Guests will not be limited but must be accompanied by an active duty military sponsor. Retired personnel are welcome. No advance approval or reservation is required.

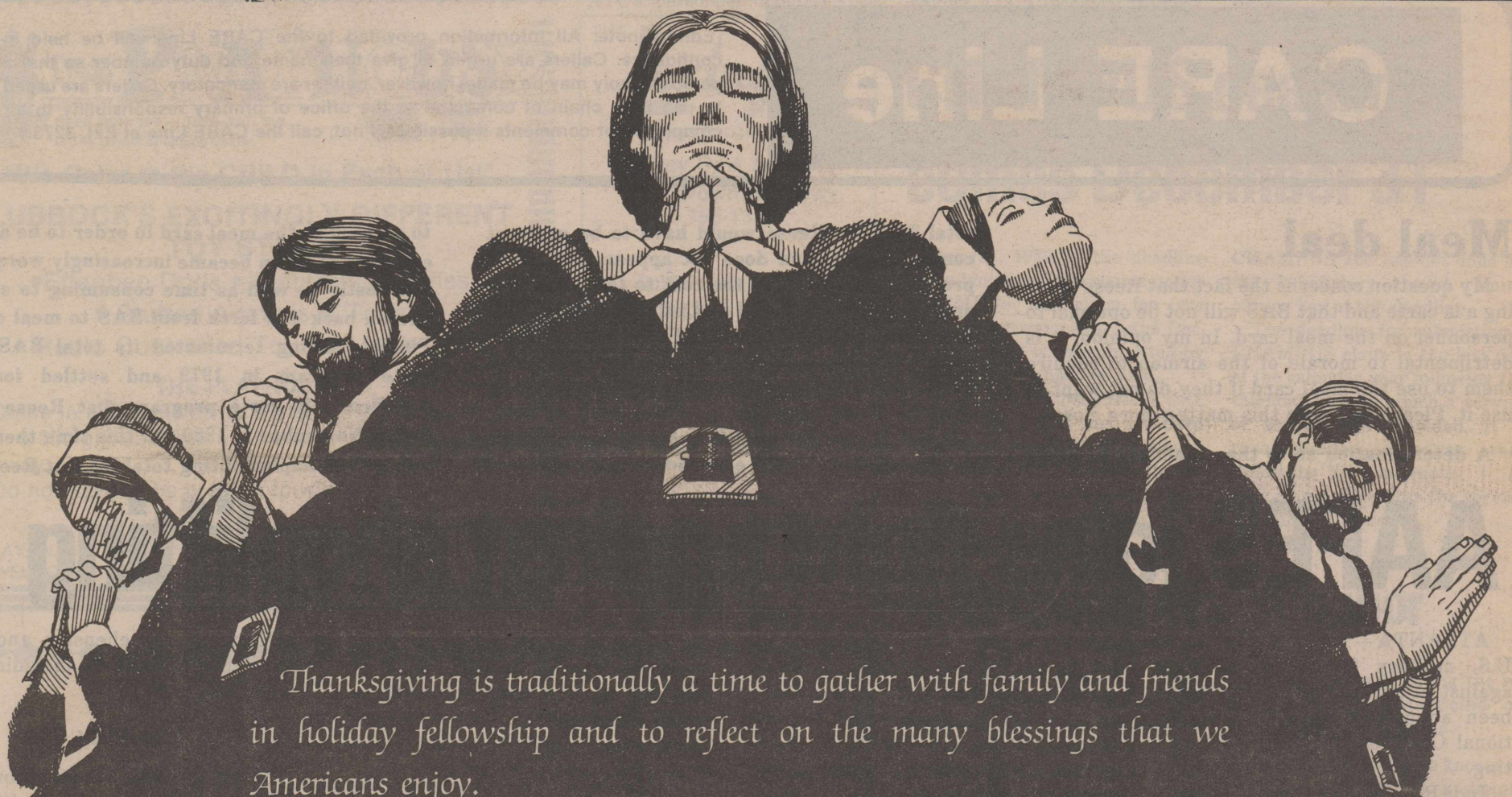

It doesn't have to be. Thanksgiving, 1980, should be a year when we pause to give our

