Zoo's bacteria

DENVER - When Taina Vitt took her 6-year-old son Coleton to the Denver Zoo to see the Komodo dragons, he got almost close enough to touch the lizards and close enough to contract salmonella. Within three days, Coleton developed bloody diarrhea, vomiting and a 104-degree fever. He apparently had grabbed some straw from the pen of one of the four reptiles. "There was a time I didn't think he'd live, he was so badly dehydrated," his mother said. The boy was among 50 people stricken with a rare, particularly virulent type of salmonella bacteria after visiting the Denver Zoo exhibit during five days in January.



Peru's worst jetliner crash kills all aboard

■ Two Americans were among the 123 people who died when plane crashed into hillside five miles away from its destination Thursday night.

AREQUIPA, Peru — Hundreds of somber relatives watched from a ridge Friday as firemen lined up rows of bodies at the bottom of an Andean hillside where a fiery plane crash killed 123 people.

The Peruvian domestic airliner burst into flames and exploded, breaking into small pieces, when it went down Thursday night five miles from Are-

Bodies and body parts were scattered across the dusty hillside. A man wearing pinstriped pants lay next to pieces of the fuselage, flames flickering from

A black singed area of dirt marked the point of impact. The largest intact piece of the plane was its tail, which still bore the red-and-white logo of Faucett Airlines. Nearby, an undamaged ceramic coffee cup lay among litter from the plane's

Fifty-one foreigners, including two Americans, were among the 123 people aboard the flight to Tacna with a stop in Arequipa, Peru's second-largest city. Transportation Minister Manuel Vara Ochoa said 103 bodies were recovered by noon, but that everyone aboard was dead.

At the morgue in Arequipa, about 500 people stood in silence outside the building's chain-link fence, while grieving family members wept inside. Coffins of various sizes were stacked three high in the yard.

RANKIN - One of five men injured in a gas plant explosion and fire died Friday. The explosion and fire occurred Thursday afternoon in a compressor room at Nu Star Benedum Gas Procession Plant, 10 miles north of Rankin. Morris Glenn, of Fort Stockton,

was flown to Lubbock from the scene. He died Friday morning at the University Medical Center burn unit from severe burns. He was an employee of Torch Energy, which operates Nu Star.

Earl Brem II and Dave Cunningham also were flown to Lubbock and are listed in critical condition. Brem

is a Torch Energy employee from Odessa and Cunningham is a Hatch

& Kirk contractor from Tomball. Odessan Neal Briley is listed in stable condition at Rankin Hospital. He is an employee of Compressor Professionals Inc.

The condition of the fifth victim. David Langford, is unknown. He was taken to Big Lake Hospital after the fire and was transferred Friday to another hospital. Langford is from Odessa and is also an employee of Compressor Professionals Inc.

All five men were in the compressor room when it exploded and

caught fire.
"We are investigating the cause of the explosion," said Matt Ramsey, executive vice president of Torch Energy in Houston.

South African president announces health troubles after much denial

PRETORIA, South Africa (AP) - After repeated denials of any health problems, President Nelson Mandela hinted for the first time Friday that something may be

He told reporters that he visited a cardiologist Friday morning and would undergo further tests.

The rumors that Mandela was ill, perhaps with a heart problem, began after he opened Parliament on Feb. 9. One source of the rumors was a reporter who saw an ambulance outside the parliament building and thought it was for the president; instead, it had arrived to tend to a security officer.

The rumors have helped cause South African currency, the rand, to plummet in value three times.

China says no to speculation in futures market

BEIJING (AP) — In an attempt to further regulate the fledgling and once-chaotic futures market, the Chinese government has banned state enterprises from engaging in futures speculation.

State enterprises and government departments will only be allowed to trade futures securities for protection against financial risk, Friday's order from the Securities Commission said.

In addition, state enterprises and government departments must provide documents showing that they have been approved by the administration or board of directors of futures exchanges before they can trade futures.

Futures exchanges and brokerages face fines or suspension of operations if they violate the ban. The notice also prohibits all financial institutions from conducting commodities futures trading themselves or for clients.

Futures are contracts to buy or sell securities at set prices on set dates in the future. They generally are traded to hedge against future price movements in commodities, currency and other investments. But the market also is used by speculators betting on price swings.



Russia's Finance Minister proposes increase in tarrifs

ing assurances made to the **International Monetary Fund only** a week ago, Russia's Finance Minister has proposed a broad increase in import tariffs.

The plan, which would raise tariffs by an average of 20 percent, appears intended to boost the political fortunes of President Boris Yeltsin by raising revenue for new social spending. It could also placate angry farmers and industrialists hurt by foreign competition.

But in trying to soothe a disgruntled electorate, Russian officials have alarmed the IMF, which has promised to lend Russia \$10.2 billion on the condition that it

A senior IMF official warned Friday night that if it carried out the plan, Russia could jeopardize the loan, which Michel Camdessus, the fund's managing director, described as necessary to insure that economic reforms were "irreversible."





