

# **Commissary renovation begins**

After an almost six-month delay brought about by lack of funding, construction of the new family shopping center finally began Wednesday.

According to Maj. John Harvell, chief of Services division, Reese shoppers should be able to enjoy the new facility in approximately one year. But in the meantime things are going to be a little inconvenient.

Only 33 parking spaces will be available for commissary patrons and a drive-to-the-door pick up system will be used. When the new facility, which will offer both commissary and exchange facilities in a landscaped mall, is complete adequate parking will be obtained by tearing down the old building and using the area as a new parking lot.

The multi-million dollar project (the commissary facility alone will cost \$1.7 million) will offer almost double the floor space in the commissary and consolidate and expand base exchange facilities that are now widely scattered. Store space in the commissary will reach 16,000 square feet while storage and processing area will total 23,000. Although the commissary and exchange will be combined into one shopping center, the contracts are being let by two different agencies. Commissary Service is handling the commissary project while the Army and Air Force Exchange Service is building the new exchange.


#### No misunderstanding

# Carpooling makes 'cents' for you

How far do you live from Reese -10, 15, 20 or event 30 miles? Are you finding it more difficult each month to pay off that oil company credit card bill?

Transportation, if you hadn't already noticed, has become a major item of expense in most households.

#### Numbers tell story

In response to skyrocketing expenses, carpooling and expense sharing have become a way of life for most of us. The numbers tell the story. If your car gets 12 miles per gallon, fuel alone will cost you \$40 to \$80 per month. You might trade for a smaller, more fuel efficient automobile and reduce your fuel costs to \$25 to \$60 per month, but will the savings pay for the car before it is ready for the junk heap? Simple arithmetic will tell you that by trading rides with a friend, you can cut your fuel costs in half and keep your present car. Of course, if you trade for a smaller car and carpool with two or three friends, you might find the savings will almost make your car payments.

#### Other transportation costs

Fuel costs are actually only the tip of the "transportation cost iceburg." Maintenance and repair, financing costs and, ultimately, the cost of replacing your vehicle actually represent the largest portion of your total bill. Every trip you don't make to the base saves cost and extends the life of your vehicle.

Let's face it — business as usual will not get us there from here. We must adjust to the fact that transportation has become a major item of expense and promises to become even more expensive.

#### **Cost saving suggestions**

Here are a few suggestions to start you thinking about things we might do.

One, how about a vanpool? Frank Falbo, Associate Base Civil Engineer, has had a lot of experience with vanpooling and will discuss it with you. Given the right conditions, you can pay for a new van every four years and save thousands of gallons of fuel in the process. An information packet on vanpooling is available for review in the Deputy Commander for Resources office, room 207, building 800.

Carpooling, expense sharing, keeping your vehicle tuned, the tires properly inflated and driving in a fuel efficient manager are other obvious ways of saving dollars and fuel.

Re-think the problem, share your ideas, talk it up with your friends. We will live with the higher prices, but we can make it easier by working together.

## Fund drive succeeds!

Air Force Assistance Fund campaign show that Reese people dug deep in order to put the base over the top with \$14,460.44, 155 percent of their goal.

According to Capt. Roger Hollowell, AFAF project offier, small amounts of money are still expected to tricke in, but the campaign officially ended Monday.

Although one squadron did not quite reach their total, three units exceeded 200 percent of their goal. The 3500th Resource

Final results of the annual Management Squadron led the race with an impressive 239 percent for a total of \$601. Organizational Maintenance followed closely on the heels of the leader with 214 percent of their goal for a total of \$1,955.44.

> The 54th Student Squadron collected \$4,292 for 209 percent of their goal.

> Other final standings include the 1958th Communications Squadron, 188 percent (\$378); 64th Supply, 163 percent (\$562.50); Air Base Group, 145 percent (\$1,308.50); 54th Flying

Training Squadron, 140 percent (\$1,520); Hospital, 135 percent (\$1,008); 35th Flying Training Squadron, 127 percent (\$1,356).

Rounding out the figures were Wing Staff, 122 percent (\$113); Deputy Commander for Operations Staff, 108 percent (\$637) and Field Maintenance, 89 percent (\$1,107).

In reporting the final figures to the Roundup, Captain Hollowell stated, "I'd like to give a great big 'thank you' from the Air Force Assistance Fund and myself for the support Reese people have shown."

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## **AF** official calls for commitment

A top Air Force official told senators that the Air Force believes a long-term plan and commitment to adequate military compensation are required to solve retention problems.

Assistant Secretary of the Air Force for manpower, Reserve Affairs and Installations Joseph C. Zengerle told the Senate Armed Services subcommittee on Manpower and Personnel that pay is an essential ingredient of retention.

