

Reese participates in test program

Reese will be one of six Air Training Command Bases to participate in an Air Force test program to evaluate 23 electric vehicles.

The test is part of an effort to conserve energy and combat escalating gasoline fuel prices and will begin upon delivery of the vehicles in early October.

Two types of electric vehicles will be used during the two-year test

program, though only one will be used at Reese. Cushman Model 317 utility vehicles will be tested here while other bases will receive both the utility vehicle and trams. The tram is a 10-passenger carrier that will be used to transport flight line crew members, while the utility or cargo vehicles will be used to support supply, civil engineering, aircraft maintenance and security police functions.

Locally, maintenance will receive two of the three utility vehicles scheduled for testing here, while base supply will use the other.

Other bases scheduled to participate in the program will be Columbus AFB, Miss., with two vehicles; Williams AFB, Ariz., with two; Keesler AFB, Miss., four; Laughlin AFB, Texas, four; Mather AFB, Calif., six; and one

each to Mather and Williams later in November.

According to Col. Homer L. Koop, chief, ATC vehicle management division, the electricians will replace gasoline vehicles on a one-for-one basis. Present vehicle authorizations will not be reduced. Gas vehicles replaced will initially be returned to vehicle operations or assigned to other activities.

Cablevision closer to reality

Residents of Reese Village, airmen dormitories and bachelor officer quarters will soon be visited by a representative of High Plains Cablevision, a sales representative for Lubbock County Cablevision.

These representatives will be selling subscriptions for both Cablevision (\$9.95 per month) and Home Box Office (\$9.95 per month). There will be a one-time installation charge of \$19.95 per unit for these connections.

For those residents who fail to be contacted or for those who move in after the program begins, a toll free number (1-800-692-4455) is provided for their use. The arrangements for installation, monthly billing and cancellation will work much the same as that for the telephone system.

Cablevision will be provided for such common areas as the dormitory day rooms and the Billeting lounge/office area free of charge. Other areas of twenty-four operation will also receive free Cablevision.

Board awards six locals silver leaves

Six Reese majors were among 1,750 who were named for promotion to temporary lieutenant colonel by the Central Temporary Lieutenant Colonel Board which convened at the Air Force Manpower and Personnel Center at Randolph AFB, Texas.

Majors Eugene A. Bardal, George C. Cardea, Robert M. Imle, John P. Lenihan, Peter L. Schill and John D. Vrettos were the local selectees.

Included among the selection were 1,584 line officers, 48 judge advocates, 26 chaplains, 34 nurses, 33 medical service officers and 25 biomedical sciences officers. Of the line officers 1,465 were selected in the primary zone and 119 from the secondary zone. All Reese selectees were from the primary zone.

The board continued the higher 75 percent promotion opportunity established with the 1979 board. This meant the board could select a total number equal to 75 percent of the new eligibles. The board used the full quota.

Overall the board selected 27 percent of the 6,071 primary-zone eligibles. Of the 2,111 line officers eligible for the first time, 1,345 were selected. Eight percent of 8 of those considered the second time and 39 of those considered the third and consequential times, were selected.

Pilots eligible for the first time were selected at a 75 percent rate, 566 of 763, while navigators had a 54 percent rate at 144 of 165. Nonrated officers were selected at a 59 percent rate, 635 of 1,083.

Don't forget chain of command

I would like to address proper use of the chain of command. There was a time in the Air Force when you would not dare to go around your supervisor with a problem. The Air Force recognized that this did not always solve the individual's problem and commanders were encouraged to get more involved and to "open their doors" to all who have problems. This was a step in the right direction and has benefited the Air Force. However, some individuals have taken this literally to mean "skip the chain of command" and go straight to the top. You would be surprised at some of the minor problems that come to me that could have been solved by the individual's immediate supervisor. I usually find that had the supervisor been given a chance, the problem would have been resolved—and a lot quicker.

This should not be interpreted to mean you aren't welcome in my office. If the "chain of command" system doesn't work to your satisfaction, then you should use the "open door policy". Let me assure you that I will be happy to assist any of you with your problems. But I want to know when you get here, that your

immediate supervisor, your first sergeant or your squadron commander are all familiar with your problem, but for some reason couldn't help you solve it.