Putting records in electronic format could generate new revenues By Mella McEwen Staff Writer

The Texas Railroad Commission's hightech data project could mean high finance for

Commission member Charles Matthews said Friday that converting 130 million hard-

copy records into an electronic format could generate an estimated \$233 million in new revenues for the state each year. "If you say that an oil or gas well, over its eco-

nomic life, produces \$2 million in gross dollars (and) if we're able to do what needs to be done to digitize these records, it would cost less than \$10 million," Matthews said in a phone interview from his Austin office. "If those records help find five new oil wells, we've done some-"There are 68,000 fields in the state of Texas

and if we can find new wells in 10 percent of those fields, or 20 percent, we're talking hundreds and hundreds of wells and a lot of economic dollars. Imagine what it will do for local taxing entities — school districts, counties.

Matthews said he plans to present the project to the other two commissioners, Barry Williamson and Carole Keeton Rylander, next will be worth more than they've ever been

to fund the project, which he said could take three to four years.

The first phase could be in place in 12 months with 30 million hard-copy records available in digital form, he said.

The records would then be available on computers in the commission's district offices in Midland, Abilene, Corpus Christi, Houston, Pampa, San Angelo, San Antonio, Wichita Falls and Kilgore and, later remote via computer

modem or the Internet. Matthews said he began talking about this project over a year ago and, not wanting to use any state funds, asked the Gas Research Institute to fund a study on converting the commission's records. The GRI contracted with the Radian Corp., which performed the study, identified the most important information, what needed to be done and what the costs could be.

"Dr. Bill Fisher, head of the Bureau of Economic Geology, has said he believes most of the fields in Texas have been discovered and that we will find few new fields. Most of our discoveries over the next 30-50 years will be in existing fields. If he's correct, these old records

week. The commission will then look for ways worth in the history of our state," Matthews said.

For example, "our W-2 forms where operators report well completions and recompletions that information indicates wellbore depths, geological formations and which parts are open to the wellbore. Recompletions can identify new completion zones. That information is necessary to identify formations being drained, information not now available to someone except perhaps through a data service.

"If that person had the opportunity to pull that information up on a computer there in the Midland office, that information could be extremely valuable.

Matthews pointed out that the information's value extends to protecting the environment. He said the environmental community is taking a look at the project, which could help the commission's Oil Field Cleanup Program, providing data on groundwater protection and site assessment projects.

"Everyone sees the benefit, and the payback will come not only to oil and gas producers but to ordinary consumers and the state of Texas and, ultimately, the whole country as it lets us reduce our dependency on oil imports.'

"I had heard about Henderson (apparently from the COE) and I called the superintendent (Joseph Barresi) and told him I should make a trip to Artesia. The superintendent thought it would be a good idea and said it would be OK

to take some of the committee (COE) members with me to let them feel they were involved.

"They came with me at my request. I did 95 percent of the talking. Henderson dropped out of the

race for the MHS position earlier this week. Ford said that the controversy surrounding the interview was a factor in his decision to withdraw.

Tim Whalen, Midland athletic director who is also on the search committee, said that Henderson had other family reasons to stay where he is and "recognized that controversy can occur in these types of searches.

"I don't think Cooper wanted to subject his family to this kind of controversy. I think it was a factor, maybe not the only one, but a factor in his pulling out," Ford

The COE feels that a bad light was cast on its group from the incident. The incident probably would never have come to light if the meeting with Henderson hadn't taken place on the same day as the Carson on-site interview. That's when public perception of the event began to take a turn for the

EXPLODE: Crash kills everyone on board

"How can any of us ever get on an airplane again?" asked Millie Juarez of Tacna, who lost several friends in the crash. "They tell us they check everything, and then you close your eyes and when you open them again, part of your life is gone.

At the Arequipa airport, family members scuffled with each other, with photographers and with police, angry that they were prevented from examining the bodies. As an official read from a list of the dead, a woman shrieked and began to shake violently. Two others held her as they, too, gasped

As word spread of the crash, the relatives and friends hiked to the barren, rocky site two miles from a highway to watch the firemen, dressed in orange jumpsuits, work from several hundred feet away. Most of them stood in silence. Some wept quietly.

Thousands of onlookers joined them, most drawn by curiosity, although in previous Andean plane crashes there has been looting. Rescue workers complained that spectators' cars blocked the road and made it hard for emergency vehicles to get to the crash.

More than 500 police and sol-diers surrounded the area to pre-vent anyone from approaching

the crash site.

Back at the airport, 250 mourners marched with an Andean brass band playing dirges. The mourners carried the flags of South American nations in memory of the foreigners killed in the crash. Several priests marched with them.

"When people spill their blood on our land, they are our family," said Flora Quispe, who said she had neither friends nor relatives among the dead.

Workers found the plane's flight data recorders, and officials wouldn't speculate on the cause of the crash until they are analyzed.

But an official at the Lima airport, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said the crew of an Aeroperu commercial flight reported seeing the Faucett jet fly-ing in flames. Local residents said they heard the plane explode on impact.

Lt. Col. Marco Velasquez, spokesman for the air force, could not confirm that report.

Flight 251 left Lima at 7: 10 p.m. and was due to arrive in Arequipa, 465 miles away, at 8: 15 p.m. The crew was last heard from at 8: 10 p.m., and "everything was nor-mal," Faucett spokesman James Faucett spokesman Jorge D'Acunha said in Lima.

