Filing period underway for May 7 general election

The filing period ends on Friday, February 18th at 5:00 p.m. The general election will be held on Saturday, May 1st from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m.

As of February 2nd, Greg Lewellen has filed for Mayor and Jeri Lynn White has filed for FISD Trustee.

State Sales Tax Revenue Totaled \$3.9 Billion in January

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced Tuesday that state sales tax revenue totaled \$3.85 billion in January, 25.3 percent more than in January 2021. The majority of January sales tax revenue is based on sales made in December and remitted to the agency in January.

Year-over-year increases for most tax revenues continue to be affected by base effects: Revenue collections in 2021, to which this year's collections are compared, were suppressed by the pandemic. Compared to January 2020, sales tax collections were up 24.9 per-

"January state sales tax collections reached another all-time monthly high, with receipts from almost all major economic sectors rocketing above year-ago levels," Hegar said. "Fueled by continued strength in both business and consumer spending, receipts from most sectors strongly surpassed pre-pandemic levels."

Business spending drove doubledigit increases in receipts from the oil and gas mining, manufacturing, wholesale trade and construction sectors, with receipts from only oil and gas mining remaining below pre-pandemic levels.

A strong Christmas shopping season continued to drive doubledigit increases in receipts from retail trade. The greatest gains came from clothing and accessories stores and health and personal care stores. Receipts from general merchandisers also exhibited very strong growth, especially from big-box retailers and mall-based department stores. Receipts from restaurants, a sector still depressed a year ago, were again up sharply and well above pre-pandemic levels.

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in January 2021 was up 23 percent compared to the same period a year ago and 21.7 percent compared to 2020. Sales tax is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 59 percent of all tax collections.

Texas collected the following revenue from other major taxes, most of which were up sharply from a year ago due to base effects: (1) motor vehicle sales and rental taxes — \$480 million, up 18 percent from January 2021, and up 2 percent from January 2020; (2) motor fuel taxes — \$296 million, up 1 percent from January 2021, and down 4 percent from January 2020; (3) oil production tax — \$427 million, up 68 percent from January 2021, and up 8 percent from January 2020; (4) natural gas production tax — \$369 million, up 260 percent from January 2021, and up 182 percent from January 2020; (5) hotel occupancy tax — \$49 million, up 83 percent from January 2021, and up 19 percent from January 2020; and (6) alcoholic beverage taxes — \$140 million, up 49 percent from January 2021, and up 8 percent from January 2020.





Deadline extended for Uri reimbursement for schools

The deadline for public school districts and charter schools to seek reimbursement from the state for damages caused last year by Winter Storm Uri has been extended to Feb. 24, the Texas Education Agency announced. Any district located in an area declared a disaster after last February's storm can apply for assistance for costs not covered by insurance or federal disaster relief.

Schools can receive reimbursement for uninsured damages to facilities, vehicles and computers.

Panel to examine Rolling Pines

An independent panel has been formed to review the circumstances and causes of a recent prescribed burn at Bastrop State Park that got out of control and burned more than 800 acres. It forced about 250 families to temporarily evacuate, although no structures were damaged. The panel was ordered through the Texas A&M Forest Service and includes wildland fire experts from state forestry agencies in Florida, Georgia, Oklahoma and South Carolina.

Prescribed burns at Bastrop and Buescher state parks have been suspended until the review is complete and recommendations are evaluated.

"We fully support this independent review and will continue working every day to earn the public's trust for the continued safe and effective use of prescribed fire," said Carter Smith, executive director of the Texas Parks and

"As a land management tool, prescribed fires are important and help minimize the threat and severity of major wildfires by reducing the amount of existing and dormant vegetation. If left unchecked, the excess of leaves and plants would fuel a minor situation into a major wildfire," according to the department's news release.

COVID-19 cases down; ICU beds nearly full

While the number of new CO-VID-19 cases in Texas during the past week dropped to 295,501 — a decrease of more than 130,000 the state's intensive care unit beds are approaching capacity once again. The Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University also reported 1,212 deaths, up nearly 25% from the previous week.

The drop in new cases has health officials hopeful the omicron variant has peaked. Hospitalizations in Texas of lab-confirmed cases of COVID-19 dropped slightly to 12,760, with only 317 available ICU beds in the entire state, according to the Texas Department of State Health Services.

"The vast majority of the people who are critically ill are either unvaccinated or have significant comorbidities," Dr. James McCarthy, chief physician executive at Memorial Hermann, told the Houston Chronicle. "We are not seeing middle-aged, healthy, vaccinated individuals in the ICU like we did in the previous wave."