#### **Recruiting shortfall**

"Although there are many interrelated factors that are contributing to our serious pilot exodus, the decline in enlisted retention and our first recruiting shortfall since the advent of the all-volunteer force have made it increasingly clear that the adequacy of military compensation is a pivotal issue," he said.

"In this regard, we fully support and believe we need to restore the relative pay comparability levels which existed in 1972.

"Clearly we cannot correct all of the pay inadequacies estimated by the Secretary of Defense pay study to require as much as \$5.5 billion in increased military pay in a single year's initiative.

#### Long-term plan

"Therefore, we believe a long-term plan and commitment for additive funds to solve this problem over the next two to five years is needed.'

Secretary Zengerle told the senators the Air Force's most pressing personnel problems are pilot retention and second-term and career enlisted retention.

#### **Badly needed programs**

"However, it is our firm conviction that the following compensation programs are also badly needed this year to help abate serious recruiting and retention problems."

Among the compensation programs he listed were:

• Trailer allowance.



## **Courts-martial dominate** Legal actions in March

Legal actions in March were dominated by three courtsmartial involving two captains and staff sergeant.

Conviction of one captain for attempted murder with premeditation and assault resulted in his dismissal from the service and confinement at hard labor for 18 years. He also forfeits all pay and allowances.

Another general courtmartial found a captain charged with five counts of willful disobedience and absent without leave. The captain attended attended college under a military scholarship program and, upon graduation, refused to fulfill his service commitment. His conviction cost him a \$10,000 fine, dismissal from the service and confinement for six months at hard labor, during which time he is forced to forfeit \$1,200 per month.

A special court-martial was convened to try a staff sergeant charged with signing false official documents, larceny and

writing worthless checks with intent to defraud. He received a bad conduct discharge and was fined \$80.

#### **Article 15 actions**

Three airmen were charged with either failure to go or absent for duty under Article 86 of the Uniform Code of Military Justice. Article 15s given these airmen reduced each in grade, although one received a suspended reduction and 30 days extra duty. A fourth airman basic charged with two violations of Article 86 received 15 days extra duty and a suspended forfeiture of \$100 for two months.

Article 92 figured into nonjudicial punishment given to five Reese people. A total of 28 days extra duty, \$1,360 in fines and four reductions in grade were handed out. Article 92 covers failure to obey and dereliction of duty.


Violations of Article 134 were most common last month with actions was a violation of

a result. Crimes ranged from disorderly on station to transfer of hashish. Fines totaling \$1,800 were levied against the offenders with other penalties from reduction in grade and extra duty to base restriction added to some judgements.

A violation of Article 128, unlawfully striking a person, cost a staff sergeant \$400, 30 days extra duty and a suspended reduction to sergeant. Willfully disobeying an order resulted in an airman first class paying \$200 and serving 14 days extra duty, in addition to a suspended reduction in grade.

Intent to defraud under Article 123A caused the reduction of a senior airman to airman first and also cost him \$285 for two months. He also received 45 days extra duty and was restricted to base for the same period.

Closing out the March legal seven Article 15s handed out as 'Article 121, stealing property,

### **Ingram backs ROA** membership campaign

Col. Richard A. Ingram, 64th Flying Training Wing commander, stated in a recent letter, "I think . . . that the Reserve Officers' Association is one of the most effective voices the Air Force officer has in Congress.'

Now involved in its membership drive, the ROA actively supports or aggressively opposes Department of Defense policy or legislative initiatives stemming from the administration, DoD, the services or Congress that will affect the military forces, according to its charter.

The ROA is also chartered by Congress to advise them on national security, the basic objective of the organization. It provides an opportunity and an avenue for participation in the legislative process and is a means by which to keep informed about current issues.

Already 115,000 members strong, membership is open to all officers in all services for an annual fee of \$12. Second lieutenants may join for only \$6. Benefits offered by the organization include group life insurance, health insurance, group travel programs and discounts on car rentals.



### **Proposed 1981 budget** includes base projects

Proposed in the President's fiscal 1981 defense budget request is a military construction that could provide Air Training Command with \$32 million for base improvements. Included in that figure are funds for two projects at Reese.

Command engineering and construction officials are optimistic yet cautious in saying what bases will get until the \$46.3 billion Air Force budget is examined by both houses of Congress and signed into law by the President.




in the year, odds are the Medics will capture the final slot in the post-season classic.

# **AF boxing team tests** area fighters April 26


West Texas will pit its best amateur fighters against the Air Force boxing team here April 26 in the Second Annual **Reese Boxing Tournament.**


