The tax rate in Floyd County for the current year will be the same as last year, the Commissioners' Court Monday voting to put the rate at 65 cents, instead of at 68 cents as voted Monday of last week. However, the apportionment to different funds is slightly different to that of last year.

The levy made gives 25 cents to the general fund, 15 cents of the county road and bridge fund, 15 cents to the special road and bridge fund, 5 cents to the building fund and 5 cents to the jury fund. Last year there was no levy for the building fund on account of a surplus accumulating in that fund that cared for all the interest coupons and warrants on the jail building. The jury fund levy last year was 4 cents and an advaloren tax of six cents for upkeep of the court house grounds, janitor's salary and incidentals was levied. This last-named fund will receive no funds from the 1928 tax.

Exploration Oil Company's No 1 Boon on the Johnson Homestead Survey two miles northwest of Sand Hill, is giving off a non-inflammable gas from a hard lime at about sea level this week while the drill is stopped for a welding job on the bit, the past being sent to Borger for the purpose, Miss Lucy Crum, of the Gamble Land Company, said this morning.

The drillers think the gas is helium. As the gas comes out of the hole around the bailer, it has about the appearance of gray smoke from a wood-stove fire, Miss Crum said.





ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA, That whereas the City Council of the City of Floydada, and Eldy and Seesement against the property and the owners thereof abutting upon a portion of virginia, main, and wall streets, and the east and west alley in block 61, of the original townsite of floydada, in the city of floydada, texas, for a part of the cost of improving said streets and alleys, and fixing a time for a hearing of the owners, or agents of said owners, of said property, or of any persons interested in said improvements, as provided by chapter 106, title street and alley improvements, general and special laws passed by the fortieth legislature at the first called session, may 9th to june 7th, 1927, and the ordinance of the city of floydada, and directing the city secretary to give notice of said hearing, and examining and approving the statement or report of the city engineer, and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF FLOYDADA: That, whereas, the City Council of the City of Floydada, Texas has heretofore by ordinance duly passed and approved ordered the improvement of the following streets

Virginia Street from the East property line of Main Street to the East property line of Wall Street
Main Street from a point 4.5 feet South of the North property line of Virginia Street to a point 9.5 feet
North of the South property line of Jackson Street
Wall Street from the South property line of Mississippi Street to the South property line of Kentucky Street
Wall Street from the South property line of Kentucky Street to the South property line of Tennessee Street
Wall Street from the South property line of Tennessee Street to the South property line of Georgia Street
Wall Street from the South property line of Georgia Street to the South property line of Houston Street

The East and West Alley in Block 61, Original Townsite of Floydada, from the East property line of Main
Street to the West property line of Wall Street

AND WHEREAS; plans and specifications for the improvement of said streets and alleys have been duly prepared and approved as required by Chapter 106, Title Street and Alley Improvements, General and Special Laws of Texas passed by the Fortieth Legislature at the First Called Session, May 9th to June 7th, 1927 and the Ordinance of the City of Floydada; and

WHEREAS; as required by the said ordinance and statutes, after advertising for bids, the work of improving said streets, and alleys, between the points above named has been let to the L. H. Lacy Co. to improve with a sixinch reinforced concrete pavement, including excavating, grading, and filling and concrete curbs and gutters, and other necessary work in connection therewith, as provided by the said plans and specifications; and

WHEREAS, a written contract has been entered into by and between the City of Floydada and L. H. Lacy Co. on the 17th day of August A. D. 1928, for the construction of said improvements;

WHEREAS, the said L. H. Lacy Co. has duly given bond for the performance of said work, and the City Engineer, of Floydada has, in accordance with the ordinance and the statutes, filed his report with the City Council as to the cost of said improvements, and as to all other matters required by ordinance and statutes;

Now, therefore, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF FLOYDADA: That the report or statement of the City Engineer filed with the City Council describing the abutting property and giving the names of property owners and number of front feet and the cost of improvement chargeable against each property and its owner, having been duly examined, is hereby approved.

(c) After deducting the proportion of the costs provided for in sub-sections (a) and (b) above the total remaining cost of such improvements shall be paid by the owners of property abutting on said streets and alleys named to be improved, and shall be assessed against them and their respective parcels of land abutting on said streets and alleys and said assessment shall be made in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 106, Title Street and Alley Improvements, General and Special Laws of Texas, passed by the Fortieth Legislature at the First Called Session, May 9th to June 7th 1927, and the Odrinances of the City of Floydada, That the said assessment shall be made after the notice to such property owners and all interested persons, and the hearing hereinafter mentioned, and that the said portion of the said cost of improvements to be assessed against such property owners and their property shall be in accordance with the Front Foot Rule or Plan, in the proportion that the frontage of the property of each owner bears to the whole frontage of the property to be improved; provided, that after such hearing, if such plan of apportionment be found to be not just and equitable in particular instances, the City Council shall so apportion all said cost as to produce a substantial equality between all such property owners abutting on said portion of said streets and alleys, having in view the enhanced value of that property, and the benefits derived from such improvements, and the burdens imposed upon them by such assessment, and that in no event shall any assessment be made against any owner or his property in excess of the enhanced value of such property by reason of such improvement. That the proportionate cost of such improvement which is contemplated to be assessed against such owners and their properties shall become due and payable as follows:

One tenth payable within sixty (60) days after completion and acceptance of the work by the City of Floydade, Texas; one-tenth payable one year after said date; one-tenth payable two years after said date; one-tenth payable four years after said date; one-tenth payable five years after said date; one-tenth payable six years after said date; one-tenth payable seven years after said date; one-tenth payable eight, years after said date; one-tenth payable nine years after said date, together with interest from said date at the rate of eight (8) per cent per annum, and reasonable attorney's fees and all costs of collection in case of default. That the total proportionate part of such improvement which is contemplated to be assessed against such owners and their respective properties, and the names of the owners of property abutting upon said streets and alleys, aforesaid, properties to be improved and description of that property, and the several amounts proposed to be assessed against them respectively for paying and for curb and gutter, and walks, and the grand total thereof; which said sum does not and shall not in any event exceed nine-tenths of the total cost of said improvements, except curbs and walks, is as follows:
