SIXTY PER CENT VOTE

Although a part of the light vote cast in Floyd County at the primary election on Saturday night may be ascribed to the scarcity of contests for county offices, a rather considerable portion of the voters who did not go to the polls, did not go because of the fact that they felt they wanted to be free for the November elections.

WAS YOUR VOTE COUNTED?

Some who are going to fix things up to suit themselves will scratch off the statutory pledge, others will sign their names to the ballot, others simply put a check mark against the names of those for whom they want to vote, and so on.

Such votes as the above the election holders are required to throw out and do throw out as illegally cast or "mutilated" ballots.

To those who are not sure of themselves, we suggest that the presiding officer is named for the purpose of running the election, including the giving of information, showing voters how to cast their ballots, passing on the eli-gibility of voters, etc. Ask him, if you do not know. Among other things, it is tive show you how to vote, nor is it permissible to carry a ballot outside of the voting place. AN INDEPENDENT INCOME

During the year of 1927, eggs and cream, butter and poultry paid more grocery bills and bought more shoes for the children to wear to school than wheat did. They produced more net wealth for the people of the county than cotton did.

Wheat and cotton we would not have the people abandon, of course. They are valuable as surplus crops. They are essential. But they do not produce the year-around income that comes from the cow and the hen.

Figures compiled by Ed Bishop, secretary of the Floydada Chamber of Commerce, not for the purpose of making comparisons particularly, but simply for the information, show that dur-ing 1927 the income from butterfat, eggs, chickens and turkeys was \$475. in round figures, conservatively put. INOCULATING AGAINST TYPHOID

Reports of several cases of typhoid in Floydada by the City Health Offier, and his reminder that "August and September days are typhoid days" should interest every resident in the suggestion that the best preventive is a visit to the family physician and an inoculation against this costly and sometimes fatal

Screening for cleanliness is highly desirable, of course. Typhoid is a filth disease, carried principally by flies. But inoculation against it is so practicable, and so easily accomplished that the practice followed in the army of preventing deaths in the ranks of its men should also be followed in private

An epidemic of typhoid can only follow carelessness and indifference to the warning of the City Health Officer.

ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA, TEXAS. DETERMINING THE NECESSITY OF LEVYING AN ASSESSMENT AGAINST THE PROPERTY AND THE OWNERS THEREOF ABUTTING UPON A PORTION OF CALIFORNIA STREET, IN THE CITY OF FLOYDADA, TEXAS, FOR A PART OF THE COST OF IMPROVING SAID STREETS AND FIXING A TIME FOR A HEARING OF THE OWNERS OR AGENTS OF SAID OWNERS OF SAID PROPERTY OR OF ANY PERSONS INTERESTED IN SAID IMPROVEMENTS, AS PROVIDED BY CHAPTER 106, TITLE STREET AND ALLEY IMPROVEMENTS, GENERAL AND SPECIAL LAWS OF TEXAS PASSED BYTHE FORTIETH LEGISLATURE AT THE FIRST CALLED SESSION MAY 9TH TO JUNE 7TH 1927 AND THE ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA, AND DIRECTING THE CITY SECRETARY TO GIVE NOTICE OF SAID HEARING AND EXAMINING AND APPROVING THE STATEMENT OR REPORT OF THE CITY ENGINEER AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF FLOYDADA: That, whereas, the City Council of the City of Floydada, Texas, has heretofore by ordinance duly passed and approved ordered the improvements of the following streets and alleys to-wit:

California Street from the West property line of First Street to the West Property line of White Street;

AND WHEREAS: Plans and specifications for the improvements of said streets have been duly prepared and approved as required by Chapter 106, Title Street and alley Improvement, General, and Special Laws of Texas passed by the Fortieth Legislature at the First Called Session May 9th to June 7th, 1927, and the Ordinance of the City of Floydada; and

WHEREAS, as required by the said ordinance and Statutes, after advertising for bids, the work of improving said streets between the points above named has been let to the L. H. Lacy Co., to improve with a six inch reinforced concrete pavement, including excavating, grading and filling and concrete curbs and gutters and other necessary work in connection therewith, as provided by the said plans and specifications, and,

WHEREAS, a written contract has been entered into by and between the City of Floydada and L. H. Lacy Company on the 10th day of July, A. D. 1928, for the construction of said improvements;

WHEREAS, the said L. H. Lacy Company has duly given bond for the performance of said work, and the City Engineer of Floydada has, in accordance with the ordinance and statutes, filed his report with the City Council as to the cost of said improvements and as to all other matters required by ordinance and statute;

Now, Therefore, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF FLOYDADA: that the report or statement of the City Engineer filed with the City Council, describing the abutting property and giving the names of property owners and number of front feet and the cost of improvement chargeable against each property and its owner, having been duly examined, is hereby

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that the City Council does hereby determine to assess part of the cost of said improvements, against the owners of the property abutting thereon, and against their property, and that the total cost of said improvements shall be paid and defrayed as follows:

(a) The total cost of curbs shall be assessed against the abutting property and the owners thereof.

