Hammer seeks U.S. 'first use' ban

MOSCOW — The United States should match the Soviet Union's pledge not to be the first to use nuclear weapons so "we'll all be able to sleep easy," American industri-alist Armand Hammer said today after meeting with Soviet President Konstantin U. Chernenko.

Hammer, 86, head of the Los Angeles-based Occidental Petroleum Corp., has had ties with Soviet officials dating back to a 1921 meeting with Vladimir I. Lenin, founder of the world's first Communist nation.

The oil company chief said Chernenko gave him a statement to read to reporters after their hour and 35minute meeting. The Chernenko statement said the "mercurial" nature of U.S.-Soviet relations "does not happen through any fault of U.S. Soviet meetings.

High court studying Haitians' rights

WASHINGTON (AP) - For the ferently than other aliens caught favor of the Haitians, but the 11th removed a group of persons altothat American slaves had no legal rights, the Supreme Court must decide whether alleged abuse of a group of people is above constitutional attack.

The high court said Monday it will decide whether the federal government is unlawfully discriminating against Haitian refugees.

The court's decision, expected by July, will not affect the government's policy of treating most Haitians as economic, rather than political, refugees and refusing them

Instead, the justices will focus on arguments that immigration officials improperly treat Haitians dif-

illegally. The government's policy is to lock

up all such "excludable aliens." But a 1981 lawsuit filed by the Miamibased Haitian Refugee Center charges that immigration officials often allow members of other refugee groups - Mexicans, for example to be released pending hearings on their applications for admission.

Haitians almost never are 'paroled" before their applications are acted on, a process that can take more than a year. The lawsuit charges that the Haitians are victims of bias based on race and national origin.

watched, a 75-foot Norway spruce was lighted with more than 10,000 multicolored bulbs Monday to become the 52nd annual Rockefeller Center Christmas tree.

The tree was lighted in televised ceremonies at the Rockefeller Center skating rink, with Olympic figure skaters Kitty and Peter Carruthers and former world champion figure skater John Curry performing for the occasion. A crowd estimated by organizers

at 65,000 jammed the surrounding streets and Rockefeller Center's Channel Gardens, and hung out the windows of the 70-story RCA Building and other surrounding build-

The RCA Building itself was illuminated with white floodlights minutes before the tree lighting ceremony, and Rockefeller Center officials said the lights would remain a permanent fixture at the 51-year-old building. The crowd began gathering in

midafternoon, braving a driving rainstorm and temperatures in the 40s to claim the best spots for viewing the ceremony.

But the rain delayed a dress rehearsal, which ended up taking place at about the time the actual ceremony was planned. By the time the half-hour rehearsal ended, the crowd was chanting, "Light that tree! Light that tree!

The tree finally was lighted about an hour late, at 6:30 p.m., following a show led by singer Ben Vereen and including the three skating stars, the New York University Choral Arts Society, opera singer Kathleen Battle and The First All Children's Theater. The show was broadcast later Monday night in the New York metropolitan area.

Members of the Children's Theater joined David Rockefeller, chairman of the board of the Rockefeller Group, in a countdown to the moment when the tree, brought from Far Hills, N.J., was lighted.

As the lights twinkled on, the crowd sent up a cheer and the choir launched into "Joy to the World."

"It's beautiful and colorful," said 11-year-old June Vetter of Brooklyn, who had been waiting three hours and said she was "freezing." But, she said, "It's well worth it."

Union Carbide halts shipments, begins study

DANBURY, Conn. (AP) — Union Carbide Corp., which has halted shipment and production of the poisonous gas that killed more than 600 people after a leak at an India pesticide plant, says it has sent officials to India and has begun discussing compensation for victims.

By early today, Indian officials said the death toll had passed 600 with most of the victims being children. Thousands of others were injured in the leak of methyl isocyanate in Bhopal, Madhya Pradesh

Death toll rises in Pemex oil storage blast

MEXICO CITY (AP) — The death toll from a series of explosions at a Pemex storage site last month has risen to 452, or 70 more than the official figure of a week ago, accord-

ing to a new government report.

The report to President Miguel de la Madrid, published Monday by the government newspaper El National, said the fire was a disaster "without precedent" in Mexico. The report said 113 of the 316

injured still hospitalized were in critical condition. A commission representing Cabinet ministries and government departments and other agencies pro-vided the report, which listed the number of people injured in the Nov. 19 disaster as 4,248.

It said 31,000 people were forced from their homes in the immediate aftermath of the explosions and fire, which destroyed 86 dwellings housing 170 families.

The explosions at a Pemex liquid petroleum gas storage and distribution site sent a firestorm sweeping through San Juan Ixhuatepec, a crowded neighborhood on the northern edge of Mexico City.

Initial reports by Pemex said the

dozen blasts began when a tank truck exploded, but the government oil monopoly later said the cause was not immediately known. Pemex Director-General Mario

Ramon Beteta said Friday that if "competent authorities" place the blame for the explosion on Pemex, it will face its moral and civil respon

Regan wants to wipe out tax-free military benefits

WASHINGTON (AP) — A year ago, Treasury Secretary Donald T. Regan spoke as a former Marine officer when he pleaded with Congress to grant a special tax exemption for U.S. servicemen who died during a terrorist attack in Lebanon.

A serviceman's survivors do not deserve the additional burden of having to face the tax collector at such a tragic time, Regan told a House Ways and Means subcommittee. Congress subsequently broadened an existing law to excuse from income taxes any civilian or military personnel killed abroad by terrorist attacks or other hostile action.

But now, Regan is asking that the exemption — and other tax-free military benefits - be wiped off the books for future servicemen as part of a Treasury Department effort to make the income tax system fairer and neutral for all taxpayers. If those tax benefits are erased, the Treasury Department said Monday in explaining the proposal, "it is expected that, through the regular


budget process, military pay and allowance schedules would be adjusted to reflect the taxation of previously tax-free allowances.

Treasury's proposal would tax combat pay, quarters and subsistence allowances and veterans' pen-

The military provisions are striking examples of how the 71-year-old tax system would change if the Treasury plan - which has yet to be endorsed by President Reagan — should be enacted by Congress.

In general, the proposal would wipe out or reduce numerous indi-vidual and business deductions and, in return, cut tax rates and boost the personal exemption and standard deductions. As a result, the Treasury estimates, by 1990 individual taxes would be cut by an average 8.5 percent while corporate collections would increase by about 36.5 per-

The aim, Treasury says, is to make the tax system fairer and less complex, to reduce incentives for investment in non-productive tax shelters



and to put various segments of industry on a more nearly equal tax footing. If a social goal deserves government support, Treasury con-tends, it should be financed like any other program - not through the

The 262 pages of recommendations were made public last week. On Monday, the Treasury released a second, 408-page volume explaining the proposals.

The second volume included these details and explanations for some of Treasury's proposals:

The special deduction of up to \$3,000 a year for two-earner couples would be abolished on grounds it "is poorly designed to offset the income of all taxpayers - not just

increased tax liabilities that some couples face as a result of marriage." The report said the tax plan offers a more equitable alternative: cutting rates and reducing the number of income brackets for couples filing joint returns from 14 to three.

-The tax credit for child-care expenses of working parents would be converted to a deduction. A credit is a dollar-for-dollar cut in taxes; a deduction reduces income subject to tax and is worth more as income rises. The child-care credit diminishes as income rises and favors lower-income families, Treasury noted, but added that such expenses reduce the disposable

-Taxing a share of employer-paid medical insurance premiums would affect only 30 percent of all civilian workers, the report stated. Treasury wants to tax premiums exceeding \$175 a month for a family plan and \$70 a month for a single person.

—The deduction for charitable

contributions made by taxpayers who do not itemize deductions would be repealed. "There is little data...indicating that the provision has had any significant effect on charitable giving...," the report said. Difficulty of enforcement may prompt dishonest taxpayers to believe they can cheat on this deduction with impunity, it added.

-Deductions for business meals frequently called the "three-martini lunch" — would be limited to \$10 per person for breakfast, \$15 for lunch and \$25 for dinner. Restaurants are howling that this would put them out of business. Treasury insisted it would have an adverse effect on no more than 5 percent of restaurants. Under the law, a halfdozen people can eat together in an atmosphere "conducive to a business discussion" and — if a corporation paying the maximum 46 percent tax rate is involved — the government

picks up 46 percent of the tab.

—Businesses would no longer be able to deduct sports and theater tickets, country club dues and any other entertainment expenses other than business meals. Treasury estimates more than half of all hockey tickets and one-third of baseball tickets are bought by businesses.

-Employee business expenses such as union dues - and other miscellaneous employee expenses of earning income could be deducted only if they exceed 1 percent of adjusted gross income.

-The presidential campaign checkoff — which permits taxpayers to designate \$1 each to the campaign fund - would be killed, as would the separate tax credit for political contributions.

-Ministers would lose the tax exemption they now enjoy on their housing and rental allowances.



Jesse Jackson to lead march calling for teachers, board cooperation

CHICAGO (AP) — Marathon negotiations aimed at ending a teacher's strike that has closed classrooms to 430,000 students resolved many ssues today, officials said, while the Rev. Jesse Jackson and other community leaders prepared to lock arms in a march calling for both sides to bend.

Talks between representatives of the Chicago Teachers Union and the Board of Education recessed early today after about 101/2 hours. Monday's walkout by 28,000 teachers and 12,000 other unionized workers slammed doors shut in the nation's third-largest school system.

Jackson, who heads the Chicago-

based community action group People United to Save Humanity and has a daughter enrolled in John J. Pershing Elementary, was to lead a downtown march today beginning at noon to urge greater cooperation by both sides, said the Rev. Willie Taplin Barrow, executive director of Operation PUSH.

"(Jackson) will be flying here to join his daughter, to take her by the hand and let them know we don't like what's happening," Ms. Barrow said Monday.

Negotiations, meanwhile, recessed shortly before 2:30 a.m. today. They were to resume this afternoon.

"We report that today's exchanges reflected good-faith negotiating, and communications were more clear,' school board President George Munoz said as he left the talks. "There were a lot of issues resolved

Salaries were discussed "in context" with other issue but were not resolved, he said.



The books, "Then Again Maybe I Won't," "Deenie" and "Blubber," were banned Nov. 4 because they contained sexual references and strong language.

"The research is well-supported, involves both military and civilian investigators, and in many cases has been linked with facilities associated with BW (biological warfare) research and development.

The CIA has learned that the Soviets are investigating a number of specific compounds "which appear to have considerable potential as BW agents." These include "biologically active silicon-containing and organofluorine compounds (and) marine neurotoxins and

blue-green algal neurotoxins."

— The CIA has figured out some of the features the Soviet scientists are looking for in their biological agents. These properties include persistence, stability, adaptability to special carrier solutions and the ability to be disseminated in such tiny particles that the poison will penetrate gas masks.

Extremely rapid-acting incapacitants are also of growing concern," the CIA reports. Already these knockout gases have been used in Afghanistan, where they are known as "the silent killer" because victims appear to have been flashfrozen without even knowing what

The CIA has received reports that describe "Soviet research on a inducing peptide rasses the possibility that they're developing other peptides as well for biological-weapons use.


The CIA has gotten a wealth of information on Soviet biologicalweapons operations straight from the horse's mouth - a key Soviet source who was extensively debriefed after defecting. He reported that in the 1970s a proposal was made to the Central Committee and the Ministry of Defense to do research on psychochemicals as promising chemical warfare agents.

The Soviet source told the CIA that "yellow rain" - the toxic weapon believed to have killed thousands in Laos and elsewhere - was "a simple agent" compared to those currently being developed. "He

To say the U.S. intelligence community is concerned about all this would be a drastic understatement. The CIA reports make clear that, far from having any idea of possible antidotes, our intelligence experts can't even identify many of the biological poisons the Soviets have been

dominated closed-door proceedings and influenced the secret ballot. Dole is feared as a hard taskmaster but admired as a prodigious collector and dispenser of campaign funds who might yet save Republicans their Senate majority

There was little discussion of issues, much less any hint Senate Republican prospects might be hinged to President Reagan's second-term success. While the White House has displayed many lameduck characteristics since Nov. 6. the Republican Senate has been a quintessential lame duck - its mempers concerned not with public policy but in keeping their chairman-ships replete with juicy perquisites. Chairmanships mean more than

policy because so many New Right conservatives who started coming to the Senate in 1978, to the horror of the Washington establishment, have been co-opted by that establishment. Dole's election shows these junior senators have taken on values held inside the Washington Beltway becoming more heedful of advice from lobbyists (ostentatiously pro-Dole) than from right-wing activists (supporting Sen. James McClure) who elected them.

A case in point is Sen. Donald Lee Nickles, who at age 31 in 1980 was swept in on Reagan and New Right coattails. Yet, he almost certainly voted for Dole, seeing in his leadership possible survival in 1986. Nickles' vote also reflected the one substantive issue that engages Republican senators: the deficit.

The conservative agenda has given way to deficitphobia. Fear of expanding the deficit has led Nickles and other conservatives (including Sen. Bill Armstrong, whose election as Policy Committee chairman excited restrained conservative cheers) to back away from commitments to tuition tax credits. McClure surely did not help himself with an unequivocal pledge against any tax increase

Dole and Sen. Bob Packwood, his ally-successor as Finance Committee chairman, are warm to tax increases. Packwood is icy to tax reform. Yet, with the president's major domestic initiative at stake. there was no intervention by the White House to elect a more congenial team. The Dole-vs.-Stevens finale guaranteed a less-thanfriendly face as majority leader.

Intervention would have hurt more than helped. Sen. Richard Lugar's prospects were damaged by the perception he would push administration programs. Many senators privately expressed desire for a majority leader who would stand up to the White House more forthrightly than Howard Baker did. This attitude by politicians who owe their high estate to Ronald Reagan shows the marginal role of gratitude in the Senate.

Even in a rare instance when ideological purity on one issue was put first by a New Right senator, it backfired. Sen. Jeremiah Denton, facing a tough re-election in Alabama, informed McClure he could not support him for majority leader because he had once (out of 38 roll calls) voted against the anti-abortion position. Denton backed Sen. Pete Domenici, a fellow Catholic and prolifer who as Budget Committee chairman has consistently harassed Reagan's fiscal policy.

There was no such confusion on the well-organized Republican left. Although liberal Republicans nationally are an endangered species, the "Group of Six" was potent far beyond its numbers. It blocvoted for leaders supportive of tax increases (to finance social welfare programs).

One "Group of Six" member, Sen. John Chafee, scored the biggest upset by election as chairman of the Senate Republican Conference. Chafee's conservative voting record is only 20 percent, and his staff reflects it. His press secretary, Cleve Corlett, peformed those duties through 1980 for the late liberal Democratic senator, Frank Church. Ironically, he may become top staffer in an operation designed to distribute the Republican message.

Chafee's opponent, Sen. Jake Garn, took defeat badly. That provided grim satisfaction for fellow conservatives who felt Garn, as impervious Senate Banking Committee chairman, too often abandoned conservative positions of his native Utah while following inside-the-Beltway mores. But Garn and other defeated right-wingers pose a new Senate bloc: a nucleus for guerrilla warfare beholden neither to the White House nor Bob Dole

That warfare extends to the 1986 campaign. The election of moderateliberal Sen. John Heinz as campaign chairman severs ties between the Senate Republican Campaign Committee and New Right operations. By divorcing itself from conservative ideology, the Republican Senate may fulfill Ted Stevens' bitter prophecy to Barry Goldwater.

hat annoys me most about most liberals is their childish and simplistic thinking. For example, the liberal approach to poverty is to say there are x-number of poor people and the government must help them.

high school algebra student knows, the first step in solving a problem is to define it: Poor people are not a uniform lot with a single common characteristic - lack of income

There are many different reasons

for poverty. One reason is the government definition itself which is based on cash income and ignores both assets and in-kind services. I know a poet, for example, who when measured by cash income is poor. However, he owns a house and in that house are about \$300,000 worth of first editions and original paintings. Yet he's counted among the official poor.

Neither Medicare nor Social Security are means-tested programs. Everyone qualifies simply on the basis of age provided they have paid in or are a widow of someone who did. Liberal politicians talk sometimes as if everyone on Social Security and Medicare were poor, but, of course, they are not. Extremely wealthy people draw Social Security and utilize Medicare, too.

Rep. Claude Pepper, for example, is a millionaire, draws his Congressional salary and also Social Security. That's one of the reasons both of those programs are in financial trouble. All of the retired executives of Fortune 500 companies oan draw Social Security and qualify for Medicare. One of the simplest and most needed reforms of both of these programs would be to eliminate from the rolls people whose financial resources are such that they don't

Rep. Bill Dannemeyer, R-Calif. has estimated that people with zero income can qualify for up to \$19,000 a year in welfare benefits, only a small portion of which is paid directly in cash

This explains two things. It explains why there are "poor" people and jobs going unfilled in the same cities. The welfare structure is such that it is more profitable for some people not to work than to

It also explains why you can hear all this rhetoric about poor people yet find it difficult to see any physical evidence of real poverty. If you visit a ghetto or watch scenes from one on television you see a majority of people who are physically showing no signs of poverty at all. The reason is that they have shelter and they have food and they have

Among those you do see who are obviously in bad shape are alcoholics and people with mental problems. Now these people need charity. But the point I wish to make is that alcoholics and mentally ill persons are not poor as a result of the government's economic policies or as a result of our capitalistic economic

The alcoholic and the mentally ill would not benefit at all from a jobs program or a jobs training program. They need medical help. Unfortunately, the present state of knowledge is such that neither the alcoholic nor the mentally ill can be certain of a 'cure" even if they get help.

Finally, there are some people who are just sorry. By that I mean they have a bad set of values. They are self-centered, lazy, irresponsible, and believe the world owes them a living. They are not poor because of any defect in our society or economic system. They are poor because of defects in their own char-

The only way out of poverty for these people is for someone or something to touch their hearts and change their value system. Government cannot do this. Religion might be able to do it.

Thus, when you look at the complexity of the problem, you can see that there is a relatively small percentage of people whose condition can be changed by government. Rehabilitation programs for the physically handicapped will work. Certainly people whose jobs have been eliminated by technology or economic shifts can benefit from government assistance in learning new skills

The difference between today's iberals and today's conservatives is that conservatives want to find solutions to real problems while liberals seem to want an excuse to spend



Dosage of drug may be cut because of side effects

Dear Drr. Solomon: My father was started o'n aspirin for arthritis and the dose was gradually increased. Now hi's doctor has reduced the dose. My father is happy about this but he does not know why it was done. Could it simply be that his arthritis is better? — Jim, Mobile,

De ar Jim: I really can't speculate about why a specific treatment approach is used in a specific patient. The dose of aspirin may have been reduced because your fat'ner has shown improvement, but it is also possible that the reduction was dictated by the development of

side effects. Sometimes the effective therapeutic level of a drug is very close to the level that produces toxicity. As a result, the medication may reach the texic range before the physician is able to regulate the dosage so that it does the job without producing the si de effects.

