# 81-03 graduates 50

Fifty Reese officers will pin on the wings of an Air Force pilot this morning during graduation ceremonies for Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 81-03.

The graduation is scheduled for 10 a.m. in Simler Theater.

Guest speaker for the first graduation ceremony of 1981 is Brig. Gen. Regis F.A. Urschler, commander of the 47th Air Division, Strategic Air Command, at Fairchild AFB, Wash.

The Pittsburgh native enlisted in the Air Force upon graduation from high school and after basic training was initially assigned to Reese. In April 1954, General Urschler entered pilot training as an aviation cadet, completing primary training at Hondo Air Base, Texas and basic training at Vance AFB, Okla. He is a command pilot with more than 11,000 flying hours, 1,500 of which he logged on combat missions.

This listing is used by MICAP personnel to identify the main problem items and allows them to take further external action to preclude future MICAP delay incidents.

#### No cash

I have SURE pay. On Reese AFB, there is no place that I can cash my check without paying a fifty-cent charge. I think this is unfair.

There are four locations on Reese AFB where checks may be cashed: the Base Exchange, the Officers' Club, the Enlisted Club, and the Lubbock National Bank. The first three can be used by military and/or club members only. The Lubbock National Bank may cash checks for all Reese personnel, but is authorized by AFR 170-7 and

the local banking agreement to levy a fee for cashing checks for non-Lubbock National Bank depositors. The fifty cent fee agreed upon is deemed a fair charge to reimburse the bank for its services, loss of funds until reimbursed by check casher's bank, and to help make up for uncollectible checks.

# AF frowns on white-collar crime

The promising careers of three Air Force members and a civilian employee were suddenly interrupted recently when they were caught cheating Uncle Sam.

A rated officer and below-the-zone major selectee had been receiving married rate BAQ for a number of years since his divorce. His protestations of "I forgot to stop it" and "honest mistake" were undercut by his annual recertifications of dependency in the years following his divorce. In addition to his Article 15, he must reimburse the USAF the amount of overpayment — and he will do it from a captain's pay.

An NCO, described as a sure bet for E-8, packaged concrete blocks and shipped them as household goods in his do-it-yourself PCS move. The inflated weight brought him several extra "bonus" dollars. It also gave him an Article 15, suspended bust and a sizeable forfeiture — several times the amount of his "bonus."

An airman, selected for the Airman Education and Commissioning Program, reported the theft of his stereo system from his dormitory room. An investigation substantiated the loss, but did not identify the thief. The airman filed a claim and was reimbursed for the loss. Investigation later revealed the airman had sold his stereo to a civilian

friend and faked the theft in a scheme to finance a new system. His official statement concerning the theft and false claim for reimbursement resulted in an Article 15 and AFM 39-12 discharge — nor will he go to college at Uncle Sam's expense

The civilian employee, recently promoted and in line for supervisory duties, filed TDY vouchers claiming air travel and non-availability of government quarters. He was paid accordingly, but the truth was that he used his POV and stayed on base. His airline and motel receipts were false. He was fired.

White collar crime is neither less serious nor punished less severely than other offenses. Many believe that since Uncle Sam is the usual victim, or that since no person is murdered, assaulted or stolen from, that the punishment will be lighter, that is, a "slap on the wrist." It simply isn't so.

The first reason is that cheating the Air Force by fraud is a crime, white collar or otherwise, and is punishable as such.

The second reason is that losses to white collar crime are enormous. Maximum criminal prosecution or disciplinary action will be taken to punish offenders and cut down the loss

The plain fact is that DoD loses huge amounts of money and

resources each year through fraud and its non-criminal correlaries, waste and abuse.

Who is responsible? There are many popular theories ranging from unscrupulous contractors to bureaucratic bungling and congressional porkbarrelling. Each theory contains a small grain of truth, but the largest contributors to the annual loss, by far, are dishonest Air Force members and civilian employees. Some steal, many more waste and about the same number abuse Air Force property and funds. These criminals are a small percentage of the honest, professional Air Force family, but their illegal acts disproportionately account for a huge share of the annual loss. Individual cases seldom fall in the high-dollar category. Many can be called "nickle and dime fraud," but in total they add up to one very large amount.

Who pays for the acts of these crooks? You do! And you pay in several ways. First, federal tax rates must be higher to generate revenue to cover the loss. (We're not talking pennies here, estimates are that billions of dollars are lost throughout the government each year.) Second, the cost of goods and services at commissaries, exchanges and morale, welfare and recreation facilities are increased to offset

their losses through theft, waste and diversion. Third, some of the money lost could be used for quality of life improvements, such as air conditioning for dormitories, dining facilities, or for base pay increases.

