# Nickell gets recognition as 64th FTW 'IP of Year'

Competition for Instructor Pilot of the Year was so close here that the wing selection board was forced to look beyond sheer job performance to pick the 1979 winner.

At least that's how Capt. Arthur Nickell, the 1979 IP of the Year, viewed his selection.

# Reese tops AFAF goal

With two weeks left to go, the Air Force Assistance Fund drive here has already reached the base goal.

Capt. Roger L. Hollowell, AFAF project officer, announced Wednesday morning that donations had reached \$9,643. That figure is 103 percent of the Reese target.

Helping Reese over the top were the eight units on base that have passed their individual goals. Heading the list is the 64th Student Squadron with donations totaling \$2,752 for 134 percent of the squadron target.

Other units going over the top and their goal breaking percentages are: the 54th Flying Training Squadron, \$1,520 -140 percent; the 35th FTS, \$1,282 -120 percent; the Wing Staff, \$108 -116 percent; and Organizational Maintenance, \$945.50 -103 percent. More units are: the 3500th Resource Management Squadron, \$439 -175 percent; Supply Squadron, \$525 -152 percent; and the 1958th Communications Squadron, \$378 -188 percent. The 1958th was the first base unit to pass its goal, however; its donations do not count toward the base total.

Colonels, lieutenant colonels and chief master sergeants from Reese will take on a basketball squad from KLLL radio Thursday night. Admission to the game is \$1 for adults and 50 cents for children under 12-years-old. The game starts at 7:30 p.m.

# 'Putting women in their place'

"Putting women in their place", — sound familiar?

The Federal Women's Program adopted this well-known phrase and turned the meaning around to promote its primary goals improved employment and advancement opportunities for women in federal service.

However, the Federal Women's Program cannot do this alone. Women must be willing to prepare themselves to "find their place".

Two terms used frequently in career counseling are goal setting and career planning. The goal you set may be in terms of money, power, or a certain grade scale level, but in any case, it must be realistic and attainable.

If you are not sure of what you want to do with your career, personal and occupational interest tests can provide some insight in finding personal desires, needs, and abilities. On base, the Education Office offers one such test, "Kuder", to all base personnel.

The best resource available to help government personnel reach their goal is the Office of Personnel Management Handbook X-118. It contains the educational, experience, and skill requirements for all occupational series. This reference is available upon request at Civilian Personnel Office. Your supervisor should also be able to assist you in determining the skills needed to qualify for certain opsitions.

If accredited college hours are required, the Base Education Office offers numerous courses through South Plains and Wayland Baptist Colleges. If night courses are impossible, South Plains offers courses during the lunch hour. If needed, the Education Office can assist you in applying for tuition assistance and educational grants.

Another way to qualify for certain positions is through professional examinations, such as Professional Accountant or PACE, both of which are free. Civilian Personnel officials can best advise you about these.

In addition, volunteer work is now considered qualifiable experience and an excellent way to acquire valuable experience and skills. However, as you complete courses, receive test results, assume volunteer positions, your official personnel folder must be updated with a detailed Standard Form 172 and copies of supporting documents.In fact, recording your skills and experience is just as important as acquiring them because this is the only way Civilian Personnel can learn about your qualifications, update the automated system and consider you for positions you desire.







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## **Travel entitlements top 1980 authorization bill**

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is one in a series of updates on the status of legislative proposals dealing with Air Force quality of life issues.

Overseas travel entitlements for junior enlisted members plus the number of military dependents abroad were related issues that began in both the Armed Services and Appropriations Committees and became part of the 1980 authorization bill.

When President Carter signed the fiscal 1980 Department of Defense Authorization Act into law Nov. 9, 1979, it established a commandsponsored ceiling of 325,000 which is to be allocated to the armed services by the Secretary of Defense. Whenever the ceiling is exceeded after Sept. 30, 1980, dependent travel will be prohibited.

The bill also provides each service secretary authority in administering travel entitlements in a manner which the secretary believes is fair and in the best interest of the government.

junior enlistedmember travel entitlements and reduce the overseas population of dependents. But the House at that time had not voted on its version of the authorization bill. Yet the House Armed Services Committee had approved a bill to support travel benefits for junior enlisted members and have not placed restrictions on the number of military dependents abroad.

Prior to becoming law, differences between the two versions of the bill were worked out in a joint House/Senate Appropriations Conference Committee.

During the joint conference it was agreed that language prohibiting overseas nonsponsored dependents from using commissaries and base exchanges be deleted from the proposed FY80 defense appropriations bill.

Earlier, the defense subcommittee of the House Appropriations Committee had voted to end these privileges for noncommandsponsored dependents who reported after Oct. 1, 1979.

The joint conference members also agreed to delete the provision which capped overseas military dependents at 375,000 including nonsponsored from the fiscal 1980 appropriations bill. (ATCNS)

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## Last summer, the Senate voted to eliminate Vice-chief of AF pins on fourth star

The Air Force's 19th vice chief of staff, Gen. Robert C. Mathis, donned his fourth star this weekend.

Formerly the vice commander of Tactical Air Command, General Mathis officially assumed his new post March 1. He replaces Gen. James A. Hill.

General Mathis comes to his new job with 36 years of military service. A 1948 West Point graduate, he is a veteran of both the Korean and Vietnam conflicts. In Vietnam he flew more than 200 combat missions, mostly in A-1 Skyraiders.

