Supply competes for Daedalian

Reese and Mather AFB, Calif., have been selected by the Directorate of Supply, Headquarters, Air Training Command, to compete as ATC's nominee for the Daedalian Supply Effectiveness trophy.

Each year ATC selects the organization that achieved the best supply performance record during the preceding year to represent the command in the Air Force competition. The Daedalian Supply Effectiveness Trophy is awarded annually to recognize outstanding base support of aircraft/missiles.

The ATC visit to Reese is conducted by Lt. Col. James E. Parrish, Directorate of Supply, Headquarters ATC. Colonel Parrish visited Mather earlier this week and will be on base through today for a firsthand evaluation of the supply support, professionalism and attitudes of people, and how well supply facilities are maintained.

The past year has been very rewarding for the 64th Supply Squadron according to officials. The squadron received a top rating during the Management Effectiveness Inspection. The ATC command Equipment Management Team also commended Supply for the overall outstanding appearance and sound records maintenance in the Individual Equipment Unit.

Some other of the unit's achievements include special recognition by the Lubbock chapter of the Special Olympics for the Handicapped and presentation of a trophy from the wing commander for submitting the largest number of names in the Air Force Recruiter Assistance Program.

Many other management and facility improvements were also accomplished during the year. These include computer resegmentation, improved turn-around procedures and repair cycle/critical item effectiveness, and improved paint and cylinder storage facilities. The Fuels Management Branch also contributed immeasurably to the 64th Supply Squadron's achievements.

Maj. Carl D. Alberchinski, chief of Supply, states, "It is an honor to be considered as one of the best supply activities in the command. Being nominated to compete for this award is the result of many hours of hard work and devotion to duty by all squadron personnel. We welcome Colonel Parrish and we are sure he will find our squadron to be worthy of consideration as the best Supply in ATC."

This approved version of DOPMA was worked out after extensive discussion between the House, Senate and Department of Defense. The House had passed a DoD version in 1976 and 1978. The Senate passed another version in 1979.

DOPMA will provide attractive and predictable career opportunities for present and future Air Force officers. If signed by President Carter, DOPMA would become effective Sept. 15, 1981.

Major features of the bill are: Permanent grade relief replacing the restrictive 1954 Officer Grade Limitative Act field-grade limites.

system replacing the existing dual temporary-permanent system. Officers holding temporary grade higher than their current permanent grade will be promoted to higher premanent grade unless they are presently deferred to that permanent grade.

Officers deferred to permanent regular or reserve captain, major or lieutenant colonel will meet a special board within one year after their effective date to resolve their status.

Uniform tenure and retirement provision for all services. This bill provides that twice-failed regular captains and majors may be continued on active duty to the 20 and

for lieutenant colonels and colonels at 28 and 30 years service, respectively.

The Secretary of the Air Force would have the authority to convene selection boards to defer mandatory retirement for up to five years, not to exceed age 62. Officers in the grade lieutenant colonel through major general who are promoted after selection by a DOPMA board would be required to serve a minimum of three years in that grade to be eligible for voluntary retirement in that grade. Exceptions would require presidential approval.

Severance pay for officers. Max-

increased from \$15,000 to \$30,000. An all-regular career force would not be required by law, but modifications made by DOPMA would permit the Air Force to implement this by policy.

Provision of Title 10 would be repealed to allow regular appointment of nurses and medical specialists under the same rules as apply to other officers. It does not revise the provision of Title 10 which restricts the assignment of women in combat.

A per-diem-equality amendment to eliminate the differences in per diem between officers and enlisted service members.



Metric system on its way

Are you ready for the day when the gas station attendant tells you that you're down a liter of oil instead of a plain old quart low?

In this four-part series, we will trace how and why people first got around to measuring things and gradually moved toward a universal system.

Nature's way

To compare the capacities of containers such as gourds or clay or metal vessels used in trading, the vessels were filled with plant seeds which were then counted to measure the volume.

Seeds also served as a standard of weight.

For instance, today's "carat" as a unit for gem measurement was derived from the carob seed.

As different societies came about, weights and measures became more complex.

The invention of numbering systems and the development of mathematics made it possible to create whole new systems of weights and measures for every phase of life, from trading to

Since time began

Weights and measures were among the earliest tools invented by man.

Primitive societies needed some type of basic measurements and weights for building, bartering, or trading.

Man understandably first turned to parts of his own body and to his natural surroundings as a way to compare and measure things.

Early Babylonian and Egyptian records and the Bible show that length was first measured with the forearm, hand, or the finger, and that the passage of time was linked to movements of the sun, moon, and other heavenly bodies.

To each his own

The goal of these early "tools" was to be able to measure height, weight, length, and distance accurately, time after time, and in different places.

But all this was at a time when civilization was developing in bits and pieces and in different tribes and cultures around the world.

Naturally enough, people came up with different standards for measuring and weighing. Just as society "A" spoke a different language than society "B," so did it measure its canoes, spears, and the weight of its cooking pots in different ways.

In Part II of this series, we will explore how some of the words we still use today developed from ordinary things.