I am certain that your first sergeant and squadron commander are willing and able to help you—they don't land those jobs by accident! In addition, it is embarrassing for them to hear about your problem from me. They should be involved—but you are responsible for involving them. In the long run, they will save you a great deal of trouble. They know the proper people to deal with, the places to go, who to avoid . . . and they probably can solve your problem on the spot. If they can't solve it, they still need to know so they can assist you along the way. Give your supervisor, first sergeant, or squadron commander the chance to serve you. They have your best interest at heart and I am confident that they will be able to solve the majority of your problems.

Again—don't hesitate to use my office, the IG's, etc—"if" you have given your chain of command a shot at it. I believe that you will find that 99% of the time your problem can be solved in your own organization by the people who are closest to you.

One more time

My complaint concerns the segregation of the Officers and Enlisted Pools. The problem has been aired before, but I feel the answer did not properly address the problem. It seems to me the last response was inadequate in that it mentioned the decision had not been made by higher headquarters to return to consolidated pools, when it appears the base commander can do this. I have contacted Morale, Welfare and Recreation and was informed that a message came down from Air Force authorizing segregation of pools when there were two pools, with the concurrence of the base commanding officer. Evidently this concurrence has been given. Also, one reason given was that it was too much of a hassle for the flight crews without a segregated swimming pool. Well, I am not in agreement with that. Don't you think there have to be ground crews working anytime there are pilots flying. They need a place to relax, too. Further, in every decision the Supreme Court has

made concerning this type of thing, they have not allowed segregation of pools. And this is definitely segregation.

Air Force and the Air Training Command have emphasized designated pools when such pools are adjacent or in close proximity to clubs and quarters. The officers' pool is used for survival training for those needing this training. It is also used for scuba classes, which are open to everyone. Designated pools tend to balance participation and thereby best serve all personnel.

Spurred on

I have observed on several different occasions a problem that I feel is a definite driving hazard. It concerns traffic entering Reese via 4th Street (FM 2255). Just this morning, I counted four automobiles cut across traffic and into the parking lot of the Credit Union. They go across

the parking lot, then out onto the 19th Street spur (Spur 309). Many times, they don't even stop before entering the highway of the spur, and I feel this is a dangerous practice. I feel this should be brought to the attention of base drivers. Perhaps some one way signs could be installed, or even signs restricting traffic from doing this.

Drivers that cut through the Credit Union parking lot to avoid the traffic backed up on 4th Street are breaking the law. Unfortunately this property is not under the jurisdiction of Reese AFB, it is under the jurisdiction of the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS). The Traffic Safety office contacted DPS and they agreed to patrol this area when their manning and priorities allowed. The Credit Union and Reese AFB are looking into other avenues for resolving this problem. However, we all know the real solution is for all drivers to obey the law.

'Good bargains' may be deceptive

Editor's note: The following article is the second in a series of consumer information articles submitted by SrA Beth DeGrace of the Comptroller Division. It deals with "bargain" plans that may not be as attractive as they sound.

Food and freezer plans

Under this scheme, the usual technique is to provide you with a bargain price on a large quantity of meat provided you buy a freezer to store it. The simple gimmick is that the price on the freezer is unreasonably high. As a package, the freezer and meat combined are a very bad bargain.

Referral plans

These schemes involve the sale of merchandise to you with a promise that, if you will provide names of other potential buyers, you will be given a cash rebate for each of the people you name provided they also purchase the product. In reality none of the people you name are likely to be contacted, and if they are, you will never see the promised rebate.

Other tricks

Other areas where deceptive schemes are common are limited only by the ingenuity of those who devise them. You would do well to

pay careful attention to the transaction if it involves Health Club Programs, Trade or Correspondence Schools, Franchise Sales, Vacation Property Sales, Animal Raising Programs, Home Improvements or Repairs, or Mobile Home Purchase. If you are uncertain about the wisdom of entering into transactions involving any of these areas, stop short of signing the contract and seek legal assistance.

Door-to-door sales

Under Federal law, you have three business days after a door-to-door sale in which to cancel the purchase if the price is \$25 or more.

For help

The principle agencies that receive consumer complaints in this area are the Consumer Protection Division of the Texas Attorney General's Office, and the local office of the Better Business Bureau.

A branch of the Texas Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division is located in Lubbock. Normally, upon receipt of a complaint on a form they provide, a copy of the complaint is sent to the company involved. This procedure, by itself, frequently results in a resolution of the complaint.