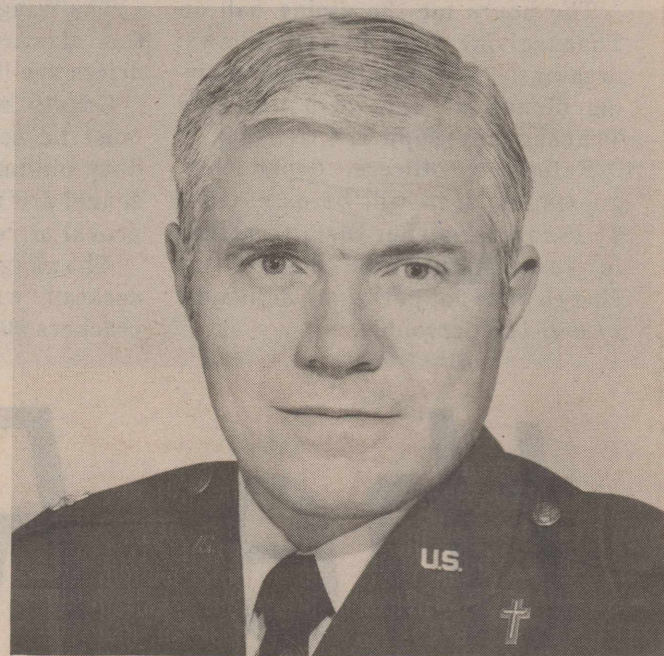
thanks to God just as the early pilgrims did when they gathered together. We have not only survived, but most of us live exceedingly well when compared to other people around the world.

Meal deal

My question concerns the fact that Reese is going a la carte and that BAS will not be optional to personnel on the meal card. In my opinion, it is detrimental to morale of the airmen to require them to use the meal card if they do not want to use it. Please look into this matter more closely.

A determination as to the possibility of going

total BAS for Reese would have to be made at command level and does not appear to be very promising considering the cost to the Air Force and the lessons learned at Loring AFB where it was tried. In 1975, Loring AFB ME instituted a total a la carte feeding program, which included BAS for all military personnel. Their program worked fairly well for a while until a large number of younger airmen began to have trouble managing their money each month and requested

to go back to the meal card in order to be able to eat. This problem became increasingly worse and was costly as well as time consuming to switch airmen back and forth from BAS to meal cards. Finally, Loring terminated its total BAS a la carte program in 1979 and settled for the modified a la carte program that Reese AFB began November 1, 1980. At this time there are no plans of implementing total BAS at Reese.

AAFES joins fight against shoplifting

ATLANTA—The enlistment of U.S. military forces in the fight against America's no. 1 crime has been announced here by the National Coalition to Prevent Shoplifting.

Judi Rogers, director of the coalition, said that major commands of the U.S. Army and Air Force will be "authorized and encouraged" to develop and carry out antishoplifting programs on military installations worldwide in cooperation with the Army and Air Force Exchange Service, operators of installation retail, food, automotive and services facilities for military personnel and dependents, the campaign will be conducted from Dec. 1 through 20.

Military participation

She said military participation in the coalition's work will also extend to cooperation with volunteer organizations in the civilian community.

The services routinely conduct crime prevention programs of various types throughout the year, placing special emphasis on shoplifting during the year-end holiday shopping season.

Noting that the National Coalition

to Prevent Shoplifting has estimated that shoplifting losses in the U.S. amount to \$16 billion a year, an AAFES spokesman said it is obvious that the share of that loss experienced by military retail operations is substantial enough to warrant a preventive program.

Maj. Gen. Duane H. Stubbs, commander of the Army and Air Force Exchange Service, said that for the 12-month period ending Jan. 25, 1980, a total of 10,724 shoplifting incidents resulting in the apprehension and detention of offenders were reported worldwide.

"Of these incidents," he continued, "39 percent involved Army or Air Force active duty personnel, 53 percent involved military dependents and civilians, and the remaining 8 percent were equally divided between personnel and dependents of other services and retired military personnel."

He said the incidents reported involved merchandise with a value of approximately \$147,000 of which all but \$7,000 was recovered.

Largely undetected

Stubbs pointed out that both the report of shoplifting incidents and

the value of merchandise involved must be viewed in the light of research by the national coalition which indicated that in the civilian community, roughly 75 percent of all shoplifting goes undetected.

The shoplifting prevention programs will include:

Displays in lobbies of main exchange stores.

Posters and signs in other Exchange-operated facilities, such as service stations and food facilities.

The distribution of national coalition pamphlets directed to students and parents.

Participation in the shoplifting prevention programs of local civilian organizations, such as retail associations, chambers of commerce, women's clubs, high school and junior college distributive education clubs.

Special programs for on-installation schools and clubs, publicity and advertising materials for installation media.

The continuing support of actions and policies that will improve

methods of apprehension and prosecution of shoplifters, including the publicizing.

Publicity

During this year's holiday buying season, AAFES is joining with the Departments of the Army and the Air Force in their shoplifting prevention campaign to publicize the crime of shoplifting. Exchange patrons will see publicity materials developed by the National Coalition to Prevent Shoplifting appearing in store lobbies and other gathering places on posts and bases. The materials will explain the serious consequences of shoplifting in terms of loss of rank, pay and Exchange privileges, and disqualification for certain civilian careers.

