Base plans observance

Reese AFB will honor all POW/MIA personnel of past wars with special ceremonies this afternoon at 4 p.m. in front of Wing headquarters, Bldg. 800.

In a POW/MIA Day Proclamation, President Jimmy Carter stated that upon our POW/MIAs "has fallen the arduous responsibility of defending American ideals under the absolute control of the enemy." He continues by pointing out that "extremely difficult at best, this responsibility becomes magnified almost beyond comprehension when men and women are treated inhumanely."

The special ceremonies will include a flyover by T-37 aircraft, presentation of special awards, a 21-gun salute by the base Honor Guard and a message from former prisoner of war Capt. Richard Fulton. All former POWs and their dependents and dependents of MIA personnel who attend the ceremony will be recognized.

Everyone is encouraged to attend this special ceremony.

HRO begins listing service

Under an expanded customer service program, the Reese Housing Referral Office, in cooperation with those Air Force-wide, is offering a real estate listing service that may reduce the cost of buying or renting a home.

The service will make the sale of homes among military members easier by listing available, low-interest, assumable loans and expanding the list of homes for rent.

According to Housing Referral Officer Mark McMahan, the concept is not so much a new program as it is an expansion of existing services. In order to aid the HRO in listing as many homes as possible, people reporting to personnel offices for relocation interviews will be asked to fill out a questionnaire about their present housing.

If they plan to sell or rent their homes, they'll be asked to fill out a listing card, which asks the size and price of their

Women's alcohol use on rise

Alcoholism is a growing problem

Alcoholism is a growing problem in the United States for both men and women.

National and community surveys have found women less likely to drink and more temperate in their drinking than men. While women may be less likely to consume large quantities of alcohol than men, there is growing evidence that within the population of women who drink, an

increasing number are developing alcohol related problems.

This may be due to the fact that more and more women are entering the job market where frequent absenteeism and poor job performance may indicate a problem with alcoholism. Just as this is an indicator, the added stress from high pressure jobs may also be a cause for alcoholism among women.

In addition, there is considerable evidence that the presence of life

event stressors (death, divorce, geographic move) are associated with the onset of alcoholism.

For example, through divorce more than nine million women are now sole support for their families — a heavy burden for women who must work full-time, maintain a home, and provide both physical and emotional support to her children. However, it is not just societal pressures that make women in their 30's vulnerable to alcoholism — certain biological

events during the life span of women have been related to excessive drinking.

Due to growing awareness of the problem of alcoholism among women, Headquarters Air Training Command has contracted with Keller and Associates, Consultant Services, to conduct drug/alcohol abuse awareness seminars at all ATC bases. The seminar is scheduled for Reese July 31 at the Base Chapel from See page 6

Injuries more devastating than disease

There seems to be more and more interest of late on preventive medicine. Increasing numbers of people are engaging in exercise, modifying diets, giving up or reducing alcohol and/or tobacco usage, or otherwise changing unhealthy habits. We in the medical profession applaud this change in attitude and the increased emphasis on prevention of disease.

However, there is another area that needs equal attention - prevention of accidents. While preventive medicine places emphasis on avoiding or reducing the incidence of disease, accidental injuries can be just as devastating, and possibly more so.

Under the Air Force Occupational Safety and Health Act, the Air Force has the responsibility to provide a safe work environment for its employees; and I think we have been highly successful in this area. Yet the majority of injuries we see at the hospital occur offduty.

It is interesting to note that at Reese, during the second quarter of calendar year 80, there were a total of 12 reportable accidents, 10 of which occurred off duty. As a result of these accidents, a total of 46 days of duty time were lost and one individual died.

Although the Air Force can encourage safe practices in our off duty endeavors, there is no way in which it can assume responsibility in this area.

For those who think that following standard safety practices such as wear of goggles, seat belts or motorcycle helmets is an individual decision, that you have the right to disregard these practices because it's your life, I ask you to think about this: what about your responsibilities to the Air Force, co-workers and your family?

Lost duty time costs money and poses an added burden on others to do your job while you are recuperating from injuries. If you are seriously injured or killed in an accident who is going to provide for your wife and your children? This is your responsibility. Think about

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POWs/MIAs receive recognition today

(ATCNS)—In the course of our two centuries of existence as a nation, Americans have been called upon many times to fight for freedom around the globe. So deep has been their conviction that freedom is a fundamental prerequisite for full human existence that often they have given their lives not only for their own freedom, but for that of others as well. In the latest such episode-the long-drawn-out, frustrating war in Vietnam-more than 50,000 of our fighting men died in pursuit of that ideal.