Dear Dr. Solomon: I started running a few years ago, and I now do 1.0 miles, three times a week, with no difficulty. I also don't menstruate any more. Is this because I am more muscular now? Also, since the cause of my not menstruating seems obvious, is there any reason that I should bother to see a doctor? - Anne,

Indianapolis, Ind. Dear Ann: It has been suggested that a woman requires at least 17 percent body fat for the onset of menstruation, and 22 percent body fat to continue menstruating after the age of 16 years.

As for your second question, I would agree that it appears as if your amenorrhea is related to your level of physical exertion; however, I would not assume this to be a fact. Women who stop menstruating, whether athletes or not, should be evaluated. I suggest you make an appointment to see you gynecologist so that the exact cause can be deter-

Dear Dr. Solomon: What's the story on the ability of pregnant women to continue to work? I've heard of pregnant women dancing and exercising, so it seems to me that they ought to be able to continue to work as well. Do you have any information on this? — Jo, NYC.

Dear Jo: According to Dr. Richard

J. Nowak, of Case Western Reserve University School of Medicine in Cleveland, a healthy woman can continue to work almost until the onset of labor. However, there are individual differences

Some women find that greater fatigue and backache limit their ability to work during the last trimester. Other women may be affected by excessive weight gain, anemia, infection, or bleeding.

Dear Dr. Solomon: Ever since I had my tubes tied, my menstrual sterilization cause this, or are the two things just a coincidence and not related to each other? - Mrs.

T.W., Richmond, Va. Dear Mrs. W.: The results of various studies have shown that women do not experience a change in menstrual pattern after undergoing ster-

Dear Dr. Solomon: By what age do people stop having sexual relations? My wife and I are both in our fifties and we are not having any sexual problems, but we were just wondering about the future. - Mr. T.M., Medford, Ore.

Dear Mr. M.: You remind me of the story of the 85-year-old man who was asked when a man could no longer have sexual relations. He replied: "You'll have to ask someone older than L

The point is that sexual relations can continue indefinitely as long as a person's general health remains good and, of course, a partner is available.

Dear Dr. Solomon: Is it true that selenium can prevent cancer? I never see it listed under the recommended daily allowances, and I would appreciate it if you would provide that information. - Stu, Moline, Ill.

Dear Stu: According to the American Cancer Society, there is no solid evidence that selenium is of value in preventing cancer. There is no recommended daily allowance for selenium, but it can be toxic if taken in excessive amounts. It you feel a need for this or any other supplement, Il suggest you discuss this

with your physician. Dear Dr. Solomon: My father is 63 years old, but he acts as if he is 25. Although he has osteoarthritis and has trouble straightening up when he gets out of bed in the morning. he still plays tennis and does everything he used to do. He says that if I wrote to you and you said he should stick to his rocking chair, he would do so. Don't you think it's about time he started taking care of himself? -

Dear Ellise: Osteoarthritic patients who are able to play tennis should continue to do so. If everyone with osteoarthritis decided to retire to their rocking chairs, there probably wouldn't be enough rocking chairs to go around. What would happen is that there would be a lot of mac-

tive, unhappy people.
I encourage all my patients to remain active within the limitations of any disease or disability they may have. Scome patients, of necessity, must limit themselves to their rocking chairs; however, those who don't have to can retain their independence and self-esteem by keeping as active as possible.

On your father's next birthday, I suggest you buy him a new tennis racket. You might even find it beneficial to join him on the court.





Unbeaten Panthers set sights on Rebels

ODESSA - The trail to state isn't unknown to the Odessa Permian Panthers. They've followed its treacherous path six times to its conclusion in the championship game where they have conquered three times: 1965, 1972 and 1980. They are hoping to add 1984 to the list.

Permian is currently unbeaten at 13-0 and No. 1 ranked in the state. Since leaving District 4-5A play three weeks ago, the Panthers have allowed only 21 points, all coming in the bi-district game against Palo Duro, which they won 41-21. In the area and regional games, Permian posted victories of 56-0 over El Paso Austin and 34-0 over Euless Trinity.

THOSE WERE the easy games, the yawners. Saturday's 2 p.m. game against Midland Lee at Texas Tech's Jones Stadium is expected to be the toughest test so far for either team.

While the Panthers have a lot of respect for Midland Lee, they also have a lot of confidence in themselves, confidence that is in part a carry-over from when the two teams first met.

On that Friday early in the district season, Permian overcame a 13-0 deficit to claim a 28-13 victory. The Panthers eventually went on to claim their rec-

ord fifth straight 45A title. "I don't think there's any doubt that this one is going to be rough," said Permian offensive tackle Eric Echols. "I think they'll do some different things this time. The last time we played they tried to stay with their basic game plan and it didn't work well

Having seen Lee once before and who knows how many times in game films, Echols doesn't see many surprises coming in Saturday's rematch. "I think we're as familiar to each other as any two teams can be. We can't help but be prepared for each other. I know our coaches have us prepared for them and I'm sure they're ready for us.

FROM THE coaching staff down to the players, the Panthers know what they have to do to beat the Rebels: Keep them from breaking the big play, a Lee trademark the past two years.

"Offensively, they've got the great backs and are a threat to break it every time they touch the football," said head coach John Wilkins. "Tyrone Thur-man has such great quickness and Walter Jones has such great speed. Thurman has good speed and is so quick. I don't remember seeing a back that quick. "You also can't forget about Randy Ellis. He'll try

up the middle and can hurt you there. You have to play him honest, too. Dirk Bergoon adds to their dimension. He can run the option keep or hold up and throw a pass.

Though he plays on the offensive side of the ball, Echols has seen the Lee backs run enough to know what they can do.

"If they get that one step on you, they can blow you away.

IT'S THE defensive players that have to worry about all that quickness and speed and they have confidence in their ability to contain the long run.

"I think we can contain them to the outside because we've got good pursuit from our front line and linebackers," said defensive tackle Tommy Bell. We'll stop their misdirection trap. We've played four teams in the playoffs (Lee is the fourth) that run that same stuff. We're getting used to it.'



Flutie heads AP All-America list

NEW YORK (AP) - Boston College quarterback Doug Flutie, the only player in major-college history to pass for more than 10,000 yards in a career, was named to The Associated Press All-America football team today, along with two repeaters — offensive tackle Bill Fralic of Pitt and free safety Jerry Gray of Texas.

Flutie, the magical 5-foot-9% riflearmed scrambler who captured the nation's fancy and became the first quarterback in 13 years to win the Heisman Trophy, passed for 10,579 yards and also set an NCAA career total offense mark of 11,317 yards.

WITH FLUTIE at the controls, Boston College led the nation in scoring with 36.7 points a game and earned a Cotton Bowl bid, its first major bowl trip in 42 years. For the

year, Flutie completed 233 of 386 passes for 3,454 yards and 27 touchdowns and led the nation in passing efficiency He threw six touchdown passes

against North Carolina, passed for 447 yards against Penn State and thrilled a national television audience with a dramatic last-play 48 yard bomb that pulled out a 47-45 triumph over Miami, a game in which he was 34-of-46 for 472 yards. Flutie passed for more than 300 yards on four other occasions.

"It's not his passing ability, it's not his running ability, but rather his ability to make a play out of noth-ing." says Alabama Coach Ray Per-kins, a two-time victim of Flutie's passing. "He does the best job of any quarterback I've ever seen at impro vising-type things, making some thing happen out of nothing."

JOINING FLUTIE on the offensive unit are running backs Keith Byars of Ohio State, the nation's leading rusher, and Kenneth Davis of Texas Christian, along with wide receiver David Williams of Illinois, the nation's leading receiver, whose 101 catches and 1,278 yards were Big Ten records. The 101 receptions were the second highest in major college history and eight of them

went for touchdowns. "He probably is the most versatile receiver we've ever had," says Illi-nois Coach Mike White. "What he does better than anybody is run

with the ball after he catches it.' The rest of the offensive unit consists of tight end Mark Bavaro of Notre Dame, wide receiver Eddie Brown of Miami (Fla.), tackles Fralic and Lomas Brown of Florida, guards Dan Lynch of Washington State and

Del Wilkes of South Carolina, center Mark Traynowicz of Nebraska and placekicker John Lee of UCLA. Fralic made first-team All-America for the third year in a row.

Named to the defensive unit were tackles Leslie O'Neal of Oklahoma State and Bruce Smith of Virginia Tech, middle guard Tony Casillas of Oklahoma, linebackers Gregg Carr of Auburn, Jack Del Rio of Southern of Auburn. Jack Del Rio of Southern California. James Seawright of South Carolina and Larry Station of lowa and deep backs Gray, David Fulcher of Arizona State, Kyle Mor-rell of Brigham Young and Tony Thurman of Boston College, along with Ricky Anderson of Vanderbilt, the nation's leading punter with a 48.2-yard average. 48.2-yard average.

ABC loses Monday charm

Ratings tarnish 'show image'

Not too long ago, the words were magic - Monday Night Football. Crowds would gather at neighbor-

hood pubs to catch Howard and the boys. Dandy Don and the Giffer became weekly guests of families across the continent.

At its peak, more than a third of the nation's television viewers tuned into ABC's weekly National Football League telecast.

Monday Night Football transcended sport. It became part of the American scene. People who had little interest in football spent Tuesday mornings discussing Howard Cosell.

Those were the good old days. In 1981, the year before the players strike, the average rating for Monday Night Football hit 21.7 with a 36 share. The average rating this year is 16.8. The year's highest mark was a 19.3 for the Los Angeles Raiders vs.

In that respect, ABC is no different from its two network rivals. Ratings for the entire NFL package are down. It's just more visible on Monday nights, football's only regular sojourn into the world of prime

"Our ratings are not down proportionally as much as the Sunday games," ABC-TV representative Jim Brochu said Monday. "But people pay closer attention to us because of

our 'show' image." That image has been tarnished this year. The ratings are the lowest ever for a production that debuted to record sports audiences in 1970. Monday Night Football laid the groundwork for prime-time World

Series games.

In that first year, Monday Night Football carried an 18.5 rating, which grew steadily through 1981. It's been downhill from then. Last season's average rating of 18.1 raised eyebrows. This year's has brought on questions.

Everyone has asked me 'What's wrong with Monday Night Foot-ball?" said Chet Forte, who has said Chet Forte, who has directed the program since its incepNight Football's three Emmys.

I think the answer is no one thing. It's a little bit of a lot of things a little to do with the cable alternates, with the USFL, with the games we've had to televise, with the return of the family unit. No one thing is the primary factor.

"It's still a strong product, much too strong to lose its mass appeal. But it will have to see some

Forte said many things have changed since Monday Night Foot-

ball began. Fifteen years ago, we had a mystique," he said Monday. "There was the entertaining team of Howard, Frank Gifford and then Don Meredith. In the beginning, if we had a bad game with Howard, the viewers would stay for a while to listen to Howard. Cosell was a factor in our

immediate success. Forte cites other factors. Early in the series, we had some great individual performers. Kenny Stabler was a big factor. Stabler and the Raiders always gave us a good

show, as did O.J. Simpson, Joe Namath and Franco Harris "But Howard stimulated the inter-

est. He was exciting. No one comes close to Howard. To say O.J. (Simpson) replaced Howard is crazy; no one could replace Howard."

Monday Night Football's decline coincides with Cosell's first year away from the telecasts. Forte, however, says ratings would be no higher this year had Cosell that should end by 11 p.m. EST.

"I think Howard believes that, Forte said. "He's one of my best friends, and we've discussed the ratings. But you could have put Attila the Hun in the booth this year, and it wouldn't have made a difference. Howard left the show at an opportune time for himself.

A major factor in the show's popularity, said Forte, are the games themselves. Monday night was an example. The San Diego Chargers played without star quarterback

tion and has earned one of Monday Dan Fouts against the Chicago Bears, who already had clinched a playoff berth and were operating without their top quarterback (Jim

> 'We've had a lot of games involving teams missing a star, a lot of games that got one-sided quick and some games that looked good last April but weren't when we showed them.

Even the better attractions have had little luck. The Chargers-Raiders game was blacked out in Los Angeles (the second-largest TV market), and the Bears' first Monday appearance fell the same night the Cubs clinched their National League East title. "We did an 8 that night in Chicago," Brochu said

Ratings are down, and they are significant," Brochu said. "When ratings fall, you look for ways to make them better. But Monday Night Football is still a profitable program. There is concern, but there is no panic

ABC is experimenting with ways to improve the program. Several weeks ago, a feature was substituted for the halftime highlights. "We got a record number of complaints about the missing highlights," Bro-

chu said. Next week's Raiders-Lions game will start at 8 p.m. EST rather than the traditional 9 o'clock start. That's in response to the "Sominex effect" lopsided games have on the Easterners. They hope more East Coast viewers will stay awake for a game

"I think the league might be making some changes for all of football." Forte said. "They should speed up the game ... they are endless.

Over objections from NBC and CBS, Monday Night Football might seek better scheduling — possibly requesting a chance to pick its game two or three weeks before it is

'We're prime time; we should get a preference on the schedule," Forte

Duckworth chases dream

Former Hog makes up for miscue

SAN DIEGO (AP) - Welcome to Don Coryell's night-

It's a recurring dream. One of his fleet of receivers is striding toward the goal line with a touchdown pass, one that will lead to the defeat of a highly touted opponent, when — just like that — the ball pops loose. Fumble. Touchdown negated. Opportunity lost.

It happened Monday night, and the San Diego coach feared the worst. But Bobby Duckworth atoned for his miscue with an 88-yard touchdown reception in the fourth quarter and the Chargers dealt favored Chicago

'I couldn't believe it," said Coryell, who watched in horror as Duckworth, nearing the completion of a 54yard touchdown pass, lost control of the ball and fumbled it away at the 2-yard-line. "I thought, 'This can't be

HE WAS wrong. Five minutes into the final period, Duckworth slipped behind defender Shaun Gayle, took a pass from Ed Luther over his right shoulder and went untouched to the goal line to complete the game-

He held the ball aloft briefly before entering the end zone, but it was clutched tightly to his hand. He didn't spike it, handing it instead to offensive lineman

"I was happy the coach had enough confidence in me to go back to me again," the third-year pro from Arkansas said. "That is part of the game of football the ups and downs.

His redemptive catch, which preceded a 66-yard interception return by Lee Williams, helped the Chargers improve to 7-7. Chicago, which lost its eighth straight Monday night road game, fell to 9-5.

The Bears, who last week clinched their first-ever, NFC Central Division title, hurt their chances of gaining home field advantage in the post-season playoffs.

Chicago has not hosted a playoff game since 1963.

Duckworth's third-quarter gaffe, which came with San Diego trailing 7-6, stirred memories of a similar miscue by teammate Jesse Bendross earlier this season. Under third-stringer Rusty Lisch, Chicago managed 312 yards, but was forced to punt 11 times. The Bears' only score, a 10-yard touchdown run by Walter Payton, came after a fumble by San Diego's Earnest Jackson put them in scoring position.







leberroth wants solutions

HOUSTON (AP) - Commissioner Peter Ueberroth challenged baseball owners on Monday to stop hunting for scapegoats and find real solutions to problems that could "tear baseball apart."

Ueberroth, reiterating what he felt were baseball's most pressing problems, asked the game's top executives to shoot for three goals. They were unity among themselves, cooperation with labor and increased attendance.

Ueberroth's address to owners, general managers and other club executives officially opened the major league portion of baseball's annual winter meetings

The new commissioner, who replaced Bowie Kuhn on Oct. 1, outlined four problem areas, the most important of which was the proliferation of superstations and their affect on attendance and television revenue.

The other problems were bitterness and a lack of cooperation among owners, the continued financial instability of the game and the lack of an offensive plan to improve the off-field aspects of the game.

The next order of business was the draft of minor league players not protected on any team's 40-man roster. Thirteen players were chosen.

Among those selected were former New York Mets Brian Giles, an infielder, and Junior Ortiz, a catcher. Giles was chosen by the Milwaukee Brewers and Ortiz was taken by Pittsburgh. Both were selected from the Tidewater roster.

The first player taken in the draft was catcher Doug Gwosdz, selected by the San Francisco Giants from the roster of San Diego's farm club in Las Vegas.

In his first opening address at this convention, Ueberroth said, "We need to bring baseball back so that, in some instances at least, we can work together." In a briefing last week, the commissioner outlined

his apprehensions regarding super-stations, which use satellites to broadcast games across the nation. He said their territorial infringement was "tearing baseball apart" and that they had a negative effect on attendance "on all levels.

He called the saturation of television markets "the worst of all" the negative effects resulting from the super-stations. Saturation not only has limited the value of local telecasts but will severely restrict the value of baseball with the major networks, Ueberroth

As he did last week, Ueberroth said the fact that seven teams currently were up for sale pointed to the financial uneasiness in the game, and he warned that he wouldn't make it easy on any new owner.

'New people wanting to come into baseball are really going to have to love the game," Ueberroth said. Cleveland, San Francisco and Pittsburgh are known

to be up for sale. Portions of the Texas, Seattle and Cincinnati clubs also reportedly were for sale, and there were published reports that Oakland also was trying to sell off some stock. The A's, however, have denied that any portion of their club is for sale. Ueberroth said he would propose some offensive

plans to owners this week to try to change baseball's 'reactionary" image. Among those intiatives probably will be a plan that will attempt to bring baseball into the forefront of the fight against drugs. Everything I suggest will be a cooperative thing.

Ueberroth said. "Baseball across America needs to make some progress. Ueberroth suggested that even the players union,

which is now holding its annual meeting in Las Vegas, Nev., should be brought into the decision-making process, a suggestion sure to be unpopular among some Ueberroth said he had met with former union head

Marvin Miller, who still acts as a union advisor, and came away with an opinion of the man that was sure to be different from that held by some owners. 'Marvin Miller has been in the game for 15 years,'

Ueberroth said. "I have my own opinion of him. And I'm not going to stand here in front of you and say he is the villain. He is not." Ueberroth said he had sent a telegram to the current

head of the Major League Players Association, Don Fehr, to suggest that since the owners and players hold their annual meetings concurrently, they should also be held at the same site. 'I'll be leaving this meeting early to go to Las Vegas

(to attend the players' meeting)," Ueberroth said. "After all, they are what makes baseball exciting. They are baseball.