\$16 billion loss

Special emphasis will be placed on the effect shoplifting has on military Morale, Welfare and Recreation activities, since Exchange earnings help pay for these. The more shoplifting, the less money AAFES will have to turn over for support of athletic facilities, craft shops, special entertainment and other "quality of life" activities.

DCM departs Reese

Col. John Rushfeldt, deputy commander for maintenance at Reese, will depart in December to become the new assistant director of maintenance, San Antonio Air Logistics Center, Kelly AFB, Texas. This is one of several senior officer changes announced recently by Gen. B.L. Davis, commander, Air Training Command.

No replacement for Colonel Rushfeldt has been announced at this time. Lt. Col. Tommy L. Richardson, assistant DCM, will fill the position until a successor is named.

Col. Donald Metz, assistant deputy chief of staff for personnel at Headquarters ATC, will become the deputy chief of staff for personnel, replacing Col. David Thomson, who is retiring.

Metz will be replaced by Col. Morton Jacobs, presently serving as the director of assignments at ATC's personnel depute. Col.

Robert Valentine will move from the Air Force Manpower and Personnel Center to become the new director of assignments.

Col. Herman McDonald, ATC deputy inspector general, will become the new director of readiness in ATC's plans depute, replacing Col. Tom Stewart Jr., who is retiring.

The new deputy commander for resource management for the 47th Flying Training Wing, Laughlin AFB, Texas, will be Col. Darrel Burris. He will arrive in January from Shaw AFB, S.C., to replace Col. Donald Robillard, who is retiring.

Moving into the command from an assignment at Patrick AFB, Fla., will be Col. Clarence Blocker, who will become the director of the comm-electronics project office at Keesler AFB, Miss.

Col. Danilo Medigovich will be leaving ATC's technical training

depute next summer to serve as the commandant of the Inter-American Air Force Academy at Albrook AFS, Panama.

The Air Force Recruiting Service's new director of advertising and publicity will be Col. Alan Shoemaker, who is arriving in January from an assignment as chief of the Air Force public affairs office in New York.

Col. Walter Hines III, director of education plans in ATC's education depute, will become the new director of Latin American military affairs at Headquarters Southern Command, Quarry Heights, Panama.

Gen. Davis also announced the retirements of Col. Nicholas G. Milanovich, vice commander, USAF Recruiting Service, and Col. Roger C. Williamson, director of data automation in ATC's comptroller depute, in December and January, respectively.

CHAMPUS deadline comes December 31

Dec. 31, 1980, is the deadline for submitting 1979 claims under CHAMPUS. Any claim for care received between Jan. 1 and Dec. 31, 1979, that is not submitted by the deadline cannot be paid.

A CHAMPUS beneficiary with a 1979 claim that has not been submitted should mail it as soon as possible. Also, if a civilian doctor or other provider agreed to submit a 1979 claim directly to

CHAMPUS and has not done so, the beneficiary should remind him or her of the deadline.

The deadline for submitting a CHAMPUS claim is the last day of the calendar year following the calendar year in which a service or supply was provided. It is recommended, however, that claims be filed promptly — as soon as possible after the service or supply is provided.

FDA condemns camphor

An expert advisory panel recently recommended that the Food and Drug Administration remove camphorated oil from the over-the-counter market because the little-used liniment is too often taken for castor oil, with poisonous results.

Camphorated oil is a highly toxic central nervous system stimulant. When swallowed, it can produce nausea, mental confusion, hallucinations, and convulsions. As little as two teaspoons can be fatal to an adult.

In a report released today by the Food and Drug Administration, the panel said, "The dangers of poisoning associated with the use of camphorated oil far outweigh the minimal therapeutic value of this product." The panel

found no data supporting the effectiveness of camphorated oil when applied to the skin.

Camphorated oil, also known as camphor liniment, is a simple solution of 20 percent camphor in cottonseed oil applied externally to treat inflammatory conditions such as sprains, bruises, and rheumatism. It is an old product mentioned in the first edition of *The United States Pharmacopeia*, in 1820.

Noting that the product has fallen into disuse in recent years, the panel recommended it be removed from the market because of reports of its being accidentally confused with castor oil, an effective laxative often used prior to childbirth, and with cod liver oil and cough medicine.

