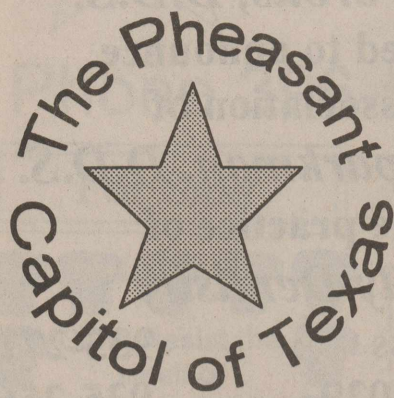

If you have one you may take it to the Depot Museum or call 396-2582 and someone will come and pick it up.

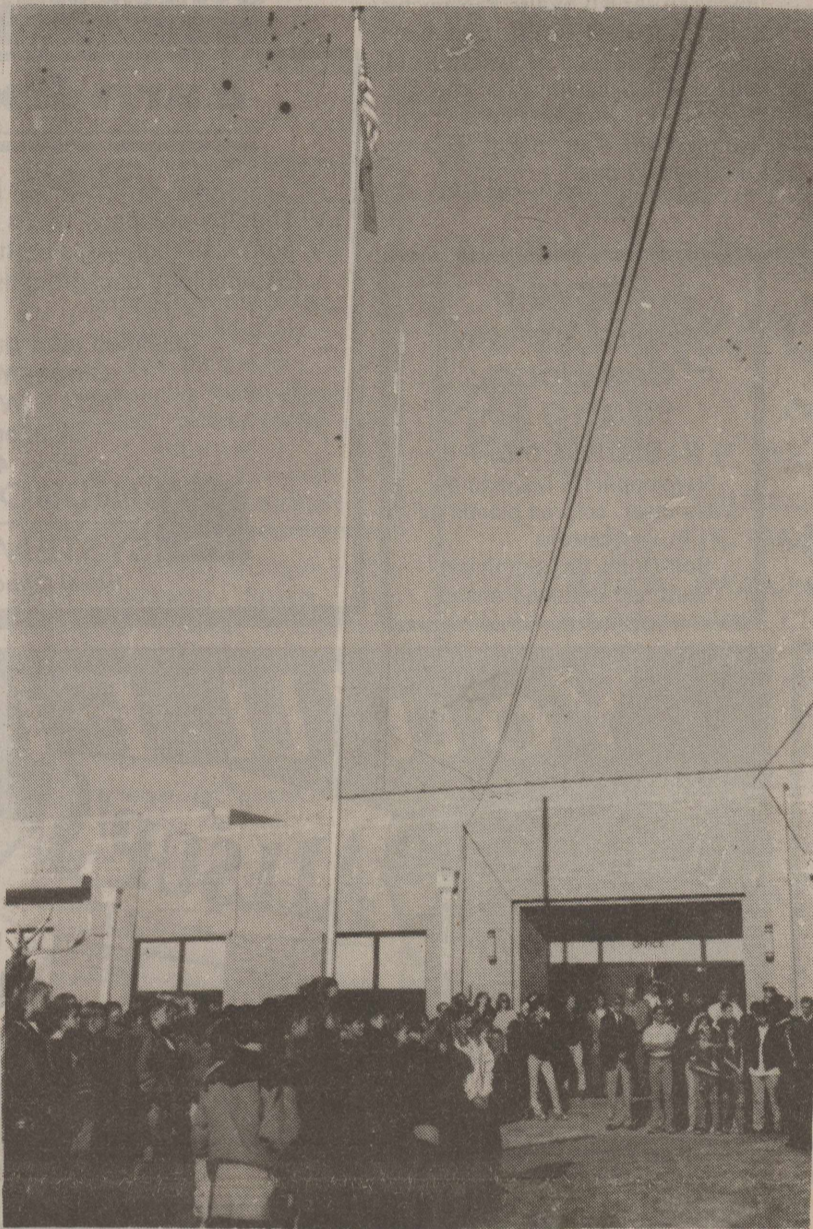

Licensed Private Pesticide Applicator Training & Testing To Be Held In Stratford

On Tuesday, November 20, 1996, Kent Shaw with the Texas Department of Agriculture will be in Stratford to conduct the training and testing for producers to obtain a Private Pesticide Applicator License. The training will start at 8:30 a.m. in the Old Sherman County Barn.