He holds both a master's degree and a doctorate in electrical engineering. Before coming to Tactical Air Command in March 1979, he held various posts in Air Force Systems Command as deputy chief of staff for systems, and later as vice commander.

He was the systems program director for the F-111 swing-wing fighter and also participated in development work on the F-15 Eagle. (AFNS)

### Several changes set for women's uniforms

Sleeves will be longer, blouses will tuck and fatigues will stay pressed in several changes to uniform items recently approved for Air Force women. especially for women, slated for March.

Several other uniform clothing items for women have been approved by the Air Force for development and testing. These include a maternity overblouse to be worn with maternity service uniforms, and maternity fatigues.





Specifically, items that will be added to the women's clothing bag during 1980 include: a tuck- • in, light blue, long-sleeved, cotton/polyester blouse, slated for October; a pantsuit uniform, slated for May; and a new, durable-press fatigue designed

Also included will be an improved sweater, a flight cap and an optional lightweight jacket . (AFNS)

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
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### **Personnel management team** schedules briefings at Reese

Reese officers and airmen will have an opportunity to discuss personnel policy with the policy makers when the Air Force's Personnel Management Team visits the base Wednesday through March 21.

The team is composed of approximately ten air staff and major command members and is led by Col. Robert Valentine.

The purpose of the team's visit is to "spread-the-word" to both officers and airmen on such subjects as: assignments and Force Management, selection board procedures and Benefits and Entitlements.

The team will meet with individuals and groups to discuss the responsiveness of the Air Force's personnel programs to the needs of its members. This will include seminars with different categories of personnel (Officers, NCOs, Air Force Spouses, etc.,) and visits by the team mebers to the work centers and base facilities. Twenty-five persons will be identified for each of the discussion groups. The team members will be visiting work centers at all hours of the day and night to listen to our people.

Briefings for officers will be held at the base theater 1 p.m. on Thursday and at 8 a.m. on March 21. Enlisted briefings are scheduled for 1:30 p.m. on Thursday and at 8:30 p.m. on

Friday. The enlisted briefings will be held at the Mathis **Recreation Center. All briefings** will run approximately two and one-half hours.

The team wants perceptions of all groups on personnel programs and policies. They also hope to receive innovative ideas or approaches concerning services, living conditions, and working conditions, said a personnel spokesman.

The perceptions recorded by the team command quite a bit of attention added the spokesman. Upon return to the Military Personnel Center, the team distributes their comments, observations, and recommendations to the Air Staff offices of primary responsibility, and a comprehensive trip report is forwarded to CSAF

### **Air Force announces** 0-5 promotion board

The calendar year '80 temporary lieutenant colonel promotion/regular appointment board is scheduled to convene July 21 at Randolph AFB, Texas.

The board, which will meet in the Manpower and Personnel Center, will consider eligible officers in nearly all promotion categories. Medical and dental corps officers are the only exceptions.

Basic eligibility criteria for consideration in the primary zone is a date of rank of Dec. 31, 1976, or before.

Secondary zone consideration by a June 2 board requires a date of rank of Jan. 1, 1977, through Dec. 31, 1978 (1966 and 1967 year groups and officers promoted with these year groups). In addition, officers must have an extended active duty service date of Jan. 21 or earlier and can not have been deferred for promotion to a permanent grade below 0-6.

Those reserve officers selected for promotion will be considered for regular appointment if they, are otherwise eligible.

According to a base personnel spokesman, pre-selection briefs will be forwarded to all eligible officers in the next few days.

## **Article 15 rate increases**

ments were up more than 100 percent from the previous month, one bright spot in the February legal actions roster is that no court martial convictions were handed down.

Two airmen first class received a vacation of previously suspended sentences: one for disobeying a lawful order (Article 91) and the other for possession of marijuana (Article 134). The airman convicted of possession was reduced to E-2 and ordered to forfeit \$90 for one month while the other had to forfeit \$75 for two months.

In other cases, an airman first class charged with failure to obey under Article 92 received a suspended reduction to airman, 15 days extra duty and forfeiture of \$50 for two months. \$25 for two months was suspended.

Two airmen first class, both charged under Article 86 with failure to go, received Article 15s. One received a suspended reduction to airman, 15 days

Although Article 15 punish- extra duty and forfeiture of \$100 for one month. The other was reduced to airman and ordered to forfeit \$75 for two months.

> An airman charged with violations of two counts of Article 92 and one violation of Article 134 received a suspended reduction in grade, 14 days extra duty, forfeiture of \$150 for two months and 14 days restriction to base. An airman first class charged with only one count of failure to obey got a suspended reduction to airman.

> One senior airman and one airman basic were both charged with striking a person under Article 128. The senior airman received a suspended reduction to airman first class, three days extra duty and forfeited \$150 for two months (all in excess of \$50 for two months was suspended.) The airman basic was ordered to forfeit \$150 for two months, \$100 of which was suspended. and 21 days extra duty.

The heaviest penalty imposed during February was on a staff. sergeant charged with three

Article 92 also figured in the punishment of an airman first class, who was further charged with failure to go, a violation of Article 86. His penalty included a suspended reduction to airman, forfeiture of \$200 for 2 months and 30 days extra duty. He was also restricted to base for 15 days.

Another airman first class charged with failure to go received a suspended reduction in grade, 14 days extra duty and forfeiture of \$50 for one month.

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
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




they have defeated two intramural teams.