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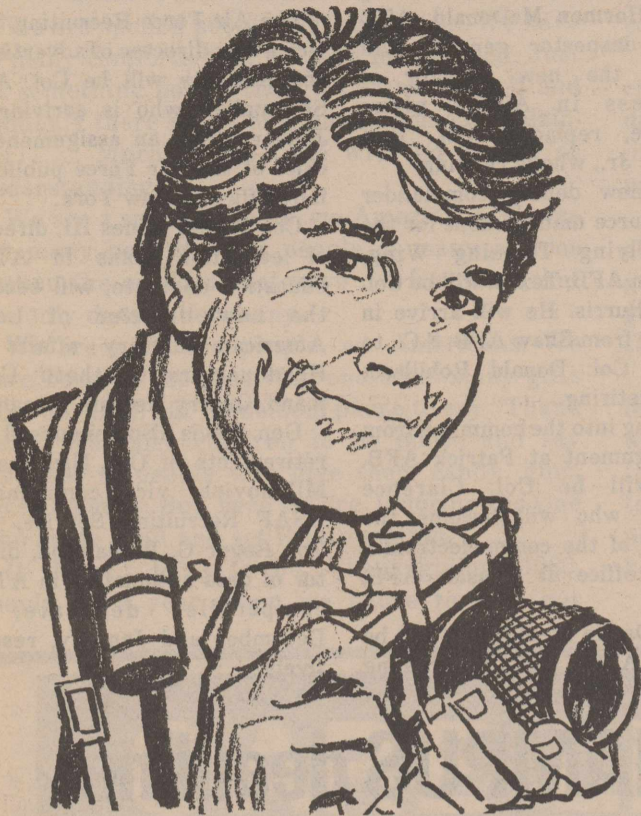
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Reese photographers net command honors

Winning entries from Reese and other ATC bases will represent the command in the 1980 Air Force Photography Contest scheduled for Nov. 18 at Peterson AFB, Colo.

If ATC entries win there, they will be entered in the 18th Interservice Photography Contest at Fort Meade, Md., in early December. Held every two years, the interservice contest will include first, second and third place winning entries from the 1979 and 1980 Air Force Photography Contest.

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ER tech plays doctor

SrA Gary Morgan West, medical technician at Reese, had one of those days recently.

Airman West, who was on his first duty day as a technician in the emergency room, received a call from a frantic father-to-be in base housing at 6 a.m. Nov. 10.

Airman West, who worked in the obstetrics Ward for one-and-a-half years at Offutt AFB, Nebo, then transferred to the OB Ward at Reese for one year, had never delivered a baby before. This day, though, West had started his duty in ER with babies as the last thing on his mind.

Airman West, along with Amn. Rob Duncan, rushed to base hous-

ing in an ambulance thinking all would be well, just pick up the mother and return her to the delivery room. Not so, according to West, laughing now about the experience.

But it wasn't a laughing matter when the mother began going into labor as the stretcher was being placed in the ambulance.

West and the father-to-be, 1st Lt. Andrew P. Tawney, jumped into the back of the ambulance to begin a ride they wouldn't soon forget. First, as they tried to shut the side door, it jammed, then the stretcher didn't lock into place. But the height of the calamity was when Lieutenant Tawney

had to use a dim flashlight to shed light on West's first experience delivering a baby. Being unfamiliar with the ambulance, they couldn't find the light.

With dim light, the stretcher swaying with each turn and the wind blowing in from the jammed side door, Airman Duncan called the OB Ward to announce "parents and son doing fine, be there soon."

West said he was shaking more than the father, as mother and child were taken in.

West sums his experience up saying, "Out of three years working OB, never delivering a baby, it only took me one night in ER to make up for it..."

AF authorizes house hunting

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (AFNS)—Service members selected for an unaccompanied overseas tour and accompanied tour where the waiting list for on-base housing is more than 20 weeks are allowed seven days' permissive temporary duty to locate off-base housing for their family members.

This is an expansion of a program started in August to allow service members seven days permissive TDY to travel to their new duty location, arrange for housing and then return to their old duty station. The permissive TDY is at the service member's expense.

Individuals selected for unaccompanied tours will be able to visit the area where they want to resettle their families to secure housing. The service member's family will then be able to move there for the duration of the new tour.

Service members entitled to take family members to their new overseas duty stations, but who will have to wait more than 20 weeks for on-base housing, may relocate their families at government expense in the interim.

"For example, an individual at Randolph AFB, Texas, may get orders to Alconbury, England, where the housing wait could be more than 20 weeks," explains Mrs. Jackie Norman, chief, leave and entitlements section, Air Force Manpower and Personnel Center, here.

"The member may then decide to resettle the family in Memphis, Tenn., at government expense,

while waiting for housing in England. That individual is allowed seven days permissive TDY prior to PCS to find a house in Memphis. However, if the permissive TDY is used as outlined, additional permissive TDY will not be given in conjunction with that particular PCS."