The Licensed Private Applicator classification allows an ag producer to purchase, use, and supervise the use of a federally restricted or state limited use pesticides to produce an agricultural commodity. To obtain a private applicator's license, an individual must meet the following criteria:

*View Extension slide/tape presentation to complete requirements for the license;

*Take & Pass a 100-question test with a grade of 70 or above. The test must be administered through the Texas Department of Agriculture;

*Pay a \$50.00 license fee to TDA.

*The license will expire on the last day of February on the fifth year after issued unless 15 hours

of continuing education credits are received within 5 years and the license fee is paid again.

The requirements for viewing the slide presentation and taking the test will all be done during the course on November 26th. Ag producers who are not currently licensed private applicators are encouraged to attend the training.

Please contact the Sherman County Extension Office by November 25, 1996 if you plan to attend the Licensed Private Applicator Training and Testing. 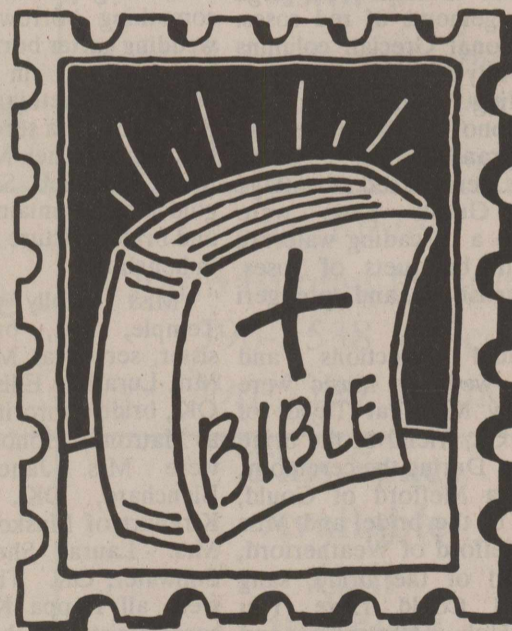

Couple Exchange Vows

Guests tables were covered with cream cloths complimented with candles, iridescent baby's breath and English ivy.

