

# Reese launches AF AF campaign

Reese people will have a chance to donate to their future beginning Thursday and continuing through March 31.

Air Force Assistance Fund key workers will be circulating through the base population seeking donations to support the annual drive that benefits a number of programs aimed directly at the military population.

One of these programs is the Air Force Aid Society. The agency assists in relieving financial emergencies of eligible active duty, retired, and reserve members. Surviving spouses and dependents also are eligible. In addition, the society helps with educational loans.

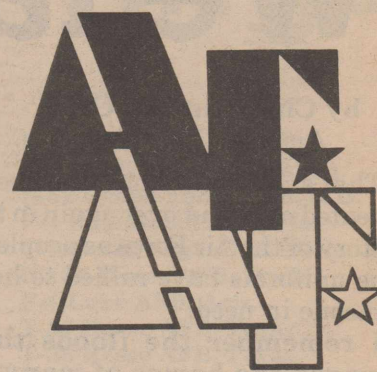
AFAF also supports retirement communities for Air Force members, their dependents and surviving spouses. Also benefitting

## 53 receive pilot wings; Risner addresses class

Fifty-three officers are scheduled to receive their Air Force pilots wings today during graduation ceremonies here for Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 80-03.

Graduation ceremonies are slated to start at 10 a.m. in the base theater.

Guest speaker for today's event will be Brig. Gen. (ret.) Robinson Risner. General Risner, retired from active service in late 1976. He served as the Vice Commander of the USAF Tactical Fighter Weapons Center at Nellis AFB, Nev. prior to his retirement. The fighter weapons school has since established an annual award in his honor.

A native Oklahoman, General Risner was inducted into the Oklahoma Hall of Fame in 1974.

The general, who spent more than seven years as a prisoner of war at the infamous Hanoi Hilton, has earned several military honors including the Air Force Cross with one oak leaf cluster, Distinguished Service Medal, Silver Star with one oak leaf cluster, Distinguished Flying Cross with two oak leaf clusters and Bronze Star with V device and one oak leaf cluster.

Class commander for the T-38 phase of Class 80-03's training was Capt. Mike Mendes. Capt. Steven P. Roach was the class commander during the T-37 phase of training.

Section leaders throughout the undergraduate program were Capt. Roy E. Payne Jr., section-one, and Capt. Delbert W. Pemberton, section-two.

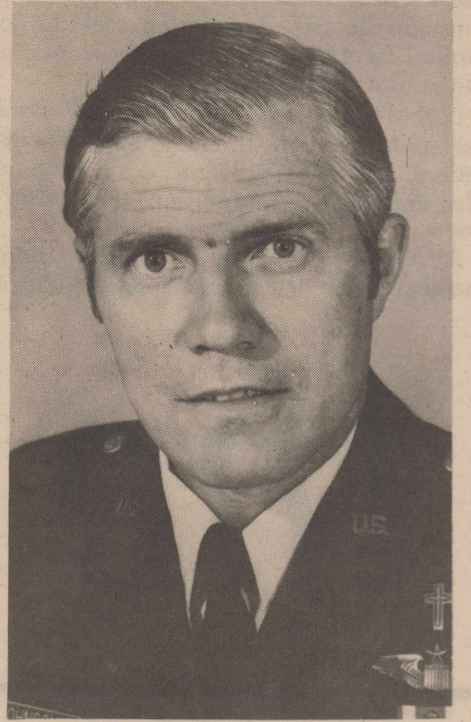
"We help our own..." We say that many times, and often demonstrate that it is true. However, that's seen on the large scale most often and not often enough right where we live daily.

While we are continuing to study the problem, there is nothing we can legally do at this time to solve it.

