The World-wide contest will also be held at Keesler starting March 24 through 30.



### Civilians gain coverage

Washington (AFNS) — Eligible Federal employees may choose a variety of new coverage plans during the Federal Employees Group Life Insurance enrollment period March

Younger employees must sign up for basic insurance during the enrollment period to benefit from increased coverage that takes effect Oct. 1 at no extra premium cost. Basic life insurance coverage will double for employees under 36 at no extra cost. Beginning at age 36, the additional coverage will decrease 10 percent each year until the basic benefit is reached at age 45.

The cost of basic insurance will be reduced from 25.5 cents to 24 cents per thousand effective April 1. The basic benefit equals the sum of the employees annual salary rounded off to the next \$1,000 plus \$2,000.

Employees will have the right to buy additional life insurance up to five times annual salary. Before now, only \$10,000 of optional insurance was available. Another option provides family life insurance of \$5,000 for a spouse and \$2,500 for each dependent child under age 22.

During the enrollment period, Central Civilian Personnel Offices will provide all employees the opportunity to select the coverage they want.

# Severe weather season approaches

Since winter made an early arrival on the South Plains this year (remember those 21 inches of snow back in November?), it's quite possible that Mother Nature will compensate by bringing us an early spring. And spring in these parts means the return of severe thunderstorms with high winds, hail and the everpresent threat of tornadoes.

#### Most destructive

Tornadoes are the most destructive of all atmospheric phenomena. The winds inside the whirling vortex have never been measured—no instrument for doing so has ever survived—but the best estimates are around 300 miles per hour. In addition, the center of the funnel is a partial vacuum, and the

sudden pressure drop can cause structures to literally explode.

A tornado's width can vary from a few hundred feet to better than a mile. Two examples of the giant type are the 1970 Lubbock tornado and the 1979 Wichita Falls twister, both of which killed more than 20 persons. The average forward speed of a tornado is 30-40 mph, but they have been observed standing dead still or racing along at 70 mph.

Twisters are capricious in their travels; they often swing wildly from side to side and may intermittently leave the ground. Thus, one house may be left untouched while both its next-door neighbors are totally destroyed.

This danger to people and property means increased work for the Reese weather station, which provides operational support for the entire base. The most important part of this support is a 24-hour radar watch of all storm activity within 120 miles of Reese AFB, plus an intensified weather watch as severe weather approaches the area.

Warnings

"Should a funnel cloud be detected, either visually or on radar, within 15 miles of the base, we will issue a tornado warning," said detachment commander, Capt. John Sanders. "And if one of our observers spots one within six miles, we will ask the command post to sound the base siren."

The three to five minute steady blast is a signal to take shelter immediately—not, Captain Sanders emphasized, "a signal for everyone on base to rush outside hollering, 'Where's the tornado? Where's the tornado?' as has happened in the past."

Those living off base should monitor the local radio and TV stations whenever severe weather is occurring or forecast. An excellent safety investment would be a National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration weather radio to monitor the Lubbock National Weather Service frequency of 162.4 megahertz. Tornado locations and movements are also broadcast on these radios. Some models have a built-in alarm that sounds when a severe weather watch or warning is issued.

A watch simply means that condi-

tions are ripe for severe weather. A warning means such weather is actually in progress.

Just in case

Base officials recommend that people have an emergency kit stashed somewhere in the house. The kit should contain a battery-operated radio, flashlight, extra batteries for both and some fresh water.

If you sight a tornado, Rule Number One is don't panic. Rule Number Two is seek shelter at once. A car is not adequate shelter—remember, a tornado can toss railroad locomotives around as though they were models. A basement or storm cellar is the best place to be. If your home doesn't have one, get down to the bottom floor in a central hallway or closet.

If time permits, you can open a window or door to lessen the effects of that partial vacuum, but stay away from windows and loose furniture.

Incidentally, a mobile home is a good place to avoid during a tornado, because of its high surface-to-weight ratio. If you live in a trailer park, it should have a storm cellar. If it doesn't, ask the manager why not!

If caught outdoors, remember that tornadoes generally travel southwest to northeast. Move away from the twister at right angles to its path. If all else fails, get into a ditch, ravine or other depression and cover your head.

With the onset of Reese's severe weather season, the Reese weather station will be limiting its services during bad weather to mission-essential support only.

We're required to give top priority to direct mission support, such as disseminating weather data, advisories and warnings to airborne pilots and the Supervisors of Flying and lowest priority to giving weather briefings via phone to people on the ground.

When hazardous weather threatens Reese, we simply don't have the time or the resources to answer casual questions. At such times we must insure aircraft are safely recovered and base agencies are given sufficient warning before the bad weather hits.

For non-operational customers, recorded weather observations and forecasts are available on Ext. 3570, on Lubbock's NOAA Weather Radio frequency of 162.4 MHz, or National Weather Service telephone 762-4647.



# **March lion roars** into South Plains

March heralds the arrival of spring on the South Plains and with it comes Texas' famous blowing dust in earnest.

Last year, winds exceeded 35 knots more than 20 times in March, with a near-hurricaneforce peak of 63 knots recorded on the 31st - at which time the dust reduced visibility to 100 meters.

The average high temperature

for the month is 64 degrees Fahrenheit, with a mean low of 37. The changeable nature of March's weather can be seen in the extreme temperature readings of 94 and 10. Reese receives an average of .64 inch of precipitation - including 1.3 inches of snow - spread out over three days. The last part of the month ushers in our "official" thunderstorm season, although of course thunderstorms can occur at any time of the year.

