
A native Oklahoman, General Risner was inducted into the Oklahoma Hall of Fame in 1974.



That's a motto that has been repeated over and over again in the history of the Air Force as people in blue uniforms have rallied to help someone in need.

I remember the floods that ravaged the homes of many of the military families that were assigned to the strategic Air Command base at Rapid City, S.D.

I remember that effort toclean up after a hurricane hit the gulf coast and the Air Force families at Keesler AFB, Miss. were in need of help. Men and women from all over the Air Force not only sent food, clothing and money to help in the recovery from that disaster, but many arrived in person to help physically.

That same was true after the

tornado that destroyed much of the city of Wichita Falls, Texas just a few short months ago. Again, the cry for help was heard across the Air Force and help came. Fortunately, not too many of our people in blue were injured, but the need was there and the response was swift and complete.

"We help our own . . ." We say that many times, and often demonstrate that it is true. However, that's seen on the large scale most often and not often enough right where we live daily.





Proposed budget to improve 'life'

budget request contains proposals aimed at improving the quality of life of Air Force

"Emphasis on military pay and allowances is needed if retention problems are to be reduced," said Air Force budget officials. They noted the \$46.3 billion budget includes pay initiatives aimed specifically at

bonuses for medical officers who enter the service through the health professions scholarship program and a cost of living allowance for unaccompanied personnel stationed overseas who live and take meals in government facilities.

reimbursement to members for permanent change of station

transportation and \$35 per day for food and lodging costs.

Another provides for an enlistment bonus in critical combat skills and an expanded re-enlistment bonus program for first-, second-term and career re-enlistment in critical skills.

A 7.4 percent pay raise figure is assumed as part of the president's supplemental budget package for fiscal 1981.

Overall figures for military personnel call for \$9.67 billion in total obligational authority for Air Force personnel costs. This includes money allocated in the supplemental budget package and represents a growth of 8.4 percent over the previous fiscal year.

After a number of years of low funding, the military construction program shows a significant increase in fiscal 1981. Both active-duty and reserve components will see a rise in their construction funding. Included in these funds is money to build support facilities for the MX missile, airlaunched cruise missile and space shuttle as well as \$42 million specifically planned for bachelor housing facilities.

Overall the fiscal 1981 budget plans for support of 133 major installations including 106 in the United States or its possessions and 27 overseas.

Force strength is anticipated at 546,000 active-duty military. 95,844 Air National Guard members, 59,343 Air Force Reservists and 240,600 civilians.

The budget will be examined by both houses of Congress before returning for presidential action and enactment into law. Fiscal 1981 begins in October. (AFNS)

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

BX survey indicates patrons save money

A recent survey conducted by the A.C. Nielsen Co. at market areas surrounding 17 Continental United States military installations showed an actual overall average savings of 21 percent for Army and Air Force Exchange Service customers.

By departments, clothing and linens showed the greatest savings-29 percent, with stationary, jewelry and household items following close behind. Other departments with less, but substantial savings, were tobacco, autonotive, toiletries, food and beverages and sundries.