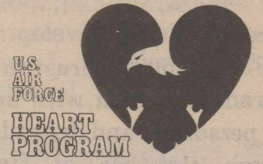
Those interested may bring their own ingredients to prepare at the picnic, following the cooking cooking demonstration and sampling, here's what to pack:

Do You Know Your Credit Rights?



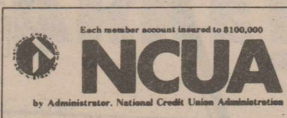
You have the Right to:

- Receive credit in your own name if you meet the creditor's standards.
- Use a co-signer who is someone other than your spouse, if one is needed.
- Refuse to answer questions about your plans for having or raising children.
- Keep your own accounts after marriage, divorce, or widowhood as long as you meet the creditor's criteria.
- Have public assistance, alimony, pension, and child support considered as any other income.
- Know the specific reason your application for credit was turned down.
- Present information to the creditor which shows that your spouse's credit rating, if it is bad, doesn't reflect your willingness or ability to pay.
- Have a record at the credit bureau in your own name for accounts you share with your spouse.
- Know what information the credit bureau has in your credit file.
- Demand that any incorrect information in your file be changed.
- Have your side of the story placed in your credit bureau file if unfavorable information cannot be eliminated.

Reese plans Women's Health Week

In recent years the Air Force has been putting increasing emphasis on preventive health care, taking care of yourself before problems develop. The Air Force's main thrust in this program has been with active duty personnel and dependants through the use of Health Education programs.

Unfortunately, due to limited resources and time constraints, the hospital cannot perform routine physical exams on an on-going basis for dependants.

During October and November the hospital will be offering special clinics to all dependant and retired women over 18 years of age, the change to receive a physical exam. Starting Oct. 1, interested women are asked to call 885-4571, Ext. 217 for information and scheduling of appointments. The first

appointment is necessary to carry out required studies and a medical history prior to the physical appointment. This will also make it possible to determine the number of patients that can be expected. There are limited spaces available.

The physical exam will consist of chest x-ray, pap smear and EKG if needed. Also, eye exam, lab tests and doctors examination. There will also be a series of health related

seminars offered on a limited capacity basis.

Volunteers are needed to help during this Women's Health Program. If you have a few hours that you can spare to make these clinics a success, call Capt. Roger Emmick at 885-4571 Ext. 282. 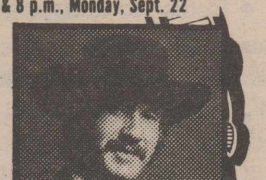

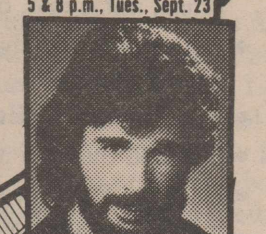

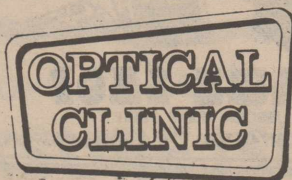

Academic Training Awards went to 2nd Lt. Michael A. Fountain and 2nd Lt. Steven C. Williams while the Section I

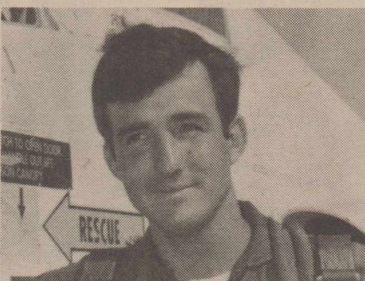
Leadership Award was won by Capt. Tim E. Troyer.

Reese volunteers bolster Lubbock youth program

The spirit of the "Air Force family" is extending into the Lubbock community, thanks to the efforts of 10 bluesuiters actively participating in Big Brothers and Big Sisters.

According to Danny McWhorter, executive director of Big Brothers and Big Sisters in Lubbock, the 10 Reese volunteers are among the nearly 200 men and women in the area that are helping children make it through potentially traumatic times in their lives.

But more help is needed.

McWhorter says that at least 100 more volunteers are needed immediately to serve as Big Brothers and Big Sisters for children waiting anxiously for someone to help fill a void caused by living in a single-parent household.

"We (Big Brothers and Big Sisters) estimate that there are approximately 2,000 children in Lubbock that need our help. As more qualified volunteers come into the program we think that more of these children will want to join, too."

To qualify as a Big Brother or Big Sister, applicants must be at least 18-years-old, have access to a car and be able to commit themselves to the program for one year.