The government said spending for new construction rose 1.7 percent in October, the first increase in five months, but analysts were divided on whether it represented a rebound or just a rush to finish projects before winter.

October construction spending rose to an annual rate of \$315.8 billion, the Commerce Department said Monday. The gain followed declines in June, July and September. In August, spending was unchanged

from the July level Analysts generally blame a rise in interest rates for the downturn in construction spending. While interest rates - including those on mortgages - have fallen in recent months, economists were divided on whether the October spending gain was the start of a rebound, especially since other government indi-cators have pointed to a continued slowing of economic expansion.

Michael Sumichrast, chief economist for the National Association of Home Builders, said spending rose partly because of an effort by builders to finish projects before winter. "This gain was a weak number,"

Sumichrast said. "It tells me that construction spending in future months will be considerably weaker.

But the Commerce Department's chief economist, Robert Ortner, termed the October increase "very encouraging" and said the October spending level was 1.7 percent above the average from July through Sep- major grade of U.S. crude oil below

Home values boost family wealth

WASHINGTON (AP) - The typical American family saw its total wealth increase by one-third since 1970 with rising home values accounting for much of the jump, the government reports.

By 1983, half of all American families had a net worth of \$24,000 or more, but the richest Americans still controlled the bulk of the country's wealth, according to a study released Monday by the Federal Reserve Board

The study found that 63 percent of the average family's net worth came from equity in the family home. With real estate values rising rapidly in the late 1970s, this was a key factor in a big jump in family

wealth, the study said. The median net worth of a family in 1983 was \$24,574, a 33.3 percent increase over the \$18,425 family net worth in 1970. The median, which was figured after taking out the effects of inflation, means that half the families had a higher net worth and half had less. Net worth is the total amount of assets after subtract-

The study said there had been only a 12.6 percent gain in the typical family's net worth from 1970 to 1977, when it put the median net worth, after adjusting for inflation, at \$20,752 compared to the 18.4 percent spurt from 1977 to 1983.

The value of the home accounted for 63 percent of total assets in 1983 while cash in checking accounts and other liquid assets accounted for 19 percent. Families had debt amounting to 20 percent of total assets with 15 percent included in the home mortgage and 5 per-

While 43 percent of U.S. families had a net worth of \$25,000 or more in 1970, that figure had grown to 50 percent by 1983. But the new study confirmed findings in an earlier report that a vast amount of American wealth is controlled by the very rich.

The study said that in 1983, 28 percent of the total

In contrast, 20 percent of the families surveyed had a zero or negative net worth, meaning that their liabilities were greater than their assets.

The findings were even more dramatic when homes and other real estate were excluded. In 1983, 54 percent of total financial assets were held by the wealthiest 2 percent of U.S. families and the richest 10 percent controlled 86 percent of all financial assets.

By contrast, with homes and other real estate excluded, 55 percent of American families had a net worth of zero or actually owed more than the total of

Oklahoma governor tells commission oil industry needs help

SANTA FE, N.M. (AP) - The oil industry needs help and it's not coming from Washington, says Oklahoma Gov. George Nigh.

Nigh, addressing the annual meeting of the Inter-state Oil Compact Commission here, said Monday the oil industry needs help and protection from detrimental federal and state regulation.

The compact commission is a 50-year-old organization of 30 oil-producing states. In honor of the 50th anniversary, Nigh and Texas Gov. Mark White were elected co-chairmen for the coming year.

The organization was founded by the governors of Oklahoma and Texas. The outgoing chairman is New Mexico Gov. Toney Anaya.

Nigh told delegates to the IOCC meeting that many politicians do not understand the oil industry's needs. 'Since we're in the West, we're going to have to

think about circling the wagons. There's something out there over those hills lurking in the distance. There are smoke signals going skyward. I don't know what they say, but I know they don't look good," the Democratic governor told the convention's opening session.

Nigh did not refer specifically to the tax-simplification proposals unveiled last week by Treasury Secretary Donald Regan, but oilmen and delegates at the meeting have expressed concern about some of its

Nigh said the "smoke signals" emanating from Washington are "disastrous and devastating recommendations" that will hurt the oil industry

Alex Massad, the president of Mobil Oil Corp., who addressed the conference Monday, made a similar plea. Massad said he sees "a growing attitude in certain quarters of some states and in Washington that the oil industry is a special fatted calf for slaughter when the need for additional revenues arises.

Oil industry officials said the Regan tax proposals could hurt the industry because of proposed changes in the intangible drilling costs and depreciation allow-

Timothy Dowd, executive director of the IOCC, said concern about the tax proposals will likely be addressed by the commission's resolutions committee.

'If the Treasury Department's tax reforms are adopted just as they are," Dowd said, "I'm afraid you

will just about see the end of independent oil exploration. The resolutions committee met Monday and will wrap up its recommendations on Wednesday at the

close of the annual meeting. More than 400 representatives of the oil-producing states are meeting in Santa Fe.

Man pleads guilty to Shell wire tapping

YAKIMA, Wash. (AP) — A Canadian oil scout pleaded guilty Monday to eavesdropping on Shell Oil Co. telephone conversations originating from a Mattawa drilling site, and has agreed to cooperate with authorities investigating the case.

Dean Thomas Adam, 30, of Trochu, Alberta, pleaded guilty in U.S. District Court in Yakima to unlawful interception of wire communication, in exchange for the government's agreement to drop three related

Under the agreement, Adam will testify at any grand jury hearing or trial related to the wiretapping of Shell Oil lines in Washington. He has

also agreed to take polygraph tests.
In exchange, Assistant U.S. Attorney Jim Blynn said the government will recommend that Adam be sentenced to 18 months in a federal prison. Maximum sentence for unlawful interception of wire communication is five years in prison

Adam had been charged with tapping conversations between Shell officials in Mattawa and company offices in Houston and Wyoming. Adam told Judge Justin L. Quackenbush that he had been involved in the espionage activities for at least four months. He was arrested in early Septem-

box where tapping devices had been discovered. In an affadavit filed after he was arrested, authorities said Adam told them he monitored the conversations from his car using a portable receiver and disclosed what he



Both sides in the agreement said they would not comment on it until after the ratification vote.

The last stumbling block in the settlement was the return-to-work agreement. Both sides apparently agreed that, with the exception of those participating in picket line violence, all workers will get their jobs back within 30 days of ratification of the new contract.

Peter Seely, president of the Golden Gate group, said before the announcement by Kagel that the owners achieved most of their demands, including stricter eligibility standards for health and pension benefits, minimal increases in wages over three years, and lower

entry wages for new employees.

Vincent Sirabella, an official of Local 2 of the Hotel and Restaurant Employees and Bartenders Union's parent organization in Washington D.C., said, "It's very fluid right now."



BUSINESS MIRROR Real estate era ends, investor says

By JOHN CUNNIFF

NEW YORK (AP) - A real estate era is ending, one in which the promoter of tax writeoff schemes outbids the more businesslike, oldfashioned kind of real estate person, says Allen Cymrot. Cymrot, president of KemperCymrot Inc., an

investment firm that controls many large buildings throughout the country, proclaims the return of the investor who buys and manages buildings for sound business reasons

Such reasons, for example, as good value, cash flow and profits, rather than paper and real losses that could be converted into tax deductions that sometimes exceeded the investment by sev-

"I consider it healthy," he said of Treasury Secretary Donald Regan's proposals for tax changes, some of them already blasted by other real estate people as potentially devastating to their indus-

But Regan's proposals — to raise the maximum tax on capital gains and to reduce the value of mortgage interest deductions - are seen by Cymrot as only part of a larger, still developing

picture that becomes clearer by the day. It began early in 1984, he says, and it gained definition when the Treasury warned investors they would be scrutinizing what it termed "abusive" tax shelters, or investments designed more

for tax deductions than profits. Many real estate partnerships, in which a general partner invites other investors to participate in a deal, fit the Treasury's definition of abusive. Cymrot contends that the bigger the tax writeoff the more dangerous the economics for sur-

He maintains that structuring multiple writeoffs is hardly a difficult job. "I'll give you any writeoff you want," he says, adding however that the greater the writeoff the more financially pre-

carious the deal becomes. The writeoffs - and the risks - come from such procedures as overpaying for a building in order to claim greater depreciation, gearing the deal to produce large interest writeoffs and post-

poning or all but eliminating profits. Aside from the threat of the IRS disallowing such deductions, the ominous threat in many such deals is that they will collapse or simply not

Cymrot contends, for example, that some investments are based on such high purchase prices that the owners - after taxing their tax deductions - might be unable to resell, as planned, for an even higher price or equal write-

"The only way a four-for-one tax writeoff can work out is if you have an equal chance of selling to another person at the same four-for-one ratio, says Cymrot, whose private partnerships have been buying heavily.

"I believe the government never meant to give multiple writeoffs to operating real estate businesses," he adds. And now, he says, the IRS has made it clear that "hey guys, if you want to do that we'll be watching you.

He contends that in tax promotions, as opposed to investments, "the promoters and salesmen have made money, but the jury is still out for the investor."

The public conception that government is cracking down on such investments contributes to what Cymrot believes is "one of the best buying opportunities since World War II for the real economic buyer of real estate."