# exington Munitions Supply nets ATC honor

Reese is a training base and, as such, doesn't often conjure visions of weaponry or munitions. Well. Reese not only has a munitions supply account, but it has one of the best in the command.

64th Supply Squadron's Munitions Supply Account was recently selected as runner-up in Air Training Command competition for 1980. The award was based on "unprecedented superior support to the flying training mission of the 64th Flying Training Wing," according to the chief of supply, Maj. Carl D. Alberchinski.

Lackland AFB, Texas won the ATC award and will represent the command at Air Force.

The support was provided during a period of significantly increased training requirements, even without increases in manpower or equipment. Some achievements of the unit includ-

- A 99.91 percent effectiveness rate on the timeliness of the Air Force Ammunition Transaction Report submitted to the Air Force Logistics Command.
- · No discrepancies in any inspections, including the Management Effectiveness Inspection,

with many laudatory comments. These comments included, "being maintained in a highly outstanding manner," "was highly secure," and "personnel were enthusiastically performing their duties despite the adverse weather conditions."

- Inventory accuracy was 100 percent for two months of the grading period, and monthly reconciliation of munitions items (required for 33 percent of inventory) stayed at 100 percent throughout the year.
- Programs were initiated to enhance the capability of the wing to provide rapid response to local as well as world-wide contingencies, in conjunction with increased attention to wartime operations.

In addition to supporting the mission of the 64th Flying Training Wing, the Munitions Supply Account has five host/tenant agreements for the support of training and exercises of the 413th Civil Affairs Company, 829th Station Hospital, Air Force ROTC Det. 320, U.S. Army Third ROTC Region and the 26th Air Defense Squadron.

Reese's Personal Affairs Unit at the Consolidated Base Personnel Office and the Family Services Center are once again planning a Personal Affairs orientation for spouses.



### **CHAMPUS** makes changes

Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services is getting better. There have been CHAMPUS improvements worth sharing.

CHAMPUS changed its method of reimbursement in July. In determining the amount of CHAMPUS reimbursement, the actual charge or the prevailing rate is used. OCHAMPUS is dropping the customary charge in the adjudication process. This change means that approximately \$14 million more will be paid in benefits. Approximately 60 percent of all claims will be paid at the actual billed rate compared to 40 percent previously.

Another improvement concerns new standards for fiscal intermediaries (contractors). New standards require the fiscal intermediaries to process 75 percent of all claims received within 21 working days. Financial incentives or penalties are used for those above or below standards performance, as appropriate.

CHAMPUS has agreed to permit use of the new American Medical Association (AMA) claim form for professional services. This action provides for some degree of standardization within the civilian environment. The HCFA-1500/CHAMPUS-501

# Suggestion results in

The results of the Fiscal Year 1980 Suggestion Program have been released. A total of 91,352 suggestions were accepted for evaluation, of these 16,996 were adopted. Owners of these suggestion ideas were paid over one and one-half million dollars in awards.

Air Training Command placed second in the total savings area, however, ATC personnel almost doubled the command goal of 10 million with total savings of \$18.5 million. Awards paid totaled over \$150,000.

Most noteworthy of all the suggestion figures released is the productivity rate of \$18 saved for each \$1 spent in manpower and awards. At a time when productivity in the U.S. is at an all time low, dollar return for dollar invested is very critical.

The Department of Defense is charged with providing the best possible military force at the lowest possible cost. The Suggestion Program is one of many programs designed to help reduce these costs.

Donald L. Younkers, maintenance foreman at McGuire AFB, N.J., won the Suggester of the Year Award. He received almost \$9,000 in awards for suggestions he has submitted.

Air Staff has set a goal of \$80,000,000 for the FY81 program. The Suggestion Program will need the support of each Air Force member, military and civilian, to meet this challenge. Your good ideas are in high demand. Suggest today.

Form is expected to be available for use in 1981.

Next, the decision has been made to require CHAMPUS Fiscal Intermediaries to provide toll-free "800" numbers for use by both beneficiaries and providers in all contract jurisdictions. Very shortly these lines will be available in the New England and Florida areas and phased-in in all other areas over the next few months. The system will provide direct toll-free services to fiscal intermediaries daily during normal working hours.

Finally, another CHAMPUS related improvement is in the supplemental health insurance area. Some Service organizations providing supplemental health insurance are improving their coverage. They are going to pay what CHAMPUS does not pay after the deductible is satisfied. They are going to use the actual billed charge in their computation, not the CHAMPUS allowable charge. Also, the pre-existing condition requirement is being lowered to six months.

New CHAMPUS legislation is

being developed to further improve benefits. CHAMPUS is slowly improving.

Specifically, the legislation provides:

a. Elimination of \$50/100 deductible requirement for dependents of active duty, retirees and others.

b. Elimination of CHAMPUS copayment for dependents of active duty.

c. A \$1000 family financial liability limit for covered services received during each calendar year.

d. Eye examinations, refractions, and prescriptions for corrective lenses but not the corrective lenses or eyeglass frames themselves for dependents of active duty only.

e. Flexibility in provider reimbursement e.g., fee schedule, negotiated fees.

f. CHAMPUS eligibility for beneficiaries who attain Medicare entitlement.

# Safety Wise



March 8-14 is Girl Scout Week, marking the founding of Girl Scouting on March 12, 1912.


Reese sponsors three Brownie troops, two Girl Scout and one cadet troop.

Group won the title despite losing the services of 6 foot 7 power forward Stanley Burdine when he injured his Achilles tendon against Organizational Maintenance.


It was the third time in five meetings this year that Group had beaten Supply. The two teams had dominated regular season play as well as the playoffs.
