Plans to match the shuttle runs with the entertainment schedule downtown are being considered, but; the entire program rests on whether or not enough people volunteer to serve as drivers.


All volunteers are welcome, noted Lieutenant Shippy.

Two Reese airmen were courtmartialed during December.

An airman basic charged with selling and possesion of cocaine and possesion of marijuana was convicted and received a bad conduct discharge, confinement at hard labor for 10 months and forfeiture of \$50 per month for 10 months.

Charged with the same crimes, an airman first class received a slightly differing sentence in conjunction with his bad conduct discharge. His penalty was confinement at hard labor for 8 months, reduction to airman basic and

forfeiture of \$100 for eight months.

Three Article 15 punishments, previously suspended, were carried out in December. One airman first class, charged with failure to obey a lawful order under Article 92 of the Uniform Code of Military Justice, was reduced to the grade of airman.

Another suspended sentence vacated involved an airman charged under Article 86 with being absent from duty. The offender was reduced to airman basic and forced to forfeit \$100 for two months.

Banking problem



"I drank because I was a very uneasy, uncomfortable person. I had a lot of friends and boyfriends, but I never felt I was good enough. I was a compulsive people-pleaser. Basically, I could never relax — and booze let me relax and be me."

"I was never myself before I got sober—I was my father's daughter, then my husband's wife, then my children's mother. But I was never me. Pat, 44, a Housewife

If you are a woman and have ever used alcohol to try to escape from your own difficulties, you have lots of company. It is estimated that 50 per cent of alcoholic people in the United States are women. If that is true, some five million women in the United States today — about one out of every 20 women may be facing some kind of alcohol problem.

The sooner you recognize a drinking problem in yourself, the easier it is to get out from under it. Below are some questions that will help you learn how dependent you are on drinking. This is a time to be absolutely honest with yourself only you can know how seriously you are being hurt by the role alcohol plays in your life.

Has someone close to you sometimes expressed concern about your drinking?

• When faced with a problem, do you often turn to alcohol for relief?

• Are you sometimes unable to meet home or work responsibilities because of drinking?

- Have you ever required medical attention as a result of drinking?
 - Have you ever experienced a blackout a

total loss of memory while still awake — when drinking?

• Have you ever come in conflict with the law in connection with your drinking?

• Have you often failed to keep the promises you have made to yourself about controlling or cutting out your drinking?

If you have answered "yes" to any of the questions, your drinking is probably affecting your life in some major ways and you should do



something about it — before it gets worse. Whether your drinking problem is in its early stages or you are severly addicted to alcohol, you can find the kind of help that will respond to your particular needs. Your social actions office is always ready to assist or direct you.

General Davis outlines challenge facing military

(Editor's note: The following are selected excerpts from a speech given to the Rotary Club of Lubbock Jan. 16 by Gen. Bennie L. Davis, commander of Air Training Command.)

We in the Air Force and you as Rotarians share a common bond — a commitment to the ideal of service ... service to the nation and the community ...

Today, I'd like to talk a bit about this ideal of service as it applies to the serviceman and woman. As you know, in the past few years the perception of service has changed significantly in the minds of many people...

Gradually, an attitudinal change seems to have evolved about military service as a profession . . . Instead of accepting the fact that all citizens have an inherent responsibility to offer something of themselves for the good of the whole society, the "takers" sometimes seem to outnumber the "givers."

Change inevitable

I realize that change is inevitable. That progress depends on constant reevaluation. We must all respond to internal and external forces, maintaining our flexibility. Yet, you and I both know that some things will always remain constant. The ideal of selfless service is one of them . . . No matter what—dedication to duty, total commitment to worthy goals, and unquestioned integrity — must remain steadfast.

Perhaps the most difficult challenge we in the military have had to deal with recently is that of basic value shifts. These have most affected both recruiting and retention efforts. ...The "Me First Syndrome" has become all too prevalent among some segments of society. And even as the changes have occurred, many have developed general distrust for all large and highly visible institutions, even the military.

Within this state of flux, the military, as much as any other facet of government, has had to meet the internal combustion of attitude change head-on . . . We've had to revise . . . timeproven techniques in recruiting and attracting the kinds of quality people demanded for a

continuing dilemma in the civilian sector . . . And we're attracting only about half of the specialty doctors needed.

These are the factors with which we must work. But we in the Air Force are determined to make the all-volunteer force a continuing success . . .

A youth attitude tracking study last spring showed a steady decrease in an interest in the military over the past five years ...

(However), over just the past year I've noted a reemergence of interest in the state of our weapons and force capability. Even before events in Cuba, Iran and Afghanistan, Americans were beginning to have a fuller understanding of the different elements of national security...


... I believe Americans are beginning to understand that the most fundamental social obligation a nation has to its citizens is to defend them against attack.

Positive effect

I also think this attitude will have a positive effect on our efforts across the board-from force modernization to recruiting and retention. International events and the obvious realization of the fragile state of peace anywhere in the world has caused many to reevaluate the status of our military Anyone who volunteers for military service makes a special contribution. That individual makes a conscious choice to accept higher standards and a more rigorous concept of discipline than the norm Servicemen and women are fulfilling a unique role of responsibility in protecting the very character of our nation. I personally consider our profession a very demanding and admirable calling ... But more than that, it's a place where one can make a director contribution to the good of the nation through individual achievement.





B-1 tested

Former POW addresses Reese Prayer Breakfast

On July 15, 1968, his aircraft was shot down over North Vietnam. Captured by the Viet Cong, Colonel James was held until March 14, 1973, as a prisoner of war.

The colonel is a command pilot with more than 3,500 flying hours and flew 34 combat missions over North Vietnam.






