COTTON LOOKS GOOD

While the cotton farmer still has his shop. plenty of things to worry him, what with the possibility of boll worms where the rain has been excessive and the market, which has not been so strong the past several days, the outlook for production per acre in the county this season is good.

The same thing may be said of the

feed crop. Row feed crops look as good as they should be expected at this season. Plenty of feed, where sufficient acreage was put in, is assured. It is this last statement that is more comforting than the good cotton outlook The bulls and bears may deal the cotton raiser quite a bit of misery in the markets, but they can't get him both down and out if he has the feed stuffs with which to keep his live stock, poultry and cream side lines going good.

Cotton is a good surplus crop if everything, including the market, is right. Feedstuffs is the insurance policy that keeps the farm plant going when the cotton situation goes wrong.

NEW IDEAS WORTH WHILE

In the building of towns and the development of a country many of the old time tried practices are beginning to fall before the newer lines of thought being introduced especially by what we term the "new comers". Many of the things that the old timers have agreed from time immemorial are highlyproper and necessary are found to be not so essential while some of the practices which are looked at askance by those of long residence are being proved as good by the "new comers

One of the things hardest for an oldtimer to fight is the business of getting in a rut in his manner of financing, in his way of getting things done and in his relations to the public. A newcomer, these old timers should remember, having moved into the country, invested his funds, and gone to work trying to make himself and his family a living, the while aiding in the general development, has every right that any of us have to be heard in the community councils. If his ideas are given due consideration he may tell us some things we need to know, although he will be reticent likely in putting himself forward too much. We get in the habit of thinking the way we do things is the only way they can be done. That's how the old story got started about the boy going to mill horseback with corn in one end of the sack and a rock in the other, because his grandfather did it.





Mississippi Street from the east line of Main Street to the west line of the Q. A. & P. Railway right-of-way:

South one-half of north and south alley in Block 62; of the Original Townsite of Floydada;

AND WHEREAS: Plans and specifications for the improvements of said streets and alleys have been duly prepared and approved as required by Chapter 106, Title Street and alley Improvement, General and Special Laws of Texas passed by the Fortieth Legislature at the First Called Session May 9th to June 7th, 1927, and the Ordinance of the City of Floydada;

WHEREAS, as required by the said ordinance and Statutes, after advertising for bids, the work of improving said streets and alleys between the points above named has been let to the L. H. Lacy Co. to improve with a six inch reinforced concrete pavement, including excavating, grading and filling and concrete curbs and gutters and other necessary work in connection therewith, as provided by the said plans and specifications, and,

WHEREAS, a written contract has been entered into by and between the City of Floydada and L. H. Lacy Company on the 10th day of July, A. D. 1928, for the construction of said improvements;

WHEREAS, the said L. H. Lacy Company has duly given bond for the performance of said work, and the City Engineer of Floydada has, in accordance with the ordinance and statutes, filed his report with the City Council as to the cost of said improvements and as to all other matters required by ordinance and statute;

Now, Therefore, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF FLOYDADA: that the report or statement of the City Engineer filed with the City Council, describing the abutting property and giving the names of property owners and number of front feet and the cost of improvement chargeable against each property and its owner, having been duly examined, is here-

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that the City Council does hereby determine to assess part of the cost of said improvements, against the owners of the property abutting thereon, and against their property, and that the total cost of said improvements shall be paid and defrayed as follows:

(a) The total cost of curbs and walks shall be assessed against the abutting property and the owners thereof.

(b) The City of Floydada shall pay an amount equal to the cost of improving all intersections of said streets and alleys with other streets and alleys, said amount being equal to or greater than one-tenth of the total cost of said improvements (except cost of curbs and walks).

