





## Funds Too Limited For Celebration At Sterley

Committee From Denver Towns Unable To Procure Necessary Funds For Fete Survey Indicates.

From The Plainview Herald:  
When it appeared that the financing of the proposed celebration at Sterley Junction upon the inauguration of train service over the new Ft. Worth and Denver South Plains Railway lines would be practically impossible after surveying the various cities interested in the project the Executive Committee of the celebration, named after the mass meeting at Turkey during the latter part of May, in session at Lockney Thursday went on record favoring the discontinuance of the plans for staging the celebration.

This means in short that the Sterley celebration has been called off so far as the towns along the line are concerned.

The meeting at Lockney Thursday was attended by Asa E. Ramsey and Maury Hopkins of Plainview. Ramsey of the Committee and Hopkins, Secretary.

Following a report from J. W. Davenport of Childress, Chairman of a committee appointed several weeks ago to prepare an estimate of the cost of the celebration that the finance plans might be definitely completed, that the celebration including a free barbecue would cost approximately \$9,200.00 various committeemen were called upon to state how much their respective cities would be willing to contribute to the fund. Plainview's part on a prorata basis would have been \$1,800.00. Childress and Plainview representatives indicated that their cities would be willing to pay these amounts. Lubbock's part would have been around \$3,500.00, and A. B. Davis, secretary of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce stated that they could not give more than \$600.00 to the celebration fund, and suggested that instead of having a joint celebration a special train bearing the officials of the road and such other visitors as possible be operated into all of the cities on the line, and that each city have such reception or celebration as it wanted when the train came to town. As Quitaque, and Lockney stated they would not be willing to pay anything on the expense of the celebration, so a motion prevailed indicating that the financing plans could not be successfully put over and that the calling off of the celebration is necessary. Maury Hopkins, A. B. Davis, and J. W. Davenport were named a committee to confer with the Fort Worth and Denver officials relative to the special train idea and having smaller celebrations at each of the cities on the new lines.

F. D. Daggett, General Passenger Agent of The Fort Worth and Denver City Railway Company was in attendance at the meeting.

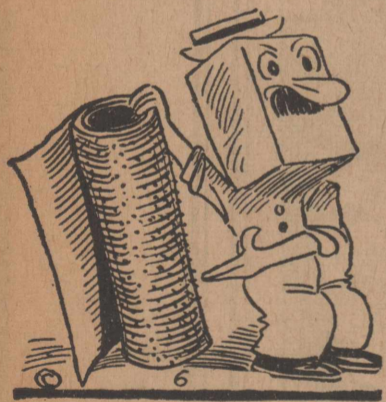

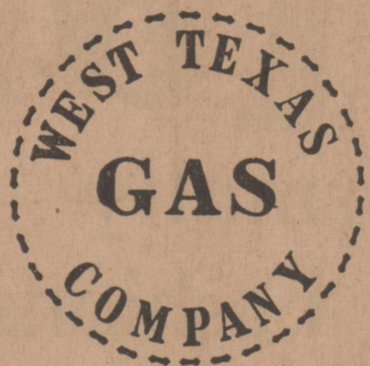

**Safe Insurance**

A recent examination of the records of the Supreme Court of Allegany County New York, discloses 185 transcripts of judgments on file as a result of the failure of the Fidelity Cooperative Fire Insurance Co. 

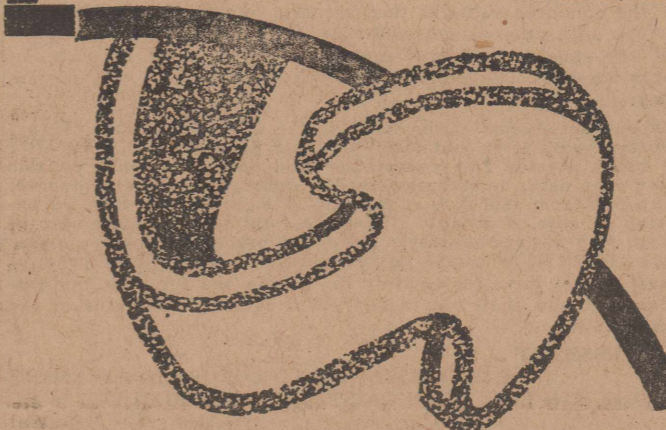

## Escape From Problem of Clothing Not Possible

Clothing Specialist Tells Club Girls Clothes Have Much to Do With Mental Attitude.

College Station, Texas, Aug. 1.—What are your clothes doing for you? Do they determine where you go, how much you invite company to your home, whether you attend church and where, how much you eat and drink, how large your checking account is at the bank? They may determine many of these things and others as well, Miss Mamie Grimes, clothing specialist of the Experiment Station, A. & M. College of Texas, declared in a talk before the girls group at the nineteenth annual Farmers Short Course here.

Clothes are a vital part of people and present a problem from which there seems no escape chiefly because of what for lack of a better term we call "clothes consciousness", the specialist said. People are never able to forget for any appreciable length of time the presence or lack of clothing.

Clothing has been given many definitions, Miss Grimes continued. "It is called the artificial skin. It is that which is between us and the rest of the world. It is in spite of all we may say to the contrary, a part of us and forms a problem from which there is no escape.

"Clothes were first worn by our ancestors, either as a protection, for ornamentation or for the sake of modesty. At present our chief motive for the use of clothes is that of habit or custom. Present styles indicate that our purpose is no longer solely that of modesty. Clothes always reflect the spirit of the age. Present day dress is for a busy, active people."

Clothes have much to do with the mental attitude, Miss Grimes said. "When feeling blue, try dressing up in your favorite dress," she advised the girls. "When you feel it doesn't matter what you wear or how you look, take particular care with your dressing and see if it doesn't help". It is often possible to change mental attitude by merely changing costume, the specialist said.

"The materials of which our clothes are made and their style or manner of cut have a decided psychological effect upon us. Silks which are thin, light, easily flowing, give us grace, ease of motion and comfort. On the other hand, heavy ceremonial silks, such as those which 'stood alone' in grandmother's day give us restraint and dignity. Colors, too have their own effect, both physical and mental on the wearer and observer.

"Clothes of improper fit and selection may ruin an otherwise good disposition. Few of us are so constructed that we can entirely forget our clothes. They are even of such importance to us that so small a thing as a hole in a stocking may spoil an evening's pleasure."

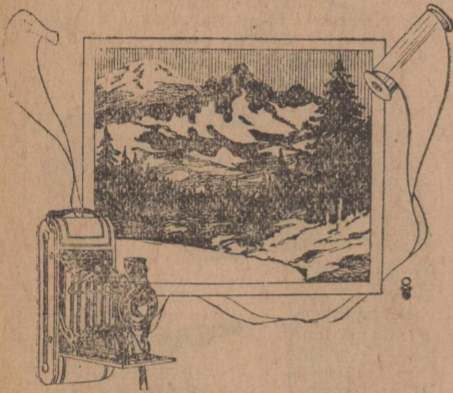