(b) The City of Floydada shall pay an amount equal to the cost of improving all intersections of said streets with other streets and alleys, said amount being equal to or great er than one-tenth of the total cost of said improvements (except cost of curbs)

cept cost of curbs).

(c) After deducting the proportion of the cost provided for in sub-sections (a) and (b) above, the total remaining (c) After deducting the proportion of the cost provided for in sub-sections (a) and (b) above, the total remaining cost of such improvements shall be paid by the owners of property abutting on said streets named to be improved, and shall be assessed against them and their respective parcels of land abutting on said streets, and said assessments shall be made in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 106, Title Street and Alley Improvements, General and Special Laws of Texas passed by the Fortieth Legislature at the First Called Session May 9th to June 7th, 1927, and the Ordinances of the City of Floydada. That the said assessment shall be made after the notice to such property owners and all interested persons and the hearing hereinafter mentioned, and that the said portion of the said cost of improvements to be assessed against such property owners and their property shall be in accordance with the Front Foot Rule or Plan in the proportion that the frontage of the property of each owner bears to the whole frontage of the property to be improved; provided, that after such hearing, if such plan of apportionment be found to be not just and equitable in particular instances, the City council shall so apportion all said costs as to produce a substantial equality between all such property owners abutting on said portion of said streets having in view the enhanced value of that property and the benefits derived from such improvements, and the burdens imposed upon them by such assessments, and that in no event shall any assessment be made against any owner or his property in excess of the enhanced value of such property by reason of such improvement. That the proportionate cost of such improvements which is contemplated to be assessed against such owners and their properties shall become due and payable as follows:

One tenth payable within sixty (60) days after completion and acceptance of the work by the City of Floydada, Texas; one tenth payable one year after said date; one tenth payable two years after said date; one tenth payable three years after said date; one tenth payable four years after said date; one tenth payable five years after said date; one tenth payable six years after said date; one tenth payable seven years after said date; one tenth payable eight years after said date; one tenth payable nine years after said date, together with interest from said date at the rate of eight (8) per cent per annum, and reasonable attorney's fees and all costs of collection in case of default. That a hearing shall be given to said owners, their agents and attorneys, and any person or persons interested in said improvements, before the City Council of the city of Floydada as provided by the provisions of Chapter 106, Title Street and Alley Improvements, General and Special Laws of Texas passed by the Fortieth Legislature at the First Called Session May 9th to June 7th, 1927, and the Ordinance of the City of Floydada, which said hearing shall be had on the 17th day of August 1928; at 9 o'clock a. m., in the City Hall in the City of Floydada, Texas, and which said hearing shall be continued from day to day and from time to time, as may be necessary to give all said property owners, their agents or attorneys, and any interested person or persons, the right to appear and be heard in any manner concerning the said improvements or said assessment, or the benefits thereof to their said property, or to any other matter of things in connection therewith, or to contest said assessment, and at such hearing a full and fair opportunity shall be extended to said property owners, their agents or attorneys, and to all interested persons, to be heard with respect to such improvements.

Said City Secretary may also mail a copy of said notice by registered letter to each of said property owners, if known, or their agents or attorneys, if known, said letters to be deposited in a post office in the City of Floydada, at least ten days before the date set for hearing. However, said notice by registered letter shall be cumulative only, and notice by publication shall be full, due and proper notice of said hearing. It shall not be necessary to the validity of said notice of hearing to name any property owner abutting on said street or alley and the fact that any such property owners are incorrectly named or not named at all shall in no wise effect the validity of the assessment against said property nor the personal liability against the real and true owner or owners of said property. No errors or omissions in the descriptions of the properties abutting on said street or alley shall in any wise invalidate said assessment, but it shall be the duty of such property owner or owners whose property is incorrectly described to furnish a proper description at the hearing or hearings provided for. No error or omission of any character, in the proceedings shall invalidate any assessment or any certificate issued in evidence thereof.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, BY THE CITY OF FLOYDADA: That the fact that the improvement of the streets herein named is being delayed pending the taking effect of this ordinance, and that the conditions of said portion of said streets and alleys endangers the public health, safety and property and create an urgent public necessity for the immediate preservation of the public peace, property, health and safety, requiring that the rules providing that no ordinance shall be passed on the day on which it shall be introduced, and providing that no ordinance shall become effective until ten days after the date of its last publication, and requiring that said ordinance be published once a week for two consecutive weeks in some newspaper published in the City of Floydada, be and the same are each hereby suspended, and that this ordinance shall be and is hereby passed as an emergency measure, and shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.