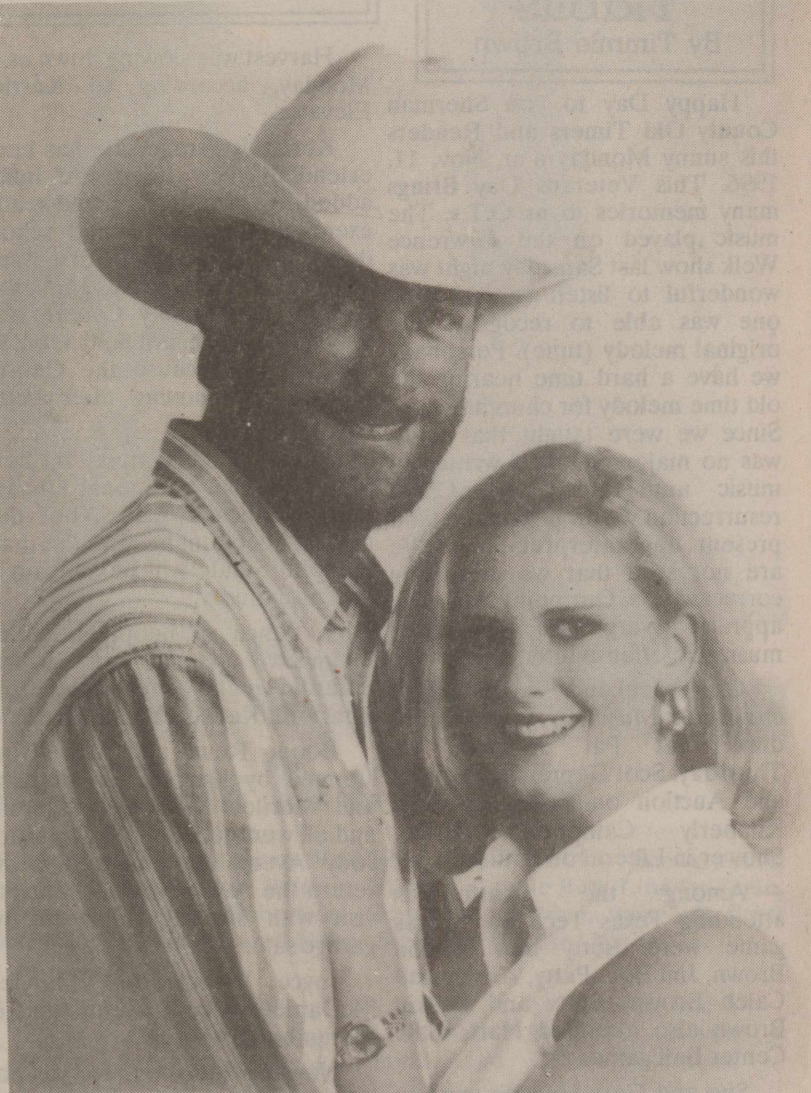

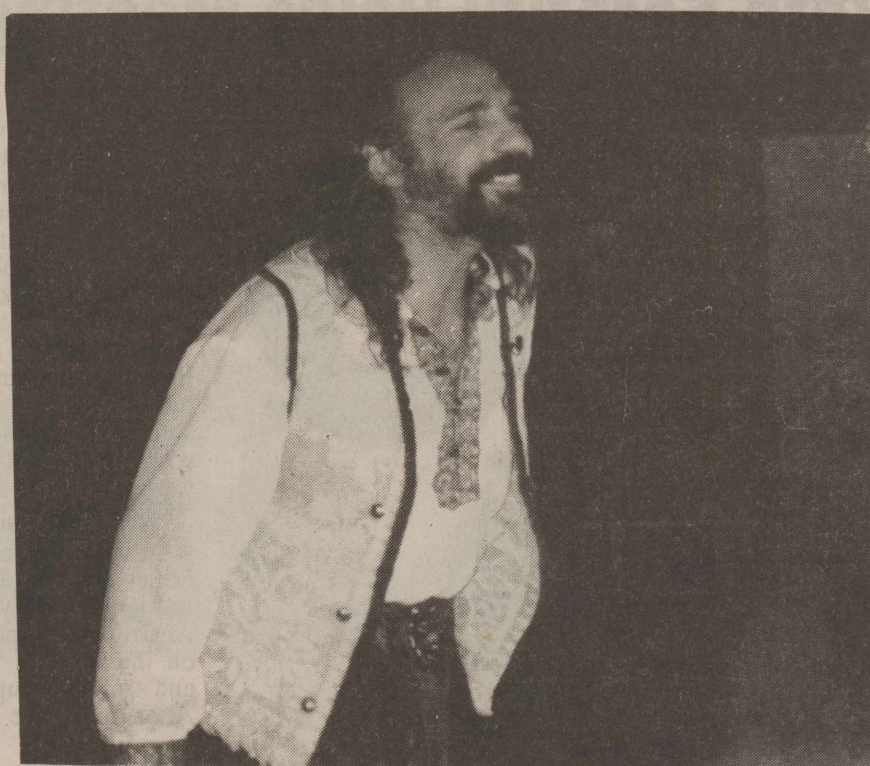

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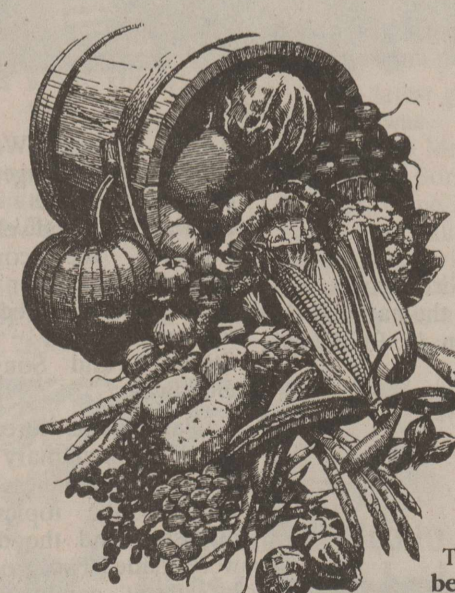
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Blind Athlete Inspires Students

Craig MacFarlane is a former competitive wrestler and the 1983 winner of the National Blind Downhill Skiing Medal. MacFarlane also excels at water skiing, golf, track and field, horseback riding and ice skating; yet, he would trade every one of his 103 gold medals to see his parents' faces.

