If we do not have enough poll workers, we will be forced to consolidate polling places with fewer open to serve the County. Many of the workers that have served for many years are choosing to retire, thus the need for new faces in the polling place. Also, the need exists for a least one bilingual speaker in each polling place.

Gas prices higher after holidays

Texas gas prices rose 5.7 cents in the past week, averaging \$2.88 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Gas prices in Texas are 4.4 cents per gallon lower than a month ago and stand 95.3 cents per gallon higher than a year ago.

According to Gas-Buddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas is priced at \$2.43 while the most expensive is \$3.69 per gallon. The national average price of gasoline has fallen 0.9 cents in the last week, averaging \$3.27 per gallon. The national average is down 9.0 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands \$1.03 per gallon higher than a year ago.

"After a pretty long run of falling gas prices, we've seen things stabilize. Oil prices have started to rise as omicron hasn't been as severe as initially feared, leading to optimism that perhaps oil demand will start to rise in the weeks ahead as cases will eventually plateau," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis for



De Haan continued, "In addition, Great Lakes states were expected to see a price hike last week, but the hike hasn't happened just yet, leading me to believe it will occur in short order this week and send the national average higher. For the rest of the nation, with oil near \$76 per barrel, we will likely see gas price decreases replaced by minor price increases."





calendar and added two months to it. However, many religions continued to celebrate the new year either on March 25th or December 25th according to their church calendars. Even the Julian calendar did not indicate a clear beginning and end to the year. Then in 1582, Pope Gregory developed the Gregorian calendar and most of the world came around to January 1 being the beginning of the New Year.

January takes its name from Janus, the Roman god of beginnings and endings. He's a protector of gates, doorways, and transitions. The Wolf Moon rises in January so it's a great opportunity to howl at the full moon. While it's uncertain where the name for this moon is derived, it's interesting to note that the month used to be called Wolfmonath. As food became scarce, wolves would begin scavenging and could be heard howling at the moon.



Bean Soup

Since the weather has actually turned colder, it is the perfect time for a warm and hearty soup. January is National Soup month and January 6 is National Bean Day, so here is a recipes for a celebration or just a weeknight dinner.

Bean Soup {Slow Cooker, Stovetop, or Instant Pot}

Ingredients

- 2 cups dried beans (I used a 15-bean mix, but any variety will work. You can use just navy beans or just pinto beans, if you prefer)
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 4 carrots, peeled and diced
- 4 celery ribs, diced
- 1 large onion, diced
- 1 tablespoon minced or grated garlic
- 8 cups chicken broth or vegetable broth
- 1 lb. cooked ham, diced (about 3 cups total)
- ¹/₂ teaspoon salt
- 1 (14.5 ounce) can petite diced tomatoes, not drained 2 bay leaves

Instructions

STOVETOP:

Place beans in a large pot or bowl. Cover with water 2 inches above beans and soak for 8 hours (or overnight). Drain beans. Heat olive oil in a large stock pot or Dutch oven over medium-high heat until oil shimmers. Sauté carrots, celery, onion, and garlic until starting to soften, about 8 to 10 minutes. Stir in drained beans, broth, ham, salt, tomatoes, and bay leaves. Bring to a boil; cover; reduce heat to low, and simmer (covered) for 2 - 21/2 hours (or until beans and vegetables are tender). Remove bay leaves; serve.

SLOW COOKER:

Place beans in a large pot. Cover with water 2 inches above beans and soak for 8 hours (or overnight). Drain beans. Transfer soaked beans to slow cooker insert. Heat olive oil in a large stock pot or Dutch oven over medium-high heat until oil shimmers. Sauté carrots, celery, onion, and garlic until starting to soften, about 8 to 10 minutes. Transfer vegetables to the slow cooker. Stir in broth, ham, salt, tomatoes, and bay leaves. Cover and cook on HIGH for 4-5 hours or on LOW for 8-10 hours, or until beans and vegetables are tender. Remove bay leaves; serve.

INSTANT POT:

Place beans in a large pot. Cover with water 2 inches above beans and soak for 8 hours (or overnight). Drain beans. Set aside. Turn the Instant Pot to "Sauté" function. Add oil and heat until oil shimmers. Sauté carrots, celery, onion, and garlic until starting to soften. Turn off the pot. Add soaked beans, broth, ham, salt, diced tomatoes, and bay leaves. Cover with the lid and seal to lock. Press the manual pressure cook button and set the timer to 20 minutes. Let the pressure release naturally for 10 minutes and then move the valve to "venting" to release the rest of the pressure. Remove the lid; remove bay leaves; serve!

