US 54 Stratford Roadway Rehabilitation Project The City of Stratford, Sherman County, Texas

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) will conduct an open house regarding the rehabilitation of US 54 through Stratford, TX in Sherman

The meeting is scheduled for Monday, May 21, 2018, from 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. at the Sherman County Exhibit Barn located at 501 S. Maple Street,

Stratford, Texas, 79084. The open house will convene with a short presentation from TxDOT at 6:30 p.m. Exhibit review, comments, and questions will be welcome after the presentation concludes. TxDOT personnel will be onsite to answer questions regarding the project. The project proposes upgrading the existing US 54 roadway through the City of Stratford by rehabilitating the existing pavement to concrete with sidewalks

and pedestrian accommodations from west of the Burlington Northern Santa Fe (BNSF) railroad crossing to east of FM 2677. Improvements to existing driveways would also occur as part of the proposed project. 



Fire Prevention Tips And Technology

(NAPS)—They look like small, plastic boxes, round or square, stuck up on the wall or the ceiling-but they could save your life. They're smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors.

Facts And Figures

On average, eight people die in a home fire each day in the U.S.-almost 3,000 people every year. While working smoke alarms cut the chance of dying in a fire nearly in half, roughly two-thirds of all home fire deaths occur in homes without working smoke alarms, according to the National Fire Protection Association

As for carbon monoxide detectors, more than 200 people die from carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning in the U.S. annually. Several thousand more are treated in hospital emergency rooms for CO poisoning. Yet an estimated 70 percent of U.S. homes are not protected by a working CO alarm. CO is created when common fuels such as natural gas, oil, wood or coal burn incompletely. This odorless, colorless, tasteless gas is often called the "silent killer" because it is virtually undetectable without the use of proper technology. You can be poisoned by a small amount of CO over a longer time as well as by a large amount over a

shorter time What You Need To Know

For the best protection, smoke alarms should be interconnected, so that they all sound if one sounds. Manufacturers are now producing battery-operated alarms that are interconnected by wireless technology.

Combination smoke alarms that include both ionization and photoelectric alarms offer the most comprehensive protection. An ionization alarm is more responsive to flames, while a photoelectric alarm is more responsive to a

smoldering fire. Hardwired smoke alarms with battery backups are considered to be more reliable than those operated solely by

· Choose alarms that bear the label of a nationally recognized testing • Install smoke alarms at least 10 feet

from cooking appliances to reduce the possibility of false alarms If possible, alarms should be mounted in the center of a ceiling. If mounted on a wall, they should be six to 12

inches below the ceiling. · Avoid locating alarms near bathrooms, heating appliances, windows

or ceiling fans. • Test your alarms every month by pressing the TEST button.

• Replace the batteries at least once a year. If an alarm "chirps" or "beeps' to indicate low batteries, replace them immediately

Occasionally dust or lightly vacuum

least every 10 years. · Never paint over an alarm. . If you have difficulty hearing, you can

get alarms with low-pitched sounds or vibrations.

(NAPS)-Although properly functioning vehicle lights, wipers and mirrors allow for better visibility while driving, these items are all too often forgotten or ignored when people perform basic auto care, says the nonprofit Car Care Council.

"Making sure that you can see and be seen on the road is essential to avoiding motor vehicle accidents, yet many motorists overlook simple maintenance steps that can improve driving visibility," explained Rich White, executive director, Car Care Council.

Following a few auto care visibility tips can be illuminating, helping to ensure the safety of you, your passengers and other vehicles around you.

• Replace any exterior or interior lights that are dimming, rapidly blinking or nonfunctioning and be sure headlights are correctly aimed.

· Make sure that vehicle mirrors are clean and properly positioned.

· Check windshield washer fluid level

and, when it gets low, replace it. · Replace wiper blades if they show cracking or if they chatter or streak when operating. Don't forget to check

the rear wiper blade. · When in doubt, turn your lights on




For safe driving, maintain vehicle wipers, lights and mirrors.

 Don't overdrive your headlights. Maintain a speed that will let you stop within the illuminated area; otherwise, you create a blind crash zone in front of your vehicle.


