Items not accepted in the roll-off box are tires, oil and tree limbs. The area southeast of the softball field is designated for tree limbs only! Security cameras are in place and those who do not comply could face fines.

Announcement of Changes to City Service Fees

Friona residents,

The City of Friona is ending this year's fiscal year on September 30th. The City Council assessed the current fees for City services and the changes will go in to affect on October 1, 2022 with the new fiscal year.

Some of the major changes include but are not limited to:

- Community Center Rental fee will be \$1,100 with a deposit of \$550. An officer will be required for all events. If you have less than 100 people you are required to have 1 officer and 2 officers for a party more than 100 people. You will be required to pay each officer \$40 per hour. The rental fee will be waived for non-profit entities/organizations. Proof of non-profit status will need to be provided.
- The animal at large fee is now \$200.
- Yard clean-up fees can be up to \$400.
- Getting water from the water crane has increased to \$50 for 1-250 gallons of water, \$75 for 251-500 gallons, \$100 for 501-1000 gallons and \$125 for 1,000 gallons or more.
- Getting a carport permit is \$1 per square foot.
- Roofing permit is now \$50.

Former Mayor Receives Legacy of Leadership Award

Former Friona mayor Ricky White was presented with the Legacy of Leadership Award at the 2022 Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) Annual Meeting on September 26, 2022 alongside Oldham County Judge Don Allred and Briscoe County Judge Wayne Nance. The Regional Service award has been presented dating back to 1986, however this is only the second time that the PRPC has awarded the Legacy of Leadership award.

The Legacy of Leadership award brings recognition to individuals that have made substantial impacts in the region and have spent a significant amount of time in their careers doing it. Since becoming Mayor in 2013, Ricky has worked not just for the betterment of the City of Friona, but for the region as a whole. Ricky has been an integral member of the PRPC Board of Directors and served as the Board Chair in 2019. "Along with Judge

Allred and Judge Nance, Ricky has been a pivotal leader in the region for many years. I have known and worked with Ricky for a majority of my career at the PRPC and I can attest that Ricky is very deserving

of this award as he combined a regional mindset with unquestionable integrity, commitment and dedication," said PRPC Executive Director Dustin Meyer. "Ricky is not afraid to ask the tough questions during

board meetings, but has always done so for the betterment of the organization and the region. We will certainly miss him on the PRPC Board of Directors, but certainly wish the best for him in retirement."

Hispanic Texans likely largest demographic group

The U.S. Census Bureau released its latest estimate, which indicates Hispanic residents in Texas make up more of the state's population than white residents. The new population figures from the American Community Survey indicate Hispanic Texans comprise 40.2% of the state's population last year, while non-Hispanic

white Texans made up 39.4%, as reported in the Texas Tribune.

The estimates, from July 2021, are not considered official but reflect trends that demographers have been tracking for years. Hispanics accounted for nearly half of the state's population increase of 4 million residents since 2010. Census figures indicate almost

half of Texas residents under the age of 18 are Hispanic.

The survey showed that Hispanic residents are more than twice as likely as white residents to live below the poverty line. The median income for a white household last year was \$81,235, compared to \$54,857 for a Hispanic household.

Commissioners approve purchase of tractor and vehicle

September 12 Meeting

Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Monday September 12, 2022 at 10:00 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and Texas Flag.

There were no comments from the public during the open forum. Minutes from the August 29th meeting were read and approved. Commissioners approved the payment of the accounts payables as presented by County Treasurer Sharon May. The Treasurer's Payroll Report was also approved. John Merriss presented the Parmer County outside audit. The report was "favorable" with only a few minor recommendations listed. The county currently has a 19-month financial reserve. A six to nine month reserve is generally considered to be a sign of good fiscal health.

Commissioners approved the purchase of a tractor for Precinct 3 to be used for shredding weeds and grass. Approval was also given for

the Sheriff's Fees for the upcoming year. Permission was granted to the Sheriff's Office to enroll in a \$9,000 grant program in order to obtain 2 bullet resistant shields. The annual contract with Justice Benefits Inc. for the SCAAP Program was also approved. The SCAAP Program provides reimbursement to states and local governments - including counties - for the cost of incarcerating undocumented immigrants who have been convicted of certain crimes.

