
Declaring that continued progress is assured through organized research, he says that this progress will come more prominently to the fore with every year that goes by.

SOLD IN 1927 According to the report of the Lamp Committee of the National

Electric Light Association at its recent convention, 525 million electric lamps of all kinds were sold in the United States during the year 1927. Of these, 305,000,000 were the large tungsten filament lamps such as is used generally in lighting, an in-crease of 3.7% over 1926, and 12,500,-000 were the large carbon filament elbow:


