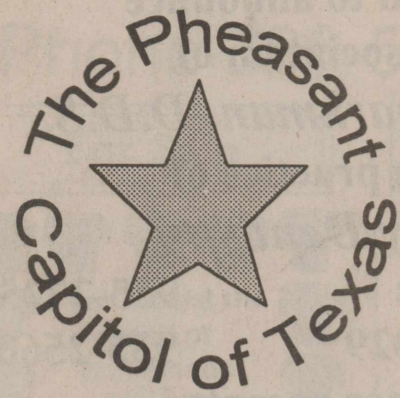

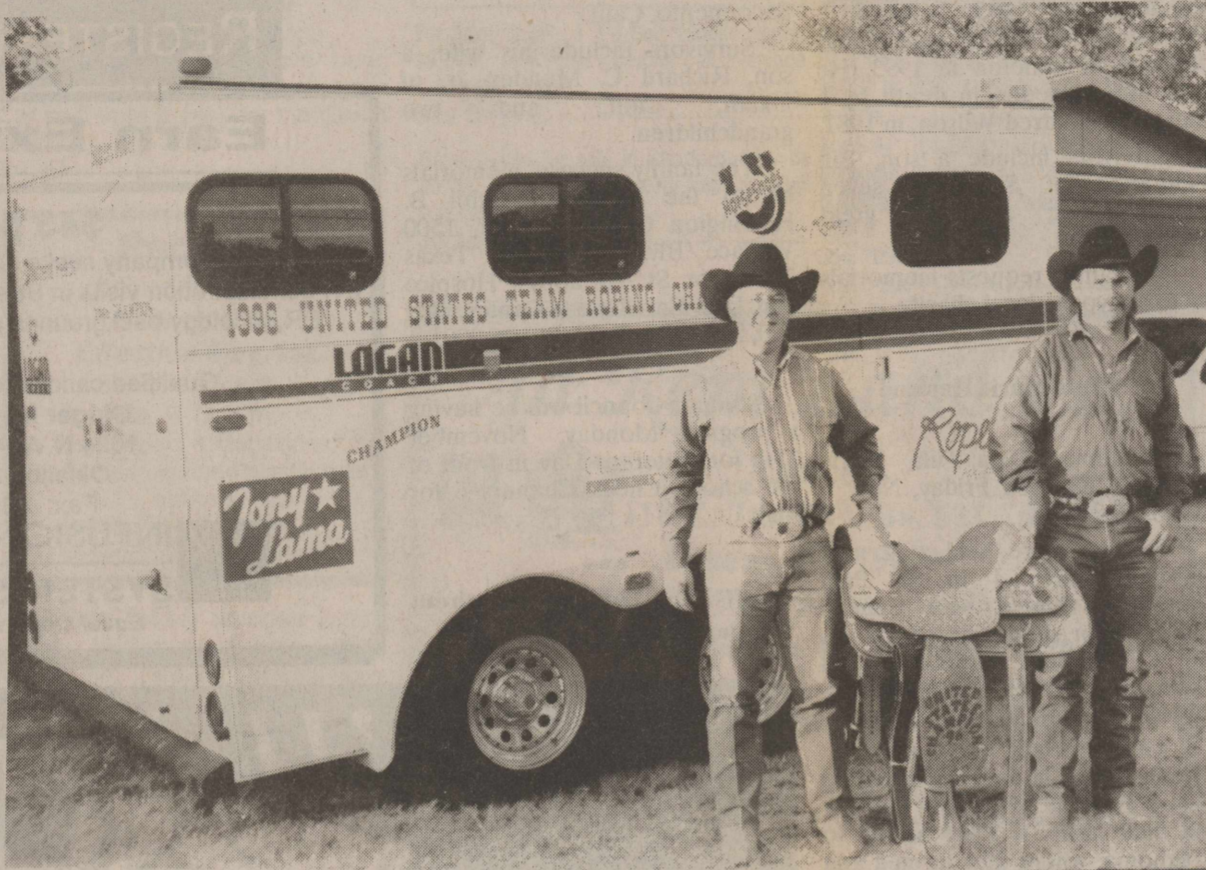

Several factors are involved in developing the housing including: construction costs, rent affordability quality of amenities, operating revenues and expenses, long-term financing, population projections, maintenance, attraction and experiences of developer, and more.

There continues to be a large gap between keeping the housing affordable for our senior citizens and building a quality housing development. More ventures are being researched at this time. This is still an active objective of the SCDC.

Major Livestock Shows Entry Nights November 12 & 25, 1996

The Sherman County Extension Office will be open from 4:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday, November 12th and Monday, November 25th to process entries for major livestock shows. Any 4-H members planning to exhibit a livestock project at a major stock show should come by the Extension Office on one of these dates and enter. A copy of rules and show schedules will be available. Major stock shows include Ft. Worth, El Paso, San Antonio, Houston, and San Angelo.

During the entry nights, we will need the 4-H exhibitor and a parent for signatures, exhibitors' social security number and date of birth, type and breed of animal, validation ear tag number, and check to pay entry fees. 4-H members entering breeding shows need to bring a copy of the registration papers on the animal. Please bring this information with you to help assure that everyone gets properly entered. All major stock entries will be processed and mailed on November 27th.