September 26 Meeting

Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Monday September 26, 2022 at 10:00 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and Texas Flag.

There were no comments from the public during the open forum. Minutes from the September 12th meeting were read and approved. Commissioners approved the payment of the accounts payables as presented by County Treasurer

Sharon May. The Treasurer's Payroll Report was also approved.

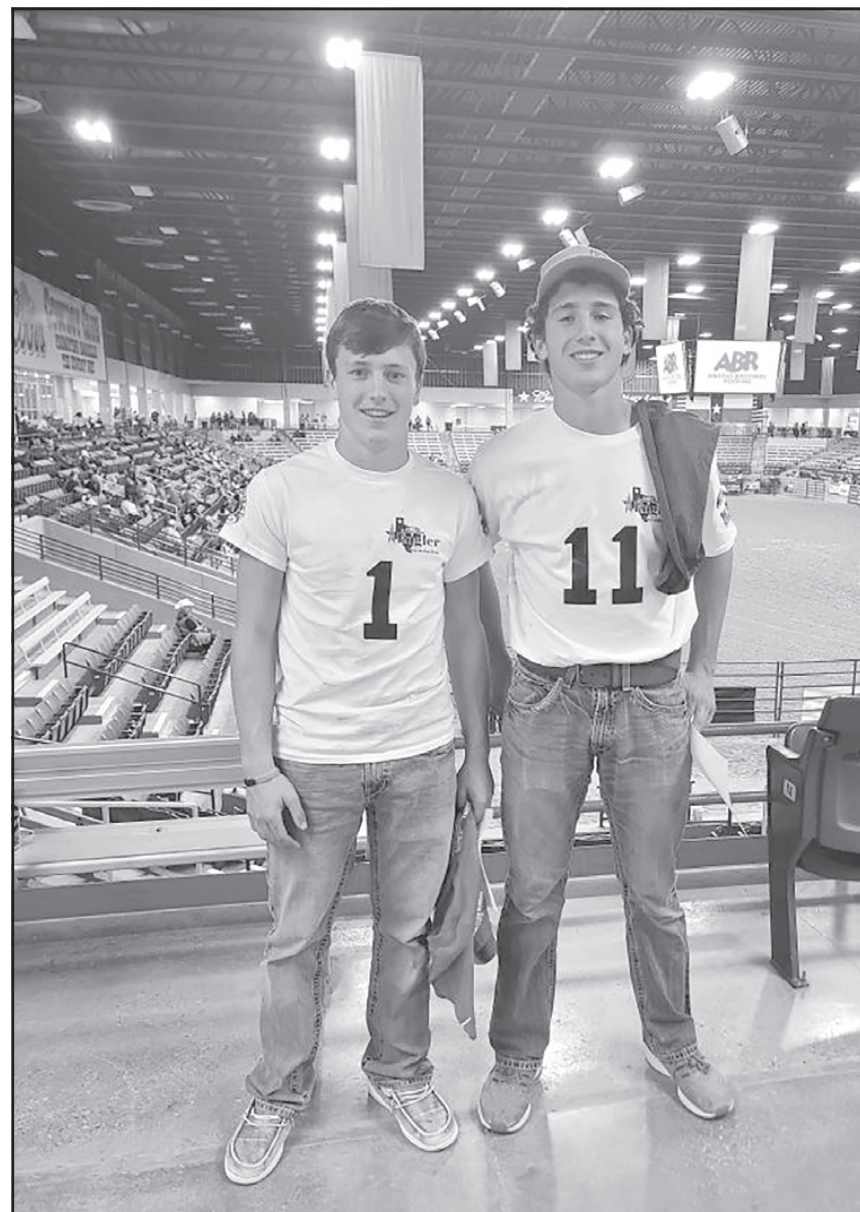
A bond was approved for Marie Samarron who is employed as the Judge's Assistant for the Friona Municipal Court. Twenty CE hours were approved for Justice of the Peace Precinct 2 Judge Lucero. Approval was given for the purchase of a vehicle for the Juvenile Probation Office. A maximum amount of \$35,000 was designated to be used with Parmer County responsible for 60% of the cost and Bailey County responsible for 40%. ARPA funds will be used for the purchase.