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
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Sunday marks anniversary of Japanese sneak attack

On September 27, 1940, Germany, Italy, and Japan signed the **Tripartite Pact**, thus bringing Japan's "Greater East Asia Co-Prosperity Sphere" within the Axis coalition. From that time on, American resistance to Japanese expansionism increased. Negotiations between Japan and the United States toward a peaceful solution of Far Eastern problems were still under way when, on December 7, 1941, Japan attacked Pearl Harbor in Hawaii. The next day, President Roosevelt went before Congress to ask for a declaration of war against Japan.

Yesterday, December 7, 1941 - a date which will live in infamy - the United States of America was suddenly and deliberately attacked by naval and air forces of the Empire of Japan.

The United States was at peace with that nation, and, at the solicitation of Japan, was still in conversation with its government and its emperor looking toward the maintenance of peace in the Pacific. Indeed, one hour after Japanese air squadrons had commenced bombing in Oahu, the Japanese ambassador to the United States and his colleague delivered to the secretary of state a formal reply to a recent American message. While this reply stated that it seemed useless to continue the existing diplomatic negotiations, it contained no threat or hint of war or armed attack.

It will be recorded that the distance of Hawaii from Japan makes it obvious that the attack was deliberately planned many days or even weeks ago. During the intervening time the Japanese government has deliberately sought to deceive

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the United States by false statements and expressions of hope for continued peace.

The attack yesterday on the Hawaiian Islands has caused severe damage to American naval and military forces. Very many American lives have been lost. In addition, American ships have been reported torpedoed on the high seas between San Francisco and Honolulu.

Yesterday the Japanese government also launched an attack against Malaya.

Last night Japanese forces attacked Hong Kong.

Last night Japanese forces attacked Guam.

Last night Japanese forces attacked the Philippine Islands.

Last night the Japanese attacked Wake Island.

This morning the Japanese attacked Midway Island.

Japan has, therefore, undertaken a surprise offensive extending throughout the Pacific area. The facts of yesterday speak for themselves. The people of the United States have already formed their opinions and well understand the implications to the very life and safety of our nation.

As commander in chief of the Army and Navy I have directed that all measures be taken for our defense.

Always will we remember the character of the onslaught against us. No matter how long it may take us to overcome this premeditated invasion, the American people, in their righteous might, will win through to absolute victory. I believe I interpret the will of the Congress and of the people when I assert that we will not only defend ourselves to the uttermost but will make very certain that this

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
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
S S form of treachery shall never endanger us again.

Hostilities exist. There is no blinking at the fact that our people, our territory, and our interests are in grave danger.

With confidence in our armed forces - with the unbounded determination of our people we will gain the inevitable triumph - so help us God.

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Hanukkah means dedication

Hanukkah celebration began Wednesday and will continue for eight days.

Hanukkah, which is Hebrew for dedication, is a celebration of the first victory in the fight for religious freedom. It marks the rededication of the Temple in Jerusalem in pre-Christian times. In the second century, Antiochus, King of Syria, defiled the Temple, turning it into a pagan sanctuary where sacrifices were offered to heathen gods. Jewish religious practice was forbidden.

The Jews revolted under the leadership of the Maccabees and won the first war ever fought for religious freedom. To celebrate they cleansed the Temple, rededicated it and rekindled the perpetual light, a symbol still found in Judaism today. The festival continued for eight days.



To commemmorate this historic victory for religious freedom, Jews all over the world light candles and exchange gifts for eight days. On the first night of Hanukkah one candle is lit in the menorah, a special candelabra used only during Hanukkah. An additional candle is added each night until the last night when all eight candles are glowing brightly.

Children especially enjoy Hanukkah because they receive Hanukkah gelt, money or chocolate candy shaped like coins. Other Hanukkah traditions include playing with dreidles, Hanukkah tops, eating potato latkes, pancakes, and singing songs including Maoz Tzur, an old Hebrew melody telling of this first victory for religious freedom.





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Approximately 2,300 stuffed mobile toys which may pose a strangulation hazard to infants are being recalled by their importer, Albert E. Price, Inc., of Bellmawr, New Jersey.

Also, 5,600 stereo turntables are being recalled by their manufacturer, Philips High Fidelity Laboratories Ltd., of Knoxville, Tennessee, because they may pose a shock hazard to consumers.

The recall includes Philips turntable models 22AF685/44B and 22AF685/94B.

Some ideas which may be


helpful to make the campaign a success are: bake sales, "bring a toy to commander's call," and car washes.



Reese's running Rattlers hope that holds true as the speedy quintet takes on William Beaumont Army Hospital here this weekend.



Traveling from El Paso, Texas, the William Beaumont team is the second New Mex-Tex Basketball Conference foe to play here and the third league opponent





Leading the Falcons against Tech will be three year starters Tim Harris and Reggie Jones. The 6 foot 6 Harris is the team's leading scorer and canned 20




points against Doane. At 6 foot 7, Jones leads the Falcons on the boards. He netted 12 rebounds Tuesday night.