This will be put on the agenda for the November meeting.

No one was present for the Chamber of Commerce.

EPA Sets Tolerance On Tilt Clearing Way For Sale Of Treated Grain Sorghum

Austin-Grain sorghum farmers in the High Plains received the information they needed to sell their harvest when the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency established a tolerance for Tilt, a fungicide used to control northern leaf blight.

Farmers had petitioned the Texas Department of Agriculture to obtain a crisis exemption to use Tilt in early September. However, because of the Food Quality Protection Act passed by Congress in August, sorghum treated with Tilt could not be sold for food consumption until EPA established a tolerance.

The regulation EPA released on Oct. 31 established time-limited tolerances for combined residues of the fungicide propiconazole (Tilt) in or on the raw agricultural commodity sorghum in connection with EPA's granting of an emergency exemption. This regulation established the maximum permissible levels for

residues of Tilt on sorghum. The tolerances will expire and be revoked automatically without further action by EPA on Oct. 31, 1998.

Crisis exemptions allow use of a pesticide that is not labeled for use on a crop; however, now EPA must establish a tolerance for that pesticide. Farmers in the High Plains are fighting northern leaf blight because of unusual wet and cool weather conditions. Estimated losses to commercial grain sorghum producers without Tilt would be over \$14 million. About 90 percent of the world's seed sorghum is produced in this area of the state.

Beginning Sept. 4, 1996, Tilt was approved for use in 18 grain producing counties on the High Plains—Bailey, Carson, Castro, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Hale, Hansford, Hartley, Hutchinson, Lamb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Sherman and Swisher.

Sherman County Library Receives Funds

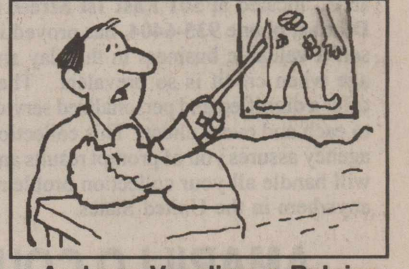
The Tocker Foundation based in Austin, Texas has granted to Sherman County Library funds to purchase a video projector and videos for use in the library. The equipment is ordered and will soon be available for use.

The Tocker Foundation was established in 1964 to implement the philanthropic interests of Phillip and Olive Tocker. Phillip Tocker was a practicing attorney, but changed careers in his later years by purchasing the Waco outdoor advertising plant. The family business was destroyed in the 70's tornado. The family rebuilt and the business survived. Phillip Tocker's vocational career culminated to the position of President of the Outdoor Advertising Association of America. After retiring, Phillip and Olive Tocker actively pursued their avocations. Phillip and Olive Tocker endowed the foundation with their estates in 1994 and 1993 respectively.

In 1992 the foundation board decided to focus grant distribution to small rural libraries serving a population of 12,000 or less. The direction is to assist libraries in making services more accessible to individuals who by reason of distance, residence, handicap, age, literacy level or other disadvantage are unable to receive the benefits of public library services. Grants are distributed to assisting libraries to serve as community information referral centers and provide literacy and bilingual programs. The foundation partners with community libraries to meet the particular needs of the community.

The foundation board members are Dr. Robert Tocker (chairman), Mrs. Barbara Tocker, Rabbi Louis Firestein, Mr. Mel Kunze and Mr. Darryl Tocker (Executive Director). Grant applications are evaluated by a permanent committee of the Texas Library Association. Over the past four years the board members have seen inroads made towards library automation, reference volumes reduced to laser disks, construction of facilities and expansion of services. Grants have been extended for outreach and "shut-in" programs library automation, enhancement of services, adult reading classes, after school projects, bilingual material and many other projects initiated by the community public library. We look forward to serving in this direction for many years.

Since 1992, the Foundation has provided almost 600 thousand dollars to small libraries to purchase much needed equipment. Sherman County Library is very fortunate to be a recipient of \$3,497 grant. We are grateful for the Tocker Foundation and their desire to help small libraries.

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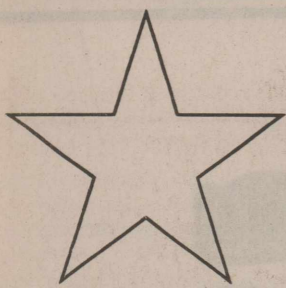

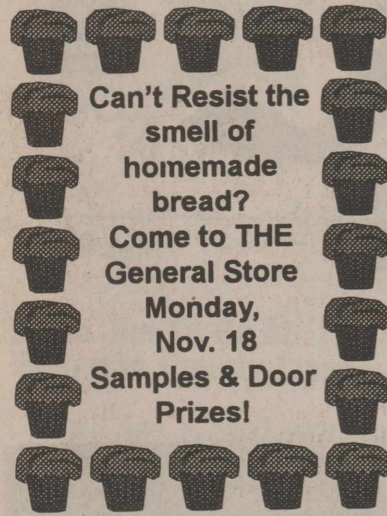