Commissioners approved a resolution proclaiming October 4, 2022 as National Night Out.

Parmer County Sheriff Eric Geske informed the Court that the Parmer County Law Enforcement Center is currently housing 24 inmates of which 13 are paying customers from Deaf Smith County. Sheriff Geske informed the Court that he has received \$199,665 so far for the housing of out-of-county inmates.

The next Commissioner's Court was rescheduled to Tuesday, October 11th because of the Columbus Day Holiday on October 10th.

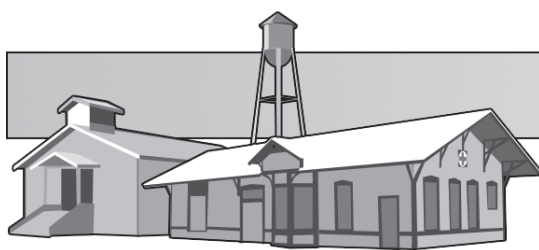

Mocha

Friona might be the one place on earth that does not have a Starbucks anywhere in town. I actually think this is a selling point for living here, even though I enjoy a special coffee drink now and then. September 30th is National Mocha Day. Here is a recipe so you can prep your own coffee mocha at home.

Easy Homemade Mocha

INGREDIENTS

- Mocha
- 1 cup strong coffee
- 2 tablespoons chocolate syrup
- ¼ cup milk
- Whipped Cream Topping
- ¼ cup heavy cream
- 2 teaspoons sugar
- pinch sea salt

INSTRUCTIONS

Make whipped cream topping. Sugar, salt, and heavy cream are whipped together using a handheld milk frother. It should take seconds to get nice and fluffy. Froth milk. Bring milk to a simmer on the stovetop, making sure it doesn't come to a boil since it can easily burn, or microwave it for 30 seconds. Pour heated milk into a French press, put the lid on, and move the plunger up and down, making sure to hold down the lid. Or heat and froth milk at the same time using an electric milk frother. If you have an espresso machine, froth milk using the steam wand. Assemble drink. Hot coffee, frothed milk, and chocolate syrup go into a cup. Stir. Top with whipped cream. Optional garnish: drizzle chocolate syrup on top of the whipped cream.

Simple Chocolate Syrup

INGREDIENTS

- ¾ cup water
- ¾ cup sugar
- ½ cup cocoa powder
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

INSTRUCTIONS

Put water, sugar, cocoa powder, and salt into a saucepan. Simmer. Simmer until the sugar has completely dissolved. Stir occasionally. Heat for 30 more seconds on low heat then take off heat and cool. Add vanilla extract. Once the syrup has cooled a bit, stir in the vanilla extract. Pour syrup into an airtight container. The syrup will keep for up to 2 weeks in the refrigerator.

Creatively undiscipline people ride highs and get sluggish in the lows. Is this statement an excuse, a rationalization, a regret? Probably a bit of all three. And why even write about it for public consumption?

Even at age 66, I want to be better. Writing about my mindset is a form of accountability as well as a message to the world that I have to work at what comes naturally to most: time management, money management, and physical and mental health management.

This past week was one of the highs. Attending informative sessions at The Texas Tribune Festival was like a Vitamin B-12 shot for my mind. The organizers of this journalism event put together a host of public servants, journalists, authors, and field experts who made sense. They came from all walks of life and from both political parties. Instead of book banning, I listened to their conversations about mental health, energy, and immigration. Rather than give oxygen to the lie of a stolen election, these Republicans and Democrats and Independents wanted to talk about inflation, transportation, gun safety, and Putin's evil that

Reaching out to family just to check in and hear voices is another helpful reboot. And I write. One added job in the past month that has been good for me is covering a certain South Plains high school football team. On Friday nights now, I listen to their games on the Internet radio stream, take notes, call the coach for some quotes, and write the sports story for a local newspaper. And I get paid for it, so this

additional free-lance job nurtures my love for sports and my need to supplement income.

