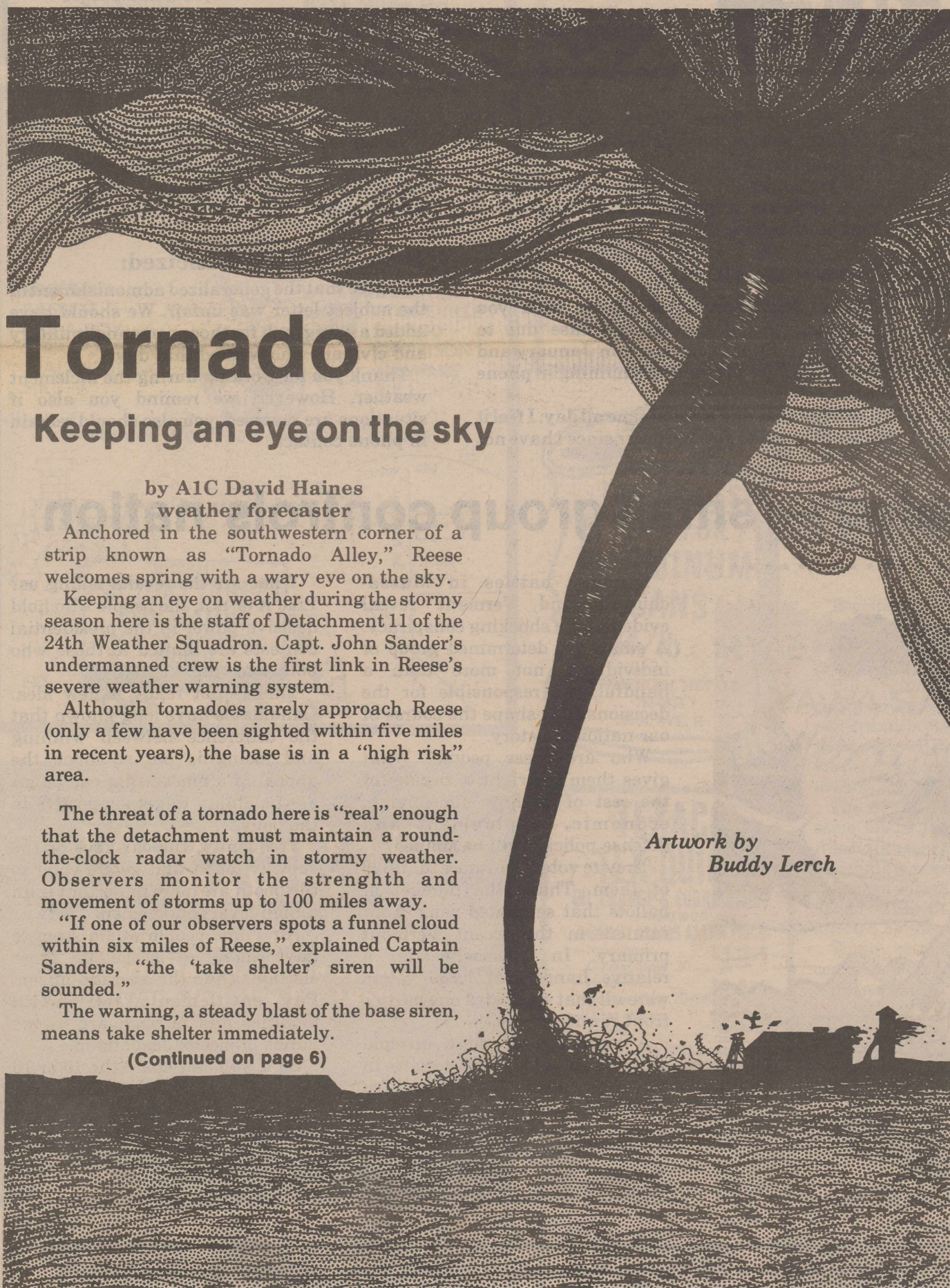

Tornado

Keeping an eye on the sky

Anchored in the southwestern corner of a strip known as "Tornado Alley," Reese welcomes spring with a wary eye on the sky.