A total of 16.896 million Texans are fully vaccinated, according to DSHS, which is 58% of the state's population. An additional 5.85 million Texans have received a booster dose.





This year the problem was that I couldn't get the canned vanilla pudding I use to make banana pudding for the buyer's meal. The problem was easily solved by preparing cobblers instead. However, I was left with lots of vanilla

wafers I didn't use. This got me to thinking, "Are there other recipes that use vanilla wafers besides banana pudding?" Below are just a couple of the recipes I found to use up those vanilla wafers.

Vanilla Wafer Cake

Ingredients

2 sticks butter or margarine or 1 cup

13/4 cups sugar

6 eggs

1/2 cup evaporated milk (can use regular milk)

11-ounce box of vanilla wafers, crushed (Put in plastic bag and crush with rolling pin)

1 1/2 cups shredded coconut

1 teaspoon lemon extract 1 cup of chopped nuts of your choice

Caramel Sauce (this is optional, it's

good with or without it):

1/2 cup white sugar

1 cup brown sugar

4 tablespoons butter or margarine

2 tablespoons corn syrup

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

1/2 cup milk

Instructions

Cream butter and sugar; add eggs and continue mixing. Add milk, vanilla wafers, and coconut along with lemon extract using mixer until well blended. Fold in nuts. Pour into sprayed Bundt pan. Bake in preheated 3500 degree oven for 1 hour to 1 hour and 10 minutes until center is done. Cool for 15 to 20 minutes and remove from pan.

Caramel Sauce Instructions

Bring to boil on top of stove and let boil for one

minute. Remove from stove and add vanilla. Let cool to the consistency you like. It will harden as it cools.

12 Vanilla Wafer Cookies


3 Tablespoons or so of creamy peanut butter

Gas prices unchanged

Average gasoline prices in Texas were unchanged in the last week, averaging \$2.99 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Prices in Texas are 11.3 cents per gallon higher than a month ago and stand 87.5 cents per gallon higher than a year ago.

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$2.34 while the most expensive was \$3.79 per gallon.

The national average price of gasoline has risen 2.9 cents in the last week, averaging \$3.34 per gallon. The national average is up 6.8 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands 92.8 cents per gallon higher than a year ago, according to GasBuddy data compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.

"The price of oil pushed into territory unseen in over seven years as WTI crude hit \$88 per barrel, which continues to drag gasoline prices higher. With continued concerns over geopolitical tensions and crude oil supply, the small yet noticeable increases are likely to continue," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy. "The only factor keeping gas prices from rising more substantially is that gasoline demand remains low as winter storms keep motorists closer to home. Once the weather starts to turn and warm gradually, we'll lose the only restraint to larger price increases."

De Hann added, "For now, I don't expect any immediate fireworks at the pump, but the trend of rising gas prices will likely persist as worries continue to overpower weak global consumption."





Araminta Ross was born into Maryland slavery in 1820 or 1821, became an active abolitionist, and died a hero in 1913, at ninety-three.

Better known as Harriet Tubman, she tangoed with the tough task of escorting slaves through free, Northern zones; between 1850 and 1861, she rescued more than seventy serfs from Maryland, and approximately fifty traveling to Canada, according to historians.

After her last mission in 1862, Tubman pivoted to nursing and espionage.

Notice of Reporting Violation – Failure to Submit a Disinfectant Level Quarterly Operating Report

Dear Customer,

On January 5, 2022, the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) notified the FRIONA MUNICIPAL WATER SYSTEM TX1850003 had violated the monitoring/reporting requirements set by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) in Title 30, Texas Administrative Code (30 TAC), Section 290, Subchapter F. Public water systems are required to properly disinfect water before distribution, maintain acceptable disinfection residuals within the distribution system, monitor the disinfectant residual at various locations throughout the distribution system, and report the results of that monitoring to the TCEQ on a quarterly basis.

In short, the City of Friona failed to submit a mandatory quarterly report. Results of regular monitoring are important because they are an indicator of whether or not your drinking water is safe form microbial contamination. This violation occurred in the quarterly monitoring period of July – September 2021.

This is not an emergency. You do not need to use an alternative water supply.

We are taking the following actions to address this issue:

- 1) Training alternative personnel in City offices to assure quarterly reporting isn't missed again, and
- 2) Have routine calendar appointment reminders set on electronic calendars to notify all staff of the upcoming reporting requirement.

Please share this information with all people who drink this water, especially those who may not have received this notice directly (i.e., people in apartments, nursing homes, schools, and businesses). You can do this by posting this notice in a public place or distributing copies by hand or mail.