This, he suggests, will create tremendous buying opportunities for the rest of this year and lower prices and capitalization rates; obtain financial guarantees from the seller, such as on rental income levels; and demand physical war-

He believes the new climate, including the proposals for limiting tax shelters, means the beginning of the end for real estate promotions and tax schemes that have have flourished since late

Q. Some mutual funds have officers and directors who are listed as "interested parties" of the funds, "as defined by the Investment, Company Act of 1940." Would it be wise to steer clear of such funds?

A. All mutual fund officers are "interested" or "affiliated" parties, because they collect their salaries either from the fund or the fund's investment advisor. The officers - president, vice presidents and such - run the fund.

The board of directors, like the board of any corporation, sets policy. You'll find some fund officers on every fund The Investment Company Act of 1940 is the



basic federal law covering mutual funds. The '40 Act requires that at least 40 percent of the directors of a "load" fund - which charges a commis sion on the sale of its shares - be unaffiliated. There's no reason to steer clear of a particular

mutual fund just because it has more affiliated If it's a case of choosing between a load fund

and a no-load fund, pick the no-load. You'll save commission costs.

Q. I have read the prospectus of each of two mutual funds and am more confused than I was before I started. I am trying to figure out which of these funds has the better investment

performance. Isn't there an easy way?

A. Sure. Visit the financial reference room of a big public library. Look up the performace records of those two funds, as well as any others in which you might be interested, in the Wiesenberger Investment Companies Service manual.

Judge grants change of venue for teen charged in carrier's death

HOUSTON (AP) — A judge said he will decide within a week where to move the trial of 17-year-old David Port, who is charged in the murder of a woman mail carrier.

State District Judge I.D. McMaster on Monday granted a defense request that the case be moved to another city because of the media attention it has received.

McMaster also issued a gag order prohibiting Port, his parents and their attorneys from commenting on the murder case.

Port is charged with murder in the shooting death of letter carrier Debora Sue Schatz. Ms. Schatz, 23, disappeared June 7 while delivering mail in the west Houston neighborhood where Port and his parents live.

Two days later, her body was found in a remote wooded area of northwest Harris County. Investigators searching the Port home found bullet holes in the stairwell and blood on the steps.

The teen-ager is free on \$20,000 bond.

The case attracted national attention when Port's parents, Bernard and Odette Port, were jailed Sept. 12 on contempt charges for refusing to testify before grand jurors investigating Ms. Schatz's death.

The teen-ager's parents argued they should not be forced to testify because it would violate a parent-child privilege similar to the one that prohibits spouses from testifying against each other.

The couple testified before the grand jury after almost two months in jail, but only Bernard Port was released. Attorneys said Mrs. Port refused to answer about six of the panel's 200 questions.

McMaster studied hundreds of newspaper clippings and broadcast scripts as he considered the motion to move the case.

"We are not going to try this in the news media," McMaster said. "You see what's happened already—the amount of publicity."

Jack Zimmermann, Port's attorney, said he was pleased with the judge's decision.

Ex-senator favors food airlift to Africa

AUSTIN (AP) — The United States could ease hunger in Africa by spending a tiny fraction of what the nation spends on the military, according to a former U.S. senator who favors a food airlift.

Yarborough said the project would cost, at most, \$800 million, or about one-third of 1 percent of United States military spending, former Sen. Ralph Yarborough said at a Monday news conference.

"We must wake up to the fact that it is as important to save human lives as it is to wipe them out," he said, adding that the airlift would be "like we're invading some country, but with food instead of bullets."

The news conference was organized by Bread for the World, a national organization that calls itself "a Christian citizens' movement in the USA."

The group wants Americans to contact the White House and request an airlift that could speed food to Ethiopia and other African nations hit by famine.

"Through normal channels it year, too late to save the lives of takes three to four months for food hundreds of thousands of people," to be delivered to people in need said Dietz.

Up to one million Ethiopians could starve to death by Christmas, according to Dietz.



Group being formed for people with eating disorders

A Midland chapter of a national organization for people suffering from eating disorders and their families is in the process of being

organized. Debbie Bond came to Midland in July 1982 and found that there was no support group available for peo-ple who suffer from anorexia nervosa, bulimia and other illnesses which, according to the National Association of Anorexia Nervosa and Associated Disorders, "makes people starve, vomit or purge because they think they are fat."

The 32-year old mother of two has been contacted by two people who are fighting the self-destructive illness which can lead to a host of physical problems and even death.

One of them is undergoing treatment in a Dallas hospital," said Mrs.

man here in Midland."

The sufferers contacted Mrs. Bond through the Illinois-based ANAD.

They gave them my name and I have been working with them when-ever they needed," she said. "I think I have found a place at a church for us to hold meetings and I have contacted a therapist and a psychologist who will be working with the

ANAD supplies literature and referrals to the local chapter, but does not provide funding.

"The purpose of the group is to educate," said Mrs. Bond. "The family and the spouses need to know that food is not the issue. An eating disorder is an internal struggle for lems. control over one's life.

A recovered anorexic, Mrs. Bond knows well the pain that the illness brings to the inflicted.

death," she said. "I had to quit work and had to stay home in bed most of the time. I had no feeling in my limbs, no sensation of pain anywhere. My hair was falling out and I had hypothermia.'

'At my worst, I weighed below 82 pounds," she said.

see a doctor in Silver City, N.M., where she was living at the time. The physician there referred her to a psychiatrist in Albuequrque.

'But my physical state needed help first. I was in the hospital for six months," she said. "They gave me IV feeding, vitamin injections, biofeedback, hypnosis and drug therapy, with demerol and mor-

'None of it worked and after six months I was a drug addict," she said. "I then had the drug problem and anorexia. It was much more complicated then before. On top of it all, my first husband

divorced me shortly after I got home from the hospital," she said.

Suffering from a severe pancreas problem, Mrs. Bond was referred to

the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn., soon after. There she underwent withdrawal from the prescribed drugs and recovered from the anorexia nervosa.

"I was still shaky afterward, but I was determined," she said. "I figured that if I had enough willpower to literally starve myself, then I could use that willpower in a positive way as well

While ANAD's local chapter is the first support group for Midlanders, professional help can be found at Charter Plains Hospital in Lubbock, where specialists have been trained in the treatment of eating disorders.

"We have some patients from the Midland area," said Dr. Marcia Abbott, director of psychological services and a licensed clinical psychologist at the center.

"Most of our patients are college students," she said. "The most combegin is 14 to 18, usually young

Dr. Abbott estimates that there are 200 to 400 patients in Lubbock alone. A treatment program is used for the patients involving diagnosis (both physical and psychological), individual and group therapy, work with dieticians and occupational

"These people need to find struc-ture for life," she said. "You can't imagine how much time they spend dealing with the problem.

Charter Plains started the center after getting a heavy community

request for treatment.
"We've patterned our program after the one at University of Cali-fornia at Los Angeles and Irvine. Our staff received training from Dr. Barton Blinder, director of eating disorder program of the University of California, Irvine," she said.

DPS taking STEP against DWI in Ector, 23 other counties

ODESSA - Starting this weekend in 24 counties across Texas, the Department of Public Safety is taking a step of its own in the campaign to get the drunk driver off

About \$3 million in federal funds will pay off-duty troopers in the latest Selective Traffic Enforcement

In the Midland Highway Patrol District, which stretches from El Paso to Ranger, Ector and El Paso

This STEP is the fourth in the past six years target-

ing Ector County, said Lt. K.D. Woolsey. A \$120,000 budget will pay troopers from across the district overtime wages to patrol specific areas in the

While the patrol schedules will likely vary between now and the end of August 1985, Woolsey said the STEP would pay for eight extra troopers and one sergeant in six-hour shifts. They are to target Friday and

Saturday nights, when the incidence of fatal accidents

involving drunk drivers runs highest. "The troopers will be working as highway patrol troopers," said Woolsey. "Whatever violations they see and can get to in safety, they will take appropriate

"They are out there to arrest DWIs — yes," he added. The overall purpose: "To keep those DWIs from being involved in accidents."

Ector was picked because it represents at least 25 percent of the problem in a district including 24 counies and larger than 18 different states, said Woolsey. It is ranked 19th among 254 Texas counties in terms of DWI-related car wrecks. Midland County ranks 29th,

but will not be targetted. In Ector County, troopers will be concentrating on the main roads north and west of Odessa, where statistics show the most DWI-related accidents occur. Woolsey estimated 80 percent of the troopers' time will

Chamber: Water plan unacceptable until issue of Stacy Dam resolved

In a resolution passed unanimously Monday, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce warned the Texas Legislature it considers any proposed state water plan unacceptable until the issue of Stacy Dam is resolved.

The resolution was drafted after members of the WTCC's Water Development Committee acknowledged that a Texas Supreme Court decision to void the Stacy Dam construction permit would have an adverse effect on water conservation efforts in Texas and on any future reservoir porposals.

The resolution says the West Texas Chamber of Commerce "desires to support the implementation of the Water for Texas' plan as prepared by the Water Development Board. But it is reluctant to do so until such time as corrective legislation has been introduced and passed making possible its implementation, now therefore be it resolved...that the 69th Legislature enact necessary corrective legislation that will enable the state of Texas to have adequate water supplies past the year 2000 and provide that adequate financial

In a Nov. 14 ruling, the Texas Supreme Court said the approval by the Texas Water Commission to issue a permit for the dam - located near Ballinger - violated state law because most of the water in the Colorado River already has been appropriated.

