IT PAYS TO FEED ENOUGH

The greatest single cause of low milk yields is lack of sufficient feed and a balanced ration. It takes about one half of a cow's feed to maintain her body and if she is fed on a half ration she has nothing left to convert into milk. Many people think that the less feed they give the more profit they get, while just the opposite is true-up to the capacity of the cow.

HOW MUCH IS ENOUGH?

Under average conditions feed all the roughage the cow will eat-Cottonseed Hulls and legume hay, with or without silage. The average Jersey cow will eat from twenty to twenty five pounds of Hulls and hay, mixed, (for two roughages should be fed) per day.

Feed a grain mixture in proportion to the amount of milk produced at the rate of from two to three pounds of grain for each gallon of milk produced per day. The grain mixture should inculde at least two ingredients in addition to cottonseed meal, such as wheat bran and ground kaffir or maize, or barley, and should contain at least one ounce of salt per ration.
