while they will have had several hard planted in their containers. frosts, will still be able to work the soil; i.e. it will not yet be frozen solid, or at worst will have only a few centimetres of higher than about 9°C (48°F) and that it frosted soil on the surface. 


