



CALCULAGRAPH CHECKS ERRORS IN TOLL CALLS

Toll telephone calls are accurately timed by an instrument known as the calculagraph, says the Texas Service Information Bureau. The instrument is much like a clock, with the exact time at the beginning and at the end of a telephone conversation is printed on the toll ticket. The clocks are tested at frequent intervals daily for time of day and legibility of print-

When a subscriber places a toll call, the operator fills out what is known as a toll ticket. On the face of this ticket, in spaces allotted, she writes the calling and called numbers and the time the call is received. When connection is established the operator puts the toll ticket in the calculagraph and presses a lever. This stamps the exact time on the reverse side of the ticket. When the conversation is finished, the ticket is again inserted in the calculgraph, a different lever is pressed and this stamps also on the reverse side, the elapsed time which is the exact time in minutes and seconds of the conversation.

When person-to-person calls are made the toll tickets are not stamped with the time until the person calling is actually speaking.



Owslev Recommends New

In his address before more than two hundred Floyd County voters last Friday afternoon, Col. 



Questions On Health With The Answers

1. Please define for me and tell me how to get rid of an "itch" which I am told is properly termed "Scabies?" (J. W. F., Roundrock).

Scabies which is commonly called "itch" is caused by very small animals or parasites which may be seen by a good ordinary lense. The eggs of this parasite hatch in 7 days and the animal is full size in a month's time. It then lives on the surface of the skin and later burrows under it to lay eggs. The parasite of scabies may pass from one person to another in several ways. They crawl slowly and do not jump like fleas. Sores and pimples seen on chil-dren at school are very often due to scabies. The following treatment has been found successful.

The furrows must be opened and the animals and eggs destroyed by a good cleansing of the skin with soap, after which an antiseptic ointment or lotion should be used. All clothing must be heated to 120 degrees, the bed linen and under clothing laundered separately. Sulphur ointment is a useful remedy.

Ankle Agony

2. I hear there is a new disease in "London town" called "Ankle Agony." Mine have been paining me so recently that I wonder if I have it. Can you give me any causes for this trouble? (Miss A. M. N., Cisco.)

2. The medical journals state that the London physicians designate a new com-plaint among women as "Ankle Agony." It is said to be due to the damp and cold weather, fancy footwear (Astmosphere stockings), and short skirts. The disease is characterized by a sometime considerable swelling of the ankles and excruciating pain.

Head Lice 3. It is almost too mortifying to write about, the fact that four of my young children have head lice. Will you please right away send me something to destroy lice and eggs. (Mrs. E. F. J., Lockhart.)

3. Head lice may easily be destroyed by applying equal parts of olive oil and kerosene to the hair, wrapping at once with towel or cloth for 12 hours and then washing the hair in soap and water, great care being taken in the case of children to prevent contact with fire. This plan will kill the insects, but does not do away with the eggs or nits, which must also be removed or they will hatch into living lice. This can be done with a fine toothed comb. It is no disgrace to acquire lice, but it is a disgrace not to get rid of them speedily.

4. Some of the deadliest enemies of mankind are invisible to the naked eye. Tuberculosis, cholera, typhoid fever, yellow fever, plagues and many other diseases which claim a greater number of lives than have ever been sacrificed in war are caused by those invisible enemies which scientists call "bacteria" or "micro-organisms." 