And as always happens in war, many others were taken prisoner, or listed as missing in

action (POWs/MIAs). But there was one horrifying difference in this and previous wars: The treatment the North Vietnamese imposed on our people whom they captured. Ignoring every rule drawn up by civilized nations concerning the treatment of prisoners of war, they subjected their captives to physical and mental torture so intense it seems incredible that almost to a man, they refused to "break;" refused to betray their nation or their comrades.

How did they do it? What sustained them? Some mentioned religion, recalling that when they felt they were approaching the point where they could no longer humanly resist, they turned to an Almighty Power for added strength.

Others attributed their successful resistance to a heritage of independence so fierce and deep that it permeates the muscle and soul of every American—a determination to fight coercion to the death, to hang on to freedom, no matter what the cost.

Whatever their reasons, it is beyond our power to properly honor their courage, their fortitude, their integrity. But this July 18, POW/MIA Day, we must at least try to do so. We must do our best to assure them that the superb example set by both those fortunate enough to have made it back home, and those still listed as "missing in action" have not been — and will never be — forgotten.

Sore throats

Hospital offers test for strep throat

Sore throats have plagued mankind from the beginning of time. They are often accompanied by fever and headaches and may cause considerable discomfort.

There are two major causes of a sore throat. The one which is thought of most readily, of course is strep throat. Actually only a very small percentage of sore throats are caused by the streptococcus bacteria. Most people associate a sore throat, pus on the tonsills and fever, with a strep throat. This can be very deceiving. Although these features may be present they are not truly reliable. The strep may be present with only a mildly red throat without pus or fever.

Viral causes for a sore throat are many. A variety of different viruses can result in a throat in one family member or a "cold" in another. They may be asociated with pus on the tonsills and fever. They may even cause swelling of the glands in the neck. Unlike the strep bacteria however, the viruses will not respond to antibiotics. For a viral sore throat, only time and the bodies defense mechanisms will result in a cure. Many local remedies are useful in relieving these discomforts of a viral sore throat. Salt water gargles, honey and lemon mixture, aspirin, throat losenges, all may help the symptoms.

In order to make the distinction between a sore throat requiring time to heal and one requiring antibiotics, a throat culture must be done. To aid families in this Reese Hospital will

do throat cultures on anyone having a sore throat. You do not need an appointment to obtain the throat culture. All that is necessary is for you to obtain your records and go to the appropriate clinic. A record is kept of all throat cultures and anyone with a positive strep is contacted by phone, and told to come and pick up the appropriate medicine.

Hopefully this article will not only help you to understand the reason for obtaining throat cultures but may increase the number of throat cultures we do. This will help to identify these with sore throats caused by strep and treat appropriately, to decrease the transmission of strep from one person to another, and to prevent over treatment which may induce an adverse patient response to a medication.

Article 86 leads June legal actions

Although legal actions at Reese were quite extensive for the month of June, no courtsmartial were heard by the Staff Judge Advocate's office.

Violations of Article 86 of the Uniform Code of Military Justice dominated the list of Article 15s issued with seven people charged with a total of 10 counts. This cost the people involved a total of \$752, 91 days extra duty, 28 days confinement to Reese, three suspended and one enacted reduction in grade.

Among the group of those who violated Article 86, there

were also three counts of violations of Article 92 and one airman basic who willfully disobeyed a lawful order in violation of Article 91.

The heat seems to have touched off some tempers at Reese. One airman was charged with three violations of the UCMJ. In their logical order, the violations were: Article 117, wrongfully using provoking words; Article 134, communicating a threat; and Article 128, assault.

An airman first class, also charged with assault, vented his anger on his wife, an act

which cost him \$116, fourteen days extra duty, 14 days restriction to Reese and a suspended reduction to airman. An airman had his previous suspension in grade vacated when he used provoking words to an airman first class, and forfeited \$75 in the bargain.

Disrespect to an officer and violation of a lawful general regulation cost an airman first class \$50 and 30 days extra duty, while a senior airman who used disrespectful language to a staff sergeant was reduced to airman first class, forfeited

\$200 and received 21 days extra

Possession of marijuana, a violation of Article 134, resulted in an airman first class losing a stripe, forfeiting \$116 and receiving 14 days extra duty and 14 days restriction.

Wrapping up the legal actions in June was the case of an airman, who was on a suspended reduction in grade, losing his stripe when he violated Article 90 by disobeying a lawful command from an officer. This act also cost him \$200.