The state's highest court ruled that state law stipulates that only water which has not been allocated to a user may be impounded in a reservoir.

Officials of the Colorado River Municipal Water District contend, however, that the dam would not hamper permit-holder's rights to the water because most permit-holders use less than their allotted share each

Chamber members agreed that banning the construction of Stacy Dam would mean no other new reservoirs could be built anywhere in the state since most of the water in the state's rivers has been allocated. Grant Billingsley, executive director of the Midland

Chamber of Commerce was not available for comment. The water committee sessions Monday were part of the chamber's 1984 prelegislative conference and midyear meeting held at the Holiday Inn Center in Odessa.

Ex-teller from Stanton sentenced for embezzling \$250,000

Vickie Sue Madison's "amazing story" got her a quarter of a million dollars richer and a 10-year federal prison sentence to serve.

The petite blonde, former manager of Heart O' Texas Savings Association branch office in Stanton, on Monday stood calmly before U.S. District Judge Lucius D. Bunton for sentencing as an embezzler.

Ms. Madison had asked the judge to put her on probation so that she might re-pay the embezzled funds; he denied her that. She asked that he give her benefit of the Youth Corrections Act by which her criminal record could be expunged were she rehabilitated. He denied that request. The judge told her the U.S. Congress recently had abolished that act. However, though Ms. Madison was eligible to come under that act since the embezzlement was committed prior to the phasing out of the act. Bunton made a no-benefit finding

"It's an amazing story." Bunton told Ms. Madison. The judge said for "someone as young as yourself" to be granted a responsible financial position and then "to betray that trust is difficult for me to understand and comprehend.

Former teller from Midland, three others sentenced

A 21-year-old ex-teller for Security National Bank of Midland admitted he let "lots of peo-ple...(and) myself down" in embezzling \$1,424.81 from the bank last June.

U.S. District Judge Lucius D. Bunton in turn placed William Scott Wilder on probation for five years, ordered him to spend 90 days in Alternative House II, a rehabilitation center in Odessa,

and ordered him to make restitu-

"I realize the seriousness of my offense," Wilder said to the judge. "I let a lot of people down; I let myself down.

His attorney, John Smith of Odessa, earlier had noted that Wilder stole the funds by selling money orders to customers, "but he would pocket the money.

After the embezzlement, Smith said Wilder admitted his misdeed 'I fouled up. I made a mistake. I need to let you know," Smith said Wilder told his employer.

Said Bunton: "It's something in your favor that you realized you betrayed trust." Wilder pleaded guilty before Bunton on Nov. 12. Others sentenced on Monday

included: Jose Segovia Morine of McCamey. He was placed on probation for five years for lying to U.S. Border Patrol officers.

Douglas Ray Weeks, 31, a convicted thief, was placed on probation for five years after he pleaded guilty to purchasing a 45-caliber revolver from Charlie's Pawn Shop in Odessa last June and then selling the pistol to an insurance agent who collects firearms. - Claus Dieter Woehl, 25, of

Odessa was placed on probation for five years after he pleaded guilty to stealing 25 sticks of dynamite and 28 blasting caps from Pradon Construction Co. in Odessa and then trading 22 of the sticks of dynamite and 25 caps for "speed," Woehl told the judge that he had obtained the stim-ulant in an effort to get off his heroin habit. Bunton ordered Woehl to undergo treatment for six months.



DALLAS — It's time to party.

And somehow those menswear tweeds, those executive coat dresses, those campy fleece jumpsuits don't quite make it on that round of upcoming holiday soirees.

What to do? Take your choice.

You can glitter in gold, sizzle in sequins or play it mellow in rich velvets and berry-dyed silks. You can cover your ankles or bare your knees. You can be as pristine as white lace and cashmere, as vampy as low-cut black jersey. You can be comfortable in soignee evening pajamas, or make a grand entrance in a body-hugging ballgown and remain standing all night

The biggest news in holiday party wear is the return of the pant. It's as all-purpose as gray flannel (topped with a gilded lace T-shirt and satin reefer) or as fluid as silk pajamas (finished off with a paisley smoking

Pants are the essential element in the latest update of the tuxedo. It's not basic black with a hint of the bell hop about it this season. With the help of Claude Montana, Chanel, Gloria Sachs and Ralph Lauren, the tuxedo comes of age as men's lounging robes.

Whatever the style - or the length - it's sure to be in a sumptuous fabric. Satins, silks, velvets and wool crepes all wrap up as smoking jackets or bathrobes. Ralph Lauren even adds extra touches of luxe — a mink collar or a gold-threaded crest.

The big plus for these evening pajamas is how well they flatter an assortment of figures. The oversized, wrap jacket has the advantage of making a woman look small and feminine. 





Heart recipient's condition upgraded; Drug tests planned

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — Twelve days ago, William J. Schroeder couldn't lift his head from a pillow. Now, with a mechanical heart beating "like everything," he says he feels fantastic and doctors are moving on to study how he'll react to drugs that affect the circulatory system.

A month before a Jarvik-7 artificial heart was implanted in Schroeder's chest, tests on his crippled heart showed "practically no to serious from critical, said Dr. motion. The heart basically didn't Allan M. Lansing, the institute's contract at all," said Dr. David Dageforde, a heart specialist at Humana Heart Institute.

"It's quite impressive to see all

these marked changes after surgery, to remember that, on Thanksgiving Day, he couldn't even lift his head off the pillow," Dageforde said. Schroeder spent another hour Monday on the portable power pack that can keep his mechanical heart beating up to three hours at a time. Schroeder's condition was upgraded

Schroeder told Dr. William DeVries, the surgeon who put the heart in Schroeder's chest, that he felt "fantastic" with "no pain, no discomfort," and said of the heart, "It's just a-pumping like everything.

The 10-minute conversation with DeVries, who led the implant team, was videotaped at the heart institute Sunday, one week after Schroeder became the second human recipient of a permanent, artificial heart.

Schroeder was being kept in the cardiac care unit as a precaution, Dageforde said. On Sunday. Schroeder sat in a chair, stood, weighed himself and "kidded around," indicating he probably was well enough to be moved out of the unit, he said.

Schroeder's vital signs are moni-tored in the cardiac unit, but, "as far as intensive things being done no," Dageforde said. "He's back there more for the caution than for

any primary care that couldn't be done (elsewhere in the hospital)."

Doctors have stressed that the implant was an experiment, and Lansing said Monday the medical team was taking the next step in the

Schroeder's mechanical heart makes him uniquely suited for tests of drugs that affect the circulatory system. It is "part of the protocol" of the experiment, Lansing said.

This is not a treatment. ... It is a clinical investigative study; the patient understands this and that is the whole purpose of entering this phase," he said. "If, however, at any time he is tired or doesn't feel like going through these studies, they

will be discontinued.' The drugs affect the vascular system, causing either constriction or dilation, and may affect the heart

simultaneously, Lansing said. But they can't affect a mechanical heart, and "that is why we are doing the study, so we can separate out the peripheral effects from the cardiac effects," Lansing said.

American still missing

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - The American University of Beirut said today that its librarian, a 60-year-old American who has been missing for four days, suffers from heart disease and sight problems.

In a statement, the university appealed to "those who may know about his whereabouts" to take Peter Kilburn's health into consider-

Kilburn, a native of California who has been a librarian at the university for the past 20 years, was last seen at his home in mostly Moslem West Beirut on Friday

The university said it was seeking the help of the Lebanese government and "a number of leaderships" in West Beirut to help locate Kilburn. The "leaderships" are believed to be local milita commands.

Mine strike continues

LONDON (AP) - Mine union delegates have voted to press ahead with Britain's 8-month-old coal strike and to continue defying the courts by resisting authorities' efforts to seize \$10.5 million in union assets.

The vote, 139-80, came at an emergency session Monday night of the 219-member delegate conference of the National Union of Mineworkers.

On Monday, a court-appointed receiver was in Luxembourg trying to persuade a bank there to hand over union funds, which miners deposited to evade seizure. The bank, has refused to deal with the receiver. A Luxembourg judge rule:d last week that British court orders do not have to be honored there.

Polish mission ends

GENEVA, Switzerland (AP) -- The International Committee of the Red Cross has announced the closing of its humanitarian operations in Poland, which had been t'ne only Soviet bloc country to allow such a

Bomb expert killed

ATHENS, Greece (AP) - A bomb planted under a station wagon belonging to the Iraqi Embassy exploded and killed a Greek bomb disposal expert, police said.

A police spokesman said three

other explosive devices found Monday beneath cars belonging to Iraqi diplomats were detonated by police sharpshooters, wrecking the vehi-

In Paris, a clandestine Iraqi opposition group claimed responsibility for the bombs. An anonymous caller telephoned the news agency Agence France Presse, claiming to represent the Islamic Action Organization in Iraq. The caller said the attack was directed against three Iraqi diplomats responsible for surveillance of Iraqi opposition figures in Europe.

An Athens police spokesman said Ioannis Kotsis, 54, was killed while trying to defuse a device which a chauffeur had spotted beneath the engine of the station wagon.

Two other bomb-rigged cars were parked outside the embassy and the third was parked near the home of the Iraqi commercial attache.

Allies threaten action

GENEVA, Switzerland (AP) Poland's communist allies have formally warned that they may take "appropriate steps" of their own to follow up Warsaw's announced withdrawal from the International Labor Organization.