Notes:

If possible, make this soup 1-2 days in advance. It just gets better as it sits in the refrigerator, and it will thicken up a lot as it cools!

This recipe calls for a very small amount of salt, since ham is often salty on its own. Feel free to season the soup with additional salt and pepper at the end of cooking. You can always add more, but you never want it to be too salty!

Spicy: add a dash of cayenne or garnish with crushed red pepper flakes.

Garnish with fresh herbs or add extra herbs and seasoning to the pot. Good options include parsley, thyme, oregano, basil, and rosemary.

NOTICE to Parmer County Taxpayers

Monday, January 31, 2022, is the deadline to pay all personal and property taxes in Parmer County.

Checks must be postmarked by Monday, January 31, 2022, or penalty and interest will occur.

If you turned 65 years old as of January 1, 2022, then you need to sign up for the "65 and older" Homestead Exemption. This is a permanent exemption so if you already have signed up for it, you don't have to re-apply. ****

If you have purchased a home since you signed up for the Homestead Exemption, you need to re-apply for this exemption.


Agricultural use exemptions are available for all who have purchased agricultural property. If you purchased ag property during the past year, you need to apply for this exemption.

Twenty-nine new laws in effect in January

More than 20 new state laws went into effect as Texans rang in the New Year, with another half-dozen to go on the books on Jan. 18, the Fort Worth Star-Telegram reported. Those laws include a ban on transgender athletes competing on sports teams that reflect their gender identity, and penalties for illegally restraining dogs.

Other new laws:

• Require landlords to disclose to potential renters if a property has ever flooded or is in a flood plain. Texas becomes only the second state in the nation with such a requirement, joining Georgia.

• Allow homeowners to take a homestead exemption in the same year they buy their home, instead of having to wait until the following year, potentially saving on property taxes.

• Require people accused in Texas of a violent crime to post a cash bond. Before, a judge could agree to release the accused on a personal bond that does not require a cash payment.

• Provide a slate of new benefits for Texas veterans and their families, including exempting new veteranowned businesses from paying the franchise tax.

Abbott seeks more testing sites, antibodies

Texas is seeking more federally funded COVID-19 testing locations and additional federal allocations of monoclonal antibodies used to treat the virus in six counties facing increased cases because of the omicron variant: Bexar, Cameron, Dallas, Harris, Hidalgo and Tarrant.

"Testing sites, additional medical staff and continued shipments of quested three teams of medical personnel to support urban hospitals that don't have DSHS-contracted health-care staff.

COVID-19 cases double in state from previous week.

The number of new Texas cases of COVID-19 has more than doubled in the past week to 108,719, according to the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University. A total of 422 new deaths were recorded, up 58% from the previous week's total of 266.

DSHS reported as of Sunday there were 5,523 COVID-19 patients in Texas hospitals, up nearly 64% from the previous week.

The total number of Texans who are fully vaccinated now stands at 16.45 million, according to DSHS, which is 56.7% of the total population. In addition, 4.678 million of the state's residents have been vaccinated with a booster dose.

First phase of election audit completed

The initial review of the 2020 general election results in four Texas counties showed relatively few discrepancies between electronic and hand counts of ballots. The Dallas Morning News reported that out of the 11.3 million votes cast statewide, Secretary of State John Scott found potentially 509 cases where people may have cast ballots both in Texas and another state, and 67 possible cases of votes cast in the name of dead people.

The audits are being performed in Dallas, Harris, Tarrant and Collin counties. During the next phase, officials will conduct "a comprehensive records review to ensure election procedures were properly followed in 2020."

Former president Donald Trump called for the audit in September, despite having handily won the cations reported fish falling from the sky. In a Facebook post, city officials explained the rare phenomenon.

State Sales Tax Revenue Totaled \$3.6 Billion in December

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced on Tuesday that state sales tax revenue totaled \$3.56 billion in December, 24.4 percent more than in December 2020. The majority of December sales tax revenue is based on sales made in November and remitted to the agency in December.

Year-over-year increases for most tax revenues continue to be affected by base effects: year-ago revenue collections to which this year's collections are compared were suppressed by the pandemic. Compared to December 2019, sales tax collections were up 18.1 percent.