"Volunteers must be committed to the program" said McWhorter. "If we match a Big Brother or Big Sister with a child and then the volunteer drops out after only a couple of months it does more harm than good. Stability is one of the main goals of our program."

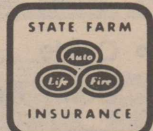

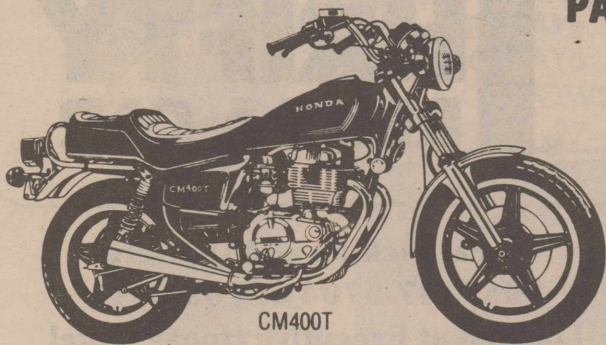

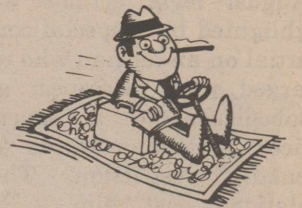

Court-martial heads August legal actions

August legal actions were highlighted by a special court-martial on an airman who was charged with disrespect and disobedience to a superior officer, provoking words and breaking restriction. These violations cost him a bad conduct discharge, confinement at hard labor for six months, forfeiture of \$299 per month and reduction in grade to airman basic.

Article 86 was a common violation, as always. Four persons were charged with a total of seven counts of failure to go. These people received between them three suspended reductions in grade, \$1,264 in

forfeitures, and 30 days extra duty.

A technical sergeant, one of those charged with Article 86, was also tabbed for violations of Article 92 and 107.

Fourteen days extra duty and fourteen days restriction, along with a suspended reduction in grade and a suspended forfeiture of pay were given to an airman for willfully disobeying a lawful order.

Disrespect to a superior commissioned officer cost an airman his stripe and 30 days extra duty, in addition to a suspended forfeiture of \$200.

An airman first class and a staff sergeant were both

charged with dereliction of duty. The airman received a suspended reduction in grade, forfeiture of \$300 and 30 days extra duty. The staff sergeant, who was also charged with willfully disobeying a lawful order, was reduced to sergeant and ordered to forfeit \$300.

Intent to deceive, a violation of Article 107, resulted in a sergeant getting 14 days extra duty, a suspended reduction to airman first class and a suspended forfeiture of pay.

Finally, an airman basic charged with a violation of Article 121, wrongfully appropriating, got 21 days extra duty and 21 days confinement to base.

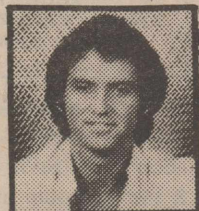

CHAMPUS plans claim form change

Several changes are planned in CHAMPUS claim forms and filing procedures that are designed to improve accuracy in initial claims submission, thus reducing the number of claims that have to be returned.

Revised versions of forms used by the American Medical Association and the American Hospital Association will be used when the provider of medical services fills out and submits the claim. These forms, already widely used by the medical professions will be used for other government programs as well as CHAMPUS and are expected to greatly simplify

claim filing procedures for physicians and hospitals.

When a beneficiary submits the claim, one form, a revised version of CHAMPUS Form 500, will be used for all CHAMPUS claims—for services of both individual and institutional providers and for benefits under the CHAMPUS Program for the Handicapped. The form requires completion of only eligibility information and the attachment of the provider's itemized bill.

CHAMPUS officials say the changes will be phased in over a period beginning October 1, 1980, when the new claim forms are expected to be available.

Re-enlistment bonus possibilities expand

Re-enlistees have a better opportunity to collect a selective re-enlistment bonus with more than 30 specialties added to the bonus skill lists and expansion of some eligibility rules. The new skills list is effective Oct. 1, Air Force Manpower and Personnel Center Officials announced.

In the Zone A list of first-term re-enlistees, 17 skills have been added to the list, while seven skills were lowered and five dropped. Zone A bonuses apply to those re-enlisting on or before six years of service.

Airmen with six to 10 years of service who qualify for a Zone B bonus fared even better. Fifteen skills were added to the list, two were dropped and none lowered. In addition, all shredouts for the 208X0 Voice Processing specialty now have a Selective Re-enlistment Bonus in both zones.