The weather was foggy at the time of the crash, but that had not stopped other flights from taking off or landing at Arequipa.

In addition to the 66 Peruvian passengers and six crew members, Faucett Airlines listed 51 foreign passengers, mostly Chileans. Others were from Canada, Bolivia, Belgium, Brazil, Argentina and Mexico.

But the Canadian Embassy said two passengers identified as Canadian were actually Peruvians who had bought tickets in Canada.

Authorities also said the plane carried two Americans: Lynn Davidson, 42, a Baptist missionary from Santa Fe, N.M., and Juan Lorenzo DeSzyszlo, who had dual U.S.-Peruvian citizenship and

whose hometown and age were not

Mrs. Davidson, a mother of three, was returning to her home in Arequipa from a missionary team meeting in Lima, according to Mark Kelly, a spokesman for the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board in Richmond, Va.

Mrs. Davidson and her husband, Dennis, had been missionaries in Peru since 1988.

The crash was the deadliest in Peru's history, surpassing a Dec. 24, 1971 crash near the jungle city of Pucallpa in which 91 people

Residents mark death of little known soldier

SAN ANGELO (AP) - San Angelo barely knew 19-year-old Army Pvt. Tracie Joy McBride. But its residents still grieve over

what happened to her.
About 150 soldiers paid their respects to the slain soldier at Goodfellow Air Force Base on Friday, the day before the one-year anniversary of the discovery of her body near a bridge, 22 miles north

of San Angelo. Miss McBride had been at the base little more than a week when she was abducted from a base laundry room on Feb. 18, 1995. Louis Jones held her captive in his San Angelo home for several hours before beating her to death with a tire iron and then dumping her body in Coke County.

A jury found Jones guilty in October and sentenced him to die. But that brought little solace to a community that once thought itself too small, too friendly, too West Texas to be the site of something

so horrific. "It has been a year of change, of personal growth and of a search for justice against those who take life so thoughtlessly," said Army Capt. Kelly Snyder, Miss McBride's company commander for just nine days before the

At a memorial ceremony for McBride Friday at the base, those who knew her said their pain

'I think for those of us who are still here, it's gotten a little bit easier but not all that much," said Col. James Faust, who commands Goodfellow's Army battalion. "It's

hard to get over a loss like this." Goodfellow's flags flew at halfstaff all day. During the memorial ceremony, soldiers stood at attention as a flag was raised, then lowered and folded. It was to be sent to Miss McBride's parents, Jim and Irene McBride, in Centerville, Minn.

'I think the healing is never finished," Mrs. McBride told the San Angelo Standard-Times from the family's home.

One of the issues Miss McBride's death highlighted was domestic violence. A criminal complaint filed by Jones's ex-wife, who said he raped and beat her two nights before Miss McBride's abduction,

broke open the case.

Valerie Tillery, program director at a San Angelo family shelter, said counseling was once an option for Jones. He was encouraged to attend the shelter's anger management classes before the breakup with his wife.

Jones never contacted the shelter, Tillery said.





Sheriff's Department arrests nine in drug bust

Nine people were arrested and, crack cocaine, valued at \$2,500, was seized after an early-morning drug bust by the Midland County Sheriff's Department.

Police look for bus-stop rapist

McALLEN (AP) - Police Friday were looking for a man accused of raping five Mexican women after offering them rides from city bus stops.

The women, all in their 30s, accepted rides from a man at a stop near Interstate 83 and the downtown Valley Transit Bus Station in January and February, Hidalgo County sheriff's deputies said.

The man then took each woman to a rural area and sexually

assaulted them, authorities said. Deputies would not provide details on the rapes, locations of the crimes or identities of the women, saying the cases were under investigation.

Valley Transit buses make an estimated 20 stops in McAllen and run about every hour to Brownsville, Harlingen and Reynosa, Mexico, said company supervisor Oscar Cepeda.

Cepeda said he was unaware of the rapes.

"I haven't heard about this, but there obviously is concern for people waiting at bus stops," Cepeda said. "Especially for women who are waiting alone.

The problem is heightened by the fact that many women, particularly those from Reynosa, pay for rides in so-called bandit taxis or accept free rides across the bor-

"The buses are often late," Iris Navarro, a Reynosa resident waiting at a bus stop Thursday afternoon, told The (McAllen) Monitor. "When the buses are late, that's when I start thinking about trying

to find a ride. The "bandit taxis," driven by unlicensed taxi drivers, cost the

same as buses, Navarro said. Other women said accepting rides might be risky, but they felt there was little choice.