The greatest opportunities for defrauding the Air Force exist at the base level. In your day-to-day activities, if you look, you very well may see fraud, waste or abuse. If you see, or suspect, a white collar crime, and do nothing, you only hurt yourself.

Air Force Office of Special Investigation is the investigative agency for the base commander. Any allegation, or even the appearance of fraud, waste or abuse, will be examined and the facts presented to the base commander for his review and action.

What can you do? If you see or suspect an irregularity, tell someone about it. Talk to your commander, first sergeant, or supervisor; or call AFOSI at Ext. 3666. If there is no answer, contact the security police desk sergeant at 3333 and ask for the AFOSI duty agent; we will respond, 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

The Air Force is in a war against fraud, waste and abuse. We have won a few battles, but if we are to win the war, we need your vigilance and information. You can help.

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
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# Village benefits from AFAF

As of January 1981 there were 278 residents in the Air Force Village.

In accordance with the concept that was formulated twenty years ago, the greater number of the residents are women, 174 or 62 percent. One hundred of these women (57.5 percent) are alone.

Thirty percent of the lone women require financial assistance from The Village; 89 percent need physical, medical or mobility assistance regularly.

About 83 percent of all Village residents are "limited activity" individuals. They have suffered physical loss of some kind and are not self-sufficient. The Village, in various ways, must offset their losses as friend and helper.

As the Village population increases to twice its present size in the fall of 1981, the number of individuals represented in these percentages will rise steadily. The tasks of "caring" will become

The Village's financial assistance program focuses on the needs of the lone women who need help. Many gifts to The Village also are designated by the donors for specific uses in the Nursing Home for equipment and furnishings.

The widows who need financial aid are, in many cases, those whose husbands died on active

### **Insulation saves money**

Giving your hot water heater a tion is adequate for the job, new overcoat is another inexpensive way to save money.

It won't even be a stylish overcoat at that.

While there is some insulation in most hot water heaters, an extra coat on the outside should save you between \$10-\$20 a year.

You can buy enough regular foil-backed insulation and tape to do this job for less than \$10, or you can buy one of the hot water tank kits that many hardware stores now feature.

Do-it-yourself is cheaper, and that's what counts.

**Tight and Neat** 

If you buy a roll of insulation for this energy-saver, you can use the remainder of the roll to finish some of the other low-cost measures described in this series.

For the water heater project you will need enough insulation to completely encircle the tank and also to cover the top.

though you may have to squeeze it a little to make it fit between the tank and any adjacent wall.

The insulation goes around the tank like gift-wrapping on a package - the shiny foil on the outside.

Since it will take two widths of insulation to cover the tank from top to bottom, you'll have to seal the horizontal seam with duct tape. Use this tape on the vertical seam where one edge of the insulation comes together with the other edge.

Last step is to cut a circle of insulation for the top and then seal that to the side insulation.

#### **Needed Holes**

The main point is to cover all exposed surfaces of the tank, except for certain critical areas that must be left free to "breathe."

On electric water heaters, it is best not to cover the drain faucet near the bottom, the thermostat The standard 31/2 inch insula- access panels, or the relief valve.





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

Airman Garcia also demonstrated his ability to other bases during support of Operation Gallant Eagle, in which he received a letter of appreciation citing demonstrated excellence.

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
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# **Board seeks applications**

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# AF seeks bomber

WASHINGTON (AFNS) -"The 96th Congress directed the Department of Defense to vigorously pursue full-scale engineering development of a strategic multirole bomber, maximizing range, payload and ability to perform the missions of conventional bomber, cruise-missile launch platform and nuclearweapons delivery systems in both the tactical and strategic roles," reports the Air Force Policy Letter for Commanders.

The Feb. 1 issue of the policy letter's Insight column further states, "Congress also directed an initial operational capability as soon as practicable, but no later than 1987."

The Air Force, using funds remaining from the cancelled cruise-missile carrier aircraft program and initial fiscal 81 funding from Congress, is preparing for the multirole bomber acquisition program due to begin this year.

Aircraft being considered include the B-1 bomber and its derivatives, a stretched and reengined version of the FB-111

called the FB-111B/C and an advanced-technology aircraft.

"The Air Force continues to advocate the concept of a mixed force of manned penetrating aircraft and air-launched cruise air defenses. To support this strategy in the near term, major modifications are planned for the B-52 force, including avionics for didate this spring."

cruise-missile integration.

"For the future, the Air Force The policy letter also reports is defining requirements and taking the first steps to formulate a program that will lead to a replacement for the B-52s in the 1990s. 