Permissive temporary duty to house hunt is also permitted:

- When returning to a stateside base from overseas.
- When assigned from one overseas duty station to another.
- If the service member is assigned overseas from a stateside base and elects to find interim family housing near the new duty location.
- When single service members authorized to live off-base know they will do so before leaving the old duty station.

The regulation governing permissive temporary duty use of space-available Military Airlift Command flights has been changed, according to officials here. MAC flights can now be used, on a space-available basis, while on permissive TDY House-hunting trips. They also said on-base temporary living quarters may be used while house hunting in the area of the new duty station on a space-available basis.

Also, those going PCS to a base in close proximity to their old duty station are not authorized permissive TDY to hunt for a house.

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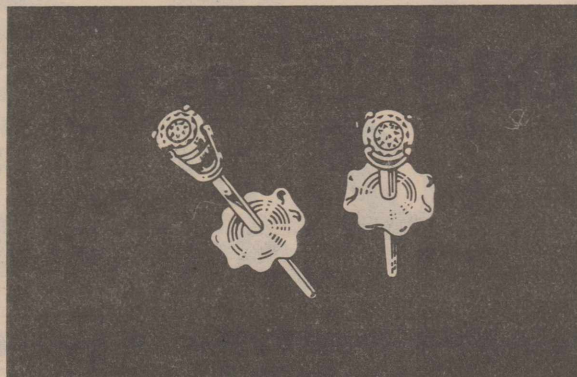

Chief offers encouragement

HICKAM AFB, Hawaii (AFNS) — "Things are finally looking up for military people and I believe they will continue to do so," CMSAF James M. McCoy said of the recent pay and benefits hikes.

Speaking before a gathering of Pacific Air Forces enlisted service members here, Chief Master Sergeant McCoy talked of pay, retention, dedication and professional military education.

"I think people are beginning to again feel they are recognized and appreciated," the chief master sergeant of the Air Force said. "They think we've made some positive steps in the right direction. And, you know, I think they're right."

Still, he said, there is much to do to achieve pay parity with

civilian counterparts. But he said he believes most people realize pay problems won't be cured overnight.

"I'm encouraged that all the hard work by our Air Force leaders is finally paying off," he said.

"A number of first termers extended their enlistments while all this legislation was working — sort of a 'wait-and-see' attitude, Chief Master Sergeant McCoy said. "Now, they are starting to re-enlist," he said. "I interpret this as satisfaction with our leaders' efforts and trust that these efforts will continue."

The chief master sergeant of the Air Force said "military service is once again gaining credibility. People realize that we

are needed and that we do contribute to our nation."

The Air Force is a 24-hour-a-day job and work must continue until the mission is accomplished, he told his audience.

"I know it's flag waving," he said, "but a little flag waving is needed sometimes. We have to believe in what we are and what we do. You have to have pride in yourself and your country."

On professional military education, Chief Master Sergeant McCoy said it is a good system, with areas that can be improved. "But, by and large, the system works," he said. "PME teaches about the Air Force, and shows people how they can better fit in. I think it makes them better leaders. The Air Force of tomorrow should be better for it."

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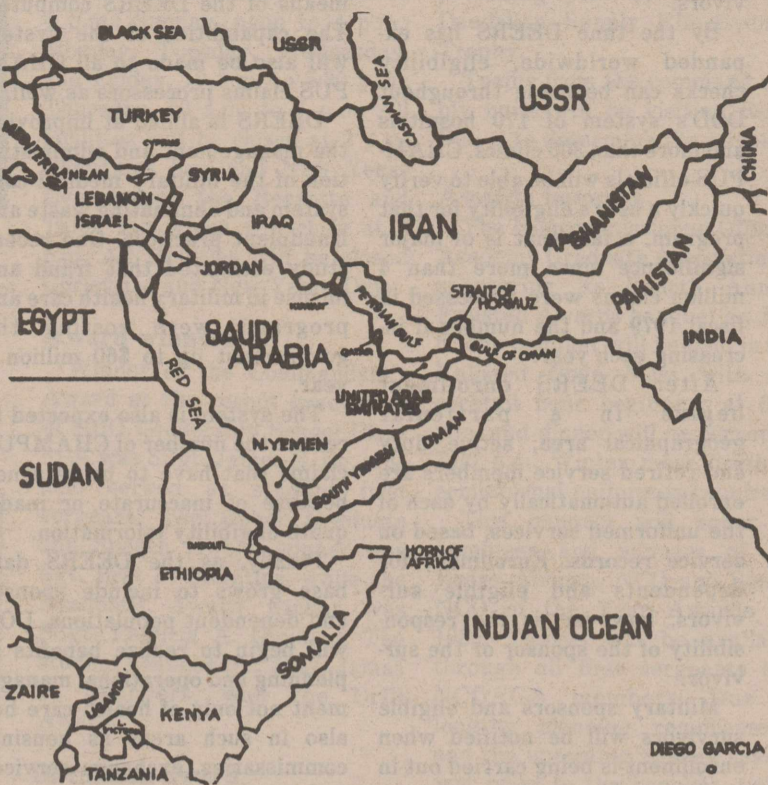
Middle East affects U.S. national security

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said Secretary Christopher, "is to prevent this conflict from spreading. Our aim is to assure, in cooperation with others, that it does not disrupt the peace of the region or the economy of the world."