Keeping an eye on weather during the stormy season here is the staff of Detachment 11 of the 24th Weather Squadron. Capt. John Sander's undermanned crew is the first link in Reese's severe weather warning system.

Although tornadoes rarely approach Reese (only a few have been sighted within five miles in recent years), the base is in a "high risk" area.

The threat of a tornado here is "real" enough that the detachment must maintain a round-the-clock radar watch in stormy weather. Observers monitor the strength and movement of storms up to 100 miles away.

"If one of our observers spots a funnel cloud within six miles of Reese," explained Captain Sanders, "the 'take shelter' siren will be sounded."

The warning, a steady blast of the base siren, means take shelter immediately.

AFAF drive tops 1979 contribution

Contributions to the Air Force Assistance Fund have soared beyond the base goal. In fact, with 11 days still left in the campaign donations have reached an all-time record here.

Capt. Roger L. Hollowell, AFAF project officer, announced Wednesday that Reese has taken in \$11,628. That's 125 percent of this year's goal and \$103 more than 1979's record setting total.

Spearheading the drive this year is the 3500th Resource Management Squadron. The unit has contributed an amazing 239 percent of the squadron goal, turning in \$601.

The 1958th Communications Squadron follows with 188 percent (\$378), Organizational Maintenance has topped 175 percent (\$1,600.50) and Supply has hit the 163 percent mark (\$562.50).

At 157 percent, the 64th Student Squadron leads all units in total dollars with \$3,219. The 54th has contributed \$1,520 (140 percent) and the 35th has turned in \$1,282 (120 percent).

Rounding out the list of units which have topped their goals is the wing staff, \$113 (121 percent).

Conspiracy revealed — small group controls nation



Primary battles in Massachusetts and Vermont reveal evidence of a shocking conspiracy. A small but determined group of individuals, not more than a handful, are responsible for the decisions that shape the course of our nation's history.

Who are these people? What gives them the right to decide for the rest of us how our foreign, economic, employment and defense policies will be shaped?

They're voters. No more than 598 of them. That's the number of ballots that separated some front runners in the recent Vermont primary. In Massachusetts, a relative handful of 1,236 voters were all that separated one party's front runners there.

A mere 200 of these intrepid individuals held ballots decisive in the destiny of the 5th, 6th and 7th place finishers. Though lower on the lists, these spots could be even more important as the winners can continue the race but losers frequently abandon it.

What are the results telling us? Like it or not, the people who hold decisive power in the presidential contests are limited to those who bother to vote.

This is not really a new idea. Candidates have long known that the difference between winning and losing is not so much the appeal of a massmedia campaign as the ability to get supporters to the polls.

Frequently, the car keys or the subway token that gets a voter to the booth are more important than a high-level endorsement.

Air Force people would seem to have more at stake in these elections than the average citizen. Pay, entitlements, retirement, facilities and mission are in the hands of elected leadership.

So if you can spare the 10 or 15 minutes it will take to register locally or by Federal Postcard Application for absentee ballot, you can take part in the decision-making process.

It's your vote. Make it count.

Some CHAMPUS forms may be hard to fill out

Many CHAMPUS users make mistakes in filling out a portion of the CHAMPUS claim form that requests three separate dates in one block — “issue date,” “effective date” and “expiration date.”

According to Bob Gregorio, Health Benefits advisor, using the wrong dates or getting them in the wrong places in that portion of the form (block 5) can delay the processing of a claim by a month or more and requires that the claim be returned for correction.

Each of these dates appear on the dependent ID card and two of them, “issue date” and

“expiration date,” are on the retiree card.

Following is an explanation of each date and, if it appears on the ID card, where it is located.

Issue Date — The date the ID card was issued to the beneficiary. For dependents, it is on the front of the card in block 2. It's located on the back of the retiree card.

Effective Date — Probably the date that causes the most confusion, it is the date the beneficiary became eligible for CHAMPUS benefits. This date appears in block 15b on the back of the dependent ID card. In the case of retirees, the “effective date” is the date of retirement or

Jan. 1, 1967, whichever is later. An “effective date” block does not appear on the retiree card but the information is required on the claim form.