"December state sales tax collections continued the exceptional growth of recent months, reaching another new monthly high with receipts from all major economic sectors surging above yearago levels," Hegar said. "Propelled by vigorous business and consumer spending, receipts from most major sectors were well above pre-pandemic levels. "Double-digit increases in receipts from sectors fueled by business spending were led by oil and gas mining, manuwholesale facturing, trade and construction,

with receipts from only the oil and gas mining and rental and leasing sectors remaining below pre-pandemic levels.

"With Christmas shopping jumpstarted by the early start of holiday promotional pricing weeks ahead of Black Friday, and despite supply chain clogs and household budgets pressured by rising prices for food and gasoline, spending consumer drove double-digit increases in receipts from retail trade.

"The sharpest increases in retail trade receipts were from electronics and appliance stores and clothing stores, two segments especially hard hit the previous year by the pandemic. But doubledigit growth continued in receipts from home improvement and furniture stores, sporting goods and hobby stores, and online general merchandisers, segments boosted a year ago by pandemic spending patterns.

same period a year ago and 16.8 percent compared to 2019. Sales tax is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 59 percent of all tax collections.

Texas collected the following revenue from other major taxes, most of which were up sharply from a year ago due to base effects: (1) motor vehicle sales and rental taxes — \$531 million, up 21 percent from December 2020, and up 24 percent from December 2019; (2) motor fuel taxes - \$312 million, up 12 percent from December 2020, and up less than 1 percent from December 2019; (3) oil production tax - \$450 million, up 128 percent from December 2020, and up 24 percent from December 2019; (4) natural gas production tax — \$384 million, the highest-ever monthly revenue amount, up 349 percent from December 2020, and up 237 percent from December 2019; (5) hotel occupancy tax - \$40 million, up 57 percent from December 2020, and down 19 percent from December 2019; and (6) alcoholic beverage taxes - \$124 million, up 47 percent from December 2020, and up 5 percent from December 2019.

Turncoat

At first, Benedict Arnold was a hero in the Revolutionary War. He participated in the 1775 capture of Fort Ticonderoga; the following year, he was part of the posse that protected New York from a British invasion, and in 1777 he savored the surrender of General Burgoyne in Saratoga.

But the enthusiastic patriot did not feel appreciated. And so, he switched sides, betrayed his brothers in combat, and offered to hand over the Continental Army's most strategic outpost-West Point-in exchange for cash, and an enemy command. His disloyalty was revealed, but not quickly enough to garner an arrest. Arnold escaped behind British lines, catapulted to the rank of Brigadier General, and proved to



his former rivals that he was a terrific turncoat.

According to History. com, Arnold fought well for the British, achieving "his greatest success as a British commander on January 5, 1781" when he seized Richmond, VA.

After the war, Arnold's military accomplishments on behalf of the British did not convey forward. Within ten years, he died in London—poor-buried in his Colonial Army garb, and forever remembered as a "traitor."



PUBLIC NOTICE: PARMER COUNTY 2021 REVISED COUNTY ELECTION PRECINCT PLAN

By order dated December 6, 2021 ("2021 Order"), the Parmer County Commissioners Court ("Commissioners Court"), the governing body of Parmer County, Texas ("County"), approved the 2021 Revised Parmer County Election Precinct Plan ("2021 Revised Plan") pursuant to Chapter 42 of the Texas Election Code and other authority. The 2021 Revised Plan made changes to the County's existing election precinct plan. The 2021 Revised Plan shall take effect on and after January 1, 2022.

The following is a brief, general description of the changes made in the County's existing election precinct boundaries as described in the 2021 Revised Plan, said changes made by the Commissioners Court a result of county commissioner precinct changes made pursuant to the County's 2021 redistricting project, or for the efficiency and convenience in the holding of elections: (1) certain territory in the northwest area was transferred from Election Precinct 303 to Election Precinct 201 in the area of US Highway 60 to Country Road 1 to US Highway 85; (2) certain territory was transferred from Election Precinct 303 in the south area to Election Precinct 201; (3) the territory of Election Precinct 301 was combined with Election Precinct 302;(5) Election Precincts 203 and 302 were discontinued since they were combined with other Election Precincts; and (6) Election Precincts 101, 401, and 402 remain unchanged.
































Governor appoints Gurley to 287th Judicial District Court
