I am the owner of a small apartment complex in Stratford, When needed, St. Jude Texas. She called the City Police officer who was on duty at the time and he came by and talked with me about the situation and left saying he would contact the sheriff and be back soon. This was around 3:00 p.m. Time went by and when no one came back I again called the Sherman County dispatcher and was told that the doctor could not be reached and without him nothing could be done. I then hung up the phone and called the doctor myself. He told me there was no problem-that he would go by his office to pick up the needed paper work and would either come to Stratford and pick up the patient or the sheriff could bring him down to meet him at his reside at the apartment who office. I then called the Sheriffs Office to tell them the arrangements had been made and for them to come and pick him up. More time passed and when they still did not arrive I again called the Sheriffs Office. Eventually they did show up and talked with me about the situation. They agreed to go up to the apartment where he was staying. When we went out into the hall you could smell something burning. When the door to the apartment was finally opened they found that a glass pan had been placed on an electric burner and left there until it exploded all over the kitchen. He was trying to make himself something to eat but in his confused state of mind was unable to do so. They came back down the stairs a few minutes later. There were four of them. The Sheriff, the Chief of Police and two deputies. I was told that he was just fine-he was just cooking

Now, I'm not exactly a rocket scientist, but I do know the difference between a Protective Order and a Restraining Order, but they refused to do what was required of them. The only one made suggestions as to what might be done was Chanze Fowler and he was completely ignored. I was told that the only way they would do anything was for me or someone else to sign a complaint against General him. Some of the other residents then offered to sign a complaint for disturbing the peace, but were told that they couldn't take their word for it. They would have to observe it for themselves. All this time you could hear him pacing back and forth and shouting at no one in particular. Again you could smell something burning inside his apartment. I asked about that because I had been told by them that they couldn't do anything unless he was a "danger to himself or others". Now if burning down the whole apartment building doesn't constitute a "danger to self or others" I don't know what would, but they again refused to take any action. I was told by Sheriff Haile that he was not about to be sued for taking him into custody. I don't know who he thought was going to sue him. His family wanted him hospitalized. His friends and neighbors wanted him hospitalized, as did I, who was representing him through his signed and notarized power of attorney. Well, people can be sued for NOT doing their job too. In the medical profession it's called malpractice, in his line of work it's just plain incompetence.

There were four people who present during all or part of these proceedings so it is not just my word against theirs. All that I am telling you can be collaborated. At least two of us were present at all times and most of the time there were three and sometimes four. About this time a window screen came flying out of the upstairs apartment where he was standing and crashed to the sidewalk not twenty feet from where we were standing. I looked at the Sheriff and said" There, I know you saw that. Is that not enough for you to do something?" I told him to get whatever papers he needed and I would sign whatever was needed if that was the only way.

The next morning the doctor called me to inquire how he was and where he was being held. They had not even contacted him.

As it happened, he did not leave the county after all. Instead