Blind since the age of 2, MacFarlane has succeeded in making his other senses do the work of his eyes. His extraordinary accomplishments have earned MacFarlane the respect of former U.S. President George Bush, auto racer Mario Andretti and many other individuals. MacFarlane began wrestling at age 8 as a way to prove himself in a sighted world. By age 13, he had won his first blind national wrestling championship.

In addition to his athletic accomplishments, the 32 year old has inspired thousands of people during speaking engagements across the nation.

In a recent address hosted by Jon Engelbrecht, the Dalhart representative for the financial-services firm Edward Jones, MacFarlane shared his story with the students of Stratford High School. He discussed the courage required of a blind athlete competing against sighted opponents and related the challenges of achieving his goals.

The thrust of MacFarlane's address was the word PRIDE, which, he says, is the primary ingredient in his success.

Each letter in the word has a special meaning, MacFarlane said. For example, the "P" signifies perseverance—to succeed in wrestling, MacFarlane did 500 situps and pushups every day. "I never wanted to give people the chance to say, "He lost because he's blind," MacFarlane said. the "R" in PRIDE, means respect to MacFarlane. The "I", individuality; the "D" means desire, and the "E" means enthusiasm.

MacFarlane's accomplishments and his concept of PRIDE have received accolades from leaders in Canada and the United States, including former U.S. First Lady Nancy Reagan, sports announcer Howard Cosell and football legend Walter Payton. MacFarlane has spoken at the last three Republican conventions and has been featured in Reader's Digest and "60 Minutes International."

MacFarlane has been visiting Jones communities across North America and was brought to Stratford by local Jones representative Engelbrecht. "I'm honored to have had the opportunity share Craig MacFarlane and his story with Stratford," Engelbrecht said. "His words are an inspiration, and his message is important for all people, young and old."

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Unexpected Changes Occur In Phone Services

Editors Note: This article was taken from the Moore County News-Press Dumas, Texas, Sunday, November 3, 1996. Entitled The Fine Print, Todd Hepler, Managing Editor.

It pays to read the fine print and it can cost you if you don't.

Dozens of residents and local business people have been finding that out the hard way over the past few weeks. More will soon find unwelcome surprises in their telephone bills.

Several telephone service resellers have been holding drawings for cars, boats and other big value items. The entry forms look harmless enough.

What people don't notice is that unless they check a small box embedded in the fine print, they are giving those companies the authority to change their long distance phone service.

The customer then has to pay \$5 to switch to the company's long distance service and pays much higher long distance rates, all because that person didn't read the fine print.

Everything about the switchovers is legal. These companies rely on people to be careless, sign up for the drawing, not read the fine print disclaimer and be too lazy to switch long distance carriers again.

Once the customer sees how high the rates are, it's too late. The customer then has to pay another \$5 to change back to his or her original long distance carrier.

More than two dozen Hi-Plains NTS customers noticed this over the past three weeks when they tried to call long distance and their familiar 700 code didn't work.

These people all thought they were just signing up for a give away. The give-away was their long distance service.

This was legal. There are illegal phone slamming operations going on in the local area also. These are telephone service resellers who change over your long distance service without even asking your permission.

What they do is clearly illegal. They prey on people who won't take the time and effort to complain.

Many times bills are \$2, \$5, or \$20 higher than normal. Over several months and several hundred customers, that can be pretty lucrative for the telephone bandits.

There is a way to prevent his. If you call GTE at 1-800-483-4400, you can get a form that will prevent your long distance service from being changed without your express written permission.

If you feel you have been the victim of a telephone scam, you can call GTE at the number above and register a complaint. First, you have to read your phone bill and notice that you've been scammed or slammed.

Until next time, don't take any wooden nickels and be sure to always read the Fine Print.

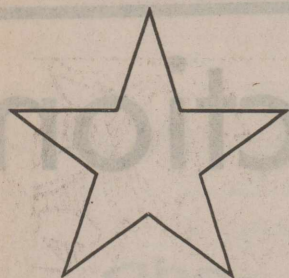