He summarized in these words our intentions with respect to the Persian Gulf conflict:

First, the United States is neutral in the conflict between Iran and Iraq. We will not intervene on either side.

Second, we expect the Soviet Union to act with restraint.

Third, neutrality in this conflict does not mean American indifference. We will defend our vital interests in the Persian Gulf region. Specifically:

—There must be no interference with free transit in the Strait of Hormuz and the Persian Gulf. We will do what is required to prevent such interference.

—To prevent the conflict from expanding in ways which threaten the security of the region, we will also respond to requests for assistance from non-belligerent friends in the area who feel threatened by the conflict.

Fourth, there must be an early end to the conflict. No one stands to gain from its continuation. We will support the efforts of international institutions to bring about a peaceful settlement.

WASHINGTON (AFNS)—While the attention of most Americans has been on the elections and the hostages, actions of vast importance to our national security have been taking place in the Middle East.

Just what is the United States' policy on the conflict in the Persian Gulf region — the war between Iran and Iraq?

Warren Christopher, deputy secretary of State, recently told newspaper editors the United States has two broad objectives. "The first is peace. The U.S. Has firmly supported the effort of international institutions to move the dispute from the battlefield to the peace table as quickly as that can be done."

The second broad objective,

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DEERS enrollment approaches

Reese and most Air Training Command bases will soon join other Department of Defense installations in signing up eligible health care beneficiaries in the new Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System.

DEERS will be used to verify who is entitled to direct health care at all military and Public Health Service hospitals and clinics. It will also be used to verify eligibility for CHAMPUS benefits. Local enrollment is expected during June-September, 1981.

Mather AFB, Calif., was the first ATC base to complete DEERS enrollment. A three-month enrollment program, involving the combined efforts of base medical, personnel and public affairs people, was completed at Mather Oct. 31. Keesler AFB, Miss., is now in the middle of its DEERS enrollment program, and it is expected to be completed by Dec. 31.

Because DEERS enrollment is being phased in at different geographical areas in the United States at different times, other ATC bases could wait as long as May 1982 to be integrated into the DEERS system.

DOD officials emphasize that DEERS is a mandatory enrollment program which ultimately will affect about 9 million people—active duty and retired service members and their dependents and eligible survivors.

By the time DEERS has expanded worldwide, eligibility checks can be made throughout DOD's system of 170 hospitals and more than 300 clinics. CHAMPUS officials will be able to verify quickly a user's eligibility for that program, a fact that is of major significance since more than 4 million claims were processed in fiscal 1979 and the number is increasing each year.

After DEERS enrollment begins in a particular geographical area, active duty and retired service members are enrolled automatically by each of the uniformed services, based on service records. Enrollment for dependents and eligible survivors, however, is the responsibility of the sponsor or the survivor.

Military sponsors and eligible survivors will be notified when enrollment is being carried out in their area. At that time everyone

is urged to cooperate fully and readily with the enrollment effort.

As enrollment is completed in a given area, a person's eligibility for medical benefits in the direct care system will be verified by means of the DEERS computer. The capabilities of the system will also be made to all CHAMPUS claims processors as well.

DEERS is aimed at improving the management and administration of the military medical care system and eliminating waste and fraudulent practices. One recent study estimated that fraud and misuse in military health care and programs were costing the government up to \$60 million a year.

The system is also expected to reduce the number of CHAMPUS claims that have to be returned because of inaccurate or inadequate eligibility information.

Finally, as the DEERS data base grows to include sponsor and dependent populations, DOD will begin to realize benefits in planning and operational management not only of health care but also in such areas as housing, commissaries, exchange services and dependent schools.

