
In the nomination letter submitted for the award, it was said of the then lieutenant, "Lieutenant Penley is one of those rare of-

Freezin' reason

I was driving by the golf course when there was snow on the ground, and noticed they were watering it. I'd like to know why they are spending the money watering the golf course when it's covered with snow.

Snow must be removed from greens anytime the temperature rises above 32 degrees. If the snow is not removed, the temperature between the green surface and the snow causes a fungus to start growing. Fungus is very difficult to control on the green and the cost to replace a green is between \$15,000 to \$20,000. No drinking water is used to water greens at the Golf Course; all our water comes from the sewage plant.

Smoke signals

I would like to know why we are restricted to two cartons of cigarettes at the Commissary when the Texas state law doesn't require that, and no other regulation that I know of.

Texas State Law, Levy of Taxes Article 7047C-3, Section 3, states, "No officers, soldiers, sailors, nurses or Marines in the U.S. Army, Navy or Marine Corp of the United States shall remove from the confines of any military or Navy post or reservation in this state, cigarettes without the State Tax Stamp affixed to the package in the quantities of more than forty cigarettes." Further, AFCOMSR 145-2, G-4 establishes a two carton limit, or the state limit, whichever is greater, per customer. Using the

AFCOMS Regulation as their guide, AFCOMS has established a two carton limit for Texas installation Commissaries.

Meat of the problem

I am wondering why we cannot have SOS gravy with bacon or sausage at the Dining Hall. While visiting other bases, I was able to get SOS gravy and potatoes along with my eggs. Why can't we have this at Reese?

In the past, the Dining Hall gave SOS and bacon or sausage. This was highly acceptable; however, it was also part of the reason for the Dining Hall sustaining a loss of 2% or the contractor will be held liable. This regulation further states that only one meat item may be served at a time (SOS gravy is considered a meat item).

Hospital offers services to base

We at USAF Hospital Reese really care.

Every person, beginning at the top with our hospital commander, Col. Lloyd McLaughlin, to every civilian and military member on our staff, believes thoroughly that our hospital is a service organization. Service organizations operate best when there is positive, two-way cooperation. There are several ways you, as the user of our hospital, can help in bolstering our efficiency as well as increasing satisfaction with your care at our facility.

Scheduled appointments at the Reese medical facility serve a dual purpose. First, they permit the maximum use of our limited number of health providers and secondly, we are able to serve the greatest number of health care beneficiaries within the shortest possible waiting period. Failure to keep or cancel appointments denies appointments to many of our other patients.

To keep this problem at a

minimum we have installed a phone recorder for cancelling appointments. When you cancel your appointment early enough, another patient is then able to be seen, increasing our provider's productivity. This recorder is on seven days a week, 24 hours a day and can be reached by calling 885-3151.

Another way you can assist us is by knowing our "sick call" procedures. Active duty members can call for a "sick call" appointment from 7 to 7:30 a.m. Monday through Friday at Ext. 3245. After 7:30 a.m., all personnel can come into our Primary Care screening office and be scheduled by the personnel in that area.

Calls for "sick call" after 7:30 a.m. cannot be taken through the Central Appointment System because they no longer have that day's "sick call" book. It is important to remember that actual "sick call" time is from 7:30 to 8 a.m. Scheduling for a "sick call" appointment guarantees you of seeing a health care provider as soon

Another method that will assist you and the hospital is to only use our "Emergency Services" when an emergency exists. Our medical personnel must be ready to respond to any in-flight emergency as well as any automobile, personal injury or severe medical problems requiring immediate care.

People who come into the emergency room because they have had a cough or sore throat for five days or such similar problem reduce precious response time when a real emergency develops. With better use of our appointment cancellation system more appointments will become available for immediate appointments in our Primary Care Clinic.

One last point. Become involved with your hospital. Too many people think that the hospital is only for the sick or injured. More and more emphasis is being placed on "Preventive Medicine."

Our hospital provides free information for a variety of medical subjects. Additionally, we have person-

nel assigned to help you understand medicine better by providing classes, free lectures and pamphlets, through the Health Education Coordinator's office.

We can always use volunteers, yet each year volunteer numbers decline. Unfortunately, each year our monthly outpatient load increases and as of this date we are averaging 6,200 outpatient visits each month. That's amazing when you remember that the active duty population on base is only 2,700 strong.