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Leaders push for dental care

WASHINGTON (AFNS) -Air Force families have the right to prompt, effective dental care. Air Force officials told the House Armed Services Commit-

Brig. Gen. Stanley C. Kolodny, assistant surgeon general for dental services, introduced results of a two-year study which found staggering proportions of oral and dental disease. He cited a portion of the report saying "dental care is an essential part of total health care . . . every person has a right to access to necessary dental

Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force James M. McCoy said, "Various surveys in the military show that health benefits, and that includes dental care, is the area of number one concern . . . for military families.

"It is rather ironic that a dependent can seek health care in the military facility, and under CHAMPUS, for back, foot, leg, head, and mouth problems - but not teeth problems. This policy does not seem to be logical . . . we are people." he continued.

General Kolodny, discussing inadequate care and the high cost of dental care said, "The cost of obtaining the needed services outside the military health care system creates significant hardships . . . An even greater problem exists in many overseas areas where alternative sources of dental care are totally inadequate or non-existant."

CMSAF McCoy said, "Other families are not seeking any dental care, even though needed, because they simply cannot afford it. The plan which has been presented is a step forward . . . Enlisted men and women . . . are very concerned that their dependents are taken care of."

General Kolodny said the American Dental Association estimated more than 70 million Americans are covered by a dental care plan, and predicted more than 99 million by 1985.

The CMSAF said "Our members certainly deserve benefits equal to those employment-related benefits supposed to be concerned with currently provided over 70 the total health care of our million citizens across the

The list of available sales shows the total price, equity, type of loan, monthly payment, type of dwelling, size, distance from base, date of availability, general comments and the seller's name and phone number. Rental listings contain the same information with

emphasis on the monthly payments.

Copies of current listings may be obtained by writing or calling the housing referral office at their new base.

Lt. Gen. Billy M. Minter, deputy chief of staff for logistics and engineering, agreed and


told housing officials here at the Air Force Engineering and Services Center to take "immediate and aggressive action."

Individuals may contact sellers or renters to work out details, but legal offices should be contacted for advice and assistance.

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
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Scholars rewarded

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



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

HEART Program suggests menu

What meal does more to promote heart disease than any other? Breakfast! America's traditional breakfast-fried eggs with hash brown, bacon or pork sausage, butter and jam on toast, and coffee with cream and sugar is loaded with calories, cholesterol, and saturated fats. If you eat a breakfast like this regularly, you can expect abnormally high levels of cholesterol and triglycerides in your bloodstream, and a big risk of heart attack in middle age.

Many favorite breakfast foods are perfectly good for you if they are properly prepared. Griddlecakes, pancakes, waffles, toast, biscuits and muffins are fine if they are made with a liquid vegetable oil or margarine, non-fat milk and if you substitute 2 egg whites for each whole egg in the recipe. Using enriched flour and/or wheat germ adds more vitamins and flavor. Instead of jams and syrups try unsugared applesauce or stewed fruit. Cereals shouldn't be loaded with sugar, like many of the pre-sweetened varieties. Oatmeal or dry cereals with extra wheat germ, served with non-fat milk and fresh fruit will do more good things for your body.

To give your heart a break at the breakfast table, there are some small, but essential changes you can make. First, cut out butterfat and saturated animal fats. Avoid cream and use low-fat milk. If potatoes are served, cook them in vegetable oil or margarine, and substitute lean meat or fish for bacon and sausage. Instead of butter use a soft-tub margarine.

Second, don't rely on sugar to give you quick energy. Sugar gives you calories and visits to the dentist, but little nutritional value. Third, cut down on egg yolks, a prime source of cholesterol. The total number of whole eggs we should eat is 2 to 3 per week. New low-cholesterol egg substitutes can be used as scrambled eggs, in omelettes, or for French toast.

Or try this low-sugar homemade cereal:

HOME-MADE SUGAR-FREE GRANOLA (Serves Four)

1 cup Rolled Oats 1/2 cup Wheat Germ 6 oz. Dried Apple Bits 4 oz. Sliced Almonds 2 oz. Shelled Sunflower Seeds or Shelled Pumpkin Kernels 1/2 tsp. Granulated Sugar Substitute

4 tbsps. Vegetable Oil

TO PREPARE: Mix all ingredients together. Place in a shallow baking pan. Bake 300-350° for one-half hour. Cool and store in airtight container. Serves 4.

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