Serbs make new home in former Muslim massacre site

SREBRENICA, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — To Rajko Brajic, a Bosnian Serb refugee, Srebrenica has an eerie feel. "It stinks of death," he says. "And it

simply won't go away."
The Serbs killed thousands of Muslims in the U.N. "safe area" of Srebrenica last summer, and drove the rest away. The destroyed city and suspected mass graves

in the area, believed to hold up to 7,000 Muslims, have become the symbol of the worst Muslim suffering of Bosnia's war. Now, thousands of Bosnian Serbs fleeing Sarajevo suburbs that are being turned over to the Muslim-Croat federation are settling into former Muslim homes in Srebrenica, trying to bring life

But for some Serbs, the task is impossible. Bosnia's worst killing field, scene of the most vitriolic of the war's many

'We all know that thousands of Muslims were massacred here," Brajic, 47, said in a half-voice, looking around so no other Serb would hear him. "But we don't talk about it. It's a taboo.

Brajic sat in a small apartment in a four-story, drab socialist-style block. "Most of us have a feeling of guilt as we

move into places whose owners are probably dead," he said. "But we had no choice — either here, or out in the open."

Srebrenica (pronounced SREB-re-neetsuh) had about 6,000 inhabitants before the Bosnian war broke out in 1992. By the time Serb rebels seized it last July, its population had swelled to more than 30,000.

It is an ancient town whose silver mines "srebro" in the local language means "silver" - gave it its name. Chunks of

Today, the town's life has a medieval quality once again.

Huge mountains of garbage - dishes, furniture and everything else rampaging Serb soldiers tossed out of Muslim apartments last summer - make the main street almost impassable.

Despite freezing temperatures, the stench of decomposing garbage is so overpowering that many people hold handkerchiefs over their mouths and noses. Stray dogs scavenge the dirt, looking for food. At night, huge rats take their

"This makes you close your eyes and bang your head against the wall," said Jovka Miric, a school teacher who fled the Sarajevo suburb of Ilijas with her two little girls. Her husband was killed in battle

Cuban exile flotilla expecting rough seas for comrades rememberance

MIAMI (AP) - Leaders of a Cuban exile flotilla pledged to stay in international airspace and waters when they commemorate the deaths Saturday of four people shot down by Cuban fighter planes.

"Anybody who deviates, we consider them a provocateur," said Jose Basulto, head of the Cubanexile search-and-rescue group Brothers to the Rescue.

Thirteen airplanes and 13 boats were to head for the spot where two Brothers to the Rescue aircraft were downed by Cuban MiGs last Saturday

But they faced literal rough water: Saturday's forecast was for 6- to 7-foot seas, possibly increasing to 9 feet, and 23 mph winds, with thunderstorms that could produce 40 mph gusts. Small boats were cautioned to avoid open seas. inspected for their seaworthiness

"It's a moderate-to-high risk," National Weather Service forecaster Jim Lushine said. "I myself would think twice about going out in those conditions.

Participants on the water planned to hold a prayer service and lay floral wreaths at the same time of day the planes were shot down. The air convoy was also to throw flowers on the same spot before heading back to a memorial service at Miami's Orange

"We are saying to Castro, 'You are not the hoodlum of the Florida Straits," Basulto said. "That message carries through to the

As of Friday afternoon, flotilla organizers were still going ahead with plans. None of the boats are smaller than 30 feet, and all will be before leaving Key West on Saturday, the Coast Guard said.

The Clinton administration has ordered the Coast Guard to escort the flotilla and cautioned participants not to stray into Cuban territory. And the Cuban government warned that anyone who trespasses risks the same fate as the four men who were shot down

The use of 13 airplanes is significant: Exiles want to commemorate the sinking of a Cuban tug-boat, the 13 of March, by Cuban authorities on July 13, 1994. Some 41 people, many of them children, were killed.

The last Cuban-exile flotilla, on Sept. 2, was canceled mid-way when one of the boats sank in bad weather and a man died of a heart attack. Three protesters were injured July 13 in another memorial flotilla when two Cuban gun-

boats sideswiped the lead boat, of Cuba's territorial waters. which had crossed into Cuban

of last week's mission, said: "Of course I am scared, but I have learned to overcome that fear. There are going to be losses along the way, and I may be just one of

Cuba has defended shooting down the planes, saying they strayed into its territory.

Cuban officials also warned that anyone who did it again could face similar retaliation. On Friday. though, Cuban Foreign Minister Roberto Robaina said that Cuba 'will act with the utmost restraint to avoid new incidents.

\$1.5 billion in loan requests Colombia has made to international lending institutions. According to federal law, the United States must oppose such requests from countries found not to be fully cooperating in the drug war.

'The decision is unjust'' Colombian Foreign Minister Rodrigo Pardo said in Bogota. "We consider unacceptable this intervention in our internal affairs.

Friday's announcement was preceded by a bitter internal debate in which some officials argued that the sanctions package was disproportionate to Colombia's shortcomings in the anti-narcotics campaign.

They contended that weakening the legitimate segment of the Colombian economy would leave the Cali cartel in an even more dominant position than presently exists

The counter-argument was that the Colombian government from President Ernesto Samper on ties

the country's role as the world's leading producer and distributor of cocaine and as a major supplier of heroin and marijuana.

White House press secretary Mike McCurry said that in Colombia, 1995 "was a year in which we made no progress compared to where we were a year ago.

Robert Gelbard, the State Department's top anti-crime official, said there were some promising developments in Colombia in 1995, including the arrests of some leading drug chieftains.