We can't always give the answers that you'd like to hear but we'll always strive to provide professional medical care, courteous service and a positive, can-do attitude. Housing Referral outlines regulations

Most Air Force personnel are cognizant of the fact that AFR 30-15 requires that all Permanent Change of Station transferees and those personnel traveling Temporary Duty for 30 days or more, must report to the Housing Referral Office at the new duty station prior to entering into any rental, lease or purchase agreement for off-base housing.

However, many Air Force families are unaware that AFB 90-10 requires that all personnel seeking off-base housing must process through the HRO Prior to making any commitments for the purchase, rental or lease of any real estate. This means that anyone living in unaccompanied personnel quarters, family housing and those personnel living in the civilian community desiring to change their place of residence, must process through the HRO.

One of the prime reasons for available for personnel reporting to the HRO is to ensure houses for sale or rent.

that all personnel are aware of the property owners/agents or firms who have been placed on restrictive sanction lists by the base commander for acts of discrimination in housing. Military personnel moving into or changing their place of residence within the commuting area of the installation are prohibited from entering into a rental, purchase or lease agreement with an agent of a facility that is under restrictive sanction.

Many other positive benefits may be derived from processing through HRO. Area maps, offbase brochures, community information and various Veterans' Administration and Housing and Urban Development pamphlets are available, in addition to counseling on Texas State Landlord and Tenant laws, financing, purchasing and sale of homes. The HRO staff keeps abreast of local problems and developments which could affect city and county residents. A listing service is also available for personnel who have



BARRY L. BEATY, D.O. Blacks proudly served

From the American Revolution to the Vietnam War, blacks have fought proudly.

Even before the Revolution, blacks were involved in the fight for freedom. One of the first men to give his life for American independence was Crispus Attucks, a runaway slave. He was killed when British soldiers fired on a crowd in Boston, March 5, 1770.

One thousand black enlisted troops fought for their new nation during the Revolutionary War.

Blacks served in integrated army and navy units during the early years of the republic. But from the Civil War to the start of the Korean conflict, they fought under a separate but equal policy.

Turning to the west after the Civil War, they fought Apaches and Sioux, defeating Chief Victorio and capturing Geronimo.

Blacks fought with Teddy Roosevelt's Rough Riders on San

More than two million blacks registered for the draft in World War I, many seeing action with the 92nd and 93rd Divisions. After the Armistice, the black units were deactivated. Only a



handful of senior black officers remained in uniform.

One was Lt. Col. Benjamin O. Davis Sr. who became the first black Army general. His son, Benjamin O. Davis Jr., was only the second black to be graduated from West Point.

In 1941 Captain Davis broke the Army Air Corps color barrier, becoming one of the first blacks to take advanced flying training. He went on to command the 93rd Pursuit Squadron, the first black air unit.







Air fares good through March

(ATCNS)—Military members considering air travel in an unofficial duty status have until March 31 to take advantage of special 50 percent discount rates offered by 11 airlines.

The discount off normal coach fares is offered to active duty military members traveling on leave, pass, other authorized absence, or for personal travel within seven days of discharge. This includes permissive TDY since travel is at personal expense.

Participating carriers are Trans World, American, U.S. Air, Western, United, Continental, Braniff, Northwest, Piedmont, Eastern and Pan American. Fares apply only to air travel within the continental United States.

Three airlines — Trans World, U.S. Air and Pan Am — offer the discount fares on all domestic routes. On the others, the fare applies only on selected routes. In addition, a 25 percent military discount is still offered by virtually all U.S. carriers on all their domestic routes.

Air Force transportation officials emphasize that the discount fares are not authorized for official TDY or PCS travel at government expense. This prohibition applies to travel expenses reimbursed for leave in connection with PCS as well.

Marquee reflects training dividends

Those driving out the gate may have noticed the marquee displaying the operational timeline position and wondered what it means.

By no means is it a measure of the overall health or effort expended on Reese. It is in fact a snapshot of how operational and maintenance investments have paid dividends. What the numbers will tell is how many days ahead or behind the ATC timeline Reese is.

There are many variables that task and keep the number affect that timeline position. positive side of the ledger.

Those variables which can be controlled are the maintenance capability, operational availability, and scheduling flexibility. The uncontrolled variables are unpredictable mechanical problems, weather, and parts availability.

If the weather and other unpredictable variables work against the mission, the number may drop from the plus side to the minus side. Historically, when the variables work in favor, the folks in the maintenance and operational areas will meet the task and keep the number on the positive side of the ledger.
