

Story of century

Brave band boots Britain

Had today's instant worldwide communications network been available July 4, 1776, what a blockbuster would have burst over the globe -- the "story of the century." Screaming headlines, radio and TV in every major city on the planet would have blared the unbelievable news that a small group of disorganized colonials were daring to take on the world's military giant.

It took colossal nerve to sign the Declaration of Independence. Each brave soul who did so knew that in the event of failure his family would be ruined, his money and holdings seized, while he would be automatically marked for prison or death. It required what is politely referred to as intestinal fortitude -- in less elegant circles, guts.

With the above in mind, as I was writing this I found myself wondering what I, had I been a signer, might have done immediately afterward. Probably would have heeded the voice of prudence and decided to lie low for a while, fade into the landscape till I saw what developed, wait for others to come forward to take lumps with me -- you know, safety in numbers, misery loves company.

But not our feisty forebears. Their faith in the rightness and validity of their dream was evidently unshakable. Rather than pussyfooting around as I, the coward, would have done, they stepped forward and stuck it in the king's ear. Witness John Adams, who would become the second President of The Dream, shortly after the Declaration was signed:

Our Independence Day, he wrote, should be "... commemorated as the day of deliverance. . . solemnized with pomp and parade, with shows, games, sports, guns, bells, bonfires and illuminations, from one end of this continent to the other, from this time forward forevermore."

As we all know, they, God bless 'em, pulled off their impossible dream. What looked to the world like a bluff, backed up by puffy balls of whipped cream, turned out to be an ace-high flush, with the players rawhide lean -- and mean.

The world was never the same after that July day in 1776. As I've noted before -- but it bears repeating -- when our doughty forefathers electrified the world with their impassioned document, France and Spain had kings, Russia a czar, China an emperor

and Japan a shogun -- infinitely powerful muckamucks all. Of course Great Britain was ruled by a monarch, too.

I know it's not nice to gloat. But with all that clout, of all the outfits around back then, the only one that's still doing business practically unchanges at the same old stand today is the puny little Federal Union that was born out in the boondocks -- America -- the creation of a small clutch of angry men and women tired of being kicked around.

What a magnificent heritage! This Independence Day let's remember it, honor it and savor it to the fullest, reassure the world -- maybe even ourselves -- that the dream that changes the course of history is still around, stronger than ever.

Gen. Davis addresses Air Training Command



This July 4th Americans will have breathed the clean, sweet air of freedom for 204 years. But that freedom has not been without cost. During those years, we have been called upon a number of times to demonstrate forcibly that our determination to protect our way of life -- to maintain the eternal vigilance which Thomas Jefferson warned was the price of liberty -- is unshakable.

Jefferson's admonition has never been more pertinent than at present. Today the battle lines are clearly drawn between two diametrically opposed philosophies of government. The totalitarian one looks on people as mere pawns of the state. Ours, as proclaimed in the Declaration of Independence, holds that each individual has dignity and worth, and that all are "endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness."

So this Independence Day let's pause to remind ourselves of the priceless treasure we can lose if we don't stand steadfast once again. Only by holding firmly to our faith in the American ideal and supporting it with armed strength too strong to be challenged can we be assured that we will pass on our birthright intact to our children and theirs.

Water rationing starts at Reese

As the result of a routine June 24 water supply check, Reese will be on a water rationing plan until further notice.

Under the plan, the base will be divided into north and south sections at Main St., with watering allowed only on alternate days (north on even days, south on odd). Reese Village will follow the same plan with Mitchell Blvd. as the dividing line.

The check which brought about the plan revealed less than four feet of water in the underground storage tanks and only 25 feet in the elevated tank. Since 22 feet of the water in this tank is required to meet fire fighting minimums, only three feet are available for general consumption.

Reese purchases water from Lubbock at the rate of 1,850 gallons per minute. Recent usage has been as high as 2,700 gallons per minute and base personnel are asked to conserve in every way possible.