There are so many "shoulds" in my life. Should be happily married for 44 years. Should be living in a house I own. Should be a published author of a bestseller-turned-into-an-award-winning film. Should be healthier. Should be driving a restored El Camino. Should be playing pickleball and golf in the same day.

And I still could. Sometimes I am well on my way to making necessary changes. Other times I am eating a third bowl of Rice Krispies on the front porch in a rocking chair.

I seldom think to myself "I should be happier."

Who I am and what I am at 66 is still meaningful and purposeful and joyful in most ways.

When my creative outbursts manifest themselves in coloring pages or photography or writing, it simply means I am channeling that unique thing that God put in my DNA. Sharing these creations with the world matters to me, but I still want to address balancing the highs and lows—and doing so in healthier ways.

Still working on that part.

Gas prices mixed across country

Average gasoline prices in Texas fell 5.5 cents in the last week, averaging \$3.09 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Prices in Texas are 26.9 cents per gallon lower than a month ago and stand 26.5 cents per gallon higher than a year ago. According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$2.55 while the most expensive was \$4.69 per gallon.

The national average price of gasoline has risen 3.2 cents in the last week, averaging \$3.67 per gallon. The national average is down 17.5 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands 49.3 cents per gallon higher than a year ago. The national average price of diesel has declined 5.1 cents in the last week and stands at \$4.88 per gallon.

"One of the longest gas price declines on record has finally come to an end after 14 weeks, with gas prices shooting up in several regions amidst myriad refinery issues from the West Coast to the Great Lakes and in between," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy.

De Haan added, "I don't know that I've ever seen a wider gamut of price behaviors coast to coast in my career. A slew of unexpected refinery disruptions, including fires and routine maintenance, have seemingly all happened in a short span of time, causing wholesale gas prices to spike in areas of the West Coast, Great Lakes and Plains states - and some of those areas could see prices spike another 25-75 cents per gallon or more until issues are worked out. In addition, as Tropical Storm Ian nears the U.S. coast, some refiners could see limited disruption. As a precaution, GasBuddy has activated its Fuel Availability Tracker for motorists in Florida, Georgia, Alabama and South Carolina. Hopefully, disruptions will be very limited due to Ian, but there remain many factors driving prices both up and down across the country."

GasBuddy data is compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.

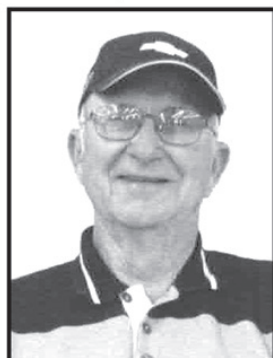

Service ≠ Salvation

It is an eternal privilege to know Jesus Christ through saving faith in him, and after salvation, it is a great responsibility to serve him in a way that is good and faithful. Salvation comes first, followed by surrendered service. In Matthew 7:21-23 Jesus warns of trusting in your service to save you. "Not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord' will enter the kingdom of heaven, but the one who does the will of my Father who is in heaven. On that day many will say to me, 'Lord, Lord, did we not prophesy in your name, and cast out demons in your name and do many mighty works in your name?' And then I will declare to them, 'I never knew you; depart from me, you workers of lawlessness.'" This grave warning pictures the judgment before Jesus and proclaims the false hope of kingdom service as a source of salvation and eternal life. Notice that the servants had the right terminology calling Jesus "Lord, Lord" and

they also had the right outward activities of doing things in Jesus' name, yet they were not truly saved.