Expiration Date — The date beyond which the card is no longer valid. It is located in block 3 on the front of the dependent ID card and is also on the front of the retiree card. Some retiree cards have the term INDEF (an abbreviation of “indefinite”) in that block. In those cases, the retiree should enter that term in the expiration date portion of the CHAMPUS claim form.



CCAF students must progress

Registered students of the Community College of the Air Force who have not made progress toward their associate in applied science degree in the last 18 months are advised to get with the program or risk disenrollment.

Bill Trafton, base education officer, advised Monday that a computer screening of all student records to identify inactive registrants is planned by the college. Registered students who have not made academic progress in the last 18 months will be contacted via personal letter. These airmen will have an additional 18 months to show evidence of progress toward their degree or be disenrolled.

The Community College, an Air Training Command unit, has some 110,000 registered students, with 1,050 enrolled at Reese. Approximately 10 percent are expected to be affected by the screening process.

Airmen who registered prior to September 1978 and who have not updated their CCAF records since that time are most likely to be affected by the screening.

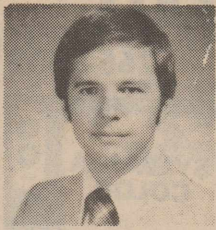

Scribe reviews DoD bill

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is an update of Department of Defense Legislative issues affecting Air Force quality of life.

After undergoing extensive battle in the 96th Congress, the 1980 DOD Appropriations Bill was finally signed into law by President Carter on Dec. 21, 1979. Many of its provisions are yet to be enacted. A review of some of the provisions covered in the legislation is as follows:

- Funds to increase the Armed Forces Health Professions Scholarship Program stipend from \$400 to \$453 per month to correspond with the National Health Service Corps Scholarship Program; the stipend would be automatically adjusted in the future by a percentage equal to any Federal pay raise,

- Approval for 740 additional Reserve Officer Training Corps scholarships for the Air Force, making a total of 6,500,

- Expansion of CHAMPUS coverage to include optometrists and certified nurse practitioners (on a test basis only) without regard to supervision by a physician or other health care provider.

Other provisions

Other provisions in the bill directed:

- Immediate action by the Air Force to ensure that officer evaluation ratings or OERs are impartial, unbiased, and standardized to the maximum extent possible,

- DOD to take immediate action to implement flexible and compressed employee work schedules to the fullest possible extent,

- Military medical services to explore the possibility of working with appropriate state and local officials to reduce child abuses and marital violence in military families,

- Retainment of the CHAMPUS reimbursement rate at the 80th, rather than 90th percentile,

The bill permits the involuntary separation of twice deferred officers. Members in the grade of

0-3 or 0-4, who have specialty skills in shortage areas, may be selectively retained on active duty until eligible for retirement or until the skill area is fully manned.

Cut funds

The appropriations bill also cut funds by:

- Deleting the \$4.2 million requested by the Air Force for real growth, above inflation, in recruiting and advertising programs,

- Deleting funds for a cost-of-living allowance or COLA for single and unaccompanied enlisted members stationed overseas who are required to reside in government quarters and use government dining facilities.

- Deletin \$1.5 million in permanent change of station funds in order to encourage greater emphasis on, and participation in, the "do-it-yourself" move program,

- Prohibiting the use of funds for abortion except when the life of the mother would be endangered if the fetus were carried to term and for the victims of rape or incest,

- Deleting \$1 million for Air Force reserve recruiting programs,

- Limiting Air Force graduate education programs (except medical) to FY 78 levels,

- Prohibiting the commissioning of physician assistants except for those individuals currently under contract or in training; physician assistants who are already commissioned may not exceed the grade of 0-4,

- Terminating "30-day write-in privilege" for space available transportation for senior personnel,

- Deleting \$85 million for contract studies and analyses, management support, and consultants in the Air Force, \$150 million DOD-wide, and

- Prohibiting elective cosmetic surgery for the dependents of active duty military personnel and retired members.