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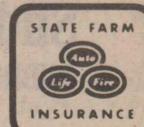

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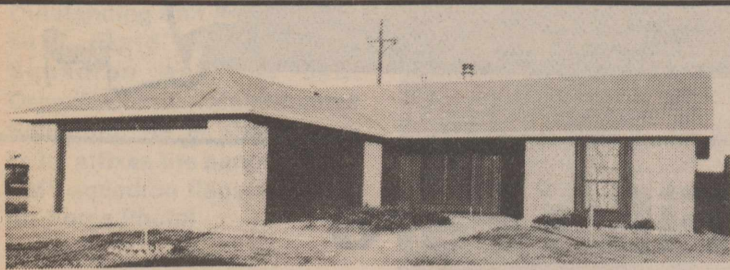
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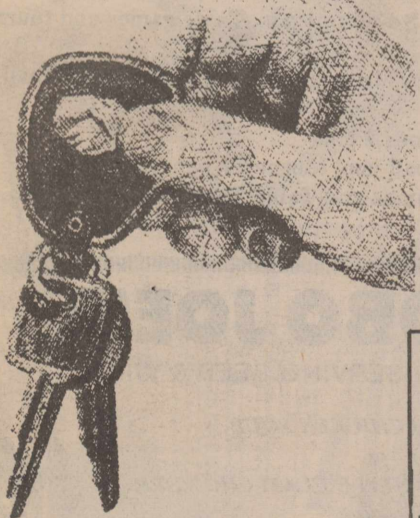
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Street Talk

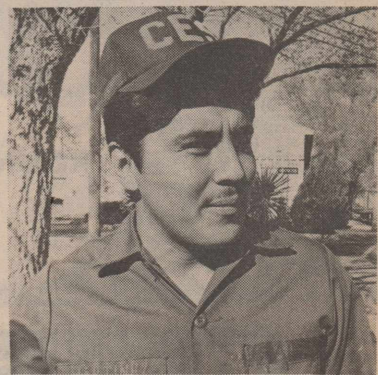

I enjoy it. I paid a lot less and still got what I wanted to eat. I don't feel like I have to eat as much to get my money's worth.



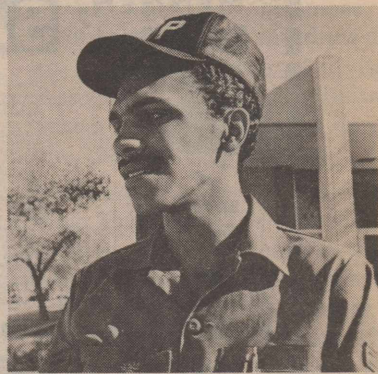

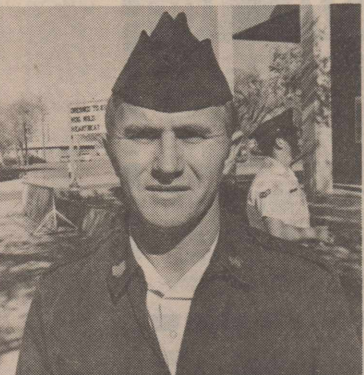

Leftover bird fills recipes

The holiday is over, but there may still be half a turkey sitting in your refrigerator. Here are some interesting and delicious leftover recipes, varied enough so that you'll forget you're eating turkey twice.

TURKEY SALAD

1 cup cooked turkey, large diced
 1/4 cup finely diced celery
 1/4 cup mayonnaise
 Juice of 1/2 fresh lemon
 Freshly ground pepper

TO PREPARE: Mix ingredients together and chill.

TURKEY FRICASSE

(serves four)

2 cups of large-diced turkey
 2 tbsp. flour
 2 cups hot chicken (or turkey) stock
 1/2 cup onion, diced
 1/2 cup celery, diced
 1/4 cup skim milk

TO PREPARE: Saute onion and celery in margarine until onion is translucent. Add the flour and continue cooking for 1 minute. Then add stock a little bit at a time, stirring constantly.

Simmer for 20 minutes. Add milk and turkey. Season with tabasco and serve.

TURKEY STOCK

Turkey carcass
 2 large onions, chopped
 2 carrots, chopped
 2 stalks celery, chopped
 10 peppercorns
 1/2 tsp. thyme
 1/2 tsp. basil
 1/2 tsp. oregano
 4 parsley stems

TO PREPARE: Cover carcass with water, bring slowly to a boil, skim, and reduce to simmer. Add the remaining ingredients and simmer for 2 hours. Strain and use the stock in sauces and soups.

TURKEY SOUP

(serves eight to ten)

1 cup onion, diced
 1 cup celery, diced
 1 cup carrot, diced
 1/2 gallon turkey stock

TO PREPARE: Saute vegetables in 3 tbsps. oil. When onion is translucent, add stock. Simmer for 1/2-1 hour. Add cooked rice,

canned tomatoes, or anything else for variety to the soup before serving.