Expansion of some eligibility rules will allow more airmen to collect a bonus.

Now, first-term airmen within 12 months of their original separation date whose career field bonus is being dropped or lowered can still

receive the original Zone A bonus if they request a career job reservation and re-enlist in their same specialty before Oct. 1. In the past, only airmen who held a valid career job reservation at the time of the announced changes in selective re-enlistment bonuses could collect the bonus being lowered or dropped. A similar situation exists for airmen eligible for Zone B bonuses. Another group of airmen who can take advantage of the changes are those whose current enlistment will expire after their six- or 10-year point of service (the time limit for Zone A and B bonuses, respectively), but who have not yet reached the sixth or 10th anniversary. They may now be eligible for a Selective Re-enlistment Bonus provided they are otherwise eligible and re-enlist on or before their sixth or 10th year.

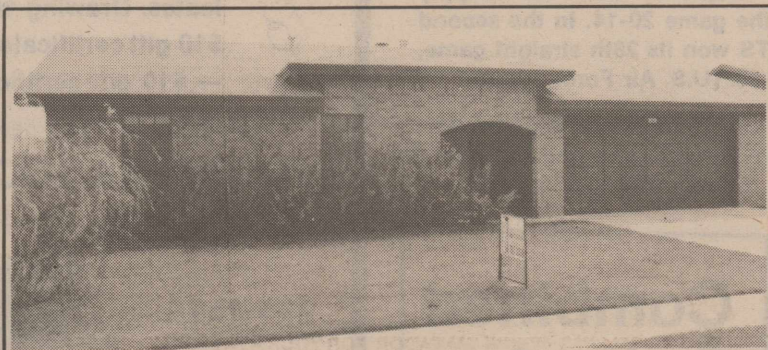

Since a great many people were ineligible to be included in last week's question concerning the GI Bill, we decided to give them equal time.

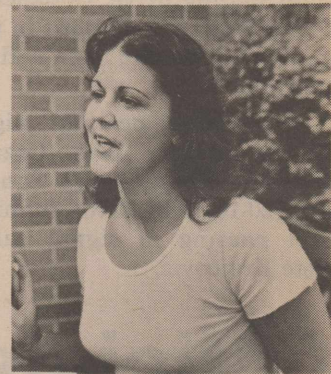
The question this week, "Are you participating in the Veterans' Educational Assistance Program" received largely negative answers. Many considered the investment too large for their slim salaries, others simply had no desire to attend college. But a great many who were not participating, and those not participating apparently form a vast majority, gave very general reasons like, "I haven't got the time," "I just haven't signed up yet," and so forth.

Education is still one of the strongest benefits the military offers. Putting up one dollar for every two provided by the government may not be as good a deal as the old GI Bill, but it is certainly better than paying 100 percent yourself. Re-examine the educational benefits, including VEAP and tuition assistance, before abandoning higher education as a dream too expensive for an airman's budget.



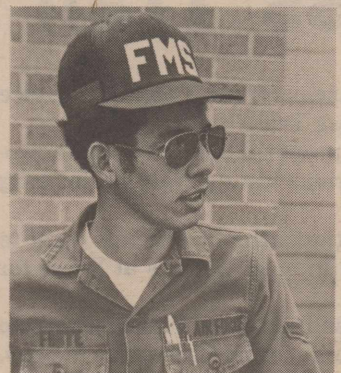

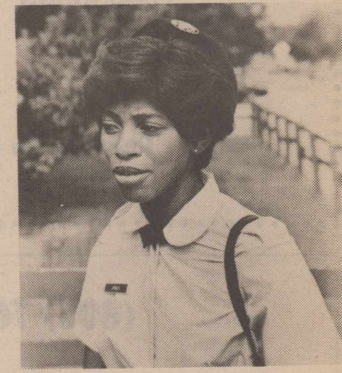

I'm not participating right now, but I intend to. I just don't have the money to put up now.



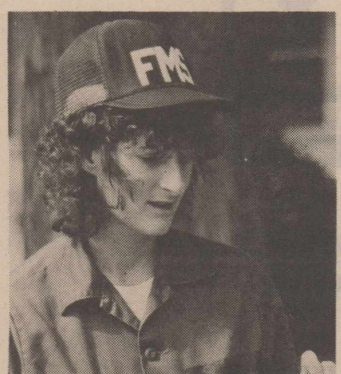