(c) After deducting the proportion of the cost provided for in sub-sections (a) and (b) above, the total remaining cost of such improvements shall be paid by the owners of property abutting on said streets and alleys named to be improved, and shall be assessed against them and their respective parcels of land abutting on said streets and alleys, and said assessment shall be made in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 106, Title Street and Alley Improvements, General an dSpecial Laws of Texas passed by the Fortieth Legislature at the First Called Session May 9th to June 7th, 1927, and the Ordinances of the City of Floydada. That the said assessment shall be made after the notice to such property owners and all interested persons and the hearing hereinafter mentioned, and that the said portion of the said cost of improvements to be assessed against such property owners and their property shall be in accordance with the Front Foot Rule or Plan in the proportion that the frontage of the property of each owner bears to the whole frontage of the property to be improved; provided, that after such hearing, if such plan of apportionment be found to be not just and equitable in particular instances, the City council shall so apportion all said cost as to produce a substantial equality between all such property owners abutting on said portion of said streets and alleys having in view the enhanced value of that property and the benefits derived from such improvements, and the burdens imposed upon them by such assessments, and that in no event shall any assess ment be made against any owner or his property in excess of the enhanced value of such property by reason of such in provement. That the proportionate cost of such improvements which is contemplated to be assessed against such owner and their properties shall become due and payable as follows:

One tenth payable within sixty (60) days after completion and acceptance of the work by the City of Floydada, Texas; one tenth payable one year after said date; one tenth payable two years after said date; one tenth payable four years after said date; one tenth payable five years after said date; one tenth payable six years after said date; one tenth payable six years after said date; one tenth payable sight years after said date; one tenth pay ter and walks and the grand total thereof, which said sum does not and shall not in any event exceed nine-tenths of the total cost of said improvements, except curbs and walks is as follows:

No errors or omissions in the descriptions of the properties abutting on said street or alley shall in any wise invalidate said assessment, but it shall be the duty of such property owner or owners whose property is incorrectly described to furnish a proper description at the hearing or hearings provided for. No error or omission of any character, in the proceedings shall invalidate any assessment or any certificate issued in evidence thereof.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, BY THE CITY OF FLOYDADA: That the fact that the improvement of the streets and alleys herein named is being delayed pending the taking effect of this ordinance, and that the conditions of said portion of said streets and alleys endangers the public health, safety and property and creates an urgent public necessity for the immediate preservation of the public peace, property, health and safety, requiring that the rules providing that no ordinance shall be passed on the day on which it shall be introduced, and providing that no ordinance shall become effective until ten days after the date of its last publication, and requiring that said ordinance be published once a week for two consecutive weeks in some newspaper published in the City of Floydada, be and the same are each hereby suspended, and that this ordinance shall be and is hereby passed as an emergency measure, and shall take effect and be in force from and after its

ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA, TEXAS, DETERMINING THE NECESSITY OF LEVYING AN ASSESSMENT AGAINST THE PROPERTY AND THE OWNERS THEREOF ABUTTING UPON A PORTION OF CALIFORNIA STREET, IN THE CITY OF FLOYDADA, TEXAS, FOR A PART OF THE COST OF IMPROVING SAID STREETS AND FIXING A TIME FOR A HEARING OF THE OWNERS OR AGENTS OF SAID OWNERS OF SAID PROPERTY OR OF ANY PERSONS INTERESTED IN SAID IMPROVEMENTS, AS PROVIDED BY CHAPTER 106, TITLE STREET AND ALLEY IMPROVEMENTS, CENERAL AND SPECIAL LAWS OF TEXAS PASSED BYTHE FORTIETH LEGISLATURE AT THE FIRST CALLED SESSION MAY 9TH TO JUNE 7TH 1927 AND THE ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA, AND DIRECTING THE CITY SECRETARY TO GIVE NOTICE OF SAID HEARING AND EXAMINING AND APPROVING THE STATEMENT OR REPORT OF THE CITY ENGINEER AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, BY THE CITY OF FLOYDADA: That the fact that the improvement of the streets herein named is being delayed pending the taking effect of this ordinance, and that the conditions of said portion of said streets and alleys endangers the public health, safety and property and create an urgent public necessity for the immediate preservation of the public peace, property, health and safety, requiring that the rules providing that no ordinance shall be passed on the day on which it shall be introduced, and providing that no ordinance shall become effective until ten days after the date of its last publication, and requiring that said ordinance be published once a week for two consecutive weeks in some newspaper published in the City of Floydada, be and the same are each hereby suspended, and that this ordinance shall be and is hereby passed as an emergency measure, and shall take effect and be in force from and after its