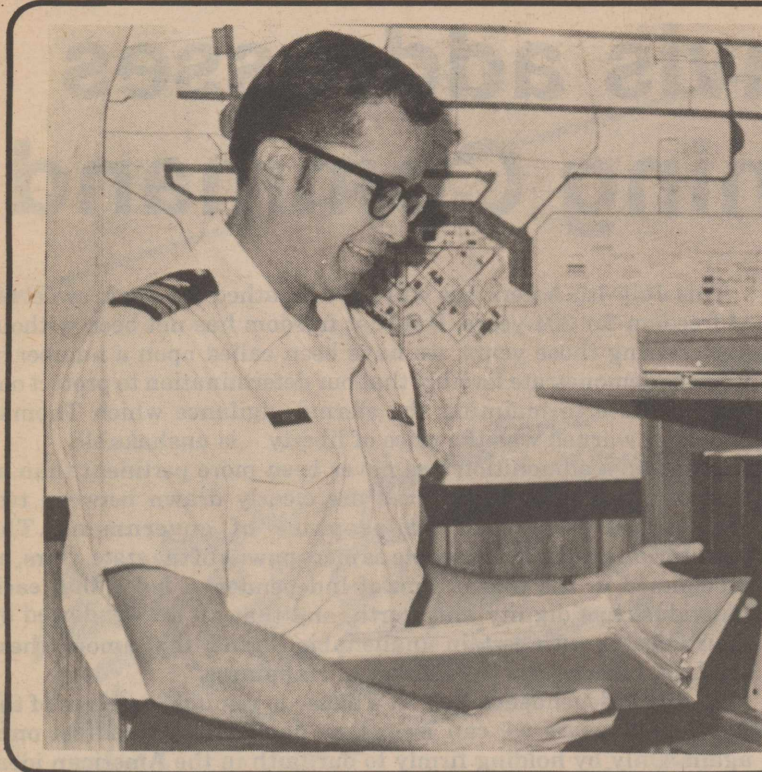


JULY 4th, 1980



Drug/alcohol seminar highlights women's use

Why know about women and alcohol? Because more women drink than ever before, and alcohol dependence among women has grown steadily. It is estimated that 2.25 million women have an alcohol related problem in America today.

To teach women how to cope with alcohol and drugs, the Federal Women's Program is conducting a Chemical Dependency Seminar for women at the base chapel on July 31. This will be an all-day affair beginning at 8:30 a.m. All military and civilian women employees and dependent women are welcome.

Alcohol has no preference who its victims are. Women of all ages, social and economic backgrounds are affected. What causes alcoholism in women? First of all, alcohol is accepted by society, is readily available

and its price is reasonable.

Whether it be family or marital stress, loss of loved ones, lack of fulfillment experienced by a career woman turned housewife, blow to self image or medical crisis, all women experience some of these problems sometime in their lives and some rely on alcohol to help them cope with the crisis.

Women with an alcohol problem are likely to conceal problems longer, abuse other drugs, neglect their children, become depressed, be deserted by spouses and give birth to children with birth defects.

The Reese seminar is part of a larger program that will be conducted at all 14 Air Training Command bases during the next two months. According to SrA David Scott, Drug/Alcohol counselor at Chanute AFB, Ill., where the program first opened June 23, "Everybody seemed to like it real well. She (Mrs. Carole

Keller) really knew her stuff." Mrs. Keller is with Keller and Associates Consultant Service, which conducts the seminar.

Objectives of the seminars are to increase awareness of chemical dependency among ATC women employees; how it relates to them, their families and their work settings; where and how to seek assistance; and about referral to the base Social Actions Office.

Keller, who has worked as a counselor, a state program administrator, the executive director of a community agency and a private consultant, is considered an expert in the field of women and chemical dependency.

She says, "As more women join the work force, drug and alcohol abuse is becoming more noticeable among women. It's a problem we have to deal with and these seminars are a great way to start."

DoD saves money with metal recovery

A concerted effort is underway in the Department of Defense to recover precious metals from scrap and surplus materials.

With many precious metals selling at near-record highs, the savings could be enormous.

AF Logistics Command property disposal office at Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio is the Air Force's focal point for the precious-metals recovery program.

Silver is most available for recovery because of its use in photographic and X-ray films.

At Reese, silver is recovered from hypo solution used in processing x-rays in the

hospital, dental clinic and Non-Destructive Inspection Lab. Lou Hecker, Area Precious Metals Monitor from Kelley AFB, Texas, estimates that Reese will turn in 679 troy ounces for a total value of \$11,189.92, based on the market closing June 30.

Gold and platinum are also found in government-used items. Items in stock, and those entering the inventory, will be identified by a special coded national stock number to show their precious-metal content. When an item is transferred for disposal, its precious-metal content can be identified for recovery purposes.