Although they may have had the right Jesus T-shirt to wear on the outside, on the inside they were lost because they did not do the will of God. In John 6:40 Jesus said, "For this is the will of my Father, that everyone who looks on the Son and believes in him should have eternal life, and I will raise him up on the last day." In other words, the will of God is to look to Jesus alone for salvation, not Jesus plus anything else. Further, we notice that although these folks did some religious things, their religious activities led to lawlessness. The fruit of their work was not Jesus being exalted and people being pointed to him, but they were pointed away from the true gospel that results in life by the law of the Spirit, which is evidenced by spiritual fruit and faithful service.

It is so sad, and it breaks your heart to see what has become of Uvalde.

However God is so good, and He showed us that healing can take place. He wanted us to be a class who loves each other, and I truly believe we are now.

I don't know how long it will take to heal Uvalde over May 24th. Some people may never heal, but I thank God for healing my class! Maybe it is a start to other healings in Uvalde!!!

Just Getting Started

When the Revolutionary War started in 1775, the British navy was believed to be—unbeatable—until John Paul Jones, a bold, young, senior lieutenant in the newly established Continental Navy, “distinguished himself in actions against British ships in the Bahamas, the Atlantic Ocean and the English Channel,” according to History.com.

Then, on September 23, 1779, Commander Jones — while aboard his vessel, the Bonhomme Richard — sighted two British warships on



the eastern coast of England: the HMS Serapis, and the HMS Countess of Scarborough:

“After inflicting considerable damage to the Bonhomme Richard, Richard Pearson, the captain of the Serapis, asked Jones [to strike]

his colors, the naval signal indicating surrender. From his disabled ship, Jones replied, “I have not yet begun to fight.” After three more hours of frenetic fighting, the Serapis and the Countess of Scarborough surrendered.

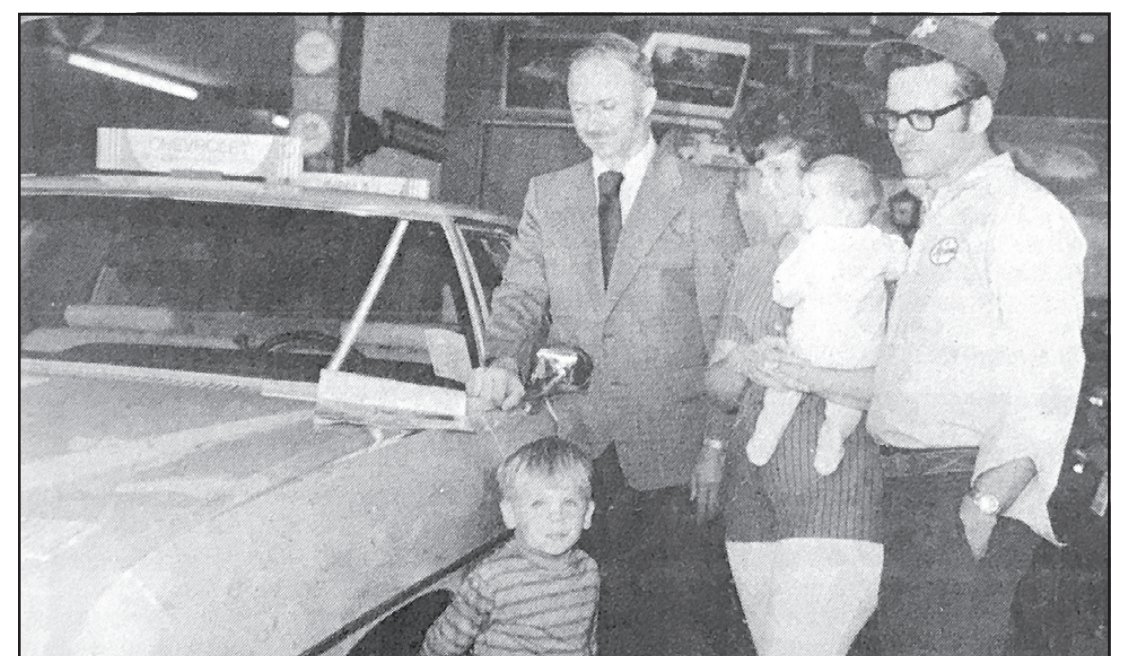