"These efforts have been undercut at every turn by a government and a legislature not only plagued by corruption, but which are fostering corruption in order to protect themselves," Gelbard said.

The Cali traffickers have been running their operations from prison, and the prosecutor general has been the target of a public campaign to undermine and discredit his efforts.

A spokesman for Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, hailed the decision, citing 'an avalanche of evidence' incriminating Colombian authori-



COLUMBIA, S.C. (NYT) — For Clinton this fall the Christian Coalition, Saturday's But a majorit Republican presidential primary in South Carolina is a time of soulsearching

Votes of religious conservatives could decide the election, and all the candidates are angling for their support. In a key test for the movement, members now must decide between the purity of their principles and practical politics.

Ralph Reed, the national director of the Christian Coalition, has been winking in Bob Dole's direction ever since the GOP race began, apparently with the thought that Dole would be the best candidate to take on President

But a majority of his organization's members in South Carolina appear to be rallying behind Pat Buchanan, just as Christian Coalition members in other states have done in previous voting.

The conservative Christian community apparently would rather follow their convictions — particularly their opposition to abortion and gay rights - and back a losing cause than compromise, let Reed play power broker in the GOP and possibly win.

"You've got to follow your convictions, and Pat Buchanan says exactly what he means," said

Executive bias? White House males make more money

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Clinton's gender gap is show-ing: More men than women are pulling down the fat White House paychecks.
To much chagrin, the salaries of

407 White House employees were mistakenly published in a Senate report — then splashed across the pages of The Washington Times on Friday.

Heads were shaking across the West Wing as staff members compared paychecks. One aide handed out business cards proving she was an "assistant" to the boss and not — as "that list" said — a mere "receptionist."

Though it's an old list, submitted to the Senate last July, it provided a snapshot of White House personnel that underscores a predicament Clinton shares with private employers: Men are often paid better than women.

Of the 21 aides who were earning \$125,000 or more, 14 were men. And of the 32 earning \$100,000 to \$125,000, 20 were men.

'The White House is no different than the rest of society," said public relations executive Sheila Tate, who worked in the Reagan White House. "The truth is, you look at the president and you do not see a lot of professional women surrounding him. His inner circle is generally white Caucasian men. That's an issue that hasn't changed."

The White House declined to release a more up-to-date list. But spokesman Barry Toiv said his internal calculations show that 14 men and eight women currently earn \$125,000 or more. Of the 27 people earning \$100,000 to \$125,000, 17 are men, he said.

"This president by far has the strongest record of any president appointing women to very high-level jobs both in the White House and in the Cabinet," Toiv said.

Three of Clinton's 14 Cabinet members are women and he has won high marks from women's groups for appointing women to the federal courts in far greater percentages than his two Republican predecessors. Laura Tyson heads Clinton's National Economic Council and Alice Rivlin recently was nominated to the

Federal Reserve. But Clinton's inner circle, his most trusted advisers, consists mostly of men.

White House aide accosted by former pro basketballer

WASHINGTON (AP) — A former professional basketball player has been charged with accosting a White House aide at gunpoint and forcing him to withdraw cash from several bank

Charles Vincent "Hawkeye" Whitney, 38, a former North Carolina State star who played two seasons in the National Basketball Association, was arrested Thursday night at District of Columbia Police headquarters and charged with armed rob-

On the night of Jan. 26, Whitney and another man allegedly accosted Mark Fabiani, the White House spokesman in the Whitewater affair, as he left a subway stop in suburban Alexan-

Police said Fabiani was hustled into a car and driven into Washington, where he was forced to use his bank card at several automated teller machines to withdraw about \$1,500.

The robbers also took Fabian-i's Rolex watch, his briefcase and a cellular telephone, but those items were returned — along with \$10 for a cab ride home — after Fabiani withdrew the cash. He was released unharmed.

Police said they were still seeking a second suspect.

Salmonella rife at Denver Zoo

DENVER (AP) - When Taina Vitt took her 6-year-old son Coleton to the Denver Zoo to see the Komodo dragons, he got almost close enough to touch the lizards - and close enough to contract salmo-

Within three days, Coleton developed bloody diarrhea, vomiting and a 104-degree fever. He apparently had grabbed some straw from the pen of one of the four reptiles.

There was a time I didn't think he'd live, he was so badly dehydrated," his mother said.

The boy was among 50 people stricken with a rare, particularly virulent type of salmonella bacteria after visiting the Denver Zoo exhibit during five days in January. Eight people, including Coleton, were hospitalized.


Some the victims had stroked one of the reptiles as it was being held by a zoo employee, while others had simply touched the tops and sides of the wooden enclosure, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said.

In a preliminary report Thursday, the CDC said that of the four Indonesian lizards on display, one tested positive for the salmonella strain.

The dragons had been moved into the wooden enclosure from their usual glass cage for the zoo's "Dragon Days" exhibit. It was not known how many people visited the exhibit.

The victims ranged in age from 3 months to 23 years, with most under 14, said Dr. Richard Hoffman, an epidemiologist with the Colorado Health Department. No zoo employees were infected.