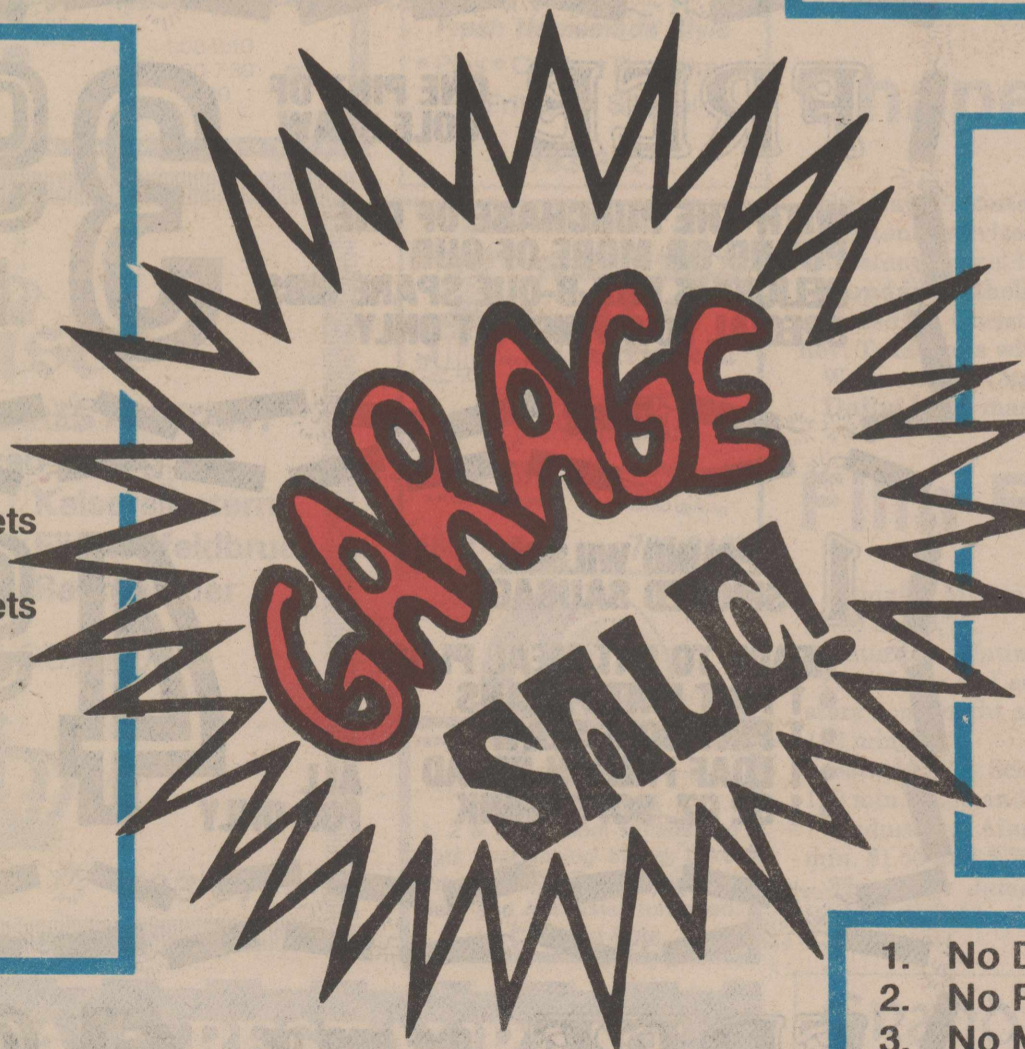

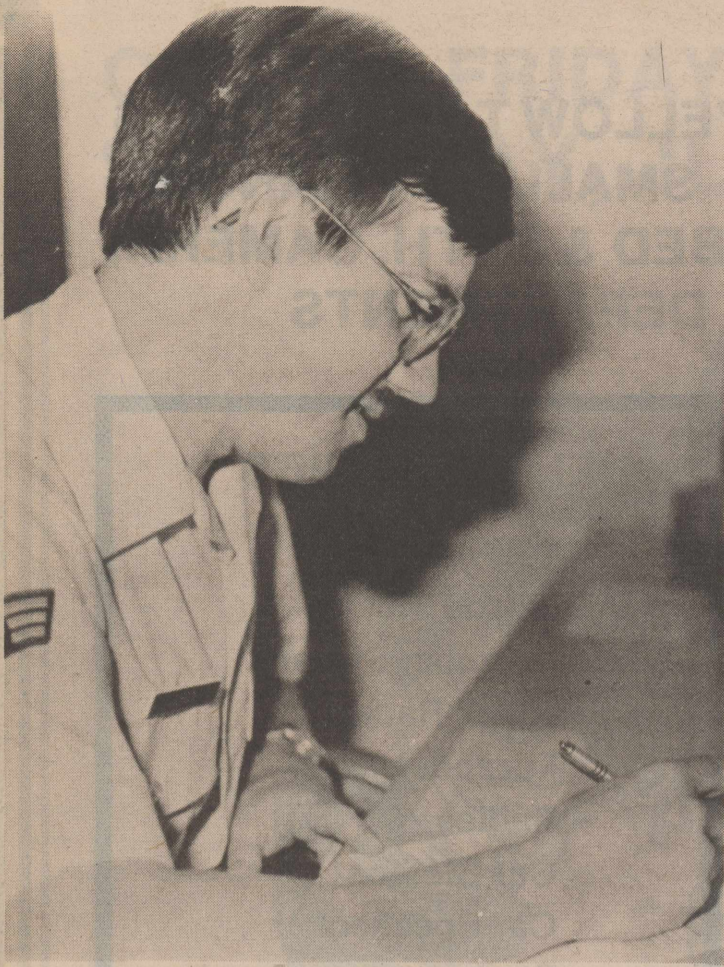

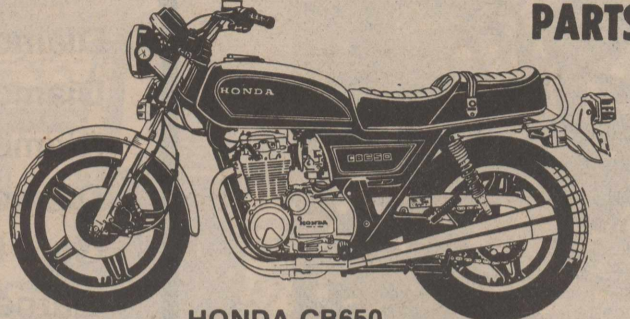

Reese slates Soviet briefing

Is war with the Soviet Union inevitable? Are Soviet leaders using detente to disarm or cripple the U.S. military? Is the Soviet military superior to our own? Have the Soviets altered their goal of world domination to one of peaceful coexistence? Do the Soviets currently have the capability to wage a theatre or world war? Would the Soviets use nuclear or chemical weapons to achieve a given objective? Will the Soviets put weapons on space platforms? What is the Soviet fighting man like?

These and many other questions have been discussed, analyzed and scrutinized by presidents, diplomats and intelligence analysts. Properly cleared Air Force and Civil Service personnel will have the opportunity to make judgments and form their own opinions by attending the Air Force Soviet Awareness Program July 21 and 22 at Simler Theater.

The Soviet Awareness Program was developed at the direction of the Air Force Chief of Staff to provide all Air Force and Civil Service members with a fundamental understanding of the Soviet military establishments. The program is designed to inform each attendee about Soviet doctrine, strategy, tactics, force structure and employment of combat forces.

ACE personnel aid hurt soldier