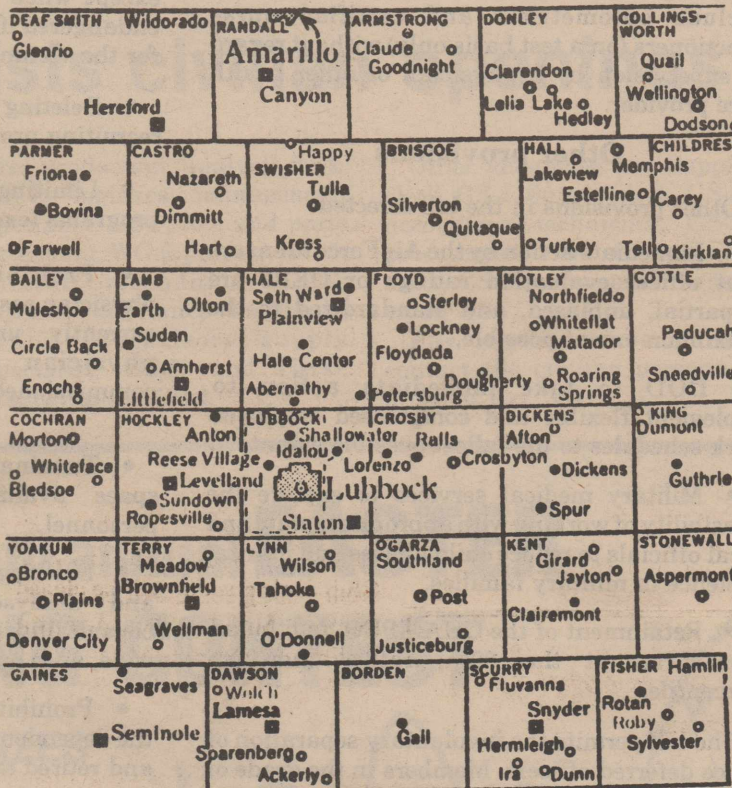

Observers watch for storms

Those living off base should keep tabs on local radio and television stations during stormy weather. Base officials recommend that people have an emergency kit stashed somewhere in the home. The kit should contain at least a battery operated radio, flashlight with extra batteries and a container of fresh water. "One more thing," noted Captain Sanders, "is that people should not call the weather service for information. During storms telephone

Maintaining a 24-hour watch isn't easy for the understaffed weather detachment. Captain Sanders' crew pulls 12-hour shifts, as the storm watch is only part of the unit's duties.

As the stormy season hits the South Plains, Reese people have an edge against nature's fury — Detachment 11, 24th Weather Squadron.



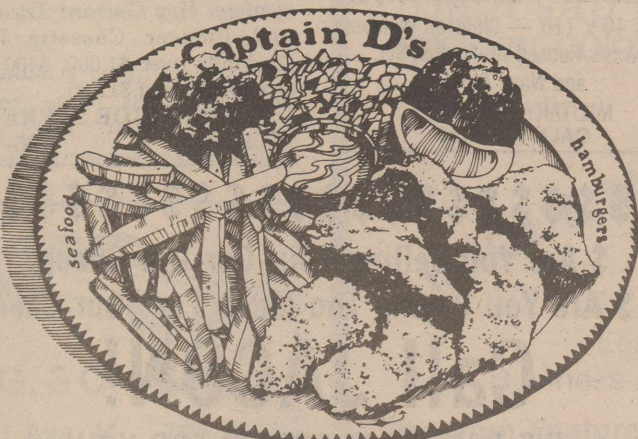

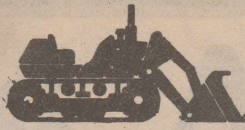

Defense personnel must ask for the discount, present DoD identification, travel orders or a rental agency identification card to get the special rate.

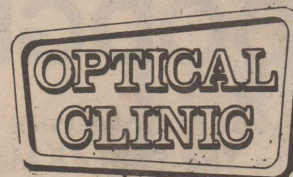