ORDINANCE NO. 115

ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA, TEXAS, DETERMINING THE NECESSITY OF LEVYING AN ASSESSMENT AGAINST THE PROPERTY AND THE OWNERS THEREOF ABUTTING UPON A PORTION OF VIRGINIA, FIFTH AND MISSISSIPPI STREETS, AND SOUTH ONE-HALF OF THE NORTH AND SOUTH ALLEY IN BLOCK 62 OF THE ORIGINAL TOWNSITE OF FLOYDADA, IN THE CITY OF FLOYDADA, TEXAS, FOR A PART OF THE COST OF IMPROVING SAID STREETS AND ALLEYS AND FIXING A TIME FOR A HEARING OF THE OWNERS OF AGENTS OF SAID OWNERS OF SAID PROPERTY OR OF ANY PERSON INTERESTED IN SAID IMPROVEMENTS, AS PROVIDED BY CHAPTER 106, TITLE STREET AND ALLEY IMPROVEMENTS, GENERAL AND SPECIAL LAWS OF TEXAS PASSED BY THE FORTIETH LEGISLATURE AT THE FIRST CALLED SESSION MAY 9TH TO JUNE 7TH 1927 AND THE ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA, AND DIRECTING THE CITY SECRETARY TO GIVE NOTICE OF SAID HEARING AND EXAMINING AND APPROVING THE STATEMENT OR REPORT OF THE CITY ENGINEER, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF FLOYDADA: That, whereas, the City Council of the City of Floydada, Texas has heretofore by ordinance duly passed and approved ordered the improvement of the following streets and alleys to-wit

Virginia Street from the East Line of Fifth Street to the East Line of Main Street;

Fifth Street from the north line of Missouri Street to the north line of Virginia Street;

Mississippi Street from the east line of Main Street to the west line of the Q. A. & P. Railway right-of-way;

South one-half of north and south alley in Block 62; of the Original Townsite of Floydada;

AND WHEREAS: Plans and specifications for the improvements of said streets and alleys have been duly prepare and approved as required by Chapter 106, Title Street and alley Improvement, General and Special Laws of Texas passed by the Fortieth Legislature at the First Called Session May 9th to June 7th, 1927, and the Ordinance of the City of Floydada and

WHEREAS, as required by the said ordinance and Statutes, after advertising for bids, the work of improving said streets and alleys between the points above named has been let to the L. H. Lacy Co. to improve with a six inch reinforced concrete payement, including excavating, grading and filling and concrete curbs and gutters and other necessary work in connection therewith, as provided by the said plans and specifications, and,

WHEREAS, a written contract has been entered into by and between the City of Floydada and L. H. Lacy Company on the 10th day of July, A. D. 1928, for the construction of said improvements;

WHEREAS, the said L. H. Lacy Company has duly given bond for the performance of said work, and the City Engineer of Floydada has, in accordance with the ordinance and statutes, filed his report with the City Council as to the cost of said improvements and as to all other matters required by ordinance and statute;

Now, Therefore, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF FLOYDADA: that the report or statement of the City Engineer filed with the City Council, describing the abutting property and giving the names of property owners and number of front feet and the cost of improvement chargeable against each property and its owner, having been duly examined, is here

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that the City Council does hereby determine to assess part of the cost of said improvements, against the owners of the property abutting thereon, and against their property, and that the total cost of said improvements shall be paid and defrayed as follows:

(a) The total cost of curbs and walks shall be assessed against the abutting property and the owners thereof.

(b) The City of Floydada shall pay an amount equal to the cost of improving all intersections of said streets and alleys with other streets and alleys, said amount being equal to or greater than one-tenth of the total cost of said improve-

ments (except cost of curbs and walks).

(c) After deducting the proportion of the cost provided for in sub-sections (a) and (b) above, the total remaining cost of such improvements shall be paid by the owners of property abutting on said streets and alleys named to be improved, and shall be assessed against them and their respective parcels of land abutting on said streets and alleys, and said assessment shall be made in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 106, Title Street and Alley Improvements, General and Special Laws of Texas passed by the Fortieth Legislature at the First Called Session May 9th to June 7th, 1927, and the Ordinances of the City of Floydada. That the said assessment shall be made after the notice to such property owners and all interested persons and the hearing hereinafter mentioned, and that the said portion of the said cost of improvements to be assessed against such property owners and their property shall be in accordance with the Front Foot Rule or Plan in the proportion that the frontage of the property of each owner bears to the whole frontage of the property to be improved; provided, that after such hearing, if such plan of apportionment be found to be not just and equitable in particular instances, the City council shall so apportion all said cost as to produce a substantial equality between all such property owners abutting on said portion of said streets and alleys having in view the enhanced value of that property and the benefits derived from such improvements, and the burdens imposed upon them by such assessments, and that in no event shall any assessment be made against any owner or his property in excess of the enhanced value of such property by reason of such improvement. That the proportionate cost of such improvements which is contemplated to be assessed against such owners
