

The following guests were present: Linda Young, Shanda Davis, Valda Burkhalter, Mary Pat Williams, D'Lynn Reed, Brad Thiessen, Kathy Switser, Linda Swain and Jeanie Boggs. The invocation was given by Kenton Kimball.

The principals gave their report on their respective campuses. Supt. Vernon Paul gave his report on transportation, tax collection which is at 95.87%. The budget is where it needs to be this place in time. Child nutrition audit was excellent. Mr. Paul also reported that the school received a \$13,400.00 grant for summer school.

The claims and accounts for the month were approved for payment. The minutes from the previous board meeting were approved as read. In other business, the board accepted the mission statement that was recommended by the District Improvement Council. It is as follows:

The District Improvement Council prepared a list of goals for the school. They are as follows:


1. SISD will provide an environment and procedures on each campus that develops within each student self-discipline and an effective work ethic.