The Komodos apparently defecated in the enclosure and then

The dragons have been returned to their glass cage, where visitors cannot touch them or the inside of the enclosure, and will never go on exhibit again, zoo spokeswoman Suzanne Juhas said.

"This was considered a one-time event," she said.

CDC. Many people who get it don't even realize it. But in babies, the elderly or those with AIDS, the bacteria can kill.

Most cases are contracted from raw or undercooked chicken, beef.

The CDC reported in 1995 that 90 percent of reptiles carry salmonella in their feces. And in 1994 and 1995, health departments in 13 states reported unusual strains of salmonella bacteria that were traced back to reptiles.

thwarted by washing hands after using the toilet and by cooking food at high enough temperatures to kill the bacteria.

In its report Thursday, the CDC recommended that zoos stop visitors from touching the reptiles, erect double barriers to keep animals and humans apart, and provide warning signs and facilities for people to wash their hands.
"We are waiting for a formal

report in writing from them before we make any final decision,' Juhas said Friday.

Defense spending cuts to be requested by White House

WASHINGTON (AP) - Higher military spending the Clinton administration says is needed would be put off until the end of the decade under a defense budget request the White House is unveiling next week.

As Pentagon officials conducted closed budget briefings Friday with senior congressional staffers, some analysts ques-tioned whether combat readiness can remain high and weapons spending be increased without reducing manpower below 1.4 million.

Figures provided by defense sources indicate that Clinton will seek \$243 billion in Pentagon spending for next year, which, adjusted for inflation, amounts to a \$14.7 billion decrease from this year's defense budget. Without inflation adjustments, Clinton's fiscal 1997 defense request being announced Monday would be \$11.4 billion less than the budget for the fiscal year ending Sept. 30.

Weapons spending would remain at a 45-year low, while research and development spending will decline through the end of the decade.

'Defense spending will continue to decline for the foreseeable future," predicted Andrew Krepinevich, director of the Center for Strategic and Budgetary Assessments, a Washington-based think tank that examines defense policy.

A fairly rapid decline in defense spending since the peak vears of the Reagan buildup "is beginning to bottom out, but not this year," he said.

Defense sources familiar with Clinton's 1997 request said it rep-

resents a status quo proposal without major policy shifts. Current policy emphasizes combat readiness and quality of life of the troops, with a leveling off of manpower at 1.4 million as recommended in a 1993 Pentagon review. The review, known as the BUR, set force levels at 10 Navy aircraft carrier battle groups with a spare carrier, 10 activeduty Army divisions and 20 Air Force fighter wings.

But with Clinton's spending plan laying out only slight defense spending increases beginning in 1999, the Pentagon faces a problem.

"How do you keep the BUR force level, keep readiness up while also increasing weapons procurement?" Krepinevich asked.

Brookings Institution defense analyst Lawrence Korb, who has criticized defense spending as excessive, said the \$7 billion added to this year's defense budget by the Republican-controlled Congress finances weapons that Clinton had planned to buy in later years. As a result, Clinton can afford to ask for less in those years because the Republicans have provided it in advance. Moreover, lower inflation rates mean the military can buy as much as planned with less money, Korb said.

Others, however, predict a crunch, probably following the November election.

"I suspect these guys are going to try to slide by the election," said Baker Spring, a defense budget analyst with the Heritage Foundation.

Dole hopes South Carolina won't let him down

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — In a conversation late last year, Bob Dole spoke of how his 1988 presidential campaign was crippled in South Carolina, and how things were going to be different this

After defeats in New Hampshire. Delaware and Arizona, Dole's "firewall" strategy in South Carolina will be put to a critical test in Saturday's GOP presidential primary

If he gets his wish over the next few days, Dole would wake up Wednesday in control of the Republican race again, and once again the favorite to win the nomination. But there would still be obstacles, chief among them Dole's own inconsistency as a candidate and the deep-pocketed candidacy of Steve Forbes.

Still, the mood in the Dole camp has turned from sour to optimistic over the past week

'South Carolina may set the tone for next week because there is so little time to change things,' said Emory University political scientist Merle Black. "Obviously

Dole cannot afford to lose. 'If Dole wins in South Carolina then he will likely sweep most of the primary states on Tuesday and it will become very hard to stop that if he can prove himself, the Republican rank and file will generally feel enough is enough."

On Sunday, Dole is heavily favored in Puerto Rico's primary. Then on Tuesday, Washington state awards delegates at GOP caucuses and there are eight primaries: Colorado, Connecticut, Georgia, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts. Rhode Island and Vermont. All told, these contests offer 240 of the 996 delegates needed to clinch the GOP nomination. New York follows these states next Thursday, with 93 of its 102 delegates at stake then.

'By this time next week we will know who is for real in this thing, said Dole strategist Don Sipple.

On the eve of Saturday's South Carolina voting, Dole held the lead in every state up in the next week. Oddly, there was no evi-

Sex assault victim gets help on 'Net

SAN ANTONIO — The star-tling message was filled with sorrow and desperation.

"I need to know how to get rid of this dirty feeling," the woman wrote. "I feel people are looking at me and pointing the finger. I'm scared and don't know what to do.

To the Rape Crisis Center of San Antonio, those troubling words were all too familiar. The shelter hears similar accounts from rape victims daily. But this particular message was unusual

The plea for help came from a woman in Scotland via the

The San Antonio Rape Crisis Center established its web site last year and receives about four or five messages weekly from people seeking information or help. Some come from other parts of the from Mexico.

It is one of several resources for rape victims on the Internet. The Scottish woman found the San Antonio center's site using an Internet search engine.

"I wonder if there is anyone who would give me help through email. I'm too embarrased to speak about what has happened to me even on the phone. I was raped on Saturday night by two men," the woman wrote to the crisis center's site on the World Wide

Her initial message arrived Feb. 19, two days after the attack. The woman, who was not identified by name or city by the crisis center, wrote that after the rape she "cried bitterly and spent most of the night in the shower trying to

wash it all away. Ron Aaron, the rape center's executive director, said the feelings she expressed and the language she used told him instantly this indeed was a rape victim.

Her description of the emotional roller coaster she was on following the rape is exactly what victims tell us face to face," he said.

■ Cyber Issues

Aaron wrote back, telling the woman the rape was not her fault, offering the name and phone number of a thera-pist and listing other web sites she might find helpful.

In an e-mail reply, the Scot-tish woman thanked Aaron for his help but again said she didn't feel she could speak with anyone about the attack.

Aaron said that reticence is typical. Forty-two percent of all rape victims never tell anyone about the assault, said Aaron, citing a U.S. Senate Judiciary Committee report.

"I get home from my work and sit and cry, I cry myself to sleep and wake up in a cold sweat after reliving it all in my sleep," she wrote. "I don't know how to open up and talk about things, and to talk about this...I just can't do it! I'm sorry I bothered you, thanks for getting back in touch.

Then Aaron asked if she might want to communicate via the Internet with a Los Angeles woman he had been corresponding with by electronic mail.

The California victim, who agreed to be identified by her first name, Brooke, was gang raped last year. She was so badly beaten she lost her hearing and now mainly communicates by e-mail.

A day later, the two women were talking by computer.

'I'm thankful for email and for being alive!" the Scottish woman wrote back to Aaron. "(Brooke) sounds as if she's had a horrific time of it her-

In other publicized cases, the Internet has been used for medical support groups and in one case was used by a man in Europe to call for help when he thought he was having a stroke.

Aaron noted that except for the technology involved, the Scottish woman's trauma doesn't differ from those the Rape Crisis Center deals with every day.

"She's saying what we hear from victims all the time," he



Just 72 of 262 respondents said they considered themselves a Buchanan supporter, and 73 said they were more likely to cast their vote for him now

that he is considered a viable GOP contender.

Fifty-four percent said they felt Buchanan's win in the new Hampshire primary would eventually prove divisive to the party and only help President Clinton's re-election chances.

Respondents to the poll, conducted largely before Bob Dole's disappointing third-place finish in Arizona where the Kansas senator had been endorsed by party elder statesman Barry Goldwater — also said they felt Dole would be the most likely candidate to win the nomination, and the one man most likely to have the ability to unseat Clinton. Sixty-one percent of the voters said they felt Dole would win the GOP presidential nomination.

Education officials get paid night on the town courtsey of Citicorp

AUSTIN (AP) - A company that holds a lucrative state contract treated Texas education officials to dinner at a posh private club, prompting concerns from a government watchdog group and an official who wasn't invited.

"I didn't think it passed the smell test," State Board of Edu-cation member Diane Patrick of Arlington told The Associated Press. "The problem, as I see it, is primarily the appearance of impropriety.

The meeting at the exclusive Austin Club wasn't publicly posted. Mrs. Patrick raised questions about whether it was proper for state officials to be treated to "an expensive dinner" by Citicorp.

A state lawyer has said no laws were violated. But Patrick and Suzy Woodford of Common Cause suggested board policy should be

revised to bar such gatherings.
"Being wined and dined by

Offutt said he thanked Citicorp at the dinner, and arranged for a Citicorp official to be seated next to Moses. But he said no business was discussed. The dinner, he "was chicken. It was not caviar."

Moses said in a statement, "I was asked to come hear Bill Honig and that's what I did. I never discussed any financial business with Citicorp representatives and haven't as of today.

Jonas and Citicorp officials didn't immediately return phone calls from the AP

Religious humor celebrats 10 years

Associated Press When "Family Circus" cartoonist Bil Keane first began putting religion into his work in the 1960s, some religious conservatives took offense at the irreverence

of mentioning God on the funny pages. Today, when one of his young characters reinterprets a commandment as 'Humor thy father and thy mother' or threatens to tell his mother that a sibling at prayer is "goin' over her head," he gets accolades from the same group.

"Even the strictest religious person from the strictest religious sect allows a little levity," Keane said. "Today, they congratulate you for carrying the Christian message into the comics.

While Keane says he has been doing the same thing all along — reflecting the reality of religion as a part of family life there has been a noticeable change in the pews, say many religious humorists. Christian comics are finding dates in

church halls, where they may be greeted by portraits of a smiling Jesus. And clergy are discovering a little humor from the pulpit is welcomed by congregations seeking more joy in their faith.