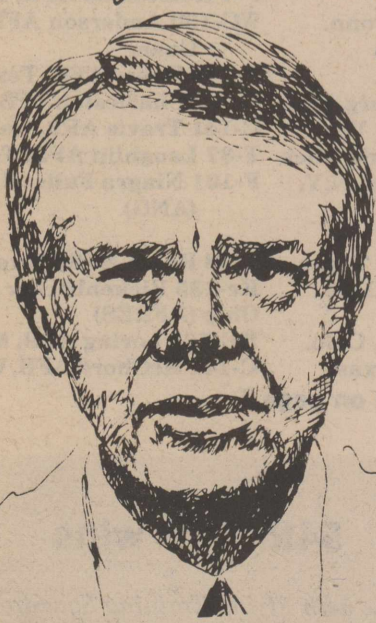
### Gym kudo

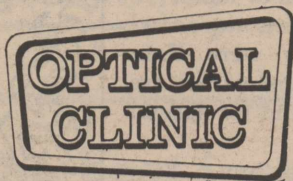

## Proposed budget to improve 'life'

The president's fiscal 1981 budget request contains proposals aimed at improving the quality of life of Air Force people in a number of areas.

"Emphasis on military pay and allowances is needed if retention problems are to be reduced," said Air Force budget officials. They noted the \$46.3 billion budget includes pay initiatives aimed specifically at retention.

Included in this area are bonuses for medical officers who enter the service through the health professions scholarship program and a cost of living allowance for unaccompanied personnel stationed overseas who live and take meals in government facilities.

Another proposal provides for reimbursement to members for permanent change of station moves at 7 cents per mile for

transportation and \$35 per day for food and lodging costs.

Another provides for an enlistment bonus in critical combat skills and an expanded re-enlistment bonus program for first-, second-term and career re-enlistment in critical skills.

A 7.4 percent pay raise figure is assumed as part of the president's supplemental budget package for fiscal 1981.

Overall figures for military personnel call for \$9.67 billion in total obligatory authority for Air Force personnel costs. This includes money allocated in the supplemental budget package and represents a growth of 8.4 percent over the previous fiscal year.

After a number of years of low funding, the military construction program shows a significant increase in fiscal 1981. Both active-duty and reserve components will see a rise in their construction funding.

Included in these funds is money to build support facilities for the MX missile, air-launched cruise missile and space shuttle as well as \$42 million specifically planned for bachelor housing facilities.

Overall the fiscal 1981 budget plans for support of 133 major installations including 106 in the United States or its possessions and 27 overseas.

Force strength is anticipated at 546,000 active-duty military, 95,844 Air National Guard members, 59,343 Air Force Reservists and 240,600 civilians.


The budget will be examined by both houses of Congress before returning for presidential action and enactment into law. Fiscal 1981 begins in October. (AFNS)





### Film increase

Space-available air travel is now offered on an equal basis to all military personnel regardless of grade, Military Airlift Command officials announced. Until Jan. 31, colonels and above could write up to 30 days in advance to be placed on a space-available register at MAC terminals. The 1980

Defense Appropriation Act ended the privilege.

### Fraudulent enlistment no longer excuse for offenses

Airmen facing a court-martial and hoping to escape it by pleading fraudulent enlistment may need to find another excuse. For the first time in more than a decade, Congress has made significant changes to the Uniform Code of Military Justice. One of the changes affects the use of fraudulent enlistment arguments to escape military justice.

### Shot clinic

Veterinary Services is offering a shot clinic for dogs and cats March 22 from 8:30 a.m.-noon. They are now taking appointments at Ext. 3534, but require at least 30 people sign up.

Texas law requires that domestic pets receive rabies and distemper boosters at least once per year. The clinic, thought not free, offers these shots at a much reduced rate.