In a letter made available Monday, the eight governments charged that the ILO had become a forum "for fostering hostile attitudes toward Socialist countries

The letter followed last month's vote by the 56-member ILO governing body to accept a commission of inquiry's report charging Poland with violating key ILO human rights conventions. Poland reacted with a notice of withdrawal effective in 1986, and a Soviet spokesman warned of unspecified measures in support of Warsaw.

In their letter, the eight governments said the vote was "ovidence of the control of

further aggravation of the struc-ural and political crisis in the ILO."

Salvadoran cease-fire considered after strafing of rebel holdings

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador Government warplanes bombed and strafed suspected rebel positions on the slopes of a volcano, and guerrilla leaders said they would consider a cease-fire for the Christmas holi-

The air raids were staged Monday near El Salto, a village, 30 miles south of the capital where guerrillas had attacked a civil defense post and ambushed a company of soldiers sent to drive them away.

Government troops entering the site of the weekend fighting on the slopes of Chichontepec volcano found the bodies of 43 soldiers, according to journalists accompanying the army. They said 35 soldiers were reported missing.

The rebels' clandestine Radio Venceremos claimed, 60 soldiers were killed, 43 wounded and 43 captured in the fighting. One military source, speaking on coridition of anonymity, said at least as many guerrillas as soldiers were presumed dead in the

The rebel offensive began shortly after an inconclusive meeting between both sides on Friday, a follow-up to 'the first round of peace

Commenting on Friday's peace talks, Col. Carlos Reynaldo Lopez Nuila, deputy defense minister and one of the negotiators for the government at Friday's meeting in Ayagualo, said the administration would quit the bargaining sessions if the rebels don't change their stand.

For the dialogue to continue, they will have to give a clear sign they are not interested in a tactical dialogue, a dialogue of the deaf," said the colonel. "The first thing they have to do is to admit their proposal was unrealistic.

Believing in non-belief

OS ANGELES — Ken Bonnell pulled 31 dollar bills out of his pocket and carefully spread them on a table. On the back of each bill, "In God We Trust," had been blacked out.

Bonnell, 57, carries a felt tip pen and on his lunch break deletes the statement, which he finds offensive, from newly gathered bills.

"I'm waging a one-man campaign to cleanse our money," said Bonnell, secretary of Atheists United, which claims to be the only organization for non-believers in Los Angeles County. "I'm protesting the increasing intrusion of religion into American life."

Bonnell, a soft-spoken title engineer for a Los Angeles insurance company, calls his protest a matter of free speech. A Treasury Department spokesman calls it "illegal," and said that Bonnell could be prosecuted for defacing currency.

Times are tough for the nation's atheists. Fundamentalist Christian organizations are gaining members and political clout, which represents an "ominous trend," said the president of Atheists United, Herbert Livingston. But the renewed emphasis of religion in America, he added, is galvanizing reaction among formerly apathetic atheists. Call it the non-believer backlash.

ATHEISTS UNITED, which had just a handful of members when it was founded three years ago, now claims a membership of 200. And the membership of Madalyn Murray O'Hair's Texas-based American Atheists, the largest nonbeliever organization in the country with about 33,000 members, has almost doubled in the last three years — even though O'Hair's son, William Murray, defected to become a Baptist evangelist.

Although their size is still comparatively small, atheist leaders contend that there are millions of non-believers throughout the country who are potential members. The most recent Gallup Poll on the subject, taken in 1976, showed that 3 percent of the U.S. population considered itself to be atheist.

"As more people perceive the threat of religion continually being forced on every aspect of their lives, they join organizations like ours," said Livingston, a businessman from West Los Angeles. "More people are becoming aware that their constitutional rights are in danger."

The organization. Livingston said, was formed to ensure the "separation of church and state," and to educate the public about a group of people who are largely misunderstood.

SOME MEMBERS discuss their belief in nonbelief with all the fervor of a fundamentalist in the grip of divine inspiration. Helen Kropp pounds a hand on a fist and jabs a forefinger in the air when she launches into a spirited discussion of her journey from Catholicism to agnosticism to atheism.

Kropp, a retired saleswoman from Van Nuys, was tormented by doubt and plagued by guilt while she sampled numerous religions, seeking an "inner peace." Then one night after months of studying atheist literature, Kropp said, she had a sudden burst of clarity and realized that there is no God.

"IT WAS A glorious, glorious feeling. Talk about being born again. I was a born-again atheist. ... I felt free. Free like a bird." Kropp waved her hands like wings and paused, staring into the distance.

"I felt freedom from religion, from dogmas, indoctrination, brainwashing. I felt: 'My God, I can think for myself. I can reason.' I couldn't even reason before. I was too petrified."

Atheists United members, alleging that their First Amendment rights were violated, have filed several lawsuits against city governments and schools during the last few years. The organization was a plaintiff last year in a lawsuit attacking Reagan's designation of a "Year of the Bible" on grounds that it was unconstitutional. The suit was dismissed.

They had better fortune in a suit filed three years ago against the city of Redondo Beach, Calif., which sponsored an Easter sunrise service. The city was prevented by a federal court injunction from supporting and paying for future Easter services.


MANY PEOPLE are irritated by the activism of Atheists United, members said. The Dial-an-Atheist telephone line receives several threatening messages a day and some people call repeatedly and then hang up, to tie up the line, Bonnell said.

Roger Stewart, who lives in a boarding house for the blind in Pasadena, was not allowed to join a Christian hiking organization for the handicapped, he said, because it was known that he is an atheist. And several volunteers refused to continue visiting him when they discovered that he was a member of Atheists United.

"Southern California's not as tolerant as a lot of people think." Stewart, 37, said. "But it's worse in other parts of the country. Me and several other atheists from all over formed a free thinkers ham radio network where we talk about church-state issues and other concerns.

"But we've got some hostile reaction. People try to interfere with the communication by playing Dial-a-Prayer or loud music.

Soviet space program expanding, study says

WASHINGTON - The Soviet Union is expanding its military space program to support combat operations on Earth and to fight a war in outer space, the U.S. Defense Intelligence Agency says.

The program matches the United States in most, if not all, military space functions and aims to surpass it, the agency said in a report, Soviet Military Space Doctrine.

The conclusions drawn by the Pentagon's intelligence agency last summer and released recently could lend support to the "Stars Wars" and anti-satellite programs of the Reagan administration.

Both U.S. research projects are under attack in the scientific and arms control communities as unrealistic, expensive and apt to fuel a race with the Soviet Union that could have dangerous consequences while unraveling weapons-limitation

More properly known as the Strategic Defense Initiative, the "Star Wars" program seeks a space-based defense against Soviet nuclear missiles. An anti-satellite component centers on technology designed to kill military satellites.

Western analyses of the Soviet space program provide convincing evidence of Moscow's intention to acquire military superiority in outer space," the Defense Intelligence Agency said.

The two basic purposes, it said, are to be able to wage war in outer space and to support ground operations, by such means as using satellites to command Soviet battle forces and to provide navigational ormation

The United States and the Soviet Union in 1967 signed an international treaty prohibiting the placing of "nuclear or any other weapons of mass destruction" in orbit around the Earth, on the moon, or anywhere else in space.

The treaty does not, however, restrict the use of space for communications, reconaissance, early warning or other military support func-

Before 1967, the agency said, the Soviets acknowledged they were try-ing to achieve some military capability in space but said it was for defensive purposes.

"The current Soviet stance, refusing to admit the existence of any military element in their space program, can only mean that the Soviet leadership, rather than merely counteracting U.S. moves, is actually seeking military superiority in outer space for offensive, as well as defensive, purposes," the agency said.
Soviet military doctrine calls for

providing the armed forces with "all vital resources" to maintain superiority in outer space and to assure maximum support for combat operations on land, at sea and in the air,

And yet, it said, "Soviet propaganda would have the world believe that the Soviet space program is wholly peaceful in nature, dedicated only to scientific and economic pur-

In another development, the Soviets were reported to be getting ready to begin landing tests of their space shuttles similar to the tests that preceded the first flights of the U.S. space plane.



Soviet space program expanding, study says

By BARRY SCHWEID AP Diplomatic Writer

WASHINGTON - The Soviet Union is expanding its military space program to support combat operations on Earth and to fight a war in outer space, the U.S. Defense Intelligence Agency says.

The program matches the United States in most, if not all, military space functions and aims to surpass it, the agency said in a report, 'Soviet Military Space Doctrine.'

The conclusions drawn by the Pentagon's intelligence agency last summer and released recently could lend support to the "Stars Wars" and anti-satellite programs of the Reagan administration.

Both U.S. research projects are under attack in the scientific and arms control communities as unreal istic, expensive and apt to fuel a race with the Soviet Union that could have dangerous consequences while unraveling weapons-limitation

More properly known as the Strategic Defense Initiative, the "Star Wars" program seeks a space-based defense against Soviet nuclear missiles. An anti-satellite component centers on technology designed to kill military satellites.

"Western analyses of the Soviet space program provide convincing evidence of Moscow's intention to acquire military superiority in outer space," the Defense Intelligence Agency said.

The two basic purposes, it said, are to be able to wage war in outer space and to support ground operations, by such means as using satellites to command Soviet battle

"The current Soviet stance, refusing to admit the existence of any military element in their space program, can only mean that the Soviet leadership, rather than merely counteracting U.S. moves, is actually and hand seeking military superiority in outer space for offensive, as well as defensive, purposes," the agency said.