Two Air Force personnel, a captain who recently departed Reese for Ellsworth AFB, S.D. and a senior airman performing temporary duty there, were recently credited with saving a man's life in a mountain accident.

Capt. Thomas A. Peraro, deputy commander of the Accelerated Copilot Enrichment program, and SrA George A. Akin, a T-38 aircraft technician TDY from Reese, were on a firewood gathering expedition in the Black Hills near Ellsworth. Upon rounding a curve they sighted an Army jeep rolled on its side with a man pinned underneath.

People already at the scene proclaimed the man to be dead, but Capt. Peraro insisted the jeep be raised so he could reach the driver. Crawling under the

jeep lifted by the bystanders, the captain could find no pulse and felt what seemed to be broken ribs and a broken right arm.

Pulling the victim from under the vehicle, Capt. Peraro and Airman Akin began performing cardio-pulmonary resuscitation. They continued the technique for approximately 30 minutes before an ambulance arrived, and Capt. Peraro continued heart massage once a respirator had been attached.

Rapid City paramedics administered heart stimulants and a definite heart beat was noted. Although the swift actions of the two airmen did bring life back to the wounded soldier, he tragically died two days later in the Rapid City Regional Hospital from wounds sustained in the accident.

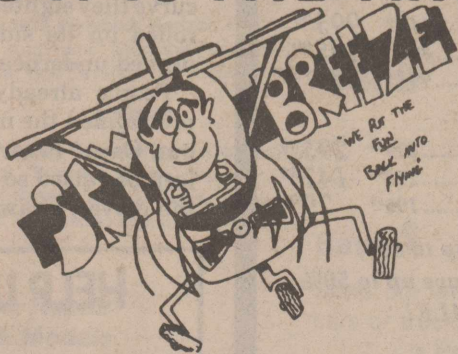