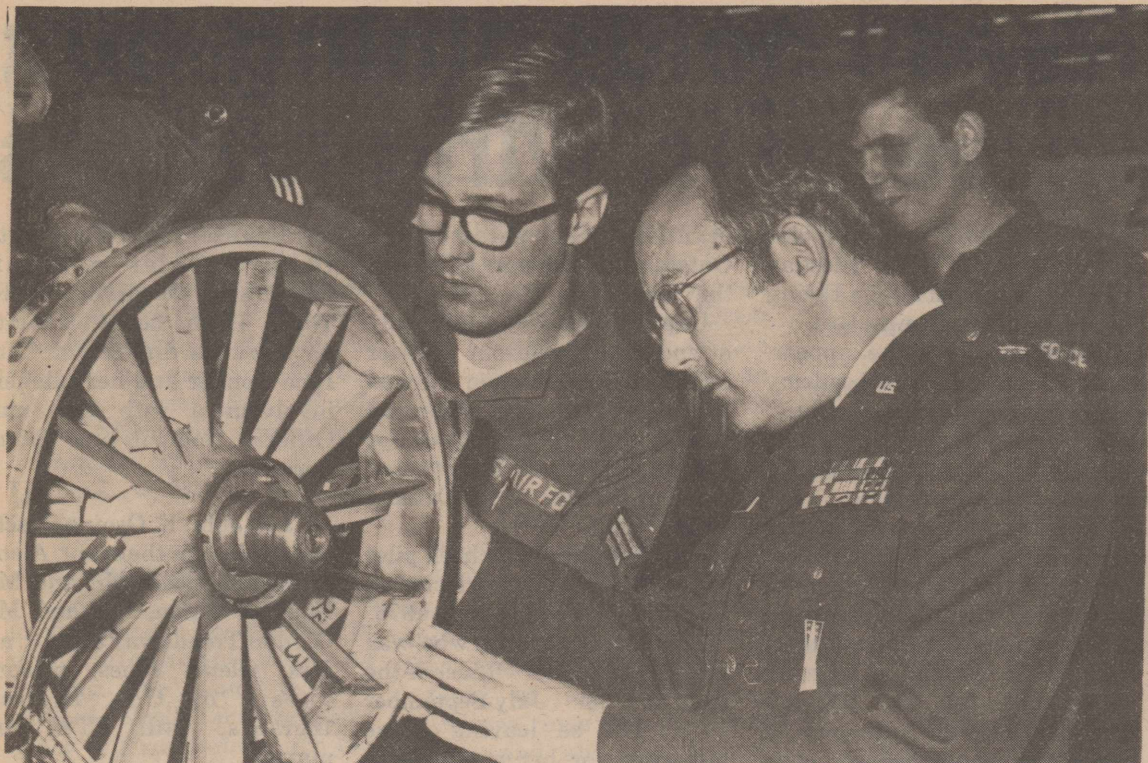

## BX survey indicates patrons save money

A recent survey conducted by the A.C. Nielsen Co. at market areas surrounding 17 Continental United States military installations showed an actual overall average savings of 21 percent for Army and Air Force Exchange Service customers.

By departments, clothing and linens showed the greatest savings—29 percent, with stationary, jewelry and household items following close behind. Other departments with less, but substantial savings, were tobacco, automotive, toiletries, food and beverages and sundries.

The extensive survey was commissioned by AAFES to document the savings provided by the Exchange Service to the serviceman and his family, and to ascertain if revisions in merchandise pricing are required.

The individual markets surveyed covered installations throughout CONUS and were

designed to be representative of CONUS exchange prices as a whole. Nielsen's local market observers checked prices on 300 different items.

Approximately 25,000 prices were collected in civilian stores Nov. 1 through Dec. 15, 1979, and "prices of the day" (including specials and other pre-holiday promotions) were reported for comparison against identical items sold by AAFES.

Areas surrounding the Alamo, Capitol, Golden Gate, Ohio Valley and Southeast Exchange regions were surveyed.

In addition to meeting its savings goal to the military customer, AAFES generates reasonable earnings, all of which are returned to the service community through dividends to the Morale and Recreation Program or the fund exchange construction programs.

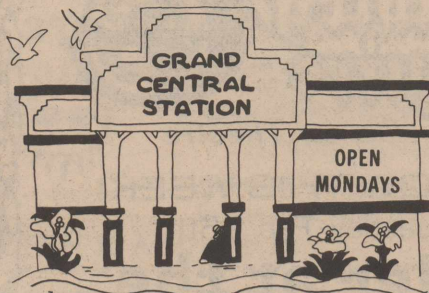
As of Wednesday morning only three acts had signed up for the annual competition. However, McFall said he knew of several other acts that were planning to enter the contest.