Celebrating this trend on its 10th anniversary is one of the strongest advocates for religious humor - the Portage, Mich.-based Fellowship of Merry Christians. The fellowship has come out with a new book: "Holy Humor: The Best of the Joyful Noiseletter," published by MasterMedia Limited of New York.

Some samples from the collection, which offers some of the best jokes and cartoons from the organization's newsletters over the past decade,

Cal Samra, fellowship president, remembers borrowing \$1,000 to produce the first 4-page newsletter distributed to 200 people in April 1986.

Today, more than 10,000 people subscribe to the Noiseletter and the association, which offers an array of services from sales of humor books to playshops in churches, has a mailing list close to 40,000

'We found so many people were searching for something more. Where is the joy? Where is the humor? Where is the celebration in Christianity?" Samra

Samra said what has fascinated him over the years is how so much religious humor crosses denominational lines, revealing "how really human we are, no matter what our denomination might

The Rev. Dennis Daniel, a Southern Baptist pastor who draws the "Brother Blooper' cartoon, can attest to a change in attitude in his denomination, where some members are among the most 'straight-laced and straight-faced' of Christians.

'I think people are experiencing the joy, and want it expressed," said Daniel, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Fountain Hills, Ariz.

Liz Curtis Higgs, a Christian comic and motivational speaker from Louisville, Ky., said she used to spend about 5 percent of her 100 speaking dates each year with church groups. Now, half of her engagements are sponsored by church-

She said there is a place for humor alongside more serious worship practices and biblical reflection.

"We also desperately need to laugh. Our pews are filled with people in pain,' she said.

Or, as the English writer G.K. Chesterton once said, "Angels can fly because they take themselves lightly. Never forget that Satan fell by force of gravity.

Is Jesus card-carrying Republican?

SAN ANTONIO - The Christian Coalition is idolatrous in portraying the Republican Party as the party of Jesus, a best-selling Christian author and lecturer said here this week.

Christians should reject the extremism of both the religious right and the religious left but support the best of both conservatism and liberalism, said Tony Campolo, a professor of sociology at the Baptist-related Eastern College in St.

David's, Pa. Campolo spoke at a conference on violence that was sponsored by the Texas **Baptist Christian Life Commission.**

When we tie Jesus up with one particular party as Christian Coalition has tied him to the Republican Party, we become idolatrous and create a god in our own image," he said. 'We believe that's dangerous for soci-

ety and for the church. Society can suffer from religious totalitarianism and the church can lose sight of what the biblical Jesus is all about," Campolo said in a post-conference interview. In his one-hour speech, Campolo

denounced the "power game" in which conservative religious leaders threaten politicians who don't follow their lead. Conservatives can play that game, he

said, but then "you can't come back to

people and say you're here to bring the

Campolo and Sojourners founder Jim Wallis launched a movement called the Cry for Renewal" last year to offer a balanced evangelical Christian vision for American society as an alternative to the religious right. He and Wallis were among 55 evan

gelical Christians arrested in December in the rotunda of the U.S. Capitol while protesting proposed budget cuts they said will hurt the poor. We wanted the message heard from

one end of this country to the other that some evangelicals aren't happy with the budget cuts," Campolo said. He said the Cry for Renewal combines the conservatives' concern for personal

responsibility with the liberals' concern for compassionate government. 'Both are right, and to emphasize one without the other is to fail to come up with conclusive answers," Campolo said.

Wallis, he said, is organizing town meetings throughout the nation to bring liberal Democrats and conservative Republicans to talk about ways they can work together.

'We're tired of polarization, the absence of stability, and hatred in the political debate. Want town meetings where people can talk together to become normal in our political discourse," Campolo declared.





While Irvin was beating up on tournament toughie Dunbar, it was the Cougars who nearly sent shockwaves throughout Class 5A


According to the the Trinity coaches, the Trojans were on a mission to avenge last year's last second buzzer beater to Cooper in the the same







NCAA looks into Tech men's programs

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — The National Collegiate Athletic Association has sent Texas Tech a letter of preliminary inquiry on possible men's basketball and football violations beginning in 1991.

In a written statement released Thursday Texas Tech president Robert Lawless said the school will cooperate with the NCAA Enforcement officials from the association visited the campus the week of Feb. 19.

The NCAA letter does not imply that Texas Tech has violated any rules nor does it charge Texas Tech with any violations,' Lawless said. "It simply formalizes continuation of the questioning and interviewing

Based on additional interviews, the NCAA

enforcement staff will decide whether to continue its investigation and recommend sanc-

The investigation was triggered by a series of stories by the Houston Chronicle detailing alleged improper benefits and academic problems involving athletes.

NCAA and school investigators are examining charges that Tech athletes received free legal assistance, bail bonds and other special treatment through arrangements by coaches and boosters. Football and basketball players who were charged with traffic offenses and criminal acts allegedly received free legal services from a Lubbock law firm whose partners include a member of the Texas Tech board of regents.

Former Tech basketball player Damon Ashley and his mother told the Chronicle in December that men's basketball coach James Dickey lured the player by promising to arrange a job for his pregnant girlfriend.