EXOTIC TURKEY SALAD

(serves twelve)

3 lbs turkey, skinned, boned, and cooked
 Margarine
 9 3/4 oz. (by weight) slivered almonds
 2 cups mayonnaise
 1 tbsp. curry powder
 2 tbsps. soy sauce
 2 tbsps. lemon juice
 2 cups sliced celery
 3-6 oz. cans water chestnuts, sliced

2 lbs. seedless grapes (or equivalent amount canned or fresh pineapple)

TO PREPARE: Coat almonds with melted margarine. Roast at 350° on a cookie sheet—about 30 minutes or until brown. Spread on paper towels, and set aside. Mix mayonnaise with curry, soy sauce, and lemon juice. Combine with chicken, celery, water chestnuts, and grapes. Chill



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Sixth Classic boasts powerful prep field

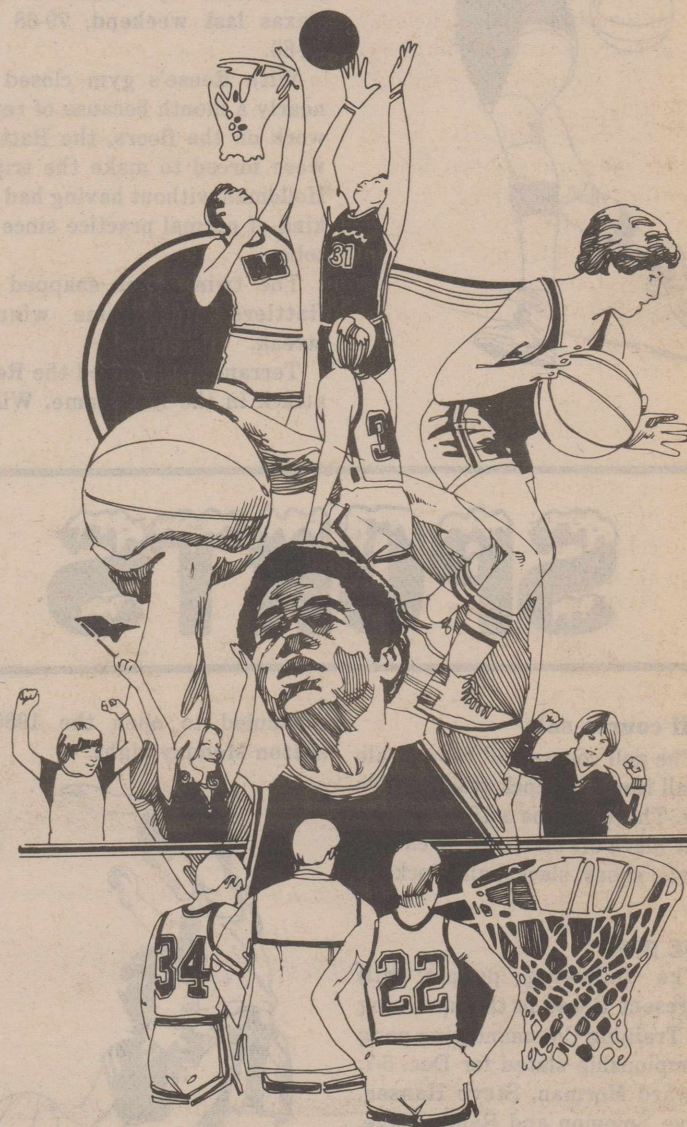
Sixteen high school basketball teams will battle for divisional titles in the Sixth Annual Reese AFB Christmas Classic here Dec. 18-20.

Tourney officials claim that the Christmas Classic boasts the strongest and most representative field ever to play in a West Texas high school basketball tournament. The field in the Com-



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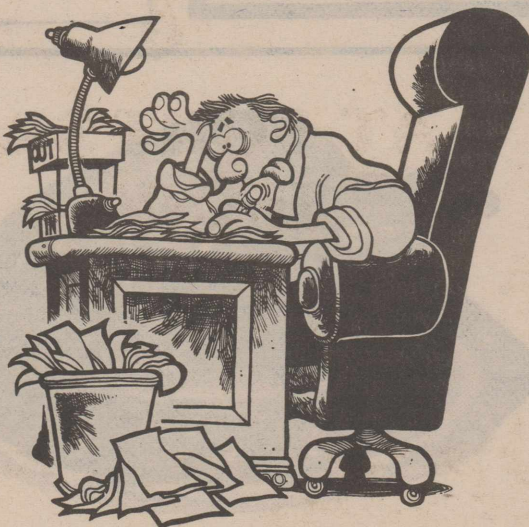
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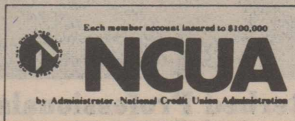


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mander's Division will match teams from eight different districts, a feat that not even the University Interscholastic League can match with its four-team regional playoffs.
